

Improvements Increase

Lumber, wire, and posts are being loaded out every day from the Lovington Hardware and The People's Store for new improvements on old and new claims. This looks like the country is settling up. And to see our dry goods stores filled with people and a number of clerks busy wrapping up numerous articles and darting about each other in their haste to wait on the customers makes a bystander think of a game of double snap. But also reminds one that this game looks to be one that did not allow any turning back in it. For it speaks of a move of emigration to this part of the Plains that has made the merchants increase their stock of goods, hence, the increase of clerks at this busy time of the year as well, and every phase of business in town seems to be pointing to a steady growth along their respective lines in the up building of our town and country.

New Live Stock Methods

Raising and handling cattle on the range and in pastures in N. M. is being done differently than formerly and the change will be still greater in the next year or two. Cattle raising is being placed on a business basis. Among the changes now coming into use may be noted the segregation of the steers and cow and heifers.

In the words of a leading stock man in N. M.: "I have learned by experience that it pays to segregate my cattle, keep all the steers in a pasture by themselves and the cows and heifers in another pasture. In handling them in this way I find less disturbance and better results generally."

I have also discovered, "he continued, "that we must dehorn all our cattle if we expect to receive the highest prices for them. We use registered bulls select the very best cows, letting the off-colored and poorer kinds go. When our calves are about ten months old we dehorn all of them. At that age the horn is just starting and its removal does not cause any harm and does not disfigure the head as is the case when an animal reaches an advanced age. These changes from the old way of handling our cattle bring their reward."

The winter care of live stock on the range and in the pastures is another change that has come just recently. The spread of agriculture over what was for a long time considered exclusive grazing range has helped to bring the change of winter feeding. Last season proved conclusively that the stockmen who fed their cattle and sheep through the winter on cake or farm feed, lost no stock and when spring came their cows and ewes brought a larger increase. It paid well and this year others follow in example.



Survey of The Queen Road Is Completed

Carlsbad, N. M., Dec. 20. The forest service has completed a survey of a road across the forest in the Gaudalope Mountains by way of Queen in western Eddy county. Robert Stephenson, forest ranger, in charge of the surveying party, came in last night and reported this morning. He says that a new route has been found that cuts out the old kinks and steep grades and at the same time cuts down the distance very materially. The route as now surveyed is fifteen and three quarters mile long and has no bad curves or steep grades.

The government intimates that it is up to the people. If Eddy county builds a good road from Carlsbad to the boundary of the National Forest, the government will build the fifteen and a fraction miles across the forest.

Tom Middleton who is authority on road building in the mountains says that Dog Canyon hill west of Queen has been reduced from thirty to eight in grade and is no longer a dread to the wayfarer. He is autoist or still a driver of the horse. C. M. Richards kept after the forest service in season and out of season and it is largely due to him and that other Eddy county good roader C. H. McLenathen that the government has made the survey of a road across the forest. It is up to the people to show they mean business by building to the forest boundary.
