Increasing Use Of Oil

Steel manufacturers are turning more and more to the use of oil. France is urging that big concerns convert their boilers to burn oil in place of coal. Large users of coal in Paris declared it would take months to adapt the boiler to the new fuel but it is stated a group of American engineers guaranteed to make the complete change in 6 weeks.

As the advantages of oil as fuel becomes recognized its use is being rapidly extended.

Consumption is exceeding production in the U. S. This situation causes the necessity of national and state policies which will encourage development of new oil fields and the opening of thousands of acres now withdrawn from use in the western states, by the government.

Variety Corn yields

Los Lunas, N. M.—Corn variety tests just completed in Valencia County.

County show some interesting results. These tests were conducted at Los Lunas, Peralta and Bluewater.

Ten different varieties were planted by county agent Conroy in each place. At Los Lunas and Peralta the highest yielding variety was the Arlington Prolific White Dent which was furnished by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The variety yielded 113 bushels to the acre at Los Lunas and 104.1 at Peralta.

The Laguna White Dent was another good variety yielded 109 bushels per acre. The U. S. No. 201 also a white dent variety yielded 102.3 bushels per acre. in the

Peralta test and 95.9 in Los Lunas test.

The high altitude test at Bluewater where ten other varieties were grown at approximately 6300 feet shows the Bluewater Improved White Flat variety the best yield or at 69.5 bushels per acre. The U. S. 933 a yellow dent variety was next with a yield of 54.3 bushels per acre.

Similar tests will be conducted next year with the best of these varieties, in order to make certain that they will be suitable for planting by farmers of these sections.

Farmers in other parts of the state should not conclude that these are the varieties for them to grow because of the results obtained from these tests. These results merely indicate that these varieties might be very desirable in parts of New Mexico when properly acclimated.

The Basis Of Credit

If ever this nation had the value of insurance impressed upon it, it was during the war.

Insurance was the stabilizing influence and basis of credit. It was the safeguard of the soldier's families and it assured protection to American industry from the frightful losses it suffered in overseas shipments.

The general public is not sufficiently familiar with stabilizing effect of insurance upon American industrial life today.

Impartial rating bureaus working along scientific lines, not guess work, have made it possible to reduce insurance cost while giving greater protection.

Insurance is one of the few industries that has been able to actually reduce its costs below the pre-war figure and this speaks well for private industry and enterprise.

A Fighting Front

"A Fighting Front" is what Frank Farrello, county chairman for the Red Cross Christmas Seal sale, says he has prepared for the drive which will open on December first and continue for ten days. Mr. Farrello has announced his list of workers who will assist in raising the \$1525 which has been found to be the quota of this county in the drive. The quota is based on population, taxable wealth and the amount of work which it is contemplated will be done in the county by the New Mexico Public Health Association, state agents for the sale.

The campaign consists of the sale of health bonds and Christmas seals. The bonds are to be given in lieu of seals to the large contributors. The Christmas seal is easily sold at the holiday season and in view of the sudden increase in tuberculosis due to the war and the need for prompt health measures in this state, it is expected that the sale will be extremely heavy.

Taxing the Millionaires.

Under the new scale of income tax imposed by the recent United States revenue bill every citizen in receipt of \$150,000 or more a year must pay at least half of it to the state.

Mr. Henry Ford, for example, is said to have an income of \$25,000,000 a year, of which the revenue authorities will claim between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000—a sum sufficient to keep 1,000 families in modest comfort forever.

But even Mr. Ford gets off lighter than Mr. John D. Rockefeller, who is reputed to have an income of \$100,000,000 a year. Mr. Rockefeller's contribution to the treasury, it is said, will not fall short of \$80,000,000 for the current year—a sum which represents 2,000 times his weight in gold.

MANY PLANTS WILL CLOSE

THOUSANDS OF MEN WILL SOON BE IDLE THROUGH COAL SHORTAGE.

SITUATION IS CRITICAL

FUEL SHORTAGE IS BECOMING ACUTE IN CHICAGO AND OTHER CITIES.

Chicago, Nov. 22.—One thousand industrial plants in the Chicago district will be forced to suspend operations on account of fuel shortage if the coal strike goes on for ten days more, it has been declared from authoritative sources.

"One week more of coal shortage and non-production will create a very serious situation and affect many members of our association," was the statement made from the office of President John M. Glenn of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association. "We will not be surprised if the number should reach 1,000."

Chicago.—Industry in the Middle West has found itself in a critical condition with shutdowns ordered, or in prospect, as a result of the soft coal shortage due to the miners' strike. While the fuel administration had ordered an embargo on export of hard coal, except to Canada, and miners' leaders and operators were considering counter proposals at Washington, announcement was made by the Illinois Manufacturers' Association that seven large industries would be forced to suspend operations indefinitely.

The companies announcing shutdowns were the following:
A. H. Andrews & Co., manufacturers of office furniture, employing about 500 men.

James S. Kirk & Co., employing 2,000.

Interstate Iron and Steel Company, operating three plants.

American Gue Company, with plants at Indianapolis and Hammond, Ind., and Des Moines, Iowa, employing about 5,000.

Oliver Chilled Plow Works, South Bend, Ind., probably will reduce to half its facilities immediately.

Kankakee Tile and Brick Company, Kankakee, Ill.

Leather Iron Works, Decatur, Ill., shut down.

Many other plants may be forced to shut down or greatly reduce their operations at the end of another week of non-production of coal, it was said at the association's offices.

Reports were somewhat encouraging from West Virginia and Colorado, where production is increasing.

Can't Get Protection.

Oakland, Cal.—Franz Roetke, publisher of the World, the official newspaper of the Industrial Workers of the World in Oakland, announced that the paper had suspended publication indefinitely, as the Oakland police department had not guaranteed to protect the paper from threatened raids from the American Legion and other organizations.

Red Cross Gives Assistance.

Washington.—In the past ten months the American Red Cross extended financial aid, totalling \$8,711,737, to families of men in the service, national headquarters reported here. The home service section assisted the families of 300,241 soldiers, sailors and marines during the month of August alone.

Wheat Embargo Off Dec. 15.

New York.—Embargoes on wheat and wheat flour will be lifted Dec. 15. It was announced by the United States grain corporation. Lifting of embargoes on both exports and imports followed the action of President Wilson in signing a proclamation completely terminating the embargo control which has been in effect for more than two years.

Rush Whisky to Chicago.

Chicago.—Thousands of whisky are being rushed to Chicago from Kentucky distilleries to supply the demand if the war-time prohibition is lifted. It became known that 4,000 barrels of whisky have been received in Chicago from Kentucky during the past ten days and that many thousands of barrels are on the way.

Present at Every Roll Call.

Washington.—Two members of the House—Box, Democrat, Texas, and Ricketts, Republican, Ohio—ramped away with all attendance honors during the special session just closed, each having voted on all of the 214 roll calls.

Plan Strike Next Spring.

Phoenix, Ariz.—Following appointment by the local post of the American Legion of a committee to investigate radical activities in this region, interest was focussed on a statement published here in which James I. Gannon, secretary of Metal Mine Workers Industrial Union No. 800, said to be a branch of the Industrial Workers of the World, was quoted as declaring a state-wide strike of copper miners would be called in the spring unless a six-hour day was granted.
