

Welcoming ceremonies accorded Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Irish republic," on his arrival at San Francisco, included an official greeting by Mayor James Rolph at the ferry building and a public reception at his hotel.

Victor Rosewater, proprietor of the Omahn Bee, and the Bee Publishing Company each was fined \$1,000 by District Judge Redick after being found guilty of contempt in publish ing an article relating to a grand jury cnse.

State farm loans to the number of sixty-eight, aggregating \$103,000, were closed during October, according to the report of Sidney Miller, register of the Montana State land office. The first list of Germans to be tried by the allies for being responsible for the war totals 80 names, according to reports from London. The list includethe former kaiser, the former crown prince and Admiral Von Tirpitz. At English judge will preside.

Child labor in the United States has decreased more than 40 per cent since the child labor tax provision of the revenue act went into effect April 25 last.

Settlement of the controversy over disposition of the German liner Imperator was indicated by shipping board officials, who intimated the ship would be tendered immediately to Great Britain.

While arguments on the validity of the war-time prohibition act will be heard by the Supreme Court this week a decision is not expected before Dec. Sth, when the court reconvenes after a recess.

Holding that the authority of the railroad administration over rates. schedules and classifications was necessary to enable it promptly to meet operating emergencies arising during the existing period of heavy traffic, President Wilson vetoed the Senate bill restoring the prewar rate making nowers of the interstate commerce commission.

Arthur Brisbane has announced the ale of the Wushington Times and the Wisconsin News of Milwankee, to William Randolph Hearst. The sale price was not made public.

Approximately 4,000 bales of cotton burned in a fire which swept part of the St. Louis Cotton Compress Company's plant at Eldorado, Ark., according to a dispatch received at Little Rock. The loss is about \$1,000,000.

A crowd took Wallace Baynes, a negro, from his home near Madison, N. C. and shot him to death, after he had killed Kay Ozburn, railroad station agent, who had assisted an officer in an attempt to arrest him on a minor charge. The negro was found between two mattresses and dragged with a rope around his neck to nearby woods and hanged.

Twenty foreigners, all striking coal miners, were refused naturalization papers at Hillsboro, Ill. by Circuit Judge W. T. Jett, when he was informed that, they had not returned to work following withdrawal of the strike order.

The eighth international egg-laving contest at the State Agricultural College at Storrs, Conn., ended with a vie tory for the ten Barred Plymouth Rocks entered by Jules F. Francals of Westhampton Beach, L. I. Their total yield for the fifty-two weeks is 2,022 eggs, this being the only pen in the entire competition to average more than 200 eggs for each of the ten hens,

Automobile accidents in the state of New York were responsible for the deaths of 104 persons, according to a report of the National Highway Protective Society issued recently. During the corresponding month last year ninety-five persons were killed in the state by auto accidents. The report shows that of these deaths, fifty-nine occurred in New Yok city, while during the same month last year fifty-six persons were killed in motor car accidents in the city.
