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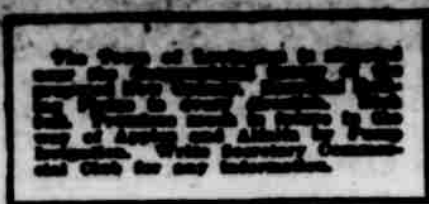

GOINGS AND HAPPENINGS THAT MARK THE PROGRESS OF THE AGE.

### ABOUT THE WAR

German submarine sunk by French and British warships and crew captured.

Spanish cabinet meets to discuss torpedoing of Spanish vessels by submarines.

Official report of American attaché supports theory steamer Sussex was torpedoed.

Austrians have drawn the Italians from the border ridge between Lombardy and Monte Fumo.

France issues official statement that thirty-five German aeroplanes were destroyed during March.

Villa's force, estimated at 500, was severely defeated in a five-hour battle at Guerrero on March 29 by Col. Dodd.

Another Zeppelin raid was made on England Monday night. The British report says no casualties have been recorded.

British capture town of Fehle in Mesopotamia from Turks in advance to relieve besieged English force at Kut-el-Amara.

The report that Greece has requested withdrawal of the French and British forces at Saloniki is reiterated in an Athens dispatch.

Germans capture village of Hancourt, northwest of Verdun. French take large section of the Carre works and also drive Teutons back in desperate underground fight.

Surprised during their siesta, one of the groups of Villa's force driven from Guerrero, was defeated Saturday by a squadron of the Tenth Cavalry under Col. W. C. Brown, according to information secured by Gen. Pershing and forwarded by him to Gen. Funston at San Antonio, Tex.

In this second engagement the American troops have had with Villa's men the bandits' loss was estimated at thirty killed. No mention of any American loss was made.

### WESTERN

The "dry" made gains in Nebraska elections.

Gen. Cecil A. Lyon, Progressive national committeeman, died at Sherman, Tex., after an illness of several weeks.

Official admission of the belief that Villa has fled far beyond the American frontier and now is operating south of Chihuahua City, was made at Gen. Funston's headquarters at Fort Sam Houston.

The Grand Army of the Republic turned the half-century point in its existence, and a nation acknowledged its love and respect for the men who between 1861 and 1865 faced death on the battlefield that the union of states might be preserved.

Fifty persons, including women and children, were murdered by bandits between Torreon and Zacatecas on March 28, when the marauders wrecked the train on which they were riding, according to word brought to El Paso, Tex., by passengers.

The bodies of Mrs. Corinne Wheeler, 76 years old, and Mrs. Kate B. Swift, aged 53, were found in their home at Seattle, Wash., by H. S. King, their nephew. The heads of both women had been crushed and \$3,000 supposed to have been hidden in the house was missing.

Two hundred and fifty women will go into military encampment on the United States Presidio at San Francisco June 1, for six weeks under strict military rule, to learn the ways of war, says an announcement by Mrs. Frederick H. Colburn of the women's section of the Navy League.

### WASHINGTON

Government agencies investigating the spectacular rise in the price of gasoline have virtually concluded preliminary phases of their work and will report to Congress.

Gen. Funston advised the War Department that he was sending more troops into Mexico from Columbus, N. M., to protect the line of communication with Gen. Pershing.

A definite public statement of support from two Republican senators, and "under the hat" statements from a half dozen others that Col. Roosevelt is the probable Republican nominee, were made after the colonel's receipt statement.

Father Angel Maria Barcelo, age 65 years, whose death is attributed by his friends to a broken heart, because of his exile from Sonora more than a year ago, was buried at Douglas, Ariz.

A joint resolution directing the Census Bureau to collect and publish statistics of raw and prepared cotton and its products consumed in manufacture of explosives passed the House, 169 to 129.

Billy Sunday, the evangelist, was received by President Wilson at the White House.

### FOREIGN

King George has placed £100,000 at the disposal of the treasury.

Admiral Sir Cyprian Bridge, in a report on merchant shipping losses, gives the total number of ships lost to allied nations and neutrals as 758.

Ten thousand Mersey river dock hands went on strike at Liverpool following a dispute concerning pay for overtime work.

The British chancellor of exchequer has estimated that the war expenditure of Great Britain for the present year will be £1,500,000,000.

Two hundred persons were killed or injured in a fire in a powder factory in the County of Kent, it was officially announced in London.

Sir John Eldon Gorst, financial secretary to the treasury in 1891, and member of Parliament for Cambridge University, 1892-1906, died at his home in London.

The British government's contribution for the relief of Belgium and northern France is about £500,000 monthly, Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, said in the House of Commons.

Gen. Zuepelli, the minister of war, has resigned on account of ill health. King Victor Emmanuel has accepted his resignation and appointed Gen. Paolo Morone, commander of an army corps, to succeed him.

On the arrival of the Aurora at Dunedin, N. Z., J. R. Stenhouse, the first officer, who brought the vessel from Ross sea, expressed confidence that Sir Ernest Shackleton had succeeded in making his trip across the pole according to schedule.

The admiralty officially denies an assertion said to have been made in the United States Congress that an American woman was stripped of her clothing before men in an examination conducted by British authorities.

According to this denial, all examinations of women are made by women examiners and in private cabins.

Commenting on the American inquiries regarding the torpedoing of the steamer Sussex and Englishman, the Hamburger Nachrichten says: "Who on earth cares in Germany whether these ships were torpedoed by German submarines or not? They belonged to and were used by the enemy and were destroyed. That is all we care about at the moment."

Several hundred soldiers were put to work at Columbus preparing a new aviation field for the eight new aeroplanes purchased by the War Department.

A shocking accident occurred at the Koshier mine, resulting in the death of Arthur Reed, the 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Reed of Raton.

W. P. Southard of Albuquerque, announced that he would accept the chairmanship of the state fair commission, which Governor McDonald announced.

A total of \$103,650 is appropriated for the United States Indian school at Santa Fe in the general Indian appropriation bill passed by the Senate at Washington.

Seth Alston bought of Mr. Hewett, of Dunlap, 1,840 acres of land, 150 head of registered cows, forty graded cows and 1,800 head of sheep at a price of \$47,500.

Wolves, lions and coyotes took heavy toll of stock on the forest ranges in the Albuquerque forest district during last year. A total of 4,500 head were killed.

The United States Supreme Court granted the state of New Mexico permission to sue the secretary of the Interior to compel him to grant title to coal lands in school land grants.

A brakeman by the name of Shaw running between Roswell and Clovis had his foot cut off in the railroad yards at Clovis.

Crescencio Molina, the third of three defendants to face a jury in the District Court at Silver City at the present term on an indictment charging murder, was acquitted, the jury being out but five minutes.

Prof. Rupert F. Asplund, for the past seven years chief clerk of the State Department of Education, tendered his resignation to the State Board to take effect April 30. The resignation was accepted.

What appears to have been a tyro murder was committed at Tylene. The body of Mr. Brainard, bartender in the saloon, was found lying in a pool of blood near the cash register with two bullet holes through his head.

The State Corporation Commission hearing on intra-state rates, at which final arguments by shippers and railroad representatives will be heard, and which will be followed by an order readjusting freight rates in New Mexico, will be held in Santa Fe April 21.

Edwin Lyons, well known in Las Cruces and a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Bowman, of Mesilla Park, and who lived there since early childhood, with the Bownmans, who are his foster parents, is now at the front in Mexico with Col. Dodd, being second lieutenant in the Seventh Cavalry.

Las Cruces voted to issue \$12,000 bonds for waterworks and \$7,000 for sewer system improvements. Republican nominees for town trustees and treasurer were elected.

Five men were stabbed and four teen other persons, five of them girls, were injured by alleged strikers in a raid on a shirtwaist factory in Brooklyn, N. Y.

The Santa Fe depot at Dayton and several stock cars were destroyed by fire. The loss is placed at \$4,000.

By a vote of 106 to 6, the business men of Albuquerque have decided that they want a state fair this year.

The Santa Fe railway is getting ready to make extensive improvements on its line through the Pecos valley.

Castulo Silva of Dilla and William E. Kelley of Socorro have been commissioned notaries public by Governor McDonald.

The Deming creamery is now receiving from 900 to 1,000 pounds of cream weekly, and is producing from 300 to 350 pounds of butter.

Mrs. Maude Hawk Wright and baby have returned to Silver City from El Paso. Mrs. Wright was taken prisoner when Villa bandits raided Columbus.

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## NEW MEXICO SCHOOLS

NEARLY \$2,000,000 SPENT FOR EDUCATION IN YEAR.

Increase of \$161,000 Over Previous Year Shown at Meeting of State Board.

Santa Fe.—The state of New Mexico spent nearly \$2,000,000 during the school year of 1914-1915 for educational purposes, which is an increase of \$161,000 over the year 1913-1914.

This was ascertained on the completion of certain statistical tables by the State Department of Education.

For the past year the total expenditures of elementary and high schools amounted to \$1,549,825.99 and for the state educational institutions, \$134,495.08, making a total of \$1,684,321.07. The total for 1913-1914 was \$1,523,326.64.

The revenues and expenditures of the state educational institutions in the years 1914 and 1915, ending June 30, follow:

Baca and Vigil File Answer.

Santa Fe.—Mrs. Celestino Otero, chief witness for the government in the trial which resulted in the acquittal of Elfege Baca and Manuel U. Vigil of the charge of aiding in the escape of Gen. Jose Ynez Salazar from federal custody at Albuquerque, was characterized as unworthy of belief, according to the answer filed by Baca and Vigil in the federal court here to the order of Judge W. H. Pope requiring them to show cause why they should not be disbarred on the ground of the testimony against them in the trial. Respondents specifically deny the charges included in the court order.

Chavez Murder Mystery Solved.

Albuquerque.—A confession the police claim to have obtained from Jose Medina that he killed Jose N. Chavez, a saloon keeper who was found partially buried in a brick yard here a month ago, clears up one of the most mysterious murders here in some time. Medina asserted his reason for the killing was a quarrel over a 25-cent debt he owed the liquor man. Officers, however, think jealousy over a girl was the real reason.

Reunion Buys Grounds.

East Las Vegas.—The New Mexico Cowboys' Reunion Association has bought Amusement park, conveniently located to both this city and the town of Las Vegas, and will use the grounds as the site of its annual reunion.

Two Las Vegas Painfully Wounded.

Las Vegas.—Nelson Mueller was shot through the hand and Lawrence Coors through the wrist and leg when a revolver in the hands of Mueller was accidentally discharged.

School Bonds Bring High Figure.

Alamogordo.—The Tularosa school district bonds, \$30,000 worth, have been sold to a Chicago bonding house for \$30,006.50 and the expenses of the issue.

Makes School Apportionment.

Santa Fe.—About \$83,000 in the state school fund was apportioned to the different counties by Superintendent of Public Instruction Alvan N. White. State Bank Resources \$11,000,000.

Santa Fe.—The total resources of the state banks on March 7 were \$10,950,969.65, according to the statement of Bank Examiner R. H. Carter. There were at that date 8,583 savings depositors and 20,917 other depositors.

Alleged High Graders in Custody.

Carrizozo.—H. H. and F. G. Newbury were taken in custody by Underheriff J. B. Baird and brought to this place from White Oaks, to answer to the charge of having stolen a quantity of tungsten ore from the White Oaks Mines Consolidated Company of the latter place. The arrest followed the swearing out of a search warrant and the discovery of ten sacks of high grade ore, valued at \$2,000 under the floor of the Newbury house.

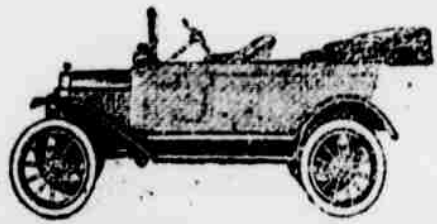
