KNEE-CAP A USEFUL AND MUCH APPRECIATED ARTICLE.

to sick headache, sour stomach, To Those With the Spare Time and Necessary Skill, the Following Directions for Its Making Will Be Found Ample.

> The directions for this are for man's medium size; it is a splendid pattern, as the part covering the kneecap is softly padded with loops of wool

About six ounces of white sports wool will be needed for a pair, if worked with No. 12 hook. The back thread of stitch to be taken through-

Work 60 chain stitches, turn. Row 1.-A treble in fifth from hook and 1 into each of the other stitches to end of chain, 57 stitches, the turn-


ing chain taking the place of 1 treble;

Rows 2 to 5.- , 3 chain, 1 treble in back thread of every stitch of previous row; turn and repeat from * three times more: turn.

Row 6.-3 chain, 25 consecutive trebles-the chain standing as one treble-2 in the next stitch, 1 in each of the next 5, 2 in the next and 1 in each of the remaining 25; turn.

Row 7.-A double crochet in each of the first 25 stitches, 2 in the next (this will be the nearest of the 2 in the last increase in the previous row), a double crochet in each of the following stitches as far as the other increase; into the last of these two work I double crochet and 1 treble, then a treble in each of the remaining 25 stitches. (Note-there must always be 25 stitches at each end of the work outside the increases and decreases.)

Row 8 .- 25 trebles, 2 trebles in next, commence the next treble as usual but before passing the hook through the stitch in the previous row, place the forefinger of the left hand upon the wool and keep it there while com-



pleting the stitch, thus forming a loop; remove the finger and repeat from . to the next increase: into the last of these work 1 treble and 1 double crochet, then 25 double cro chets; turn.

Row 9 .- 25 double crochets, 2 in the next, 1 in each of the next to the increase, 1 double crochet and 1 treble in last of the two, 25 trebles; turn. Repeat rows 8 and 9 five times more. but when repeating row 9 for the last time, omit the increase.

Correct Feeding and Clean Houses Are Essential.

Profits Depend on Persistency of Herdsman in Fighting Unsanitary Conditions - Alfalfa Makes Best Muscle and Bone.

A hog and his health are soon part ed if the caretaker is the least inclined to allow the pigs to care for themselves. Pig profits in the corn belt depend on the persistency of the herdsman in fighting unsanitary conditions. And doubly hard must the pig grower work to ward off disease if he does not give forage an important place on the bill of fare.

Any hog, to have a clean system, must have the correct kind of feeding. Naturally, the hog eats much grass and forage. When he cannot get it, he is unable to do what nature tells him to do in keeping his system in exact tone.

Pigs grown on forage and carried into the breeding period and then through the winter on rightly cured hay and slops made of clean feed are always ready to withstand exposure. A clean digestive apparatus and liv-

er can throw off many impurities of a hog's body. Alfalfa pasturage is found to make the best bone and muscle on pigs of any known forage. Clover is good, but cannot equal the unkillable alfalfa plant.

Alfalfa or clover pasturage keeps the pig's blood cool and the bowels in excellent condition. It also grows an earlier maturing animal. For winter PROTECTION FOR THE FARM use this plant should be cured as green as possible. Cock in after cutting, and do not allow the sun to bleach it until all the color is gone. Not long since I saw a farmer who was feeding alfalfa hay, cured green and very toothsome, on a feeding floor. This was late in the fall. flesh-tinted chiffon, this wrap is in-

Between the three trough-feeds daily an abundance of this fine hay was tossed upon the floor, where the pigs devoured it greedily. The troughfeed was of cracked corn and more alfalfa to balance it.

Plan to have the front of the house open on all nice winter days, and a flood of sunlight will help to rid the place of any disease that may be lurking about.

Dust should be avoided in the house Keep it clean, and hoe it out often. Bedding is cheap. Use plenty of it.

Cost of Feeding Calf.

An Indiana man asks what it will cost to feed a calf until it is three months old. One of the eastern experiment stations made some experiments along this line two years ago and figured it out that it cost \$10.40 per calf for the first three months, counting the whole milk worth two dollars per hundred. About twentyseven dollars for feed for the calf for the first year.

Many Farmers Allow Their Work Teams to Stand in Stable Without Necessary Exercise or Air.

Why do so many farmers neglect their work teams during the winter months? By neglect I mean, why are so many farm horses kept shut up in close stalls, close stables, when not actively at work; fed a heavy allowance of heating grain, all the forage they can stuff, and only given exercise when actually at work on the field or on the road?

In a natural state, in any climate, the horse, like all animals, must necessarily take exercise in seeking a means of subsistence, therefore, horse which is kept by man must have exercise in the open air (whenever practicable) in order that he may be able to give his owner the full equivalent in good honest work for the feed that he eats.


Farm teams are used to working hard all spring, summer and fall. The dull season for the farmer is when inclement weather prevails. Outdoor work for the faithful farm team will be uncertain.

Don't let them stand up in the stable for days at a time, fed heavily on heating food, breathing only the vitiated air of the stable.

Under the most favorable conditions, the average stable does not furnish pure oxygen to horses or cattle that are kept constantly confined. They get the much-needed daily exercise at irregular intervals, and in consequence suffer from many ailments incident to close confinement, along with heavy feeding.


If Cream Is Too Warm the Butter Will Come Soft and Salvy-Best to Use Dairy Thermometer.

The proper temperature for churning varies at different times of the year, with character of feed, with period of lactation and breed of cows. As a rule, the temperature should be about sixty degrees in winter and fiftysix in summer, and the cream should be held at these temperatures for at least an hour before churning. If the cream is too warm, the butter will come soft and salvy. It will have a poor keeping quality and there will be a large loss of fat in the buttermilk. If the cream is too cold, it will froth and stick to the churn. It is well to have the temperature so that churning may be accomplished in twentyfive to thirty minutes and the butter come in firm condition. A dairy thermometer should be used in controlling the temperature.

DESIRABLE QUALITY IN EGGS

Actual Age is Only One of Factors Which Affect Excellence-Term "Fresh" is Synonymous.

Because of the readiness with which eggs spoil, the term "fresh" has become synonymous with the idea of desirable quality in eggs. However, the actual age of an egg is only one of the factors which affect the quality, An egg 48 hours old that has lain in a wheat shock during a warm July rain would probably be swarming with bacteria and be absolutely unfit for food, while another egg stored eight months in a first-class cold-storage room would be of much better quality.

COOKING TOUGH MEAT

NO BETTER WAY THAN BRAISING HAS BEEN DEVISED.

Especially Should Fowl That Is Not as Tander as Could Be Wished Be Prepared in This Way-Some Kidney Dishes.

Braising is an excellent way of cooking rather tough meats, as the long. slow cooking softens the meat and yet all the nourishment is preserved in the gravy. A fowl that is tough should always be cooked in this way. Take a casserole just large enough to hold the fowl. Cover the bottom with slices of fat badon, add thick slices of onion, carrots and turnips and put in the fowl. Cover the dish and let it cook on the top of the stove for 15 minutes. Then add a pint of hot water. Place in the oven. Let it simmer an hour or longer, according to the age and size of the fowl. Two hours will be needed for an old bird. Dish the bird. Put the vegetables around the dish and pour over it a gravy made from the stock.

Kidneys which may be bought for one, two or three cents apiece, never more, even in the city, make a cheap and delicious supper, luncheon or breakfast dish either grilled or stewed. To stew the kidneys scald, skin and cut them in halves, take out the small, hard piece and rub in seasoned flour. Heat a little dripping in small casserole, put in the kidneys and fry them brown. Take them out and keep warm on a plate. Chop a small onion, fry in the casserole until brown, add a little flour and brown. Add a teaspoonful of sharp sauce and one of tomato sauce or catchup. Pour in slowly as much water as required, stirring to keep smooth. Return the kidneys to the pan and simmer for about an hour. Skim off any scum and flavor with sherry. Kidneys that are left over from a supper dish are very good hashed and served on toast for breakfast. They should be rewarmed with

a brown gravy. Grilled kidneys may be grilled in their own fat, or they may be scalded, skinned and split and brushed with oil. They should be served on toast, either well seasoned or with a devil

Veal and ham pie, a very popular and inexpensive English dish, is made as follows:

One pound veal cutlet, four ounces bacon or ham, two hard-boiled eggs, pastry, seasoned flour and mushrooms.

Make a seasoned flour by mixing one tablespoonful of flour, one teaspoonful of salt, one-half teaspoonful of pepper; add a little grated rind of a lemon and a pinch of cayenne. Cut the meat into medium pieces, rub in the flour and put into a deep ple or baking dish. Peel the mushrooms and put them in the dish. Pour in enough water to three-quarters fill the dish with ple crust. Make a hole in the center of the pastry. Put it into the oven and bake for an hour.

Stuffed Candy.

Purchase a pound of fresh marshmallows and cut them in two with the scissors. Do not attempt to pull them apart, for this cannot be done with success, as they are too sticky; they should be cut horizontally, as they look better that way when stuffed. In some of these put pieces of preserved ginger, candied orange peel, walnuts or pecans. Cherries make delicious filling and pieces of fig are also good. After the filling is put on the bottom portion, press the top part over it and this will readily ad-

Baked Spare Ribs. Anyone that likes spare ribs will find this an improvement over boiling them. Put spare ribs in cold water and let cook for almost an hour. Into a baking dish put a layer of raw sliced onions. Lay the spare ribs on this and finish dish with another layer of onion and the top layer of potatoes. Add enough hot water to half fill dish and bake one hour, covered the first half hour. Serve with boiled

Banana Salad.

This is a very nourishing dish, easily prepared at a few minutes' notice. Peel and scrape ripe bananas. Cut each one in two pieces and cut off the sharp end, making them look like croquette. Roll them in chopped nuts of any kind-either peanuts, hickory nuts or walnuts. Lay on a leaf of lettuce and serve with a little French dressing containing a great deal of olives.

Casserole of Rice and Meat. Two cupfuls chopped meat, pepper and cayenne, one-quarter cupful bread or cracker crumbs, one-half teaspoonful salt, celery salt, one beaten egg, hot water or stock to moisten.

Line a buttered baking dish with cooked rice one-quarter inch thick. Pack mixture in and cover with rice. Steam or bake 30 to 40 minutes. Invert on a platter and surround with tomato sauce.

Sugar Potatoes.

Bix sweet potatoes, one cupful white sugar, one-half cupful water, one teaspoonful butter. Parboil, peel and cut potatoes into quarer-inch slices. Cook the other ingredients to form a sirup. Place the slices of potato in the sirup and simmer gently for an hour, then let the sirup boil away until it is almost dry. Serve with meats.

Today, Thursday, there are five cars of grain loaded and in the course of loading, at this place, for shipment to eastern points.

Within the last week there has beee eight cars of grain shipped from here, consisting of two cars of wheat sold by W. T. and J. N. Brown, at \$1.35 per bushel which has made them aproximately \$40.00 an acre: two cars of maize sold by Jess Crecelius, and T. F. Ray, and a car sold by Crecelius, Ray, Mason, Isler. and others, at \$1.00 per cwt.: and three cars of maize heads, sold by the tarmers of the valley and northof town, at \$14.00 a ton. This has brought the farmers of this section at least \$6,000.00 in cash, and on land that can be bought at an average price of from \$3.00 to \$5.00 an acre.

Four threshing machines are running on the plains and it is estimated that there will be 50 more car loads of grain to be shipped from the plains country alone.

A movement is on foot to get a five cent lower freight rate on grain shipped from here and if this is successful it means that the most of this grain will be shipped from salary. San Jon.
