That the said abandonment still exists and has not been cured at this time. That the said entryman has not earned the said land so as to be entitled to a patent, either under the 3 year, nor the 5 year homestead laws.

Today, Thursday, there are five cars of grain loaded and in the course of loading, at this place, for shipment to eastern points.

Within the last week there has been eight cars of grain shipped from here, consisting of two cars of wheat sold by W. T. and J. N. Brown, at \$1.35 per bushel which has made them approximately \$40.00 an acre: two cars of maize sold by Jess Crecelius, and T. F. Ray, and a car sold by Crecelius, Ray, Mason, Isler, and others, at \$1.09 per cwt.: and three cars of maize heads, sold by the farmers of the valley and north of town, at \$14.00 a ton. This has brought the farmers of this section at least \$6,000.00 in cash, and on land that can be bought at an average price of from \$3.00 to \$5.00 an acre.

Four threshing machines are running on the plains and it is estimated that there will be 50 more car loads of grain to be shipped from the plains country alone.

A movement is on foot to get a five cent lower freight rate on grain shipped from here and if this is successful it means that the most of this grain will be shipped from San Jon.

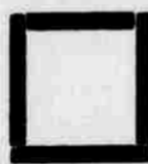
