Whereas: We consider the present session of the Eddy County Institute one of the most pleasant and profitable notwithstanding the intense heat, and whereas, we feel that our county superintendent and his instructors have planned wisely and toiled early and late to that end, therefore be it resolved: 1st. That the great success of our Institute is largely due to the untiring efforts, the professional ability, and inspiring example of our conductor, Mr. J. B. Taylor, and that we are grateful to him for the practical demonstration of "Eye and Ear Tests" whereby the teachers may be able to ascertain any defect in sight or hearing of the pupil and take the proper steps to remedy them.

2nd. We wish to extend our appreciation to Miss Dorothy White whose charming personality and practical ability have made her work in music, primary methods, and domestic science a real inspiration, to Mrs. Howard and Messrs. Knorr, Kaiser, and Kirk, the K. K. K. Klub, for their excellent instruction, to Miss Toffelmire for spirit of helpfulness so manifest everywhere, to the Board of Directors for the use of the high school building, manual training shop, etc. and to the janitor for his obliging helpfulness.

3rd. Resolved: That we favor legislation for free text books for the season that such books would be cheaper, more readily obtained, and equally healthful after disinfection.

4th. That whereas, the salary of teachers is insufficient to enable them to provide for the future, and whereas the leading states of our country have passed such a law. Resolved: That we memorialize the State Legislature of its next session to pass a law providing pensions for teachers who have taught twenty years, ten of which have been in this state and be it further, Resolved: That we extend to Mr. Poore, our efficient County Superintendent, our thanks and appreciation for the interest he has taken in our work throughout the year and that we endorse the firm stand he has made for higher certification and that whereas, The teachers of this convention believe that our state ought not to be second to any in United States in educational standards, progressiveness and efficiency, and that these ends may be best attained by a strong man at the head of educational affairs of the state.

Therefore, be it resolved, that we desire the Democratic party irrespective of politics, to place in nomination for State Superintendent the name of one who is not a politician but an educator, a man who has much experience in school affairs and who is amply qualified in every for the office, but who has turned resolutely away from such a proposition and refused to have his name mentioned, Supt. W. A. Poore.

Sept. 4—State Tennis Tournament at Roswell. Oct. 3—New Mexico Bankers' Association Convention at Grand Canyon, Ariz.

Flag Day was generally observed throughout the state. The Roswell state clip, it is estimated, will reach 2,500,000 pounds.

The Kin-Bell Cattle Company of Artee filed articles of incorporation. Over \$11,000 is now in hand with which to erect the Portales creamery.

The Purty Creamery Company of Roswell filed articles of incorporation. The state engineer's office is making surveys for a new bridge over the Canadian at Logan.

James H. Rice, a young employee at the Denning car shops of the Santa Fe, blew the top of his head off with a shotgun.

Taleum powder and mentholatum for sunburn are among the "extras" sent the Battery A boys by the women of Roswell.

The body of a man so decomposed that identification was impossible was found in the bed of the Ponil river near Raton.

An examination for eligibles from whom to appoint a fourth-class postmaster at Albuquerque will be held at Laguna on July 8.

Construction soon will begin on a million-gallon reservoir with pipe line and electric pump at the Marine Hospital at Fort Stanton.

The new school building at La Union is to be named in honor of James Gadsden, who negotiated the Gadsden purchase with Mexico.

There is much talk going the rounds in Dona Ana and Lincoln counties of a proposed branch road to run from Organ to Oro Grande.

Attorney General Clancy has handed down an opinion to the effect that the state must give compensation for tuberculosis cows destroyed.

The screw-pile ranch near Spring Creek, owned for a score of years by Edward O. Brown, has been sold to the Del Pano Cattle Company.

Another state road camp has been established on the Roswell-Carrizozo road, this one at the "Border Hill" near the Chaves county line.

The galleons erected at the Grant county jail for the execution of Lucas C. Hightower and Pedro Montes have been taken down and stored.

The State Board of Education has invited Hon. P. P. Clayton, Commissioner of Education, to make an educational survey of New Mexico.

The attorney general has held that where a county clerk does not employ a deputy to do the work of the District Court he may draw the salary as such a deputy himself.

Found guilty by Federal Judge Pope on two of the charges brought against them in dishonor proceedings, Francis E. Wood and his legal partner, O. N. Marron, were suspended from Federal Court practice for two years.

C. Cronmeyer, a relative of Curt Cronmeyer, murdered in his Indian trading store not far from Gallup about a year ago, has offered a reward of \$1,000 for information leading to the discovery of a will made by the dead man.

The rapid settling up of the state has caused a great increase in the number of wild animals killed and consequent bounty claims presented.

CROPS IN NEW MEXICO

PRODUCTION SMALLER—PRICES HIGHER. Figures Submitted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on June Condition and Prices.

Western Newspaper Union News Service. Santa Fe, N. M.—A summary of the June crop report for the state of New Mexico, as compiled by the Bureau of Crop Estimates (and transmitted through the Weather Bureau), U. S. Department of Agriculture, at Washington, is as follows:

Winter Wheat—June 1 forecast, 1,420,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate), 1,110,000 bushels. Spring Wheat—June 1 forecast, 1,090,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate), 1,012,000 bushels.

Oats—June 1 forecast, 1,200,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate), 2,100,000 bushels. Barley—June 1 forecast, 325,000 bushels; production last year (final estimate), 261,000 bushels.

Hay—June 1 condition 89, compared with the eight-year average of 80. Pasture—June 1 condition 89, compared with the eight-year average of 80.

Apples—June 1 forecast, 125,000 barrels; production last year (final estimate), 272,000 barrels. Prices—The first price given below is the average on June 1 this year, and the second the average on June 1 last year.

Wheat, \$1.12 and \$1.20 per bushel, corn, 80c and 81c; oats 60c and 59c; potatoes \$1.15 and \$1.40; hay, \$8 and \$10 per ton. Eggs, 24c and 23c per dozen.

President May Attend State Fair. Albuquerque—A letter from Joseph Tumulty, secretary to the president, and another letter from A. A. Jones, first assistant secretary of the interior department, sent the attendance of the nation's chief executive at the New Mexico State Fair this fall, indicate that Woodrow Wilson is anxious to be at the exposition and will attend if it is possible.

Albuquerque Gets S. S. Meeting. East Las Vegas—Albuquerque was selected at the business session of the State Sunday School Association as the place for the holding of the 1917 convention of that body. Resolutions adopted by the convention condemn cigarettes, favor prohibition and censorship of motion pictures and urge Bible reading.

Columbus Raiders Hanged at Deming. Deming—Francisco Alvarez and Juan Sanchez, two Villa followers captured during the raid on Columbus March 9, were hanged here. Five other Villa followers condemned to death were granted a reprieve by Gov. McDonald for further investigation of their cases.

Bound Over for Bootlegging. Gallup—John Clark, colored, of whom it is said he has been tried five times on homicide charges, yet has not been convicted, has been bound over here on a charge of selling liquor to Indians near Cabezon, Sandoval county.

Faculty of Blind Institute Re-elected. Alamogordo—The Board of Trustees of the New Mexico Institute for the Blind has re-elected the entire faculty of the school to serve for another term.

Workman Fatally Injured. Roswell—Casper Boes, aged 27 years, was fatally injured while working in the irrigation ditch that is being constructed by the Lana Construction Company.

Flowers for Wedding Cover Casket. Las Cruces—Flowers ordered for the wedding of Miss Joyce Beasley and Joseph Goodrich of Los Angeles, were used to cover the casket of the prospective bridegroom. Goodrich came here for the wedding, was taken ill and died in a few days at the home of the bride-to-be.

Government Buying Colts for Mounts. Deming—That the country now is experiencing a huge famine and that the government is buying colts at fat prices and conditioning them itself for use as cavalry and artillery horses were the statements of C. W. Bowers, a California horse dealer.

Women to Build Fountain. Santa Fe—A beautiful stone fountain will be built by the Woman's Board of Trade at the east end of the Palace of the Governors.

Land Office Business. Santa Fe—The Santa Fe land office reports 200 acres for May, covering 16,283 acres, the fees paid being \$1,299.58.

Artist Disappears from Santa Fe. Santa Fe—A young Italian artist who was being received in the best of local homes, has suddenly taken his departure. His love-taking was synchronous with the receipt by local Italians of a printed circular describing a forger wanted by the United States government and also by the Colorado authorities. The description of the young man sought by the government tallied with that of the handsome young artist who originally came to Santa Fe from Albuquerque.

Postmaster at Gallup Resigns. Gallup—B. A. Wetherell, postmaster here for eight years past, has resigned his office and will take over the management of the Orabi trading post. The resignation takes effect July 1.

Company E Mustered Into Service. Columbus—Company E of the New Mexico National Guard, a Santa Fe organization, was mustered into the Federal service with a full peace complement of sixty-five men and officers.
