SHERIFF LESLIE DOW KILL'D.
The Sheriff of Ediz County shot to death by concealed Murderers, who
Make good their Escape.

A VERY FORWARD ASSASSINATION

—————

The sheriff then received a telegram from a deputy, notifying him that Deputy Sheriff Armstrong had been announcing the killing Thursday night of Sheriff Dow.

Sheriff Dow was elected to the position that he held at the time of his death, last November, but had previously served as a deputy in which capacity he had been arrested on a parole violation three-and-a-half years ago, criminals at one of the worst sections of the territory.
