While confident that the foot and mouth disease, which has been epidemic among the live stock of the country for the last six months virtually has been wiped out.

Department of Agriculture officials declared to day that they would not relax their efforts to prevent a future recurrence of the scourge.

Altogether more than 124,000 animals have been killed, because of the epidemic at a cost of between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000, the expense of which has been shared equally by the federal and state governments.

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the County of Quay, N. Mexico, to be held at Tucumcari, N.
