Correspondent at the Front Says Ex perience Indicates Truth of Reports-Shots at Aviator 100 in Mve Minutes.

Paris.-The New York Sun's correspondent with the Foreign Legion sends the following notes from his

Monday-Started for rations at 7:30 p. m. and on the way caught up with three officers strolling along stowly. The roadway was narrow and it was very dark through the woods, so that it was impossible to puss them. One of the boys get tired of being kept behind at such a slow pace and at last broke out with: "H-, I'm not going to stick behind that guy! He's too blame slow" (only the word was not ciame. The officers accompanying the colonel, for it turned out to be our colonel, evidently knew the American language, for they burst out laughing, but the colonel continued his stroll

Tuesday Up at 3:30 a. m. rheumatism in my right arm preventing me from sleeping. Found Joseph Collett. who declared he had not slept a wink all night as a continual bombardment had been going from ten o'clock till three, with a short letup between midnight and one. The French heavy artillery was firing incessantly without any reply from the Germans. It was over in the direction of Reims, he said, and the firing was awful; the flashes of fire were continual. When it ceased about midnight I supposed the infantry must be charging with the bayonet, but it commenced again as furiously as ever.

I am not surprised at the stories about Germans going crazy as they did at Hartmannsweiler Kopf after seeing and hearing this.

The papers spoke of German soldiers running round the village, mad, stark mad, driven so by the hellish noise and the destruction. Even the men in reserve underground trenches. feet below the earth, who were to replace the man killed in the trenches. were driven mad. They could see noth ing, but could hear the swish of the shells, the roar of the explosions and the shrieks of those above.



Aged French General Waits 44 Years for Day.

Since 1870 General Maunoury, Recently Decorated by King George, Has Worked and Planned for Revenge on Germans.

Paris.-"I owe to you the attainment of the aim towards which all my efforts, all my energy have been strained for forty-four years past-revenge for 1870."

This message from the order of the day in which General Maunoury thanked his troops for their victorious participation in the battle of the Marne explains the whole life of the veteran upon whom King George has conferred the order of St. Michael and St. George.

In a war which has clamored for the qualities of youth, a general upon the retired list, sixty-seven years of sge, might well have imagined that his hopes of active employment were vain that the most he could expect would be some post as organizer in the depots well to the rear of the zone of operations.

General Maunoury was called from his flowers and his tirming in the Loir et Cher in August, and came to Parls in the hope of obtaining some command in the field where he would be able to work directly for the "revanche

At the outset of the war all the general officers belonged to the active army, and for a time General Maunoury had to content himself with the useful, if less satisfying, work of inspecting depots and the organization of reserves.

It was not long, however, before he was given the command of an army formed at Verdun, at the head of which he took part in the early and disastrous fighting along the Belgian frontier. During the retreat he fought a series of actions with the greatest brilliance, while at the same time reorganizing and completing his force.

General Maunoury was ordered to Peris to undertake the task of organixing and commanding the army des-tined, in the event of things turning out badly on the Marne, to act in the defense of Paris.

The appointment was flattering. but to General Maunoury it aroused many cruel memories, for he had be gun his military career in the army of Paris in 1879 and, as artillery officer, had known the bitterness of defeat in the series of battles which was fought in the neighborhood of the capi-

That bitterness he wiped out in signal manner at the head of the army of Paris which at the critical moment swung on to the German right along the Ource, and withstanding the most

He is a type of the officer bred of the desire for revenge. He declined to believe that the tale phones, wireless, the aeropianes, and modern shell fire have in any way belittled the importance of men, and he made a point of making at least one visit a day to the front trenches. where his cheery smile and cheering words never failed to increase the respect and admiration in which he is held by his officers and men.

RUSSIAN WOMEN IN THE WAR

Do Effective Work in Bringing in Prisoners and Doing Sentry Duty.

London -- A dispatch from Warsaw declares that the present war is grow ing every day more like the campaign of Alexander I against Napoleon Now the civil population is joining in the defense and among these are found women and even children willing to undergo the hardships even of sentry

These women and children are most effective, the dispatch says. They bring in many German prisoners to headquarters. The prisoners are usually safely bound and for greater security their guns, though taken away from them, have the triggers tied with

The devotion of the peasant population to the cause of defense is notice able particularly in the Grodno district, where the volunteer guard has rendered valiant service.

WHEN TO PRUNE THE GRAPE

Work May Be Done From Oropping of Leaves in Fall to Swelling of Buds in Spring.

CBY U. P. REDRICK, Massachusetts Ex Grapes may be pruned from the dropping of the leaves in the fail to the swelling of the buds in the spring. Pruning after sap begins to flow is devitalizing. It is soldom advisable to prune when vines are frozen, as the brittle canes are easily broken during handling.

Summer pruning is far less practiced now than formerly, with a tendency to do less and less of it. It is used to remove surplus shoots and in heading back canes to keep them within

Very often shoots grow from weak buds on the fruiting canes to the detriment of the fruit-bearing shoots. These weaklings should be rubbed off. So, too, shoots often break from arms. spurs or even the trunk where they are not wanted. These should be removed. Secondary shoots sometimes appear on fruiting shoots, especially in the axils of the latter; these should be rubbed off. Here, for the most part, summer pruning should end.

RENEWING THE STRAW HAT has become old and rusty looking, go

Ways in Which Old Headgear May Be Freshened 8o That is Will Appear New.

You can freshen your colored straw hat with dyes. There are dyes which can be diluted in gasoline or water and which, if properly applied to a hat, will give the desired color. When it cannot be given its original color, it may be dyed black.

To restore natural straw color, clean the hat with lemon juice and sulphur. Wash white straw with oxalic acid diluted with water. A leghorn hat may be cleaned with water or aciddampened commeal. Brush it lightly and place it over burning sulphur to bleach the straw. The sulphur may be burned in a can in the bottom of a barrel, and the hat suspended at the top, where it will not scorch.

A straw hat may be successfully bleached at home by first placing a piece of thick brown paper the width of the hatband around it, and tying it with a string to keep in place. Then cover the entire surface of the straw with a thick paste made of sulphur and water, and put the hat where the direct rays of the sun will beat down upon it. A sunny grass plot is just the place. When the paste has become thoroughly dry, brush well with a whisk broom, and a new hat will be the result.

To clean a panama hat, wet some sulphur and make a paste of it, and rub it on the hat with a small brush. Put on enough to cover the hat thoroughly. Let it stand in the sun until dry, then rub more with a clean cloth.

cloth moistened with water and then press dry with a warm iron. Cover with small flowers, and the effect will be artistic. This method of trimming is fashionable as well as handy in concealing a limp crown.

Figured Silk Petticoat.

To wear with negligee there are lively petticoats of pompadour silks. Sometimes the ground is white and the floral decoration is carried out in pink and blue. Sometimes the ground is yellow, pink or brown, with blue and pink, or brown, yellow and green flowers on it. WESTERN CANADA SEEDING FINISHED

Wheat and Other Grains Have Had an Excellent Start.

The seeding of spring wheat was pretty general this spring about 7th of April or about as early as in Illinois and lows. Oats and barley followed. Information is to hand that on first of May all sceding was practically finished. Farmers will now be busy at their breaking, and the land for summer fallow will be entered upon. Some who did not get their land prepared last fall, will be later than the others, but as the spring in Western Canada has been very open they will be only a few days later. At the time of writing rain would be welcome, but at seeding time, the ground contained a splendid lot of moisture and the lack of rain at the present time will not be serious. The number of farmers who have gone into the raising of cattle has been considerably in-creased, and the preparation for extensive cultivated grass pastures is in evidence everywhere. The cultivation of fodder corn is being largely entered upon in Manitoba there being upwards of 25,000 acres in corn. In Saskatchewan there will be a large increase in the area planted, and in Alberta many of the more progressive farmers are taking hold of it. The yield varies according to the cultivation it receives, and runs from five to nine tons per acre. In some portions of Manitoba where it has been poor for some years, success has been achieved in ripening and it is expected that a variety will soon be developed that will provide seed for the entire West, that will at an early date give to Western Canada a fame for the growing of a marketable corn equal to that it has now for the growth of smaller cereals.




