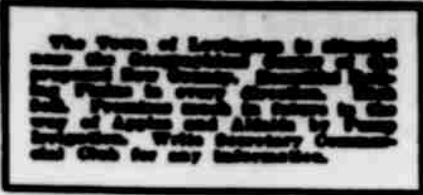

ABOUT THE WAR

Russian attacks repulsed with severe losses in the Carpathians and Galicia.

Russians gain successes along the Black Sea coast in Armenia and on the Persian front near Hamadan.

Gen. Brussiloff reports total number of Austro-Germans captured in present offensive to be 120,000 officers and men.

Storming of trenches in the Canal du Nord region gives French important advantage in their advance to ward Peronne.

Thiepval has fallen into British hands, as has also the fortified town of Gaudécourt, according to the British official statement.

Greek government in agreement with King Constantine, is reported having decided on military co-operation with the entente powers.

Bulgarians claim repulse of entente troops all along the line in Macedonia. Paris contradicts it, however, saying the Bulgars attacks on one sector were beaten back.

Cambes, pivotal point in the German line guarding the approach to Bapaume, now is entirely in the hands of the allies as the result of a combined attack.

British attacks north of the Somme resulted in the capture of 2,000 yards of German trenches north of Fiers and a strong redoubt 2,000 yards north-east of Thiepval.

German pilots shoot down twenty-four entente aeroplanes and allied aviators bring down twenty-six Teuton planes in the aerial encounters on various war fronts.

German official statement admits "conquest" of villages necessary to capture of Cambes, but gives great praise to troops who defended these important possessions.

Great battle is in progress between Lusk and Vladimir Volynski, where Russians have launched a new offensive. Berlin reports successful counter-attacks against the Russians.

General allied assault on the Somme is discontinued for the time following capture by British of a strong redoubt north of Thiepval. British and French cannon, however, are hurling tons of shells upon the new German positions.

WESTERN

President Wilson will speak in Chicago on Oct. 19.

An order issued at Washington directing Troop A, Kansas cavalry, to proceed to the border, was received at post headquarters at Fort Riley, Kan.

According to the official advice, tungsten and molybdenite have been added to the list of goods that are prohibited to be exported from Japan without special permit.

Three of the mail pouches stolen from a Santa Fe train near Syracuse, Kan., several weeks ago, were recovered by postoffice inspectors from the Denver and Kansas City offices.

Mozie Shuler, a 20-year-old negro, arrested on the charge of attempting to assault a 14-year-old white girl, was taken from Sheriff Martin near Bainbridge, Ga., hanged to a tree and shot to death.

Armed bandits looted the mail car attached to the New York-Chicago express of the Michigan Central railroad, two miles east of Dearborn, Mich., and escaped with two sacks of registered mail.

Congressional investigations of the livestock industry, including production, marketing, slaughtering and distribution and sale of all cattle, was asked at Kansas City in a resolution presented to the American Bankers' Association.

WASHINGTON

The War Department ordered 6,000 National guard troops to the Mexican border and directed Gen. Funston to send home 10,000 state troops to be mustered out.

The State Department was officially advised that Burton Wilson, a prominent American and president of the American Club of Mexico City, has been thrown into jail by Carranza.

Secretary Lansing announced officially that James W. Gerard, American ambassador to Germany, was en route home for a belated vacation, probably to stay about two months.

Reports that water is being added to shipments of oats to increase their weight have caused the department of agriculture to instruct inspectors to watch interstate shipments closely.

American shippers exported \$283,101,181 worth of breadstuffs during the eight months ending Aug. 31, according to an analysis of August trade issued by the Department of Commerce.

FOREIGN

Canada has subscribed \$180,000,000 for the \$100,000,000 war loan.

A Russian torpedo boat sank three Turkish ships and several sailing vessels loaded with coal at the port of Eregli, 128 miles east of Constantinople.

The Argentine minister of war, Gen. A. P. Allaria, has resigned owing to a disagreement with a decision of the president regarding the promotion of several generals.

Bandits Sept. 23rd wrecked a north-bound National Railways passenger train between Gonzales Junction and San Luis Potosi, Mexico, resulting in the loss of several lives.

Lieut. Sir Ernest Shackleton, the explorer, who is on his way to England, arrived at Santiago, Chile, from Punta Arenas with the members of his party who were rescued from Elephant Island.

Gertrude Almes Lincoln of Los Angeles, Cal., was married at Heilings, near Eastbourne, England, to Lieut. Arthur Lett Haines of the Royal Field artillery. London newspapers say she is a granddaughter of Abraham Lincoln.

In a dispatch from Athens, Reuter's correspondent says a telegram has been received there from Cananea, giving the summary of the proclamation of a provisional government by former Premier Venizelos and Admiral Coundouriotis.

An unofficial estimate published in Paris of the Austro-German losses from February of this year to the end of the summer places the number at two millions. Of these 700,000 were estimated to have been suffered on the eastern front; 500,000 at Verdun; 400,000 on the Italian front, and 400,000 on the Somme front.

More than 100 Villa followers were killed, the bandit leader, Baudelio Uribe, taken prisoner and heavy casualties suffered by Carranza forces in a terrific fight at Cusihuiriachic, an important mining center about fifty miles southwest of Chihuahua City, according to a message received by Gen. Trevino from Gen. Matias Ramos, who was himself slightly wounded.

The world series will open on Saturday, Oct. 7, according to President B. B. Johnson of the American League. Left jabs and hooks won for Joe Cassidy, Newark, N. J., lightweight, over Leo Kelly, St. Louis, in twelve rounds at St. Louis.

Joe Flynn, the "Battling Wop," added another kayo to his lengthy list at Denver when he dropped Johnny Arrouse of California in the eleventh round of a scheduled fifteen-round bout.

Joe Mandot, who for years was a lightweight championship contender, announced at New Orleans that he was through with the glove game for good. Prospective bouts with Bennie Leonard and Johnnie Dundee have been called off.

Boston was virtually eliminated from the National league pennant race at New York, Thursday, when New York twice defeated the visitors, 2 to 0 and 6 to 0. The victories boosted the New York winning streak to twenty-five straight games.

Miss Molla Bjurstedt, national women's tennis champion in singles, was eliminated as a competitor in the doubles in the women's open tennis tournament at the Longwood Cricket Club at Boston. Paired with Miss Eleanor A. Sears of Boston, she was defeated by Mrs. A. A. Shurtleff of Boston, and Mrs. H. H. Smith of Philadelphia, 2-6, 6-4.

GENERAL

Col. Caesar Rodney May, twenty years a resident of Camden, N. J., died in Cooper hospital. He was 75 years old. He was born in Illinois and as a boy was a close friend of Abraham Lincoln.

A gain of 50.14 per cent in net income is reported by the Southern Pacific Company in its detailed report for the fiscal year ended June 30 last, that item increasing from \$20,570,319 to \$30,885,254.

Policeman William J. O'Brien has been getting only four hours' sleep a day since the New York strike began. He announced at headquarters that he is going to have the hay for keeps. He inherited a \$40,000 farm.

Hollow-eyed and nerve-racked after his flying trip from Chicago, Joseph Le Duc, husband of the living victim of the triple shooting at a Philadelphia hotel, in which Jacob C. Graveur was killed, Mrs. Harry Belzer committed suicide, and Mrs. Le Duc was wounded, rushed to the Jefferson hospital and reassured his wife that he believed in her faithfulness.

The steamship Victoria arrived at Seattle, Wash., from Nome with more than \$1,000,000 of new gold.

Eliseo Arredondo, Mexican ambassador designate to the United States, arrived at Laredo, Tex., from Washington on his way to Mexico City, where he will confer with Gen. Carranza.

Revision of American neutrality laws, with a view to discouraging Americans from participating in Mexican factional conflicts, was suggested at the conference of the Mexican-American joint conference at New London, Conn.

BULGARS TRY TO SAVE MONASTIR

CROWN PRINCE RUPPRECHT SAYS SOMME LINE MADE IMPREGNABLE.

BRITISH TAKE TRENCHES

LONDON CLAIMS MORE SUCCESS NEAR THIEPVAL—BULGARS REPULSED.

London, Sept. 30.—In desperate efforts to save Monastir from the fate that awaits it almost any hour, the Bulgarians are carrying out a series of violent counter attacks to prevent the Serbs and their allies from re-assuming the offensive in Macedonia.

London.—Steadily the British troops are pushing forward toward the Peronne-Bapaume road, the main artery immediately behind the German lines north of Cambes. After taking 500 yards of trenches southwest of Lesars, Gen. Sir Douglas Haig's men made additional progress in the capture of 500 yards of German trenches east of Les Bouefs.

The British occupancy of the territory between Thiepval and the Ancre is being contested strongly by the Germans.

A German counter attack after the entry of the British into a section of the Hessian trench resulted in the forcing out of the holders. The section was regained later, however, by the British, London says. Heavy fighting also has occurred around the Stuff redoubt.

Rain is hampering operations on the remainder of the Anglo-French front north of the Somme, according to official statements. Paris mentions no activity after the advance between Freigourt and Morval toward Sailly, on the Peronne-Bapaume road.

There has been no great activity on any of the other fronts in Europe except in Transylvania, where the Austro-Germans have repulsed the Rumanians at Hermannstadt.

The intense fighting in the region of Koryniza on the eastern front in Russia, appears to have come to an end. Berlin and Vienna say that the Russian prisoners have increased to forty-one officers and 3,000 men. The forces under Prince Leopold of Bavaria here also took two cannon and thirty-three machine guns. Berlin records the repulse of Russians near Godzieschki, and Petrograd claims the defeat of Germans near Gukalov.

Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria declares German defenses on Somme have been made impregnable and that he is convinced allies never can break through.

Speech of Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, imperial chancellor, produces profound impression but fails to rouse enthusiasm in Germany.

New York Strike Called Failure.

New York.—Sept. 30.—The widely exploited sympathetic "walkout" of trades unionists in Greater New York in aid of the striking carmen, which was supposed to have started Wednesday, had not materialized, according to the police. The labor leaders, however, claimed that upwards of 140,000 workers actually had quit their places but refused to make public the names of any unions answering the call. The police declared they were unable to find any evidence of a general strike.

WILSON ORDERED DEPORTED.

Funston Confirms Border Raid at Yaleta, Tex., by Mexicans.

Washington.—The State Department was notified Friday that the Carranza government has ordered the deportation of Burton Wilson, president of the American Club of Mexico City. Charge Parker at Mexico City informed the State Department that Wilson was sent to Vera Cruz under guard and with orders to board the first steamer leaving Mexico.

Reports of Villa's alleged defeat of Carranza forces at Cusihuiriachic reached Washington, but officials did not consider any as containing official confirmation of Villa's part in the fight.

General Funston sent to the War Department official confirmation of the border raid by Mexicans at Yaleta, Texas, near El Paso. He charged full responsibility for the raid to Carranza soldiers. Funston also reported that one of the thirty Mexicans participating in the raid dropped an American rifle in his flight, the gun sling of which was marked "K. Tenth Cavalry."

Berry Elected to Head Colorado Elks.

Trinidad.—Business sessions of the thirteenth annual reunion of Colorado Elks came to a close with the election of the following officers: President, L. W. Berry, Trinidad; first vice president, L. F. Radosky of Loveland; second vice president, G. T. Hyatt of Alamosa; third vice president, John Kiel of Florence; secretary, George W. Johnson of Longmont; treasurer, M. G. Nelson of Fort Collins. Loveland was chosen for the meeting next year.

Eighteen true bills were found in six days by the grand jury at Albuquerque.

The Taxpayers League held its annual meeting in Albuquerque during State Fair week.

Farmers' associations are being organized in every district of San Miguel county by M. H. Gonzales.

The annual meeting of the National Anti-Horse Thief Association of the United States will be held in Las Vegas on Oct. 5.

The Socialists of New Mexico have nominated a complete state ticket, with the exception of a candidate for attorney general.

Johnny Connelly, of Roswell, and Mike Baca of Santa Fe boxed ten rounds of the fastest milling ever seen in Roswell to a draw.

John C. Henderson, a Grant County stockman, was killed in an auto accident near Miami, Ariz., where he had gone with cattle and horses.

John Conway, S. J., who was a novice in the Jesuit order, died in St. Anthony's sanitarium at East Las Vegas after an illness of over a year.

Physicians have received notices that the annual convention of the State Medical Association will be held in Albuquerque Oct. 11, 12 and 13.

The Pecos forest is unusually wet at this time, owing to recent rains and it has not been necessary to establish lookouts to guard against fall forest fires.

Brig. Gen. Granger Adams announced that Camp Deming will no longer be known as provision division headquarters, but as the Fourth separate brigade.

The people of Tatum have raised \$1,000 to purchase a taxi truck to haul thirty-two children to the school every morning and to their respective homes every evening.

The 2-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Robbins, living southwest of Estancia, died from pneumonia caused by sucking a bean into its windpipe, which then passed into its lungs.

According to Charles Tamme, clerk of the board of education, there are 200 more children of school age in East Las Vegas this year than there were at this time in 1915.

The Rio Grande Gun Club will protest against the shortening of the duck shooting season. The club will ask that the opening day be advanced from Oct. 16 to Oct. 1 next year.

Superintendent of Insurance Jacobo Chaves revoked the certificate of T. H. Rixey at Clayton, Union county, as agent of the Kansas City Life Insurance Company on the charge of rebating.

The Pecos River Oil & Gas Company, of Artesia, Eddy county, filed articles with the State Corporation Commission. The capital stock is \$100,000, and the company starts with \$3,000 subscribed.

It is stated that Eddy county will have a \$100,000 wool clip this year.

Governor McDonald has appointed 110 delegates, fifty-one to the International Dry Farming Congress meeting in El Paso Oct. 17, and fifty-nine to the International Irrigation Congress meeting in El Paso Oct. 14 to 18.

In Probate Court at Albuquerque, M. Mandell was appointed sole executor of the last will of Major Ernest Meyers. The value of the estate as estimated in the report of Mr. Mandell as special administrator is about \$15,000.

State Engineer James A. French returned to Santa Fe after a road inspection trip of 1,250 miles. He visited several points where road construction is in progress, and mapped out considerable new work, to be started immediately.

MOONLIGHT SCHOOLS

TO BE REORGANIZED IN SANTA FE COUNTY THIS YEAR.

First County in New Mexico to Begin Night Instruction to Exceed Last Year's Practical Benefits.

Santa Fe.—Superintendent Conway sent out instructions to the Santa Fe County teachers directing them to reorganize the moonlight schools. Last year the moonlight schools afforded the adults of the rural communities an opportunity to receive free instruction.

Over fifteen hundred adults enrolled in the night classes and some excellent results were reported by the teachers. The large enrollment was due to the fact all were admitted whether illiterate or not. This year an effort will be made to conduct the classes solely for the purpose of reaching the illiterates. By doing this the superintendent believes more substantial results will be accomplished.

The superintendent will offer a substantial prize to the individual teacher and the school making the best showing and presenting proofs through letters of the results accomplished. There will be quite a competition between the teachers and various schools.

Santa Fe Lawyers Suspended in Court.

Santa Fe.—The State Supreme Court, in an opinion by Justice R. H. Hanna, orders the suspension of State Treasurer O. N. Marron and Attorney Francis E. Wood, composing the law firm of Marron and Wood of Albuquerque, from practice before the Supreme Court for a term of one year. Charges of unprofessional conduct formulated by the State Bar Association are sustained. District Judge Noblett, who sat for Chief Justice Roberts, and Justice Parker concur in the findings. The defendants were previously suspended by Judge Pope from practice in the Federal Court for a term of two years.

Claim Villa Not in Columbus Raid.

Columbus.—Army intelligence agents are making an investigation of a report that adherents of Villa were here to secure information to prove that Villa was not at Columbus on March 9, but that the raid was led by Pablo Lopez, who was executed in Chihuahua City because of his alleged leadership at the Santa Isabel massacre, when eighteen Americans and other foreigners were massacred. In this connection it is reported that Villa is preparing a manifesto disclaiming responsibility for the Columbus raid and placing the blame on Lopez.

\$75,000 for Education and Missions.

Santa Fe.—The Presbyterians are spending approximately \$75,000 annually for general educational work and missions in New Mexico. All of the funds used for these two purposes are contributed by Presbyterians outside the state. From \$40,000 to \$45,000 is being spent on the general education work and over \$30,000 on missions. Only eight of the fifty-six churches in the state are what is known as "supporting churches." These are among interesting facts gleaned from the meeting of the synod at Santa Fe.

Odd Fellows Elect 1916-17 Officers.

Albuquerque.—The annual meeting of the Grand Encampment of the Odd Fellows elected the following officers: Grand patriarch, J. J. Votaw, Albuquerque; grand high priest, M. Ream, Hagerman; grand senior warden, C. L. Dotson, Silver City; grand junior warden, W. J. Howell, Raton; grand scribe, C. A. Doty, Roswell; grand treasurer, J. C. Spears, Gallup; grand representative, W. W. Ogle, Roswell.

Ladies' Broncho Riding Prize.

Tucumcari.—Some of the best broncho riders in the world will enter the contests in the First Annual Cowboys' Reunion to be held in Tucumcari, Oct. 3, 4, 5. The executive committee has arranged an additional event, to be known as a ladies broncho riding contest, with a purse of \$100.

Gen. Adams Bids Farewell to Army.

Deming.—Brig. Gen. Granger Adams, who reached the age limit for active service, bade farewell to the United States army at a banquet given in his honor by officers of the Fourth separate brigade. Col. E. F. Glenn of the Eighteenth regular Infantry took command of the Deming camp.

Legislature Acted Within Its Rights.

Santa Fe.—In providing that the Clark public monies bill should not become effective until Jan. 1, 1917, the last State Legislature was wholly within its rights, according to a decision of the State Supreme Court.

Prisoner Shot by Jailer.

East Las Vegas.—A county jail prisoner, known to the authorities as Jack Hendy, was shot and killed by Amador Ullbarri, the jailer. The jailer fired, it was said at the jail, after Hendy had fired a shot which pierced Ullbarri's hat with a revolver he secured where it had been left on a bed by a deputy jailer. A coroner's jury returned a verdict of justifiable homicide. Other prisoners told the authorities that Hendy's correct name was Hennessy.

ARTICLE I The name of this corporation is the Llano Abstract Company.

ARTICLE II The location of its principal office in the State of New Mexico is at Lovington, in the County of Eddy.

ARTICLE III The objects and purposes for which this corporation is formed are as follows:
