## N. M. Legislature Costs Less Than Arizona Assembly

The Fifth state Legislature in New Mexico cost \$51,829.81 as recently shown by the Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico. Upon request for information by the director of the Association, Mr. Asplund, the state auditor of Arizona writes that the recent legislative session in that state cost \$66,394.65. Arizona senators and representatives number fifty-eight, while the New Mexico assembly has seventy-three members. In the neighboring state members receive \$7.00 per day instead of \$5.00 paid New Mexico legislators. The allowances for mileage and for employees are also more liberal in Arizona. The information, it is interesting to note, was secured from Mr. Charles W. Fairfield, now state auditor and superintendent of banks in Arizona. Mr. Fairfield was for a time deputy state auditor in New Mexico.

## New Mexico Educators Opposed to Constitutional Budget Amendment

In their recent conference at Santa Fe, the city and county superintendents went on record as opposing constitutional amendments providing for a state budget and for limitations on tax levies. Their reasons for opposing these amendments are based upon the fear that schools and institutions will be deprived of revenues necessary for their proper support. This fear is not justified, in the opinion of the Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico, according to the Tax Review. If the budget amendment is studied carefully, it will be found that it provides for a modified executive budget designed to place responsibility upon the executive; yet with sufficient power reserved to the legislature to initiate appropriation bills after the general bill has been disposed of. Those who fear abuse of the executive power should also consider such abuse is possible under our present constitutional provisions which give the governor power to veto whatever items he desires to eliminate from the general appropriation act.

The opposition to the tax limitation act will, it is believed, disappear after close consideration. It is coming to be generally accepted that adequate and equalized assessment and a full collection of taxes can be brought about only through limitations on the tax rate. Statutory limitations vary according to the need of the legislature. Hence, the necessity of constitutional limitations. In the amendment proposed, these limits are placed so high as to remove all cause for fear as to revenues even if such revenues are to be derived only from tangible property. It is not conceivable that valuations will fall below present assessments to any material extent. In only two counties is the tax rate at present above the limit fixed for schools in the proposed amendment, and in these two it can be shown that sufficient revenues can be made available even with the 1 1/2 per cent school tax rate fixed by the proposed amendment. Even if this were not the case there are other revenues that can be made available to take care of emergency situations in counties that are up to the limit and still lack funds for schools. The object of the amendment is to fix a limit to the tax that may be imposed upon real estate and other tangible property. Such a limit will serve to bring about a full and equitable assessment and a one hundred per cent collection. It will also serve to eventually force intangible property under the tax burden. It is hoped that the citizens of New Mexico will consider these two amendments carefully, and from every angle. Such consideration it is believed will lead to the conclusion that these measures are not destructive of, or detrimental to any desirable governmental activity, but, on the contrary, broadly constructive and conducive not only to economical, but also to efficient administration.

## GOVERNOR WILL CALL SENATORIAL ELECTION FOR SEPT. 20

### Believes People Should Fill Vacancy Created by Resignation of Fall; Parties Will Get Busy.

Santa Fe, May 4.—Governor Mechem announced today that he will call a special election for September 20 for the purpose of filling the U. S. senatorial seat held by Secretary of the Interior Fall before he went into President Harding's cabinet.

By holding the senatorial election on that date the cost will be cut. There will be an election on September 20 any how—for the submission for ratification or rejection of the constitutional amendments proposed by the fifth legislature. The senatorial election will cause little additional cost to the state.

Democratic and republican party managers are already laying plans for the calling of the conventions to nominate candidates, and one of the most spirited political battles in the history of New Mexico will be the result.

## ATTENTION, I. C. C.

Examiner Keane in his report to the interstate commerce commission adverse to desired reduced passenger rates in the southwestern states, alleged that agricultural resources in Arizona, New Mexico and Nevada were negligible, or words to that broad general effect.

We call the attention of the interstate commerce commission to the fact that New Mexico's wheat crop this year will show an increase of 600,000 bushels, and that the yield has increased 1,500,000 bushels in ten years or an average of 150,000 bushels a year.

This does not bear out Mr. Keane's strictures on New Mexico's agricultural development or the tonnage she develops. The increased tonnage of winter wheat in New Mexico, the bureau of crop estimates says, is phenomenal. The figures are sufficient demonstration.

And this is only one angle of New Mexico's agricultural development. Mr. Keane, in lumping New Mexico with the great American desert in Nevada, has entirely misrepresented conditions and possibilities in this state and has not a leg to stand on in his endorsement of the discrimination in passenger fares in New Mexico. The state corporation commission should make immediate and forcible use of the official winter wheat forecast before the interstate commerce commission.

The New Mexican is not prepared to say whether or not conditions in Nevada have been exaggerated. Certainly neither New Mexico nor Arizona have been done justice in the examiner's report, the chief fallacy of which moreover is that he refers to a section of the country embracing a wide variety of natural and commercial conditions as if its characteristics were uniform, and it were all a sparsely inhabited desert region.

New Mexico, if conditions hold good, will raise enough of the great American staple this year to feed the state and ship 1,300,000 bushels besides.

We submit that for a desert this is a most astonishing showing.

We advise the examiner to come back and do some real examining.

If the rate discrimination against the southwestern states is continued, the I. C. C. will have to produce some more convincing reasons.—Santa Fe New Mexican.

County Agent appointed as committee to arrange dates and places for Farm Bureau picnics and secure outside speakers. Mr. W. B. Plunkett selected as committee to take up with the Chamber of Commerce and the City Council of Clayton the matter of the County Fair.

Motion carried that County Agent confer with president of Mutual Aid Association on dates for county wide meeting. Public notices to be sent all concerned.

Regular meeting of the Executive Committee at 10:30 a. m., on First Tuesday of each month. Each man bring sandwiches and cookies. Coffee furnished by Farm Bureau.

Minutes of each meeting to be sent to State Organization.

Motion carried to have effective Farm Bureau posters printed; communities using same paying 10 cents each for them.

Committee selected to confer with District Attorney on reported violation of Constitution of New Mexico as it relates to taxation of land. Mr. A. L. England, chairman.

Fair committee asked to secure change in rules forbidding adequate advertising of livestock shown at fair by permitting advertising on stalls. Judging ring necessary; judging to be done on second day of a three day fair.

The following telegram was forwarded to representatives in Washington and to president of New Mexico Farm Bureau:

"Union county agricultural operations seriously handicapped. Urge prompt relief measures. Demand Federal Reserve Banks give more favorable terms to agriculture. Farmers creditors have forced them to sell themselves short of feed and seed. Must have credit at once or crop will be greatly curtailed."

## Farm Bureau Spirit

The American Farm Bureau Federation has carried on no propaganda of vilification against existing agencies; has made no threats of smashing any of the existing machinery and has kept clear of anything looking toward political intrigue. It has very wisely and very sanely looked upon itself as a business organization created by and representing a great group of business men who have an economic problem to solve.

It's grain marketing committee hopes that eventually the farmers organization which they are proposing will control the marketing of all the grain of the country and eliminate the various boards of trade and other speculative agencies; but it proposes to do this thru the operation of economic forces and not thru drastic prohibitive legislation. It proposes to meet the present dealers on their own ground and by better service and the elimination of speculative profits capture the business. It expects to stand or fall on the basis of its performance. All it asks is an open field and no favors. If it can accomplish this it will succeed. If not capable to give this service it will fail.

## The Way to Win the Battle

Nothing was ever accomplished for society which was not secured by co-operation and organization. Things worth while are not done by the man who says to his fellow "You get out and get the men of our profession together and solve our many vexing problems." But the men who are putting things over for their community, county and nation are men who see and attack the job as Mr. F. A. ## MEMORIAL DAY PROCLAMATION BY THE PRESIDENT

### Asks People of the Nation to Honor Hero Dead on Monday, the Thirtieth Day of May.

Washington, May 4.—Calling upon the nation to pay homage to United States hero dead, President Harding issued Tuesday the following proclamation:

"Whereas, the nation has been conceived in prayer and devotion by men and women who were moved under God to found a nation where principles of right should form a lasting cornerstone; and,

"Whereas, these principles, purchased at the price of great sacrifice, have been fostered by worthy posterity; and,

"Whereas, a great war has lately laid its costly demands upon our land;

"Now, therefore, I, Warren G. Harding, president of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim Monday, the thirtieth day of May, a day already freighted with sacred and stimulating memories, a day of public memorial. I invite my fellow citizens fittingly to pay homage on this day to a noble dead who sleep in homeland, beneath the sea, or on foreign field, that we who survive might enjoy the blessings of peace and happiness; and to the end that liberty and justice, without which no nation can exist, shall live forever."

## Clayton To Have Real Park

The work on the park for Clayton has been started and time and effort will add to its beauty. Last Friday the business houses of Clayton were closed until noon, and the business men, members of the American Legion, and citizens generally, planted about 175 trees in the new park. The park contains four blocks located just north of the fair grounds.

## The Farm Bureau's Legislative Program

A repeal of the guaranteed railroad rates and a lowering of the freight rates.

The same tariff protection for the farmer as industry enjoys.

Retention of the excess profits tax; opposition to the proposed 4 per cent Federal excise tax on land.

Commodity financing on warehouse receipts; livestock financing on the proper pledge; personal rural credits secured by proper insurance features; use of the Federal Reserve profits in a revolving fund to provide working capital from date of application for loan until sale of debentures; increases of maximum Federal farm loans from \$10,000 to \$25,000.

Fair and just packer regulation, vested in the United States department of agriculture rather than a separate commission.

**Bill Provides Public Building For Clayton**

Washington, April 28.—Senator Bursum introduced the following bill, which was read twice and referred to the committee on Public Buildings and Grounds:

**A BILL**  
To provide for the acquisition of a site and the erection thereon of a public building at Clayton, New Mexico.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to acquire, by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, a site, and to contract for the erection and completion thereon of a suitable building, including fireproof vaults, heating and ventilating apparatus, and approaches, complete, for the use and accommodation of the United States postoffice in Clayton, New Mexico, at a cost, including site, not to exceed the sum of \$200,000.

## THE BRAVING ASS HAS AGAIN "GONE LOCO"

Read the following which was taken bodily from the Des Moines "Swastika." It is a gem within a gem, evidently the product of Pussfoot's brain after a day of deep study pondering the solemn problem of whether it would be better for him to wield a democratic, republican or independent pen:

"A newspaper is usually supposed to be run for the benefit of the public and to dispense the news. Not so with the Clayton News. Of late that sheet has had the punishment of its enemies as its main reason for existence. Last week's News devoted most of its valuable space to the testimony in the case of a suit over some townsite stock in which W. A. Henderson was involved. The Collins case, that was of interest to the people of Union county, drew about one-half column all told, altho quite a lot of editorial space was used at that time to convince the public that black was white. Henderson was one of the moving factors in the conviction of Collins and naturally has earned the ill-will of the News. There is an old saying that if a man throws a rock at a dog he will have all the fleas in the country barking at his heels. The venom of the News can accomplish only one end and that will be to make W. A. Henderson's friends more loyal, and to call the attention of the general public to the fact that he really amounts to something. A knock from the News is getting to be an endorsement of real worth. If it can get away with it by doing all in its power to defend the law-breakers of Union county, by using the columns that should be devoted to news to abusing the people it does not like, then we will have to revise our opinion of the good people of Union county and also to what a newspaper must do to succeed."

Now, what 'ave you think it. The News published the testimony in the townsite case without comment, and on solicitation of a number of the leading business men and citizens of Clayton, not of Des Moines. We assure one and all that our failure to secure the consent of Pussfoot to publish the testimony, was simply an oversight—undoubtedly reprehensible—but liable to again occur. Not one word was said in defense of or against any of the parties to the suit, and insofar as we know not a one of them is aslamed of the testimony given. We have never heard of a complaint being registered by a single man, woman or child in the town of Clayton on account of that particular issue of The News containing the testimony of the witnesses in the case referred to by the misfit monstrosity of Des Moines. However, it remained for a non-skull fifty miles away to figure out a reason for certain things which appear in this sheet—just as if it were some of his business.

Pussfoot is a peculiar lad; his every reason for existing in the constant and lingering hope of securing a little county printing. His policy is to edit a democratic paper in democratic times; be independent when the political horizon is cloudy; dicker with republican commissioners, endorsing their to-be administration even before they take the oath of office—if they will promise to sweeten his life just a little bit. What a wonderful lad is Pussfoot, but few opoids has he. Think of a man who is capable of changing his political policies every day of the week if necessary in harmonize with the administration in power, and you have him.

Our greatest source of pride is our enemies. We do no man an injustice because of selfish and personal reasons; we support at all times the principles we believe to be right; and if in so doing we get on the other fellow's toes, he had them in the way. However, we greatly doubt if we have an enemy who has not some redeeming feature—always excepting the wretchedly, pussfootedly editor of The Swastika.

## ORDINANCE NO. --- An Ordinance Providing for the Sanitary Disposal of Human Excreta in the City of Clayton.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of Clayton, New Mexico:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to throw or deposit upon the ground or bury, within the city of Clayton, any human excreta, solid or liquid, or otherwise dispose of such substances in any manner other than into a properly sewer water closet, a cesspool or septic tank, or a privy, constructed in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 2. If a water closet is connected to a cesspool or septic tank, such cesspool or septic tank shall be tightly covered and proof at all times against access by flies to the contents thereof, and shall not cause any nuisance of sight or smell. No cesspool or septic tank, or the drainage therefrom, shall be located within 100 feet of any well or cistern used for domestic water supply, except upon written permission of the municipal health officer. No cesspool or septic tank shall be constructed within the City of Clayton except upon a permit to be issued to the prospective builder thereof by the Municipal Health Officer, and under his direction.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to construct, maintain or permit to be maintained upon any premises within the City of Clayton, any surface closet or privy, unless the same shall be constructed and maintained in a flyproof and sanitary manner under a permit to be first obtained by the prospective builder thereof from the Municipal Health Officer, and said surface closet or privy to be erected and built under the instructions and directions of the said Municipal Health Officer, or his authorized agent. In the case of existing surface closets or privies the Municipal Health Officer shall be and is hereby empowered to order and require such modifications therein as may be necessary and requisite to make the same flyproof and sanitary; and such orders of the Municipal Health Officer shall be enforced under the same penalties as the other provisions of this ordinance.

Section 4. Privies shall be located not less than one hundred feet from any well, cistern or other source of domestic water supply, and from any occupied dwelling, wherever possible. Distances less than one hundred feet may be maintained only upon the written permission of the Municipal Health Officer.

Section 5. All privies within the City of Clayton, shall be kept at all times in a clean condition, in good repair, and thoroughly fly proof.

Section 6. Any person, firm or corporation violating the terms of this ordinance shall be subject, upon conviction thereof, to a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00 in the discretion of the court trying the cause.

Section 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

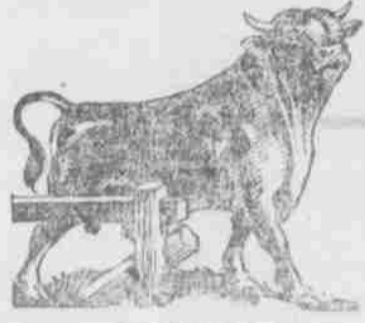

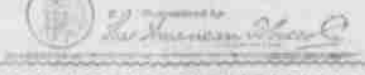

#### Collecting Delinquent Taxes

A vigorous drive for the collection of delinquent taxes is in progress in Santa Fe county. As the result of a survey made by the Taxpayers' Association of New Mexico at the request of the Board of County Commissioners, Mr. Alexander Read, the district attorney, and his assistant, Mr. Edwards, have initiated proceedings to collect as much as possible of more than \$200,000 appearing as delinquent taxes. A special clerk has been employed by the state tax commission to supply the district attorney's office with the information necessary for instituting suits for judgment. The immediate necessity for recovering the money due from delinquents was found in the discovery that the county owes over \$30,000 in floating indebtedness which, under the Bateman act, can be paid only out of taxes for past years. The action of the county authorities is receiving general approval on the part of those citizens of the city and county who recognize and fulfill their civic obligation to support the government, its schools and other functions.

#### Mora County Has Leading Pig Club

"The Mora County Pig Club is an organization of which New Mexico should be proud," says W. H. Trentman of the Junior Extension Department after attending a regular meeting of the club held April 22. The club is composed of boys and girls each working under one of three divisions, Poland China, Duroc Jersey, or Hampshire.

Messrs. Robert Sterrett and J. R. Dillard, local farmers and hog breeders, are responsible for the organization of the work and the funds necessary for the purchase of pure bred gifts are furnished by the bank of Wagon Mound. Miss Ruth Irwin of Levy is president of the club, which meets the first Saturday of each month, at which meetings practical and interesting talks are given on hog raising. The club demonstration is to last for a period of two years and an exhibit will be held each fall.
