CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION OF THE NEVIS COMPANY, INC.

We, the undersigned, in order to form a corporation for the purpose hereinafter stated, under and pursuant to the provisions of the Twenty-Third Chapter of the second session of the legislature of the State of New Mexico, as amended by Chapter 112 of the 1917 Session Laws and Chapter 100 of the 1919 Session Laws, do hereby certify as follows:

I.

The name of the corporation is "THE NEVIS COMPANY, INC."

II.

The registered office of the corporation is located at Bluewater, Valencia County, New Mexico, and William E. Nevis is designated as the statutory agent therein and in charge thereof, and upon whom process against the corporation may be served.

III.

The objects for which the corporation is established are:

To buy and sell, deal and engage generally in the wholesale and retail merchandise business, and to act as the agent of any individual or individuals, natural or artificial, in buying, selling or dealing far them in general merchandise; to engage generally in the business of mining, burning, producing, shipping, buying and selling, lime and lime products; to buy and sell hay, grain, alfalfa and other commodities and products; to acquire by purchase, lease or otherwise, lime kilns, lime claims and other mining properties and to mine and develop the properties so acquired; to build all necessary buildings, warehouses and other facilities to accomplish the purpose of the corporation; to engage in the business of raising, selling and preparing for market, produce, poultry and eggs; to buy and sell all kinds of tools and implements, including harvesters, binders, reapers, mowers, rakes and headers; to carry on the business of dealing in cattle, livestock and sheep, and also that of dealing in cattle and sheep generally and in all branches of such respective trades or businesses; to purchase, acquire, hold and deal in and in any manner dispose of or sell on commission, or otherwise, hay, grain, wheat and bread stuffs, and all other goods, wares, merchandise and commodities of a similar kind.

IV.

The corporation shall, in addition to the powers hereinbefore enumerated, have and possess all rights, powers and privileges

given to corporations by common law, to sue and be sued, to borrow money and secure the payment of the same by notes, mortgages, bond or deeds of trust upon its real or personal property; to rent, lease, purchase, hold, sell and convey such real and personal property as may be necessary and proper for the accomplishment for the objects and purposes of said corporation.

V.

The authorized capital stock of the corporation with which the corporation begins business is Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), divided into five hundred (500) shares of the par value of one hundred dollars (\$100) each.

VI.

The names and postoffice addresses of the incorporators and the number of shares of capital stock subscribed for by each, the aggregate of which shall be the amount with which the corporation shall commence business are as follows:

Y. W. C. A. TO ORGANIZE.

On Tuesday afternoon, at 4 o'clock, Miss Ruth M. Stuckfield, of Albuquerque, met with a group of women, including the Belen teachers, to discuss Y. W. C. A. work. Miss Stuckfield, who is carrying on the publicity campaign in the interests of the Young Women Christian Association, gave a very interesting talk on the work of the association in war and in peace. She told of not only nation wide but world wide achievements of its leaders.

Realizing the possibilities in Belen, a committee was appointed to acquaint others of the town with the aims of the Y. W. C. A. Mrs. J. P. Nash was made chairman, Miss Helen Hoffman publicity agent and Miss Lureen Hulbert secretary treasurer to work under the direction of Miss Stuckfield.

THE STATE LEGISLATURES.

The price of sugar will rise when the sugar equalization board passes on January 1, the state commission of necessities of life reported to the legislature of Massachusetts. The commission asserted that the equalization board could have purchased the 1920 sugar crop of Cuba for 6 1/2 cents a pound in July and August.

Free Love, Bolshevism, Socialism and anarchy again formed the subject for a lengthy discussion in the house at the special session of the North Dakota legislature, culminating in the defeat of the minority independent faction, whose speakers declared a change in the supervision of schools was necessary to prevent supervision of books, or these subjects by the state library. Before action on this bill was taken. Representative Burtress of Grand Forks, reiterated his charge that he had found books of free love, socialism and anarchy in the state traveling library. The committee appointed to investigate the charges reported its findings without recommendation.

State Engineer Frank E. Williams has informed the New York legislature that his department will need more money to complete and equip the Barge Canal terminals, particularly the New York, Rochester and Troy.

Of the seven governors invited by William D. Stevens, of California to join with him in holding special legislative sessions to pass on the federal suffrage amendment, the Idaho, Arizona and Wyoming executives are favorable to the cause. Governor Larrabee of New Mexico, will include woman suffrage with other important subjects when the extraordinary session convenes. Nevada plans to have special session when industrial relations will be considered along with woman suffrage, according to the reply of Governor D. Boyle to Governor Stephens. Governor Hart of Washington sent the following message: I have no power to limit the duration of an extraordinary legislative session or the subjects of legislation, and therefore doubt the wisdom of a special session unless the necessity therefore clearly appears.

Ratification of the federal woman suffrage resolution was completed by the South Dakota legislature when the senate passed the senate passed the measure. The lower house acted on the resolution Wednesday of last week. South Dakota was the 21st state to ratify the amendment.

Salaries of the members of the New York legislature and judges of the court of appeals will remain at present figures. Secretary of state Hugo announcing that the constitution amendments proposing the increase had been defeated in the recent state election. The vote on the proposition to increase legislators' salaries from \$1,500 to \$2,500 for senators and \$3,000 for assemblymen was 625,881 in favor and 679,243 against, according to complete returns. The proposed increase in salaries of court of appeal judges was lost by a majority vote.

IN FOREIGN LANDS.

Herr Schmidt, German minister of food and economics, declared the economic situation in Germany recently had improved to an astonishing extent. Workers had returned to their tasks in far greater degree than was foreseen last summer.

The Bolshevik delegation now at Dorpat to discuss the possibilities of peace with representa-

tives of the Baltic states, have published their thirteen points of peace. Their conditions declare that the treaty must be based on one principle self determination, without indemnities and without annexations.

Dr. L. Martina de Souza Dantes, the new Brazilian ambassador, to Italy has presented his credentials to King Victor Emanuel.

Soviet authorities in Russia have punished the death of the individual responsible for the execution of the former Emperor and his family at Yekaterinburg in June, 1918, where the imperial personages were being held prisoner, according to a dispatch to the Politiken of Copenhagen. A message quotes the Bolshevik newspaper Pravda of Moscow as authority for this statement. The Pravda's account states that a member of the Yekaterinburg Soviet had been executed at Trm for ordering the Czar execution.

Gabriele D'Annunzio, the insurgent Italian leader at Fiume, and his adherents in Italy, have arranged the most startling scheme for the advancement of their cause yet undertaken, revolving about an attack on Spalato in the immediate future, according to private advices from Dalmatian sources. Efforts are being made, it is declared, to instigate uprisings in Montenegro and Albania coincident with the Spalato assault, while the Bulgarians are being urged to attack Jugoslavs.

Representatives of American, British and French banks in Spain have appointed a committee to formulate a protest to the government against the proposed tax on foreign banks doing business in this country. The bank of Rio de la Plata, Argentina, joined in the protest.

VACATION GRANTED.

Special Correspondence:

Roswell, N. M., Dec. 17.—In order to permit cadets at the New Mexico Military Institute to spend the Christmas holidays with their parents, classes of the Institute will be suspended from Saturday evening December 20th to January 4th, at 8 p. m. It is believed that this vacation will give the cadets sufficient time to travel to and from their homes and spend a few days with their relatives and friends enjoying the holiday season. A number of cadets from the eastern states here attending school, will make the flying trip to and from their homes. It is believed that only one cadet will be unable to get home and back to school again within the holiday period. He is from Tampico Mexico.

The cadets who remain at the Institute and do not go home, will be freed from study periods or classes. They will be under partial martial rule, but every effort will be made by the authorities of the school to give them as enjoyable a Christmas as will be possible under the circumstances.

A class study of the physical record for the period, September 15th to November 15th, has proved gratifying to the officers of the school. Cadets have gained wonderfully in weight and chest measurement; and their parents will be rather surprised at some of them when they return home for the holidays. They will discover that their boys have gained in height, weight and strength; that the few months they have spent under military discipline has given them advantages that will be of inestimable benefit in later life. The physical training that they have undergone to develop strength and endurance has been

systematically carried out and never at any time at the expense of their mental development. The figures available at the Institute, and which have been carefully compiled, are conclusive evidence that the cadets have obtained at the Institute this Fall their full share of learning. Individual reports have been sent to parents and guardians each month in order that they might be kept informed as to the progress of their boys in an educational way.

The holiday season marks the found the first chapter of the school year. In a great many ways the period from September to January has been most satisfactory. Fortunately the Institute has escaped any epidemics, and no serious accidents have befallen the students. The school spirit has been highly developed chiefly because of the great success that this football team experienced.

Col. James W. Willson superintendent of the Institute, expressed himself recently as being very well pleased with the progress made by the school year, and believes that the coming months of the term will prove even more successful than the first period.

MENTAL DEFECTIVES.

Analysis of the acts of so-called Anarchists and Reds in the United States leads to the ready conclusion that these creatures are in reality suffers from some virulent form of insanity. The mad viciousness of a recent attack by Red agitators upon an Armistice Day parade which resulted in the death of four veterans was merely an active expression of what this type of agitator customarily expounds from the soap box. It was the transition from raving maniac to homicidal maniac.

The country should accept responsibility for such few of these defectives as owe their origin to our own soil. It should place them under restraint and proper medical attention when their insanity manifests itself by rabid utterances against freedom and democracy. It should not wait until the mental disease reaches a more dangerous stage and becomes a menace to individuals and property.

But the country owes no such responsibility to such of these defectives as come from alien sources. It should go no further than to restrain them at the first manifestations of these mental disorders and ship them forthwith to the land of their origin for such treatment as that land may happen to provide.

We fear that social investigators and students have been dealing too long with a problem that properly belong to the alienists.

How could any one have doubted the authorship of the last presidential message? Wasn't it a beautiful bunch of rhetoric that meant most anything in general and nothing in particular.

The present national administration may have overlooked a few things it might have done to the country, but it has fifteen months to think up the rest of them, if any.

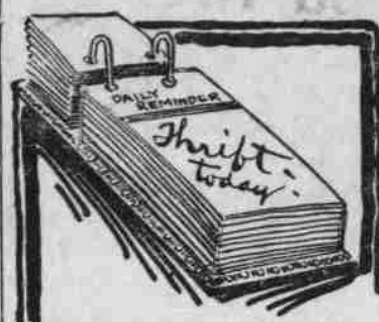
