NOTICE OF CONTEST

To Guadalupe Chavez of Ramah, New Mexico, Contestee:

You are hereby notified that Herman I. McDaniel, who gives Fort Wingate, New Mexico, as his post-office address, did on February 18th, 1920, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your Homestead Entry No. 093253, Serial No. C.3265, made April 1st, 1915, for SW1-4NW1-4, W1-2 SW1-4, SE1-4SW1-4, Section 22, Township 10 N. of Range 24 W, New Mexico Principal Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that the said Guadalupe Chavez, has wholly failed and refused to establish and maintain a residence upon the said land as required by law; has failed and refused to improve and cultivate the same as required by law; and has abandoned the same for a period of more than six months prior hereto; and that the said abandonment was not nor is not due to military or naval services.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken as confessed, and your said entry will be canceled without further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the fourth publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically responding to these allegations of contest, together with due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail.

WOOD TO ABIDE BY HAYS' LEADERSHIP

WILLIAM PROCTER AND CHIEFS
ARE WELL PLEASED WITH
RESULTS OF PAST WEEK.

Chicago, March.—An overwhelming sentiment for Leonard Wood's candidacy has developed in the past week, according to William C. Procter, chairman of the Leonard Wood national campaign committee.

Mr. Procter's statement followed a long conference with General Wood, Frank Hitchcock, J. J. McGraw, Fred Stanley, Frederick A. Jones, N. B. Walpole, and others actively interested in the Wood campaign.

Chicago, March.—Three former service men saw a "buddy" in distress at New Haven, Conn., a few nights ago and like all former service men immediately came to the rescue.

The rescued one was none other than Major General Leonard Wood, who was traveling from New York to Boston. A pouring blizzard from the sea had delayed the train for more than eighteen hours. There was no dining car attached and the station restaurant at New Haven was attacked by a cold half-frozen mob. In the end crash many were left in the snow.

The three former service men were fortunate. They had braved many a "howl" and knew just what to do. They elbowed their way to the front and were fortunate enough to get a table to themselves. Then one of them spied their "buddy" got hold of his uniform and piloted him to their table. Three chairs were piled together so that four could sit down. One man took a fried egg from his plate and put it on that of the visitor. The second man added two slices of bacon from his plate and the third gave up a roll and butter. All three offered to share their coffee.

General Wood got something to eat, found fine companionship and went back to his train contented to face the rest of his arduous journey.

LEONARD WOOD HAS "14" POINTS, TOO

100 Per Cent American, Statesman,
Peacemaker and Diplomat Make
Him Logical Candidate.

Chicago, Ill.—Leonard Wood's "14 points," on why he is a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination have been made public at his headquarters here. They are:

1, 100 per cent American; 2, equipped for nation's highest office; 3, a man of deeds, not words; 4, statesman; 5, diplomat; 6, business administrator; 7, authority on international affairs; 8, judge of men; 9, peacemaker; 10, organizer and builder; 11, proved leader; 12, champion of law and order; 13, unbroken record of success; 14, he did not keep us out of war, but paved the way for victory.

MARNE MEMORIAL POSTER

JUST as the school children of France gave for their country's gift to the United States—the Statue of Liberty—so will American school children contribute "one cent and upward" for "America's Gift to France," a monumental statue by Frederick MacMonnies, the noted American sculptor. Mr. MacMonnies is contributing his services toward the monument which, it is estimated, will cost \$250,000.

The poster shown herewith, is by Albert Sterner, noted American portrait painter. It typifies the tribute which this country will pay to the French through the Marne monument. 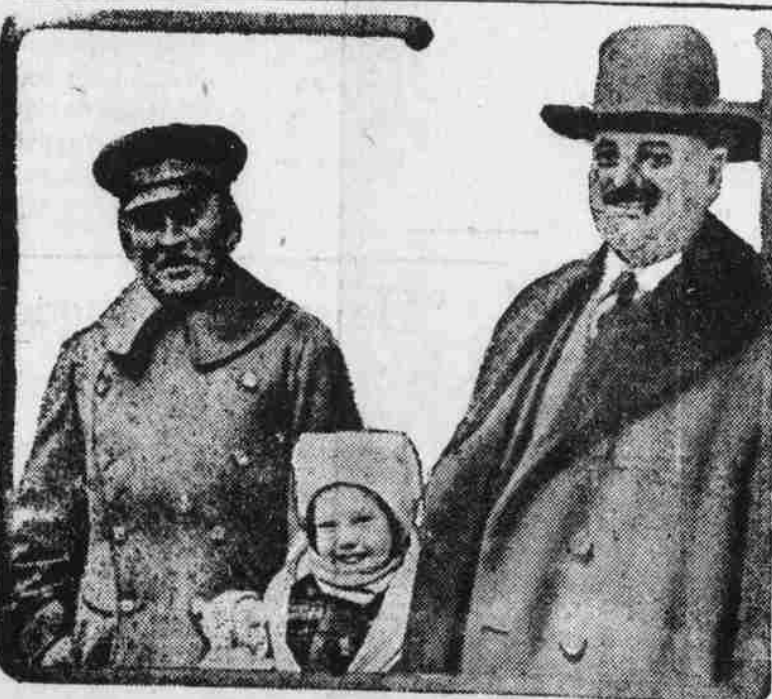

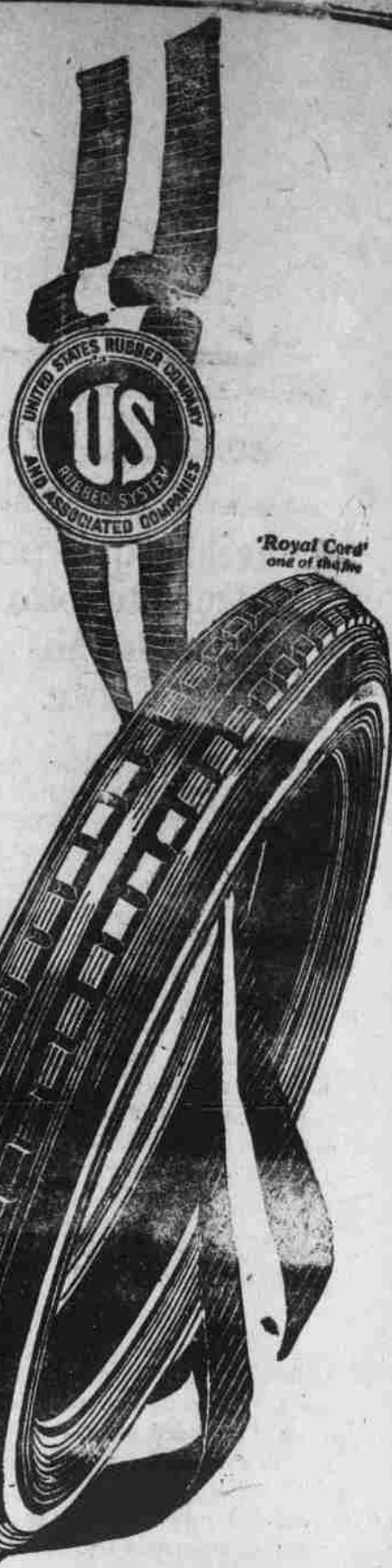
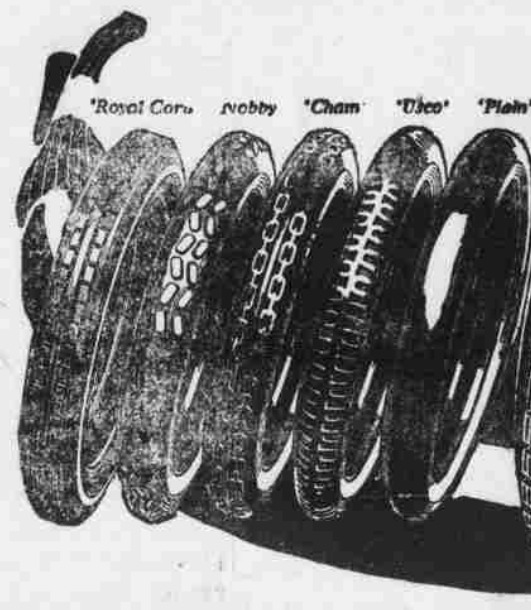
