## NOTICE OF CONTEST

Gallup, New Mexico, February 18, 1920.

To Guadalupe Chavez of Ramah, New Mexico, Contestee:

You are hereby notified that Herman I. McDaniel, who gives Fort Wingate, New Mexico, as his post-office address, did on February 18th, 1920, file in this office his duly corroborated application to contest and secure the cancellation of your Homestead Entry No. 023253, Serial No. C.3265, made April 1st, 1915, for SW1-4NW1-4, W1-2 SW1-4, SE1-4SW1-4, Section 22, Township 10 N. of Range 14 W, New Mexico Principal Meridian, and as grounds for his contest he alleges that the said Guadalupe Chavez, has wholly failed and refused to establish and maintain a residence upon the said land as required by law; has failed and refused to improve and cultivate the same as required by law; and has abandoned the same for a period of more than six months prior hereto; and that the said abandonment was not nor is not due to military or naval services.

You are, therefore, further notified that the said allegations will be taken as confessed, and your said entry will be canceled without further right to be heard, either before this office or on appeal, if you fail to file in this office within twenty days after the fourth publication of this notice, as shown below, your answer, under oath, specifically responding to these allegations of contest, together with due proof that you have served a copy of your answer on the said contestant either in person or by registered mail.

Washington April 1.—Tentative regulations governing oil and gas production under the land leasing bill were considered today at a conference of representatives of the five states containing public oil lands and oil producing interests, called by Sec. Payne. Representative of the American Petroleum Institute, the American Institute of Mining and the American Mining Congress were present and the conference went exhaustively into the technical regulations as drawn by the interior department to insure economic operations on leased lands.

Only minor changes were recommended and it is understood the regulations will be promulgated in a short time. As drawn they gave federal supervisors wide powers of regulations as to operations and equipment.

## WOOD AFTER NEW ENGLAND

Procter and Associates Out to Get All of 87 Delegates at Coming Primaries.

Chicago, March.—With eight votes from New Hampshire already in their grasp, Leonard Wood forces moved on New England in the hope of taking that section of the United States away from "the field."

"Maine is absolutely certain," Colonel William Procter, campaign manager for Leonard Wood, says. "The New Hampshire primary also had a very favorable effect on its neighbor on the west—Vermont—and that state and Rhode Island are fairly well on the way to a solid Wood delegation. Most of the progressive following in Massachusetts that has been for Governor Coolidge is now in the Wood camp. We have a big fight to beat the reactionary field, but some of the strongest men in the state are working with our managers, and the outlook is very promising."

"The influence of Boies Penrose has spread from Pennsylvania into Connecticut, but reports received from eastern headquarters indicate that the people are about ready to bolt over and throw out the Penrose machine. There are 87 delegates in New England. We are going after them tooth and nail, and we are going to get most of them."

## CUBAN STRONG FOR WOOD

Sentiment in Island for Him, Says Menocal, in Recalling His Great Work.

Chicago, March.—A strong endorsement for Leonard Wood in his candidacy for the presidential nomination has been made by General Mario G. Menocal, president of the Republic of Cuba.

President Menocal in his endorsement speaks of the active work accomplished by General Wood when he was governor-general of Cuba. He classes it as the most glorious achievement made by America in that island. "General Wood practically demonstrated that real democracy is not incompatible with the principle of authority or with a strong government of powerful initiative," Menocal declares. "It will be found that without such a government democracy degenerates into anarchy and licentiousness."

"General Wood left in Cuba a friendly people who remember with admiration his admirable qualities and work, and who will always be grateful to the United States for all that he contributed to the welfare of the Cuban people."

## MEN OF NOTE FOR WOOD

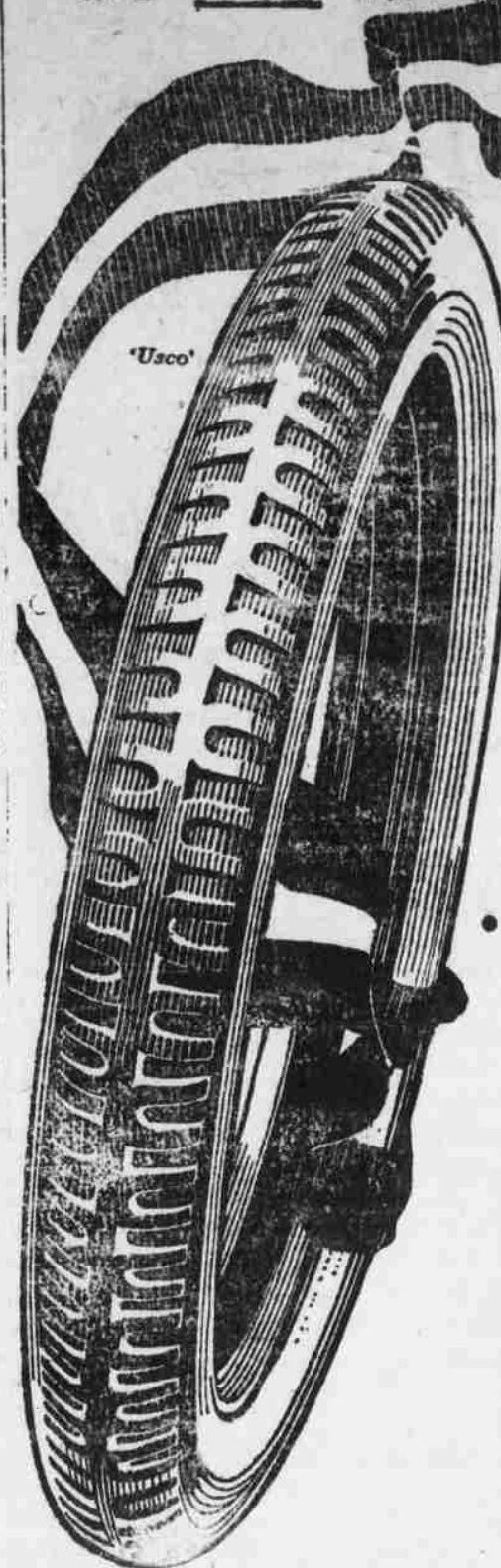
Strong Letters of Indorsement From Prominent Americans From Every Section of U. S.

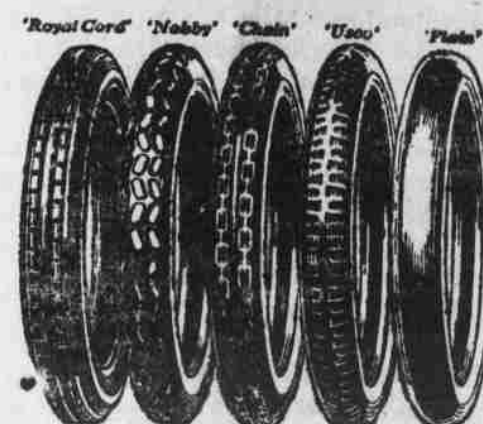
