ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION
of the
EXCELLENCE MOTOR COMPANY
(No Stockholders' Liability.)

We, the undersigned citizens of the United States and of the State of New Mexico, being desirous of forming a corporation under the laws of the State of New Mexico, do make, sign and acknowledge the following articles and certificate of incorporation, to-wit:

1. The name of said corporation is **EXCELLENCE MOTOR COMPANY**.

(No stockholders' liability.)

2. The principal registered office of said Company in the State of New Mexico is at Belen, in the County of Valencia, and the Statutory agent of Company upon whom process against said corporation may be served, is F. C. H. Livingston.

3. The purposes for which said company is to be formed are the manufacture of various kinds of spark plugs, motors, machines, engines, machinery and contrivances for the generation and application of steam, electricity or other agents for the production of power; the manufacture of cars, carriages, wagons, boats, and vehicles of every kind and description; the manufacture of machine supplies and devices and appliances incidental to the construction of motors, vehicles, machines, engines and machinery; the acquisition and sale of inventions, patent rights, letters patent, trade-marks and copyrights covering any or all articles to be manufactured or dealt in by said corporation, or covering any advertising devices, or advertising matter to be used in connection therewith; the issuing of licenses under patents, trade-marks and copyrights; the acting as principal or as agent and the exporting and importing of any spark from foreign countries; motors, machine supplies, contrivances and appliances or other articles manufactured by said corporation, or by other corporations, or persons; the carrying on of any lawful trade or business incidental to the aforesaid purposes; and the doing of all such things as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this corporation, and to issue its own stock or bonds or other securities or obligations in exchange for stocks, bonds, or

other evidences of indebtedness of other corporations, domestic or foreign; to make and carry out contracts of every kind, and to transact any and all business which may be necessary or proper or convenient, which is not contrary to the laws of New Mexico, to the exercise and fulfillment of any of the aforesaid powers and purposes.

4. The amount of the total authorized capital stock of said corporation is Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, divided into Fifty Thousand Shares of the par value of Ten Dollars each. The amount of the capital stock with which the said corporation shall commence business is Two Hundred Shares or Two Thousand Dollars.

5. The names and post office address of the undersigned incorporators and the number of shares subscribed by each are as follows:

W. J. Easterday, who has subscribed Fifty shares, whose post office address is Belen, New Mexico.

Joe Bell, who has subscribed Fifty shares, whose post office address is Belen, New Mexico.

E. G. Neumeier, who has subscribed One Hundred shares, whose post office address is Belen, New Mexico.

6. The term of existence of this corporation shall be fifty years, from and after the date of the filing of these articles in the office of the State Corporation Commission of New Mexico.

7. The board of directors shall have the power to make and alter by-laws, but any by-laws made by the directors under the power hereby conferred may be altered or repealed by a majority of the stockholders.

8. The names of the directors who shall manage the business of said corporation for the first three months after the filing of this certificate of incorporation are: W. J. Easterday, E. G. Neumeier and Joe Bell. After the expiration of said period of three months the board of directors shall consist of nine members, three of whom shall be elected for a period of one year, three for a period of two years and three for a period of three years, to be elected by the stockholders as provided by law.

9. The directors may hold their meetings and have offices, and keep their books of the corporation, except stock and transfer books, at such places outside of the limits of the State of New Mexico as the said directors may by resolution, from time to time, direct.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS PROCEEDINGS

REGULAR SESSION. APRIL 5, 1920.

The board of county commissioners met in regular session on April 5th 1920.

There were present Hon

Manuel Garcia chairman, Abel Vigil and Tranquilino Jaramillo members of the board, Placido Jaramillo sheriff and Diego Aragon county clerk.

The minutes of the proceeding session were read and approved.

Resignation of Francisco B. Chavez justice of the peace of precinct No. 27 was accepted and Ignacio Garcia y Gabaldon was appointed justice of the peace for said precinct.

Petition of citizens from precinct No. 13 for a political sub-division for an irrigation section, was left for consideration at next session.

Bond of Remigio Chavez for butchering was approved.

Whereas a petition by citizens and tax payers of Valencia county has been presented to the board of county commissioners showing the necessity for the installation of a railway crossing on the township line between 12 N. rge. 10W. N. M. P. M. and twp. 11N rge. 10W N. M. P. M. between sec. 32 and sec. 5.

And whereas the board of county commissioners of Valencia County, N. M. after due consideration of the above petition have arrived to the conclusion on this crossing to be a necessity and essential to provide proper traffic facilities for the residents of western Valencia county.

Therefore be it resolved, that the county clerk is hereby instructed to request of the superintendent of the A. T. & S. F. R. W. Co. at Winslow Ariz. to provide for the opening of said crossing; and in the event that the said superintendent shall fail to give satisfactory assurance indicating that the request will be properly complied with; the clerk of Valencia county is thereby instructed to forward the certified copy of this resolution to the state corporation commission of the state of New Mexico and to W. C. Reid attorney for the A. T. & S. F. Co. Be it further resolved that the county highway superintendent is instructed to cooperate with the railway Co. and citizens of vicinity of said crossing in the installation of same.

Be it resolved that the Mountain States Telegraph and Telephone Co. is hereby authorized to construct its telephone lines to cross river north of Los Lunas bridge, provided however

that said construction shall be confined by regulations as conducted by railroad engineer.

Whereas it is necessary that the bridge now being constructed near Los Lunas, N. M. be constructed to its specifications, and being necessary to have a competent inspector upon the ground it is proper that said inspector be paid monthly; Therefore be it resolved that the county clerk is hereby authorized to draw warrant monthly on the special bridge or general county fund in the amount of the voucher presented by said inspector, provided however that it has been duly approved by the state highway engineer.

The state highway engineer is hereby authorized to extend contract between the county of Valencia and the Midland bridge Co. entered the 8th day of November A. D. 1919, so as to provide 6 additional panels of the same construction as those shown on plans and specifications adopted, provided however that cost of same should not exceed the cost per panel as in contract.

Whereas it is a duty imposed by law upon the board of county commissioners to provide the necessities of life to indigents and whereas it has been impossible to comply with this duty in the past, due to the fact that no organization existed which could investigate the merits of claims so presented; and whereas it is the sincere desire of the board of county commissioners of Valencia county to assist in cases of emergencies and distress, therefore it was resolved that a committee for the examination and assistance of indigencies is hereby appointed, the committee consisting of Mrs. Eduardo M. Otero and Mrs. Placido Jaramillo. Be it further resolved that the county clerk is hereby instructed to draw a warrant of \$150.00 quarterly in advance in favor of said committee, to be used by them in assistance to those in need and distress. The said committee is to make a quarterly report of their expenditures and file same in the office of the county clerk.

Whereas it is the desire of the board of county commissioners of the county of Valencia, state of New Mexico, to cooperate in the development of agriculture and particularly in that branch of endeavor, which arouses interest among the growing children, as it develops them as well as it teaches them the best and most approved scientific methods of cultivation and animal husbandry, and whereas it is possible to secure the services of a county club leader by entering

into cooperative agreement with the federal and state agricultural authorities, at the total cost to the county of Valencia, of four hundred and fifty dollars \$450.

Therefore be it resolved that the sum of \$450. dollars is hereby appropriated for the aforesaid purpose, said amount to be paid when required by the New Mexico director of agricultural extension service upon presentation of duly signed vouchers.

Be it further resolved that the county clerk is hereby directed to transmit three copies of the foregoing resolution to the Hon. C. R. Monroe, director of extension service, State College, New Mexico.

Be it resolved that the county road superintendent is hereby authorized to spend a sum not to exceed \$300.00 dollars in the drainage of waters in precinct No. 11.

Be it resolved that the county clerk is hereby authorized to draw warrant in favor of Simon Neustadt for coal contracted as soon as it is delivered.

Payments made by the county road superintendent for the quarter ending March 31, 1920 were audited and approved.

Be it resolved that the county clerk is hereby authorized to draw warrant of \$100. dollars in favor of Richard Pohl to buy stamps for the use of the county officials.

County clerk's reports for the months of January and February 1920 were approved.

Claims as shown on page 43 of the warrant and fund received were allowed by the board.

Sheriff's report for the month of Dec. 1919 was approved.

Report of justice of the precinct No. 10 was approved.

Being no other business before the board it adjourned subject to call of the chairman.

BOOKS BRING AID TO SOLDIER SICK

American Library Association

Serves Ten Thousand Men in Nation's Hospitals.

EFFORTS BRING RESULTS.

Works on Vocational Training Circulated Among Men Who Must Take Up New Callings Because of Their Injuries.

Hospital library service maintained by the American Library Association during the war was credited with great value in aiding in the recovery of many sick and disabled men.

There are still in our hospitals more than 10,000 former service men. Of these nearly 8,000 are in Public Health Service hospitals, the remainder in civilian hospitals. Books, magazines and newspapers are sent to these men from the American Library Association. In the larger hospitals, containing over 300 patients, special librarians are placed. To the smaller hospitals, through the co-operation of many public libraries, library visitors are sent to visit the wards once or twice a week and learn the book needs of the patients.

A special effort is made to supply to ex-service men in hospitals the books in demand as a result of the training given by the Federal Board for Vocational Education.

More Books for Blind.

The A. L. A. in co-operation with other agencies already interested in work for the blind, is printing books in the new Braille type. Because of the newness of the revised Braille adopted for teaching to the American war blind, literature printed in it is limited to fewer than 200 books. Though the total number of blinded soldiers is small, their need of books is great, and the "magic of print" can do much to restore hope and usefulness to them.

Not only for former service men who are sick or disabled is the association working. The value of books proved so great to men in camps that efforts are still being made to connect discharged soldiers and sailors with libraries wherever they may be. Hundreds of letters have reached A. L. A. headquarters from former service men telling of the lack of library facilities in particular localities to which those men have returned.

Direct Service Provided.

In many cases there is a state library commission or a nearby library to which a man can be referred for the books he needs, but if there is no such organization through which he can be served, books for almost any serious purpose may be borrowed directly from the A. L. A. War Service, 24 West Thirty-ninth street, New York city. The only expense in connection with these loans is prepayment of return postage on books borrowed.

The A. L. A. has published lists of books to help ex-service men who are studying to advance themselves in their work. "Five Hundred Business Books," "One Thousand Technical Books" and reading courses on practical subjects are now in preparation.

Other Work Being Done.

Other branches of work which the A. L. A. War Service is carrying on include service to the Merchant Marine, Coast Guard and lighthouses, service to industrial communities which are resultant from the war, service to United States forces overseas. This work is carried on with money received from the United War Work funds, the use of which is limited by the conditions of the gift to these specific purposes.

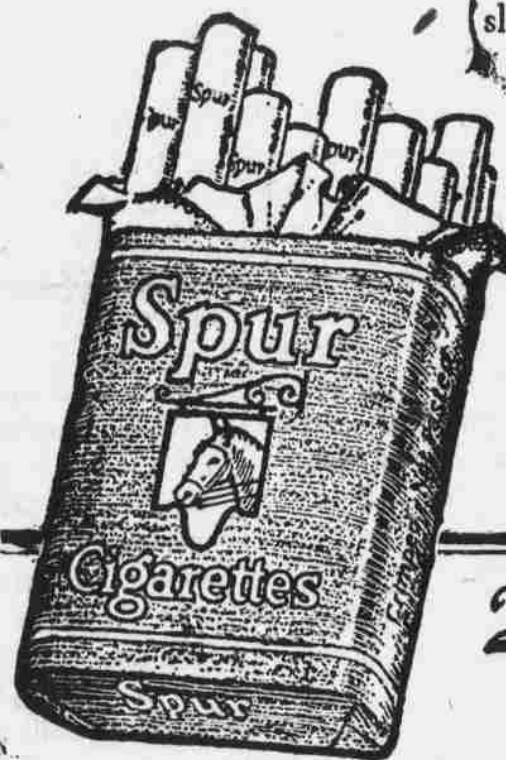
