**Pithy News Items**

Gathered From All Over

**New Mexico**

Western Hemisphere Daily News Service.

The Baptist church is planning to establish a mission somewhere in New Mexico this year.

The fourth annual convention of the New Mexico Cattle and Horse Trainers' Association will be held in Albuquerque, March 23, 24 and 27.

R. S. Miller, veterinarian, was shot and seriously injured, it is alleged, by W. Delaney, an engineer, in the yards at Gallup. The shots were fired from a locomotive.

Charles A. Spiess, a resident of New Mexico since 1888, member of the Republican national committee, both in territorial days and since New Mexico became a state, is dead at Las Vegas.

The epidemic of influenza is subsiding and many of the sufferers are back at their place of business again, according to reports from Farmington. The nurses from the outside are being released and but few new cases are reported.

The well now going down at Columbus and the one at Bixbee seem to have gotten bored almost considerably, for capital from a considerable distance is now apparently interested in the possibilities of southern New Mexico as the next big oil field.

P. J. Vidal is preparing to open a candy and ice cream manufacturing shop at Gallup at once and work has already started on the building which is to house the enterprise. Mr. Vidal has had six years' experience previously in the same line of business.

The body of a young man identified as William Miller of Pueblo was found in the tender of train No. 7 when it reached Haton. Another young man, calling himself Victor Caldwell, who was his companion in stealing the ribs, notified the trainmen of the accident.

The Modoc mine, one of the best known properties in the southern section of New Mexico, and located in the Organ mountains, is to be a producer no more. When the Organ district was at its height, the Modoc was one of the best known and paying of them all. The mine is now being dismantled, and the machinery removed.

The first session of the District Court in Grant county which has been held for a year will be convened on March 3 at Silver City. The grand jury is expected to be sworn only three or four days. Two murder trials are expected to be disposed of during the term, that of S. E. Bailey, charged with killing J. M. Bedore at Vanadium last summer and of Manuel Lopez, charged with slaying Doc Catilla, a former saloonkeeper in Hinton.

A contract has been awarded to Tex Elyck, representing a bridge company, to build a pile trestle 200 feet long with a 7 per cent grade as an approach to the bridge spanning the river near Farmington, N. M. In addition to this a contract also was let to the bridge contractors to build a 100-foot trestle embankment. This will form a connection with the steel work of the new bridge twenty feet higher than the old bridge, which was washed out by high waters.

Indiscretions, it is said, have been committed by the grand jury against several prominent citizens of Clovis charging them with assault in connection with a tar and feather incident that took place here last April. The action of the grand jury is understood to have been taken in connection with the case of T. Smith, of Medrose, N. M., who alleges that just prior to the Third Liberty Loan campaign, last April, he received a coat of tar and feathers at the hands of certain citizens of Clovis.

Charles A. Spiess, a resident of New Mexico since 1888, member of the Republican national committee, both in territorial days and since New Mexico became a state, died at East Las Vegas after an illness of several years. His death, however, was hastened by an attack of pneumonia which he contracted a few days ago.

Local officials at Columbus have been notified by Senator Fall that the War Department has formally approved the proposal to make Columbus a permanent landing station for airplanes. As already a good deal of equipment has been removed from Camp Cody to that place this move is thought to precede a general military establishment there.

Bids have been asked of local contractors at Gallup within the past week by Louis Liberator for the construction of a modern office building and hotel on three lots which he recently purchased. The building is to be 7,000 feet, two stories, three business rooms, a 24-room hotel on the second floor and an auditorium for public meetings and dances.

Equal rights in all places of public association, resort or amusement would be guaranteed by a bill introduced in the Legislature by Speaker Sedillo, Representatives DeNils of Bernalillo, and Armijo of Dona Ana. The measure would forbid the owners of any such public place to display any notice denying the privilege of his establishment to any person on account of race, color or creed. By the terms of the bill drug stores, barber shops, theaters, schools and academies, skating rinks and the like are included.

COMMUNITY WORK

Think of the happiest and at the same time the most wide-awake and progressive family you know—the one which most closely illustrates your idea of family life. Analyze the secret of their success and you will probably find it lies in their power of co-operation and compromise. No member insists in carrying out his own wishes regardless of the interests and wishes of the others. Each claims a little and yields a little. The real basis of their life is a spirit of mutual help and forbearance.

The community is only a larger family. To accomplish satisfactory results there must be a body of citizens working together in harmony. And in order to achieve anything worth while, each man must not insist too strongly upon his own wishes and ideas. When he finds that they conflict with the ideas of others he must be prepared to yield the less essential details of his plan—or perhaps to attain only part of his object.

If the public improvement which he has at heart seems desirable enough to warrant it, he must be ready to support his neighbor's project (if it is not distinctly an unworthy one) in order to gain the neighbor's support to his own object. He must control his temper, study the personality of the man he is dealing with, use tact and consideration.

These are qualities we must all cultivate to work with each other successfully and do our part in the community life.

He supplies the people with their food and is the buyer, judge and dispenser of the articles that go on many tables throughout his neighborhood. If he is efficient people will come to him for advice upon what to buy, when to buy it and how much to buy, because he will know whether or not the prices on the market are going up, whether the market will be scarce on certain necessities or whether the immediate stuff he is selling are the best that can be got from any standard wholesale house. These are vital things for the vigilant housekeeper to know and merchants who wish to have a corner on the good wishes of the consumer's heart will do all he can to please him in these ways.

NEW CREED FOR AMERICANS

Vice-President Marshall, speaking before the National Press Club, denounced Bolshevism and anarchy and propounded what he termed a new creed for Americans. He said that these American citizens, native and naturalized, who were unwilling to seek redress for their grievances in orderly and constitutional ways "should be taught peacefully, if we can, and forcibly, if we must, that our country is not an international boarding house, nor an anarchist cafe."

The creed, presented by the vice-president, said:

"I believe that the American republic as instituted by the fathers, constitutes the finest system of government ever ordained among men and affords the machinery for the righting of grievances without resort to violence and disorder.

"I believe that every inequality which exists in the social and economic condition of the American people is traceable to the successful demands of interested classes for class legislation, and I believe, therefore, that practical equality can be obtained under our form of government by remedial legislation in the interest of the American people and not in the interest of anybody thereof, large or small.

"I believe there is no justification in a government where officials are elected and laws made by the people, for a minority to threaten bloodshed and anarchy unless the majority shall submit to the will of the minority.

"I believe that America belongs to American citizens, native and naturalized, who are willing to seek redress for their grievances in orderly and constitutional ways, and I believe that all others should be taught, peacefully if we can, and forcibly if we must, that our country is not an international boarding house nor an anarchist cafe.

"I pledge myself in the support of these principles by my voice, my vote and, if need be, my fortune and my life, and I promise my country to train my children in this most holy faith."

INCOME TAX MAN IS NOW IN COLUMBUS

Get ready for the Income Tax man. He arrived in Columbus on Thursday evening, and is located at the Bank, where he can be consulted without charge.

"Bring in your figures, your problems, your doubts, and your questions," is his invitation.

Collector of Internal Revenue Alfred Johnson has sent one of his deputies, Mr. M. B. Smith, solely to help people in this vicinity to determine their individual liability and to comply with the law's requirements as to 1918 incomes.

His office hours are from 1 to 5 Friday and 9 to 5 Saturday, and he will remain in town until the close of business on Saturday.

"This free advisory service," writes Collector Franklin, "is planned for those who are required for the first time to consider their liability and to make sworn returns."

"Many thousands who were not affected by the prior federal law taxing incomes must this year file returns. Here are the requirements:

"Every unmarried person who had a net income of \$1,000 or over during 1918; and every married person who, together with wife (or husband) and minor children, had a net income of \$2,000 in 1918, should file returns."

"The advice and services of the deputy collector are entirely free, and he is authorized to administer the oath required on returns, free of charge. Persons who are taxable should make payment when filing their returns by attaching check or money order.

"This tax is a war burden; it is a part of the price of victory, the greatest victory that the world has known. I believe the people of this district will meet it fully, and I am offering every facility of my office to aid them to determine their individual liability."

ARMY HOSPITAL AT CAMP GODY TO BE ABANDONED

Washington, D. C., Feb. 25.—Surgeon General Ireland announced today that as a result of the abandonment of a number of army camps and the concentration of sick and wounded soldiers in city hospitals, it has been decided to discontinue fifteen base hospitals. Steps already are under way to abandon the hospitals at Camps Gody, MacArthur, Joseph E. Johnston, Logan, Hanesock, Stevens, McClellan, Sevier, Wheeler, and to reduce the hospital at Camp Kearney, Cal., to 500 beds.

CARL BUYS PART OF ROSELEY TRACT

L. M. Carl recently purchased from Mrs. Carrie B. Tyson, formerly Mrs. Nowley, thirty-five acres of the homestead tract in the northwestern part of town, which he expects to cut up into town lots and offer for sale. This will be a restricted residence section, it being the plan of Mr. Carl to sell to no one unless they agree to build houses up to a certain standard. He expects to grade the streets before the addition is placed on the market.

Mrs. Tyson retains five acres in the southeast corner of her tract, and also the rest of the homestead with the exception of the thirty-five acres, which will become very valuable when the improvements are made on the Carl addition that he has planned.

J. A. Prewitt sold the C. E. Gustaf property this week to R. E. Rawson. Gustaf is a corporal in the Twelfth Cavalry Band.

CONSTRUCTION PLANS CALLS FOR NEW HOSPITAL

The new buildings in Camp Furbush are to include a hospital that will accommodate 250 patients. The plans have already been drawn for the buildings and work will be started soon. The hospital at Gody having been done away with, it becomes necessary for a large hospital here.

The building of the new quarters for the Twenty-fourth Infantry and Twelfth Cavalry is being continued as rapidly as possible. It is thought that this job will be finished within eight weeks.

New Railroad Pumping Plant.

The railroad company has had workmen building a new pumping plant here this week. The new plant is located a few yards east of the old one and is to be on the same order. The well was drilled several months ago, which is thought to be as good as the wells now in use.

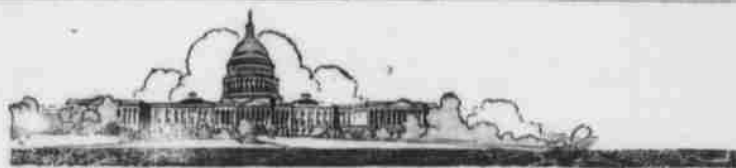
