ELEVEN Special Sessions of State Legislatures to ratify the Amendment were called by Democratic Governors, to SIXTEEN Special Sessions called by Republican Governors for the same purpose.

Resolution as per amendment to June 7--10, 1920 Special session.

State of New Mexico, County of Valencia.

Resolved by the board of county commissioners of the county of Valencia, State of New Mexico, that the special tax of three mills on each dollar of the valuation of all property in said county subject to taxation for state and county purposes is hereby levied and imposed for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and improvement of public highways and to enable the state and counties to meet the provisions of the Federal Aid Road Act, being the tax authorized and directed to be made by said board, by act of the legislature of said state, entitled "an act authorizing and directing boards of county commissioners to levy taxes for the years 1919, 1920 and 1921 for construction and improvement of public highways and to meet dollar for dollar allotments to the state Federal funds under the federal aid road act and for other purposes approved March 17, 1919.

The county assessor of said county is hereby authorized and directed to extend said levy on the tax roll for said county for the year 1920, and the county treasurer of said county is hereby authorized and directed to collect said tax and remit the same to the state treasurer to be placed to the credit of the state road fund.
