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SAVING ON PAYDAY IS MADE EASY BY SAVINGS STAMPS

Hume, of Dallas, Federal District Director of the Government Savings Division. Thrift, he declares, is the good management of the business of living, and the business of living is the most important business men and women are engaged in.

"If one will have a quiet little session with himself, he will see that he can save money to be put away in a safe place every payday. Many people say they cannot save, but those who really make an effort to save and, after deciding that they will religiously set aside something each and every payday, stick to this decision will soon find that 'where there is a will there is also a way' the savings director says.

"Thrift Stamps and War Savings Stamps, which are issued by the Government and can be gotten at any bank or postoffice, make regular, systematic and safe saving easy. In this way, one can save in any amount from a quarter on up to a thousand dollars. Money so saved draws interest at the rate of four per cent, compounded every three months, and if one needs his money it can always be gotten at the postoffice with interest earned. The person who regularly purchases one or more War Savings Stamps each month every payday will not have to worry about the rainy day and he will never have to say: 'Oh, if I only had some money.' These little Government bonds issued in convenient denominations make saving easy and certain."

WHAT DOES THE FUTURE HAVE IN STORE FOR YOU?

What does the future hold for you—good things or bad? Look ahead! Five, ten, fifteen, twenty years from now, where and what will you be then? WHY SOLDIERS ARE OPPOSED TO LEAGUE

Impossible to Arouse Proper Spirit to Face Death for Foreign Countries.

The following is the third of four articles by Capt. "Eddie" Rickenbacker on "Why Soldiers Are Against the League of Nations." Capt. Rickenbacker was the ace of aces in American aviation on the front in France. His acquaintance during the soldiers of the late war is nationwide. When he speaks for them, he speaks what he knows.

By CAPT. "EDDIE" RICKENBACKER, Chapter 3. It is a solemn thing to go out to kill or to be killed. Most men do not like to do it. They go because duty forces them to. Their sense of duty to their country is stronger than their sense of self-preservation. They face death because they ought to protect what they love at home.

That is what makes spirit in an army. The West Pointer calls it morale. Without this fighting spirit a soldier is not worth much, and an army is no army at all. Every soldier knows this. And so he asks: "How are you going to get the proper fighting spirit into American troops when, under article 10, they will be called to fight for Poland against Russia, or for Roumania against Bulgaria, or for Greece against Turkey?"

What is there to nerve a man against death in the thought that by his death he will help one of these foreign countries retain a territory as big as Long Island and prevent another country from getting it? Will that thought console him when his mind turns to the mother or wife in America? Is there any inspiration in it? Does a man die gladly for anything so foreign and so absurd?

The soldier who has stood by the charred flesh and bones of a comrade knows there is no spirit or consolation in any of these things. He knows that men cannot fly willingly into the face of death for any such causes.

The whole thing is impossible. To a soldier of the line it is simply unthinkable. To him all the talk about making the world safe for democracy by fighting boundary wars all around the globe means just nothing at all. You might as well tell him to die for the blue sky as to die for boundary lines everywhere and for democracy in general.

I have never seen a soldier or an army that could get the fighting spirit in such a cause as that. Neither has any other American soldier. An American army that had no other inspiration would be an army without spirit, without morale; it would be no army at all. I defy any soldier to imagine a fighting American army under these conditions.

WHO'S SAVING THE MONEY YOU MAKE?

TWO AND A HALF MILLION COME TO HOLDERS OF THIRD LOAN BONDS NEXT MONTH

Dallas, Texas.—Owners of Liberty Bonds of the third issue, bearing 4 1/2% interest, according to Dinmore W. Hume, Federal Director of Savings, number 719,210 in this district. The total value of Liberty Bonds bought in the district was \$113,216,050. The interest thereon at 4 1/2% will be due and payable at any bank on September 15; it will amount to \$2,469,462.50 for this, the eleventh reserve district, according to Mr. Hume. A like amount of interest on the same bonds will be paid in six months later, on March 15, 1931. Bankers are frequently finding bonds issued in 1917 and 1918 from which no interest coupons have been clipped.

BOOKER T. WASHINGTON'S DAUGHTER URGES NEGROES TO EARN, SAVE, INVEST

Dallas, Texas.—Portia Washington Pittman, daughter of the noted negro leader, Booker T. Washington, wife of W. Sidney Pittman, a negro architect in Dallas, insists that now is the time when negroes, above all others, should earn, save a part of their earnings, and invest in government securities. "Negroes are now earning more than ever before in their lives," she said. "They should save and invest it so it will comfort and give them the things they need so much when age or sickness or death overtakes them. PRaises HARDING'S WELFARE PROGRAM

"Senator Harding's address on social justice in which he proposed a Federal Department of Public Welfare, is the longest step and practicable proposal yet taken by any man of official responsibility," declares Hon. Simon D. Fess, representative in Congress from Ohio.

His program goes directly to the core of the problem and demands protection, first, of motherhood, by safeguarding maternity, then of childhood, by proper legislation, and through these, the national health against invasion of disease through low standards of morals and commercial aggression of industry, which exposes to epidemics," he said. "He recognizes social justice not as a woman's problem, but as a general problem, in which women play a larger part. Hence, his specific demands that women be placed on various boards, Federal and State, which have to deal with problems of employment, labor adjustment and wherever national health is to be determined. This concern must extend to women in agriculture, as well as industries."

"Senator Harding's sound common sense prevents his dealing in general theories at the expense of practical results. Alive to the dangers of bureaucracy, against which he warns, he asks for a reorganization of our departments at Washington which will be one of his earliest tasks, and recommends the creation of a department of Public Welfare, to have directions of the problem of social justice. This will prevent duplication of agencies by unifying a half dozen bureaus now doing a haphazard work into one responsible and responsive department of the government. This step carries a program of social justice from the stage of theoretical speculation to that of practical execution, and the country can expect immediate action along practical lines."

RED CROSS ACTIVE IN DISASTER RELIEF

When disaster hits a community—
fire, flood, earthquake, explosion, bad
wreck or tornado—the American Red
Cross can be depended upon to follow
right at its heels with help for the
stricken people. Red Cross relief is
almost immediately forthcoming—food,
clothing, shelter and funds; doctors,
nurses and special workers with long
experience in handling similar trouble
elsewhere.

During the last year, ending June 30,
there was an average of four disasters
a month in the United States. One
hundred and fifty communities in
twenty-seven states suffered. The
largest and most destructive of these
were the tidal wave at Corpus Christi,
Texas, and tornadoes in Mississippi,
Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, Ohio,
Indiana and Illinois.

In these events of horror 850 per-
sons were killed, 1,500 were injured,
18,000 were made homeless, about 80-
000 families needed help, the property
loss was nearly \$100,000,000 and al-
most \$1,000,000 in relief funds, not in-
cluding emergency supplies was ex-
pended.

To the sufferers from all disasters
during the year, the American Red
Cross sent \$120,000 worth of sup-
plies, 110 Red Cross nurses and seven
special relief trains. To meet the
needs of the stricken, the organization
set up ten relief stations, operated
thirty food canteens and as many
emergency hospitals. One hundred
and twenty-five Red Cross chapters
gave disaster relief service.

If disaster ever strikes this town or
county, the citizens can be absolutely
sure the Red Cross will be right on
hand to help them in every way.
