COUNTY PROCEEDINGS

SPECIAL MEETING HELD NOV. 22, 1920

The Board of County Commissioners met in Special Session on November 22nd 1920, for the purpose of making the annual levies for current year 1920. There were present Hon. Manuel Garcia chairman, and Abel Vigil member of the board, Placido Jaramillo Sheriff and Diego Aragon County Clerk.

The minutes of the preceding session were read and approved.

STATE PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY MEETS POPULAR DEMAND

The state Public Health Laboratory, established jointly by the state Department of Health and the University of New Mexico on January first, has met with a totally unexpected demand for its services. Starting off with 10 specimens for the first month, the total number of examinations for November reached 791, and the number for the first half of December has already run up to 550. A total of 3000 examinations have been made since the laboratory opened its doors. The present capacity of the laboratory could be utilized to such an extent for two or three years.

A significant fact in connection with this demand is that, so far as can be learned, the laboratory has drawn little, if any, of the work formerly done by private laboratories located within the state, indicating that the use of laboratory examinations by the physician and health officers in the diagnosis and control of communicable diseases has been increased to a considerable extent.

One important function of the laboratory has been the examination of samples from public water supplies over the state. These samples have been taken by the sanitary engineer of the department of Health in connection with sanitary surveys being made of water supplies. Laboratory investigations have also resulted in the finding of two typhoid fever carriers in milk handling establishments in two cities, within the year, which enabled the health authorities to prevent further spread of infection from these sources, which might have continued for years without being discovered otherwise.

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Six Barrels of Potatoes for 99c.

On September 14, Mrs. Sarah S. Hancock, of Bridgeton, New Jersey, sold six barrels of No. 2 potatoes through a New York commission house for \$1.50 a barrel—a total of \$9.00. After deducting \$2.10 for barrels, \$3.51 for freight, \$1.50 for cartage and \$.90 for commission, the firm sent Mrs. Hancock what was left—99c.

RED CROSS ACTIVE IN DISASTER RELIEF

When disaster hits a community—fire, flood, earthquake, explosion, had wreck or tornado—the American Red Cross can be depended upon to follow right at its heels with help for the stricken people. Red Cross relief is almost immediately forthcoming—food, clothing, shelter and funds; doctors, nurses and special workers with long experience in handling similar trouble elsewhere.

During the last year, ending June 30, there was an average of four disasters a month in the United States. One hundred and fifty communities in twenty-seven states suffered. The largest and most destructive of these were the tidal wave at Corpus Christi, Texas, and tornadoes in Mississippi, Louisiana, Alabama, Georgia, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

In these events of horror 830 persons were killed, 1,600 were injured, 18,000 were made homeless, about 30,000 families needed help, the property loss was nearly \$100,000,000 and almost \$1,000,000 in relief funds, not including emergency supplies was expended.

To the sufferers from all disasters during the year, the American Red Cross sent \$120,000 worth of supplies, 110 Red Cross nurses and seven special relief trains. To meet the needs of the stricken, the organization set up ten relief stations, operated thirty food canteens and as many emergency hospitals. One hundred and twenty-five Red Cross chapters gave disaster relief service.

If disaster ever strikes this town or county, the citizens can be absolutely sure the Red Cross will be right on hand to help them in every way.
