HIGH PERCENTAGE DEATH WITHOUT MEDICAL ATTENDANCE

From an analysis recently made by the State Department of Health of death reports filed from over the state, it was found that 10 percent of the deaths actually reported occurred without medical attention. This did not include sudden deaths and deaths from accidents.

Most of the deaths in cases where physicians have been called, are being reported, the department believes, but is estimated that over one-third of those actually occurring, especially in the remote rural sections, are not being reported. Since it is estimated that the majority of these are cases not seen by physicians, the department believes that an estimate of between 35 and 40 per cent of all deaths occurring within the state at the present time are among persons unattended by physicians. This has been especially noticeable in the mountainous counties in the northern central part of the state. The reporting for the past year has been gradually becoming more complete, so that more exact figures will be available later.

In discussing the situation, Dr. C. E. Waller, Commissioner of Health, stated that this condition, which is a serious one, appears to be due to two causes: failure to recognize the grave nature of illness in time to call a physician, and inability on the part of many to stand the expense incident to the obtaining of medical attention. The elimination of the first mentioned cause, it was pointed out, calls for an intensive educational campaign, the sooner instituted the better. This one item alone is enough to thoroughly awaken every citizen of the State to the importance of the work which must be done by the State and local health authorities and to the need for proper provision for carrying it out.

The remedy for the second cause lies in the provision of better facilities for taking care of the sick among those who are unable to pay.

STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT WARNS AGAIN'S MEASLES

Reports received by the State Health Department indicate that measles is likely to become epidemic over the State within the next few weeks. There has been a widespread outbreak of measles within the last year or two, and as a result there are now thousands of susceptible children. This will tend to make the disease spread more rapidly.

Attention is directed to the fact that measles is by no means a harmless disease, as is supposed by many. While it rarely results fatally if uncomplicated, it is followed, in a certain percentage of cases, by a form of pneumonia which is exceedingly dangerous. Many deaths occur from this cause every year, especially among infants under five years of age. For this reason, parents should be particularly careful to prevent the exposure of children as far as possible, and should, under no circumstances, voluntarily expose them, as has often been done in the past. While practically every child will have measles sooner or later, the longer the disease is put off, the less the danger. Even in cases which recover, the child is sometimes left with impaired eyes, ear trouble, or in a weakened condition which renders him susceptible to other diseases.

The most important point in the prevention of measles is the early recognition of cases, that they may be promptly isolated, and the quarantine of persons who have been exposed until it can be determined whether they will develop the disease. Measles is most contagious in the earliest stages, before the eruption appears on the body.

BONUS TO SERVICE MEN

Shall the bonus to service men be given by the states or by the federal government? The national convention of the American Legion asked that aid be given by the national government. The resolutions suggest that there be a cash bonus, or a gift of land, or aid to secure a home in a town or a city. This alternative system would result in giving soldiers, sailors and marines the kind of help that would be preferred. Many could get along without the cash bonus, but would appreciate aid to get a home or government land. Only by an act of congress could this alternative system that the Legion asks for be worked out. Half a dozen states have already voted aid in the form of a cash bonus making a double system when logically it should be a national undertaking.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS SPECIAL SESSION

SPECIAL SESSION DEC. 13 1920

The Board of County Commissioners met in special session on December 13th 1920; There were present Hon. Manuel Garcia chairman, Abel Vigil and Tranquillino Jaramillo members, Placido Jaramillo Sheriff and Diego Aragon County Clerk.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

The board then adopted the following resolution:

Be it hereby resolved that the following proclamation be published as required by law, and the same contains the action of the board of county commissioners taken in reference with the election of Justices of the Peace and Constables, to be held on the second Monday in January A. D. 1921.

An election of the qualified voters of Valencia County is hereby called to be held in the several precincts of said county, on the 10th day of January 1921; for the purpose of voting for a justice of the peace and constable and said election to be held in conformity with the laws of the State of New Mexico, the Polls of the said precincts shall be opened from 9 o'clock A. M. to 8 o'clock P. M.

The following named persons are hereby appointed judges of election and the following places for holding the election are hereby designated.

SON ARRESTADOS DE NUEVO LOS 16 VILLISTAS

Se hacen Nuevas acusaciones por el condado de Luna.

Santa Fe, N. M., Diciembre 16. Cualquiera que sea el resultado del recurso de "habeas corpus" que será resuelto mañana, para poner en libertad a los diez y seis villistas que estan cumpliendo sus sentencias, por homicidio en conexión con la incursión hecha por Villa en Columbus, en 1916, dichos presos no podran salir de la prision.

Los Villistas fueron perdonados por el gobernador Larrazolo hace unas pocas semanas, y la libertad no se llevo a cabo, por las gestiones de los ex-soldados y otras personas, que alegaron que el indulto era ilegal porque el gobernador no habia consultado con la oficina de indultos.

El recurso de habeas corpus, que será visto mañana, fue introducido por los abogados de los prisioneros.

R. A. Lane, diputado sherife de condado de Luna, llegó ayer a Santa Fe, procedente de Columbus y técnicamente arrestó a todo el grupo de Villistas.

En el evento de que la corte declarara legales los indultos, los presos tendrian que continuar en la cárcel.

Se alega que fueron convictos por una sola acusación de homicidio. Varias personas fueron muertas en la incursión se hace por el homicidio de personas que no se habian citado en el primer caso.
