MR. FARMER, DO YOU PLOW YOUR WHEAT LAND EARLY?

We have received the following article from the Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association, of Kansas City, and it carries such an important message to the farmer who is planting wheat that we feel it should be given as wide publicity

One hundred dollars an acre more without a single dellar more invested was made in eleven years on a wheat belt farm. Early plowing for wheat was the method used in obtaining these increased returns. Two different plots of the same ground were used in making the comparison at Manhatian, Kansas. One was plowed in July each year; the other in September, the usual time on the

average farm. Based on August I prices in Kansas City, the total value of the wheat from September plowed land in the eleven years was \$173.60 an acre. From the July plowing the return in cleven years was \$277.91. This is a profit of \$191.22 an acre. The land


