## Will You Stick?

"This Farm Bureau thing costs too much," said a Nebraska merchant to several farmers gathered in his store. "County dues are all right, but putting up for a lot of state and national officers is different. You don't know how they'll spend your money."

"Let's see, don't retail merchants have both state and national organizations?" asked one farmer.

The merchant colored, but admitted they had. The farmer asked if he belonged to any of them.

"That's my business," sputtered the merchant.

"Yes, and I guess the Farm Bureau is my business," spoke up another farmer. "I hadn't joined it before, but I'm going to now. If a national organization is a good thing for merchants and bankers and manufacturers, it's a good thing for farmers, too."

### NEED OF FARM TARIFF IS GREAT, SAYS CAPPER

Washington.—Reasons for the protection of the American farmer through the emergency tariff bill which the Republican Congress has passed and President Wilson has signed his de termination to disapprove are summed up by Senator Capper, of Kansas.

This emergency bill is a paramount act of social and indispensable justice, he said. The American farmer stands alone today of all the producers in the world. Other governments, notably those of Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, and Japan, are helping their farmers, protecting and supporting them but our farmers must go it alone in competition with all the world.

### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

The board of County Commissioners met in special Session on the 14th day of February, 1921, at the Court House; there being present the Hon. Daniel Lucero, chairman, Hon. Narciso Frances, and Hon. Celso Lobato members, Hon. Joseph F. Tondre sheriff and Hon. Abelino Gutierrez, clerk.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The board then adopted the following conditions before proceeding to open the bids for the sale of the Old Los Lunas bridge: "No bid to be accepted for less than \$1200.00; said bridge not to be taken off until the new bridge would be open for traffic, and if the county would require, for bridge construction, any portion of the old structure, they could have the same at pro rate cost to the buyer."

The board then opened the bids for the sale of said bridge at the hour specified according to resolution of January 17, 1921. Mr. A. E. St. Morris, District Highway Engineer, then appeared before the board in behalf of the state and presented a certified warrant for \$100.00 for bid on said bridge, making an offer of \$1200.00.

The board then called on all those wishing to bid on said bridge and who had certified checks; there being no other bids, the board accepted the offer of Mr. St. Morris and closed the bids. Mr. St. Morris was requested to deposit the sum of \$1100.00 additional with the county Treasurer to the credit of the county road fund. It being agreed that a receipt from the treasurer shall be full evidence of Mr. St. Morris having fulfilled his contract.

Mr. A. E. St. Morris District Highway Engineer again appeared before the board requesting that the board take the necessary steps to secure an adequate right of way from Grants to the western boundary of Valencia County and after taking the matter into consideration the board adopted the following resolution:

**BE IT RESOLVED** that it is the duty of the board of county commissioners to secure ample and adequate right of way from Grants to the McKinley County boundary, and Mr. A. E. St. Morris is hereby requested to ascertain as near as possible the cost of the proposed right of way and to present to the board a map showing his recommendations as to said route.

The county clerk was authorized to issue duplicate warrant for No. 3957 which was lost.

The board then took recess until 1:30 P. M. at which time the board proceeded to revise and approve the bonds of constables recently appointed and the following bonds were approved by the board:

Manuel Chavez, Eliseo Salazar, Ma. Pilo, Gabriel Romero, Pedro M. Gallegos, Jose Griego, Perfecto Gurillo, Leandro Ballejos, Emilio Armiño, Estanislado Chavez, Juan Maes y Baca Ramon Chavez y Lujan, Augustin Baca, Julian Martinez, Jose T. Otero, Lorenzo Marquez.

Venceslao Sanchez from Belen appeared before the board in regard to a suit for right of way filed against him in the name of the county of Valencia and after due consideration on the matter the following amicable agreement was reached: Mr. Sanchez agreed to open the right of way desired by said county and the county agreeing to compensate Mr. Sanchez at the rate of \$50.00 per acre for the land so taken and to erect at its expense a three wire fence on the east side of said road. The county clerk being directed by the board to ascertain the amount of land taken and to draw a check for the amount above agreed upon. County commissioners will instruct the official designated by law for road construction to erect said fence and the clerk is authorized to draw warrant to Mr. Sanchez upon presentation of a satisfactory deed for the land.

A petition was presented regarding resolution of the 17th in the Casa Colorado and Adelino action; said petition was left until the next regular meeting.

The justice of the peace and constable appointed by the board on Jan. 17th for precinct no. 20, not qualifying, the board declared the office of the justice of the peace vacant and appointed Lauro Baca to fill the vacancy. Vacancy was also declared to exist in precinct No. 17 in the office of justice of the peace and constable and the following were appointed to fill

said vacancies: Justice of the peace Frank Martinez, for constable Pedro Torres. The board then reconvened as a canvassing board and canvassed the returns of Precinct 24, Jaraloso, and Epifanio Jaramillo was declared elected for justice of the peace and David Martinez constable.

The following resolution was adopted by the board:

**WHEREAS**, the county highway from Laguna throughout the town of Seboyeta to Marquez is in great need of improvement, particularly in the construction of bridge across arroyos and it is the desire of the board of county commissioners of the county of Valencia to secure the construction of a good and substantial road between these points.

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the state highway commission is hereby requested to expend out of the funds arising under the levy made for the year 1920 under the provisions of chapter 38 of the laws of 1915 the sum of not more than \$10,000.00 in the construction of bridges and other necessary improvements on the above mentioned highway.

Be it further resolved that the county clerk is hereby directed to transmit a certified copy of the foregoing resolution to the state highway commission of the state of New Mexico.

The county clerk was instructed to draw warrant for \$200.00 in favor of the county purchasing agent for purchase of postage stamps, said purchasing agent to distribute said postage stamps to the various county officials, taking their receipt for same and making quarterly reports.

The county clerk was also authorized to draw warrants in favor of the county for right of way purchased under resolution of the board of county commissioners upon presentation of proper documents to the county of Valencia for same.

Be it resolved, that the county clerk is hereby instructed to draw warrants for the amount allowed by law in favor of the judges and secretaries of election and the boards of registration for the general election held Nov. 3, 1920. Also the judges and clerks of the election held January 10th 1921, for justices of the peace and constables.

The clerk was then instructed to notify Hon. Fred G. Nicholas, District Attorney, to meet the county commissioners on March 7, 1921, for discussing matters of importance to the county.

The clerk was also instructed to draw warrants for the premium on the bonds of the various county officials.

The board of county commissioners met in conformity with section 5434 of the compiled laws to ascertain the values for assessment for the year 1921; the board then adopted the following resolution:

**BE IT RESOLVED** that the assessor of Valencia County is hereby instructed to assess the classes of property listed below at not less than the value per acre stated opposite the same: (lands per acre)

No. 1—Agricultural lands, with permanent water rights in actual cultivation not less than \$60.00 per acre.  
2—Agricultural lands with permanent water rights not in actual cultivation \$50.00  
3—A—Meadows under irrigation \$30.00  
4—B—Meadows not under irrigation \$15.00  
5—Bosque and grazing lands, irrigated \$10.00  
6—Grazing lands not exceeding 160 acres containing springs, running wa-

5—Dry farming land in actual cultivation \$25.00
