CONGRESSMEN FAVOR FILIPINO INDEPENDENCE



Congressman Ed. J. King of Illinois.

Washington.—The appointed hour is here: let the Philippines be free. This was the keynote of a speech by Congressman Edward J. King of Illinois, (Republican) in which he reviewed the American occupation of the islands from the first day to the present time. He declared that the United States was bound to grant independence without further delay.

Congressman King is one of an increasing number of Republicans in the House who are urging quick action for Philippine Independence. Mr. King is the author of a bill which provides that within one year the Philippine government, under presidential administration, may assemble a constitutional convention to frame a constitution for the Philippine people. The President may ratify the constitution and the Philippine people may then declare their independence.

Mr. King said that the Philippine people are now in a state of "a state of self-governing nation." The transfer of authority is to be completed within one year. Provision is made for safeguarding American interests in the Philippines and for providing for coal stations and marine bases in the islands by the United States.

Word from the Philippines is that people expect early independence and will be sorely disappointed if they do not get it.

"The nation has the right," said Congressman King "to hold another people in bondage, even though it may be used by the profiteers that the nation is simply one of 'intelligentsia'."

A little more observance of the rule in national and international affairs would soon dispel the fear for exploitation, the fiercest foe of freedom in the world today.

When we went to the Philippines declared before the whole world we were not actuated by any self-desire of conquest or territorial aggrandizement, but solely by humanitarian impulses.

Congressman King called attention to the fact that Filipinos are now being used to erect a monument to

Admiral Dewey. He said was indirectly a tribute to the American people as well as to Dewey. He recalled the cable that Dewey had sent to President McKinley, which was as follows:

"In my opinion these people (Filipinos) are superior in intelligence and more capable of self government than the natives of Cuba, and I am familiar with both."

Congressman King then recited the preamble to the Jones law, passed August 29, 1916, and declared it was a definite pledge of independence. The preamble stated "It is as it has always been the purpose of the people of the United States to withdraw their sovereignty over the Philippine Islands and to recognize their independence as soon as a stable government can be established therein."

Congressman King stated there was no question but that the Filipinos had established the specified stable government and, therefore, it is the solemn duty of the United States to grant the promised independence.

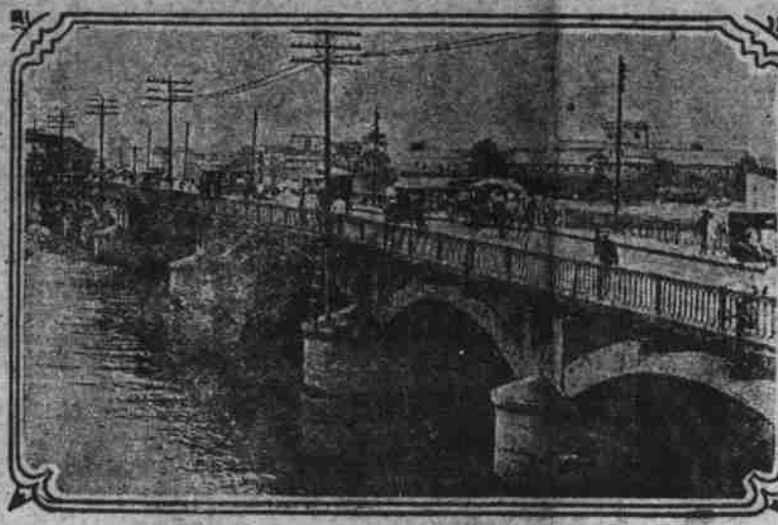

A Passing Landmark of Old Manila



This is a photograph of the famous old Bridge of Spain, Manila. It is now a departed landmark of the Philippines, for its place has been taken by one of the finest bridges in the entire Orient, the new Jones bridge.

The Jones bridge is named in honor of the late Congressman W. A. Jones of Virginia, author of the Jones law of 1916 which promised the Philippines independence upon the establishment of a stable government.

The old Bridge of Spain is called "the mother of Manila's bridges." The original bridge was built of pontoons sometime between the years 1590 and 1600, being known as the Bridge of Boats. The stone bridge shown above was built about 1630. It was twice damaged by earthquakes, and was once partly demolished by a flood.

TO HOLD PRO-GERMAN MEETS

Sessions Alleged for Purpose of Protesting Against Negro Troops in French Army of Occupation.

Pro-German meetings planned for the near future in a number of cities in the East and Middle West will be closely watched by the American Legion, according to national headquarters of the ex-service men's organization. The series of meetings, it is understood, will be held for the purpose of protesting against the reported presence of negro colonial troops in the French army of occupation, despite the fact that the troops in question were withdrawn many months ago.

Cities in which the meetings are scheduled are Milwaukee, Omaha, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Louisville, Chicago, Cleveland and New York. It is understood that Dr. Edmund von Arden, who was recruited at Washington, D. C., in an effort to enlist the aid of F. W. Galbraith, Jr., Legion national commander, in the project, and George Sylvester Viereck, notorious Boche magazine editor, are among the hyphenated Americans who are sponsoring the movement.

A bulletin from Legion national headquarters, warning state headquarters to watch for an attempt to revive German propaganda and to create sentiment in America hostile to the allies, has been sent out, and steps have been taken by national officials to influence the Department of Justice to prohibit the meetings.

"A recurrence of German propaganda activity in this country is something the Legion has been watching

for some time," said Lemuel Bolles, national adjutant of the Legion. "I feel that the greatest check to a movement of this kind will come from citizens of Teutonic extraction, of whose loyalty and sincerity there can be no doubt. Loyal Americans should know of the sinister efforts to turn sentiment in favor of the nation with which technically we are still at war."

NAVY HEAD SENDS GREETINGS

Josephus Daniels, Retiring Secretary, Expresses Appreciation for Part in World War.

A message of greeting and appreciation to the members of the American Legion was written by Josephus Daniels, former secretary of the navy, just previous to his retirement from office.

The message follows:

"Upon my retirement as the directing head of the navy, which place I was privileged to hold during the World War, I wish to send a word of greeting and appreciation to all who belong to the American Legion and all who served their country in the army and navy during those crucial days. It was a privilege I shall regard as the most sacred in my life to have been their comrade in those great days. They truly saved the civilization of the world by their spirit and their valor. In the days that are to come the world depends upon them for saving it from the perils of peace. I have profound faith that they will not be wanting in the new call upon them for the same courage and wisdom in peace which they manifested in war."

NOTICE TO ALL LIVE STOCK OWNERS

by THE CATTLE SANITARY BOARD OF NEW MEXICO

By the passage of a law relating to the recording of brands by the Fifth Legislature of the State of New Mexico, it required that all owners of live stock having brands on record in the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board shall re-record such brands by the first day of July, 1921. A failure to have such brands re-recorded as required by this Act provides that they shall be stricken from the records and become obsolete.

Proper blanks will be mailed to each brand owner from the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board.

The following is the text of the law to which your careful observation is directed.

HOUSE BILL NO. 66
As Amended
AN ACT

RELATING TO THE RE-RECORDING OF BRANDS.

It Enacted By The Legislature of the State of New Mexico:

Section 1. The Cattle Sanitary Board of New Mexico shall have power to and shall cause all brands in actual use to be re-recorded.

For this purpose the Cattle Sanitary Board shall issue and mail a circular letter through the United States mail addressed to each owner of any brand on record with said Board, at the last office address shown on the record, requiring the owner of owners of brands to file with the Secretary of said board an exact duplicate of any brand or brands now being used or owned by such owners.

In addition to the above notice, the Cattle Sanitary Board shall cause to be published in either English or Spanish, or both, in at least one newspaper in each county in this State, where there is a newspaper, a copy of this said publication to continue at least four consecutive weeks.

Sec. 2. Within three months from the date of the first publication of this act as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of all owners of brands now in record in the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board, a fac-simile of the brand or brands now in actual use and owned by them. A fee for re-recording of brands shall be one (\$1.00) dollar for each brand re-recorded, the proceeds to be used for the cost of notice given as provided in section 1 of this act; provided, that any excess money from such fees shall be placed in the indemnity fund of the Cattle Sanitary Board.

For the right to continue the use of any brand or brands recorded with the Cattle Sanitary Board, the owner of owners thereof shall, on or before the first day of January of every third year after its recording, pay to the Cattle Sanitary Board a fee of fifty cents (\$.50) which said amount is to be placed in the indemnity fund of the Cattle Sanitary Board. Upon receipt of the payment of the said amount, it shall be the duty of the Sanitary Board to mail to any such owner or owners a brand certificate for each brand recorded for which said fee has been paid. A failure to make such payment shall forfeit the right to use any brand. When the right to use any brand recorded as aforesaid shall have become forfeited, the said brand shall not be recorded by any other person until after the expiration of two years from the date of forfeiture. The Cattle Sanitary Board shall give

notice each year on or before the first day of November by letter mailed through the United States mail to the owner or owners of such recorded brand of the amount due to be paid is hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 3. That it is necessary for the preservation of the public peace and safety of the inhabitants of the State of New Mexico that the provisions of this act shall become effective at the earliest possible time, and, therefore, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this act shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval.

SPECIAL MEETING MARCH 21, 1921.

The meeting was called to order at 11 A. M. there being present Hon. Daniel Lucero, chairman, Hon. Narciso Frances and Hon. Celso Lobato, members of the board, Hon. Joseph F. Tondre, sheriff and Hon. Abelino Gutierrez, county clerk.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and after some corrections were duly approved by the board.

Hon. Emiliano Castillo appeared before the board and presented his final report as county road superintendent for the months of January and February, 1921, which report after due consideration was approved by the board. The county clerk was instructed to draw warrant in payment of road work, materials, supplies and salary of road superintendent as per vouchers presented by Mr. Castillo with his approval, which vouchers had not been paid and Mr. Castillo was directed to hold county road materials under his care until the regular term of the county commissioners in April.

The county Clerk was instructed to secure certified copies of all laws relating to the duties of County officials enacted by the present session of the State Legislature and to notify the commissioners as soon as the new road law would be enacted.

WHEREAS the board of County Commissioners of the county of Valencia during the last year requested the opening of a right-of-way crossing on the Atchison Topeka and Santa Fe R. R. Coast Lines on the township line between Township Number 12 and 11 North Range, Range 10 West near Totlec, New Mexico.

Whereas no definite action has been taken in the matter by the railroad authorities and the lack of a crossing at this particular point causes great inconvenience and costs to a large number of citizens and tax payers of western Valencia County, therefore Be It Resolved that the State Corporation Commission of the State of New Mexico is hereby requested to secure at the point above mentioned, Be it further resolved that the said Corporation Commission of the State of New Mexico is earnestly solicited to investigate the great need of this crossing.

Be it further resolved that a certified copy of the foregoing resolution be transmitted to the division superintendent of the Atchison Topeka and Santa Fe R. R. Coast Lines at Winglow, Arizona and the solicitor for the Santa Fe System at Albuquerque, New Mexico, Mr. W. C. Reid and also to the State Corporation Commission.

The county clerk is hereby instructed to draw warrants from time to time on the special bridge fund in payment of certificates of indebtedness to the Midland Bridge Company to the amount of the balance in the treasurer's hands and chairman of the board is hereby authorized to sign the same.

Whereas until the passage of a law providing for county road administration there is no authority besides the board of county commissioners to look after the county road maintenance, and WHEREAS it is expected that proper legislation for county road administration will be enacted at an earlier date and WHEREAS it is necessary to provide for prompt repairs of the county highway and purchase in case of emergency, and whereas Hon. Eugene Kempenick, secretary of the State Highway Commission has volunteered his services in behalf of said commission to undertake this work during the period above mentioned and it is furthermore being necessary that a responsible person take charge and any defects in the roads and bridges of the county be reported. Therefore be it resolved that Hon. Emiliano Castillo is hereby designated as the person to whom any immediate road necessities shall be reported and said Mr. Castillo is requested to notify the highway commission immediately upon investigation.

The following bonds of constables were approved by the board: Carlos Garcia, W. M. Jolly, and Pedro Tondre.

The board then adjourned until March 23, 1921.
