Manilla, P. I.

The people of the Philippines want independence in whatever form they can get. H. Manuel Quezon, president of the Philippine senate, declared in an address before that body.

"Let the American cause in the Philippines and those in the United States know that the people of the Philippines covet their freedom, liberty and political emancipation so much that they will not hesitate to receive from the Congress of the United States complete and absolute independence without protection," Quezon said.

"If the United States, dictated by its own interests, decides to extend protection to the Philippines, well and good. We would accept that as a solution of our problems. If not, let us have absolute independence in whatever form we can get it."

President Quezon declared that if the question were put before the Filipinos for a vote, 98 per cent would favor absolute independence.

NOTICE TO ALL LIVE STOCK OWNERS

by THE CATTLE SANITARY BOARD OF NEW MEXICO

By the passage of a law relating to the recording of brands by the Fifth Legislature of the State of New Mexico, it required that all owners of live stock having brands on record in the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board shall re-record such brands by the first day of July, 1921. A failure to have such brands re-recorded as required by this Act provides that they shall be stricken from the records and become absolute.

Proper blanks will be mailed to each brand owner from the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board.

The following is the text of the law to which your careful observation is directed.

HOUSE BILL NO. 66 As Amended AN ACT

RELATING TO THE RE-RECORDING OF BRANDS

Be It Enacted By The Legislature Of The State Of New Mexico:

Section 1. The Cattle Sanitary Board of New Mexico shall have the power to and shall cause all brands in actual use to be re-recorded. For this purpose the Cattle Sanitary Board shall issue and mail a circular letter through the United States mail addressed to each owner of any brand now of record with said Board, at the post office address shown on the brand record, requiring the owner of brands to file with the Secretary of said board an exact facsimile of any brand or brands now being used or used by such owners. In addition to the above notice, the Secretary Board shall cause to be published in either English or Spanish, or both, in at least one newspaper in each County in this State, where there is a newspaper, a copy of this act, said publication to continue at least four consecutive weeks.

Sec. 2. Within three months from the date of the first publication of this act as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of all owners of brands now in record in the office of the Cattle Sanitary Board, a facsimile of the brand or brands now in actual use and owned by them. A fee for re-recording of brands shall be one (1) dollar for each brand re-recorded, the same to be used for the cost of notice given as provided in section 1 of this act; provided, that any excess money from such fees shall be placed in the indemnity fund of the Cattle Sanitary Board.

For the right to continue the use of any brand or brands recorded with the Cattle Sanitary Board, the owner or owners therefore shall, on or before the first day of January of every third year after its recording, pay to the Cattle Sanitary Board a fee of fifty cents (\$.50) which said amount is to be placed in the indemnity fund of the Cattle Sanitary Board. Upon receipt of the payment of the said amount, it shall be the duty of the Sanitary Board to mail to any such owner or owners a brand certificate for each brand recorded for which said fee has been paid. A failure to make such payment shall forfeit the right to use any brand. When the right to use any brand recorded as aforesaid shall have become forfeited, the said brand shall not be recorded by any other person until after the expiration of two years from the date of forfeiture. Public Misled as to Situation People are misled and conclude that high rates have stopped the movement of a large amount of freight and that the railways would make more money if they would reduce the rates and thereby relieve the traffic.

There is the strongest reason to believe that the very great reduction in traffic has been due almost entirely to general business conditions that are world-wide in their effect, and that would have come if there had been no advance in freight rates.

Prices of commodities reached their maximum in the first half of the year 1920 and thereafter fell with great rapidity in France, the United States and the United Kingdom. The fall in the United States began in May, and was rapidly on its way down grade in September, when the advanced rates took effect. Nevertheless traffic did not drop for at least four months.

Slump Not Caused by Higher Rates It was a general deflation and fall

In prices from the heights to which they had been driven by war conditions that has caused a stagnation of business throughout the world.

That it is not caused by the cost of transportation is convincingly shown by the fact that stoppage of buying has caused an oversupply of ships, hence ocean tonnage rates have been recently at the lowest points in their history.

Notwithstanding these low rates, ocean traffic shows as great stagnation as rail traffic, and millions of tons of shipping here and abroad are rusting away in idleness. Many commodities would not move even if the freight charges on them were abolished entirely, because producers can find no market.

That the decline in business is not due to prohibitive freight rates is shown by the following examples:

Sec. 3. That it is necessary for the preservation of the public peace and safety of the inhabitants of the State of New Mexico that the provisions of this act shall become effective at the earliest possible time, and, therefore an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this act shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
