BAPTISTS CALL REV. KENNEDY OF MISSOURI

Rev. G. E. Kennedy of Flat River, Tenn., has recently been called as pastor of the Clovis Baptist Church. Rev. Kennedy spent last week in Clovis but is now in El Paso where his wife is visiting. He will return to his home in Missouri immediately and prepare to move to Clovis and expects to be here to take active charge of the pastorate of the church in about ten days.

Rev. Kennedy has been state evangelist for Missouri and has been pastor of one of the leading Baptist Churches at Kansas City. He comes with the reputation of being an extra strong pastor and will no doubt be heartily received by the people of Clovis.

TAX PAYING TIME EXTENDED
Tax paying time has been extended to March 1st. This means that the first half of your state and county taxes must be paid by this time or the penalty will be added.

AUTOS CLASSIFIED BY TAX COMMISSION

Undervalued automobiles will soon be rare birds on the tax rolls in New Mexico. In fact their complete extinction is threatened by the tax commission which yesterday afternoon sent every assessor in the state a table fixing standard values for all makes of motor cars.

The table which is expected to secure uniformity in valuation, classifies automobiles as to model, make and power and allows depreciation for age. All that the assessor has to do is to find out the class and age of an automobile and then he glances at the tax commission's table. It does the rest.

WILSON MAKES TWO CABINET CHANGES

Washington, Jan. 27.—Two more changes in President Wilson's cabinet were made today and a third is expected in the near future.

David P. Houston of St. Louis, who has been secretary of agriculture since the beginning of the Wilson administration, was given the treasury portfolio and Edwin L. Meredith of Des Moines, Iowa, was named to succeed him as head of the department of agriculture.

The third cabinet change expected soon is the appointment of a secretary of the interior to succeed Franklin K. Lane, who desires to retire to private life. Mr. Lane's successor has not yet been selected.

In selecting Mr. Houston to succeed Mr. Glass as secretary of the treasury, the president ran counter to all guesses of administration officials most of whom had expected Assistant Secretary Leffingwell to be given the office.

In choosing Mr. Meredith to succeed Mr. Houston the president selected a practical farmer as well as a business man. Mr. Meredith is the editor of Successful Farming and before establishing that paper was publisher of the "Farmers' Tribune." He is president of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the world, a director of the Chicago federal reserve bank and was one of the excess profits advisers of the treasury department, appointed in 1917.

In a statement today at Miami, Fla., Mr. Meredith said one of his first undertakings as head of the agricultural department would be to work out some method of getting crops to market without too much "lost motion." He is expected in Washington within a day or two to take up his duties.

Meantime Mr. Houston will succeed Mr. Glass, who will take his seat in the senate to fill the unexpired term of the late Senator Martin of Virginia, after serving as secretary of the treasury for a little more than a year.

When Secretary Lane passes out of the cabinet only four of the president's original official family still remain. Besides Mr. Houston they are Secretary Daniels of the navy department, Secretary Wilson of the labor department and Postmaster General Burleson.

Mr. Wilson has had two secretaries of state—William J. Bryan and Robert Lansing; two secretaries of war—Lindley M. Garrison and Newton D. Baker; three attorney generals—James C. McReynolds, now an associate justice of the supreme court; Thomas Watt Gregory and A. Mitchell Palmer; two secretaries of commerce—William C. Redfield and Joshua W. Alexander, and three secretaries of the treasury—William G. McAdoo, Carter Glass and David F. Houston.

County Treasurer J. S. Morgan's office is a busy place these days since tax-paying time is on. The penalty goes on after March 1st.

This ticket was put out, it is understood, with the intention of representing all interests in the town. Those interested in advancing the ticket announce their intention of putting forth a ticket that would represent the business interests of the town as well as the labor interests and by getting out such a ticket it is their hope to avoid all the unnecessary election contests possible. The ticket was filed with the city clerk the first of the week and so far those named on it are the only announced candidates for city office.

CITY NOW HAS THREE NEW ALDERMEN

At a meeting of the City Council Monday night three new aldermen were named to take the places of Aldermen Doughton, Eastham and White who have moved out of their wards to other parts of the town. The city is to take the matter of paving and possibly a bond issue and it was found that there was a question as to whether the aldermen mentioned above were serving legally and hence they tendered their resignations.

C. A. Scheurich was appointed for Ward No. 1 to take the place of C. F. Doughton; J. O. Pritchard and C. Anthony were named for Ward No. 3 to take the place of I. V. White and E. B. Eastham. The appointments hold only until the election in April when it will be necessary to elect men to take their places.

At the next meeting the Council plans to receive a paving petition for a number of blocks.

RURAL TELEPHONE PROJECT PROGRESSING

The rural telephone project is under way now and it is hoped that the necessary stock subscriptions will be secured within a few weeks. County Agent Peterson and D. W. Jones, secretary of the Clovis Chamber of Commerce, report that they have met with much encouragement on a two-days' trip they made the first of the week to points in the north part of the county. The roads were bad and not a great many farmers were seen but practically all subscribed for stock, and it is believed there will be little trouble in putting the proposition over. A meeting is being held at Ranvalle tonight and another will be held at Claud Friday night in the interest of the proposition. These will be followed by other meetings at other parts of the county and by personal solicitation.

This is the biggest thing in the way of bettering rural conditions in Curry County that has ever been advanced and it should meet with hearty co-operation from people in Clovis as well as everyone living in the country effected.

BIG PAVING PROGRAM IS SCHEDULED FOR 1920

DUTIES OF THE U. S. CENSUS ENUMERATOR

The men and women appointed to serve as enumerators of the 14th Decennial Census are charged by law with the collection of all facts necessary to fill out properly the printed census schedules which each enumerator will carry when making the house to house canvass of the territory assigned to him. Each enumerator must visit personally each house in his district and make his inquiries of the head or some other member of the family who is competent to answer questions.

The Act of Congress providing for the Census gives each enumerator the right to enter any dwelling in his district for the purpose of obtaining the information required. Enumerators will carry with them their identification cards and also their written commissions from the Government which they will show whenever requested to do so. They are instructed to be always courteous and considerate but in those rare instances where information necessary to fill out the questions is denied them, they are empowered by law to insist on correct answers. There are legal penalties for refusing to answer the census questions or willfully giving answers that are false.

Each enumerator is prohibited by law from publishing or communicating any information obtained through the census regarding any individual or his affairs. This obligation to secrecy likewise applies to all persons connected with the Census. After the schedules are all filled out they are sealed up and sent to Washington, names being discarded entirely. No person, therefore, need fear that his personal affairs will be disclosed or that the information will be used to harm him in any way.

Grand Avenue, four blocks, from Gidding to Connelly Street.

Main Street, four blocks, from Monroe Avenue south to the Santa Fe right-of-way.

Gidding Street, five blocks, from Otero Avenue to Bent Avenue.

Pile Street, two blocks from Otero to Monroe.

Washington Avenue, six blocks, from Main Street east to Ross.

There is also a petition being circulated for paving on Otero Avenue from Gidding to Connelly but this is not quite ready for presentation, but may be by the time the council meets next Monday.

This will mean a big paving program for Clovis and it is hoped that there will be no hitch in its being carried out this spring and summer.

HIGH COST OF TALK

"Talk is cheap," observed an individual back in the time when other things, too, were cheap. But not now. Talk is more expensive than it was in grandfather's day. Especially is this true of congressional conversation.

Every hour a congressman or senator talks he eats up \$360 of the people's money. This represents but that portion of the cost which goes into printing the speech in the Congressional Record, which sets the government back \$60 a page. The talker's salary should be included. So should the stenographer's and the page's, and the doorkeeper's and a lot of other items. Probably \$500 might be near what we pay for an hour's congressional talk.

Which wouldn't be so bad if the talker said something. So much of what burdens the Congressional Record is intended only for the building of political fences back home, and so little for the good of the country.—Amarillo Daily News.

SHIPPING SWEET POTATOES

One of the surest ways of getting something worth while for a community is through organization, getting together and everyone pulling the same way. As an illustration in favor of our argument let us cite you to the accomplishments of the Portales Valley Sweet Potato Growers' Association of this place. Al-

though they have been organized a few months, they have put the Portales Valley on the map as one of the best sweet potato producing districts to be found in the United States and the demand for our products is reaching out each day.

Last week the association sold and shipped out three carloads of potatoes and have orders for four more to be shipped this week. Including the above shipments, bring the total up to twenty cars of potatoes that have been shipped by this organization alone.—Portales News.

SAM G. BRATTON FOR CONGRESS

It has been a long time since the east side furnished the State's representative in Congress. Rodey, Andrews, Curry, Walton, all were from some other section of the state and Mr. Hernandez, the present incumbent, resides in North Central New Mexico. THE WAR MADE 12,000 MORE MILLIONAIRES

Twenty thousand persons in the United States are now rated as millionaires, the new income tax reports show. More than twelve thousand new millionaires were created in this country in the four years of the European war.

The internal revenue bureau is receiving these reports from all parts of the country as a result of the filing of returns for the three months period.

The millionaire class, according to government standards, includes all persons whose incomes for the calendar year are at least \$50,000, or 5 percent of 1 million dollars. This, of course includes some high salaried executives, whose private fortunes do not total 1 million dollars.

On the other hand, the millionaire class includes many persons whose incomes are well above \$1,000,000 a year. Thus, for the last full year for

which reports were available today, sixty-seven persons paid taxes on incomes ranging from \$1,000.00 to \$1,500,000 a year. The average tax paid by these persons for the year was \$249,948.

For the same year four persons made returns on personal incomes of at least \$5,000,000 each. The average tax paid by this group was \$4,937,731.

In the calendar year of 1913 approximately 7,500 persons were rated millionaires, according to the internal revenue bureau. In 1915 there were 17,000 millionaires, and in 1917 there were 19,103.

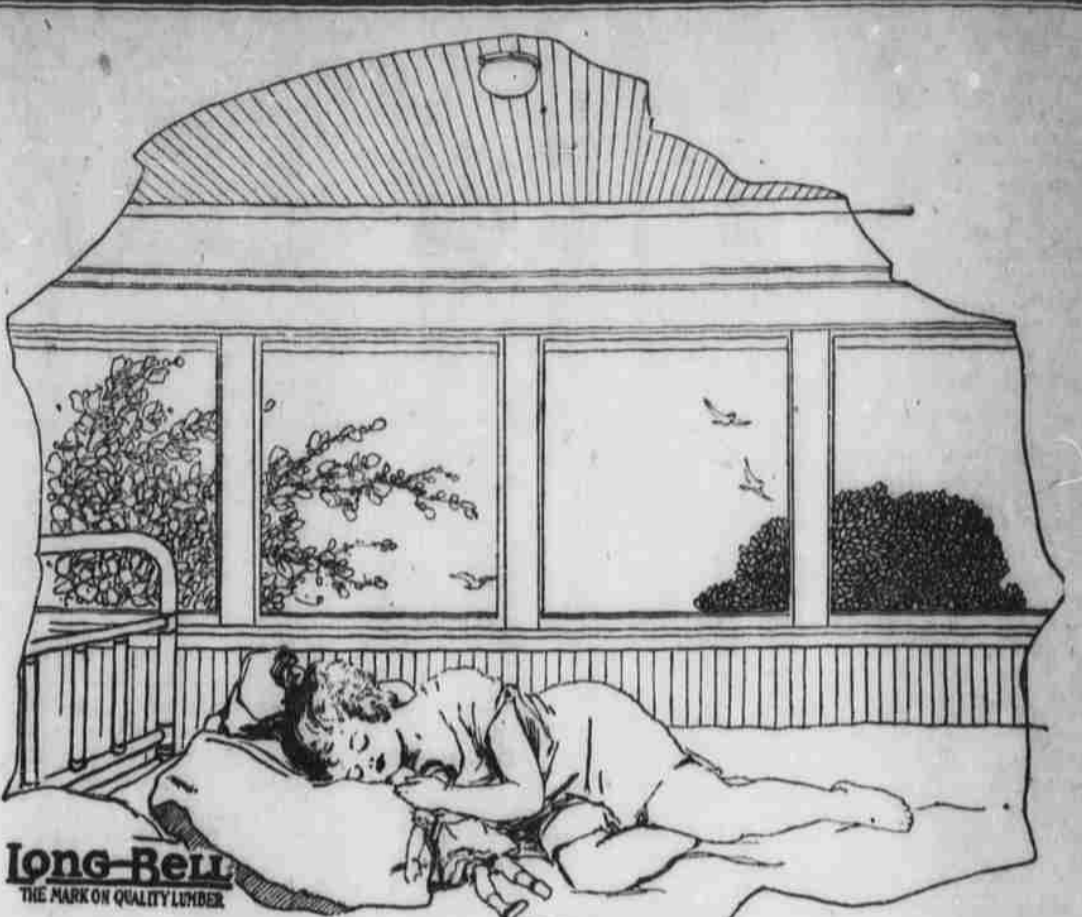

I.

UNCLE SAM CHAMPION LAND SPECULATOR

The following interesting facts are taken from an illuminating article in a recent issue of "The Country Gentleman":

If you are looking for the champion land speculator of the world you need go no farther than Uncle Sam. He takes the blue ribbon for steady nerve, for sensational plunging in land deals and for phenomenal success in land gambling. Uncle Sam's first attack of the land buying fever lasted from 1803 to 1869—a period of sixty-six years. During this time he bought 1,597,608,000 acres of land for \$58,200,000, or at an average rate of three and a half cents an acre. He then proceeded to give this land away to any and all applicants. As a result of this he has become a very much multimillionaire. And the end is not yet, for there are still nearly 213,000,000 acres of the public domain to be disposed of.

The men who negotiated these gigantic deals for Uncle Sam had not only foresight but also a supreme faith in the future. In 1803 we were merely a group of states along the Atlantic Coast. Ohio was a howling wilderness. The two crops of which Kansas could boast were buffaloes and Indians. And as for the country farther west, it was for the most part an uninhabited desert. Even the Eastern States were then only thinly settled.

The practical man maintained that we were already poor. But, fortunately, there were others who foresaw that the tribe of Uncle Sam would eventually need more elbow room. And thus on April 30, 1803, the Louisiana Purchase was made by treaty

with France. France needed the money and we drove a rather shrewd Yankee bargain, paying only \$15,000,000 for 565,166,080 acres of land, embracing the present states of Louisiana, Arkansas, Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Oklahoma and parts of Kansas, Minnesota, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

Again on June 12, 1846, the problem of the Oregon country was settled. We had been wrangling with England for years about the Oregon boundary. Some of us had been saying "fifty-four-forty or fight," but we finally agreed on the present northern boundary. The area of the Oregon country was a little matter of 191,795,200 acres and embraced all of the present states of Washington, Oregon, and Idaho, and those parts of Montana and Wyoming which lie west of the Continental Divide.

Then a bit of trouble arose in the Southwest, resulting in a war with Mexico. Closing the war, a treaty with Mexico, May 19, 1848, secured to the United States California, Nevada, Utah, and parts of Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico. This territory embraced 334,443,520 acres, and as a heart balm we gave Mexico \$15,000,000 for it. Finally, just to smooth out the southern boundary of the United States the Mesilla Valley in Arizona and New Mexico was purchased—29,142,400 acres for \$10,000,000.

When Texas came into the Union she had a somewhat irregular outline. The United States, therefore, on September 9, 1850 purchased from Texas 61,892,480 acres for \$16,000,000. This area embraced parts of Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico and the "public land strip." We had, of course, already bought Florida in 1819, and, finally, in 1867 we purchased Alaska.

But just what did Uncle Sam actually get for his \$58,200,000? It must make the modern land speculator turn a jaundiced green with envy to think of Uncle Sam's buying \$500 Iowa land for three and a half cents an acre. With this three-and-a-half-cents-an-acre idea in your mind make a tour of the Far Western States. Keep repeating under your breath three and a half cents an acre, while you look at the potato fields of Greeley, the citrus groves of Phoenix and Riverside, the Egyptian cotton lands of Salt River and Imperial valleys, the alfalfa meadows from Yuma to Bozeman, the apple orchards of Roswell, Watsonville, Hood River, Yakima and the Bitter Root, the thousands of rolling hills of wheat in the Palouse, the white-faced cattle on the endless plains of Texas and the 4,000,000 sheep on ranges of Wyoming. Ask the folk along the way what these lands are worth and compare the present price with three and a half cents an acre.

After you become tired of trying to estimate the agricultural resources of this country west of the 100th meridian, just remember that a few other things were thrown in with the job lots of land—such things, for example, as cubic miles or magnificent snow-capped mountains, covered with forests, furrowed with foaming streams, and hiding within themselves stores of gold, silver, copper, lead, tungsten, coal, and so on.

Then, too, without extra charge the original owners of the land threw in several of the most magnificent play grounds of the world—Yellowstone Glacier, Yosemite and Rainier parks, the Grand Canon, a few hundred waterfalls and mountain lakes, such odds and ends as the petrified forests the cliff dwellings, Great Salt Lake, the Garden of the Gods, the Hoodoos of Wyoming, Grasshopper Glacier, a dozen or more natural bridges, caves and lava flows—all for \$58,200,000.

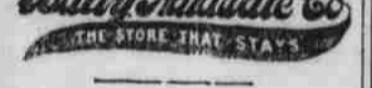

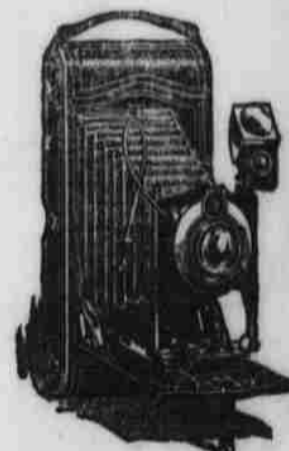

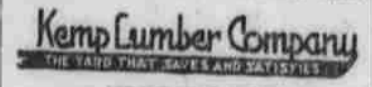

TO CONTROL INFLUENZA

In view of the fact that there is a certain amount of influenza in the nation again County Health Officer, Dr. G. K. Maynard authorizes the publication of the following:

Ten Commandments for the Control of Influenza.

1. Keep away from the sick.
2. Avoid crowds.
3. Do not use cups, glasses or towels that anyone else has used.
4. Get all the fresh air, good food and exercise you can.
5. Wash your hands frequently.
6. Avoid the use of sprays, drugs, etc., for preventive purposes. They do no good and may do harm.
7. To protect your neighbor, cover your nose and mouth when you cough and sneeze. Cough and sneeze toward the floor or ground.
8. If you feel sick when influenza is prevalent, go to bed and send for a doctor.
9. If you have the disease stay in bed until entirely well. Pneumonia may result from getting up too soon.
10. Help your health officer fight the disease.

SCHOOL NOTES

Clovis from growing more school buildings will have to be built, and no one wants the Magic city to stop growing.

One hundred and forty-six thousand teachers have quit the teaching profession. Some of our best teachers, ones that will be missed in successfully conducting our schools have already stated emphatically that they will not return for another year, and that they do not expect to teach. Money, such as we can pay, has no attractions. The editor of The Swastika, a paper published in Des Moines, New Mexico, evidently has given little thought to how a teacher gets her living. He states in an editorial that if the teacher is to receive a minimum salary, so should preachers, bankers, and city dog-catchers. He further adds that if the country is going Bolshevik why not have a minimum wage for every vocation under the

The department of health at Santa Fe congratulated the Clovis schools for having a practically perfect record for vaccination against small-pox, there being but two in the entire school system physically able not yet vaccinated. But these are to be vaccinated at once.

The enrollment to date is more than at the close of the school year last year, there being nearly fifteen hundred. Present indications indicate the enrollment will be nearly seventeen or eighteen hundred by the close of the school year in May. The highest daily attendance is well past the twelve hundred mark. Unless something is done soon to prevent

sun. It would seem that this editor needs more schooling, and that his teachers were the kind who were bound down by low salaries such that only the untrained could teach him his A. B. C's. A man that will write such an article as this does not deserve to have his children taught. The New Mexico Educational Association will preserve a copy of this paper and at the proper time will make use of it. In the meantime teachers who read such material are not in the least disturbed for they are doing the choosing now, and are quitting the profession in order to make a decent living. Our own teachers are being partly supported by their parents. Can any person follow a profession with any degree of dignity when father has to help meet the bills? America was weak in its beginning, but grew to such a power that she whipped her fatherland. Teachers have been looked on with pity and disdain for several centuries, but they have the power in their own hands now and are using it. There will be no strike if educators use good judgment, for a strike means harm to the child, but there will be an exodus in the profession, such that it will require years to repair. Minimum wages for the public school teacher are just as proper as a set wage for any public official. Inducement after inducement are necessary to attract young people to the profession. A minimum salary, high enough, guarantees a living to those people who have a desire to teach. One hundred dollars a month these days are little enough to tide one through the year, even though it be paid every month of the year, and it is certain that any one who objects to better salaries for teachers would not have the job at any price. He will say that it takes too much patience, too much training for the money there is in it, too long hours, though he will declare that a teacher has the easiest time in the world for she begins at nine and quits at four, when he knows that a teacher burns a light many hours at night when he is smoking a pipe and spitting ten feet at a cuspidor. So we say, keep on Mr. William Felter of The Swastika, you are doing your little part to drive the country to the Bolshevik condition. Eliminate the teacher and you have arrived.
