Division Superintendent Fox Talks.

What He Says About the New Hotel and Depot.

A New Time Card to Go Into Effect Sunday, June 9.

FREIGHT DEPOT TO BE BUILT.

F. C. Fox, the popular superintendent of the New Mexico and Rio Grande divisions of the Santa Fe, came in from his morning rounds in his private car, No. 219, and is scheduled for the day at the local depot.

Mr. Fox went down south to look over the Rio Grande at the La Jara station, where the waters had caused some little trouble to the track in that vicinity. While there, he was having considerable trouble, and he anticipates no further trouble from the river in that neighborhood this summer, except when an unprecedented flood rises in the river coming from heavy rains.

While in Deming, Mr. Fox found there several engineers of the new bridge building, constructed by the Dodge-Phillips company, and he was informed that the engineers were there for the purpose of surveying a line from Deming, June 9, and the main line from Hiale to El Paso.

Regarding the locations for the new freight depot, Mr. Fox stated that this matter had been definitely settled upon; the former will occupy ground on the east side of the present freight depot, and the new freight depot will take the site of the present freight depot as soon as it is cleared away and work on the new freight depot is commenced.

"When will that be?" promptly asked the reporter.

"It won't be long," remarked Mr. Fox. "I understand the contract has been let, and if that is true, contractors will be at work on the new freight depot in a very short time. It will occupy the ground now in use by No. 219, and will extend to the Coal Avenue viaduct."

Regarding the viaduct, Mr. Fox stated that the delay in construction was caused by the fact that the new freight depot was to be built on the site of the old freight depot, and the new freight depot was to be built on the site of the old freight depot.

"Will a new time card go into effect soon?" asked the reporter.

"Yes," said Mr. Fox. "After that date the limited service will run only semi-weekly, as follows: No. 3, from El Paso to Santa Fe, every Monday and Thursday at 4 a. m., and leave for the west at 4 to 10 a. m."

"No. 4, from the west, will arrive every Tuesday and Friday at 10:45 p. m., and leave for the east at 10:55 p. m."

"The other trains will run as follows: No. 7, from the east, will arrive at 9:10 a. m., and leave for the west at 10 p. m."

"No. 1, from the east, will arrive at 10:10 p. m., and leave for the west at 10:15 p. m. This train heretofore arrived at 6:55 p. m. and left for the west at 7 p. m."

"No. 2, from the west, will arrive at 8 a. m., and leave for the east at 8:10 a. m., and No. 8, from the west at 6:40 p. m., and leave for the east at 7:10 p. m."

"No. 22, from El Paso, will arrive at 7:10 a. m., and passengers will go east on No. 2."

"No. 21, will leave here for El Paso at 10:45 p. m. This train heretofore left at 10:15 p. m."

Local, or accommodation freight trains on the New Mexico and Rio Grande divisions will be discontinued after June 1.

No. 23 freight train will go south at 10 a. m., and will carry passengers as far as San Mateo.
