FREE PAPER

A bill to permit the importation of newsprint paper without payment of revenue has been introduced in congress. This is an emergency measure, as Representative Kitchen explained, designed to save hundreds of small newspapers. These newspapers will have to suspend publication at an alarming rate within the next three or four months unless the supply of paper is augmented. It appears that the only way of increasing the supply at present is to permit the importation of much paper from Scandinavian countries. The price to publishers will be much higher than the high prices now prevailing, but even at that many papers can manage to keep afloat if they can get the paper. The bill should be passed promptly.

AN UNUSUAL AUTOMOBILE LAW

Lots of things are done in North Carolina, that for example, South Dakota and Alaska are not guilty of. Probably, also vice versa. In the twin Carolina, for instance, they have a law. They have lots of laws in these two states but this is a most peculiar one.

The courts have ruled that if a pedestrian is struck by an auto, he can sue for possession of the vehicle. This law has become so popular of late, it has been upheld so often to the loss of his car by the owner, that a growing number of people in these two states, when they feel the need of a car for business or pleasure, walk forth, strut in the right-of-way of a motor car, are knocked down, institute suit, and quickly obtain possession of the car that injured them. —Motor Life.

THE MODEL LANDLORD DWELLS IN CINCINNATI

Cincinnati, O., April 3.—The model landlord of Cincinnati is Michael Mullen, Ohio state political leader. Mullen owns a tenement house on Pike street. For 20 years his tenants have been paying him no more than \$10 a month for a four room flat with private bath. Mullen pays all the water bills. Every Christmas Mullen presents each family with a turkey. The tenants have the privilege of passing upon any newcomer. As if this was not enough to please any tenant, Mullen recently tore down an adjoining building and fitted out a play ground for his tenant's children.

FIRST AMENDED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF "THE CITY DRUG COMPANY" OF CLOVIS, NEW MEXICO.
KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, the under-

signed, whose names are subscribed hereto, do by virtue of the laws of the State of New Mexico hereby associate and form ourselves, our successors and assigns into a corporation, under the following: **FIRST AMENDED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION** to-wit:

I. The name of this corporation shall be: The City Drug Company.

II. The location of its principal office in this state, and the place of business of said corporation shall be at Clovis, New Mexico, and which place this corporation shall keep and maintain an office for the transaction of business, and that Joe C. McClelland, whose residence is Clovis, New Mexico, shall be the agent in charge of said corporation at said place, upon whom service of process against said corporation may be had.

III. That the object and purpose for which said corporation is formed, in addition to the general powers conferred by law, are as follows:

To own, operate, control, purchase, sell, manage and run Drug Stores in the State of New Mexico, for the wholesale and retail of all drugs, chemicals, sundries, fixtures and all classes of general merchandise.

To compound, prepare, advertise and sell all kinds of proprietary medicines and sundries.

To buy, hold, sell, convey, lease, own and control real estate, and all classes of personal property, chattels and commercial paper; to borrow money and to pledge real estate, personal property or personal security therefor; to make and perform agreements and contracts of every form and description.

IV. The amount of the total authorized capital stock of this corporation is the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars, (\$40,000.00) and the number of shares into which the same is divided is Four Hundred (400) shares, and the par value of each share is the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and that said shares are fully paid up and said corporation shall continue business under the first amended articles of incorporation with its Four Hundred (400) shares of stock fully paid up.

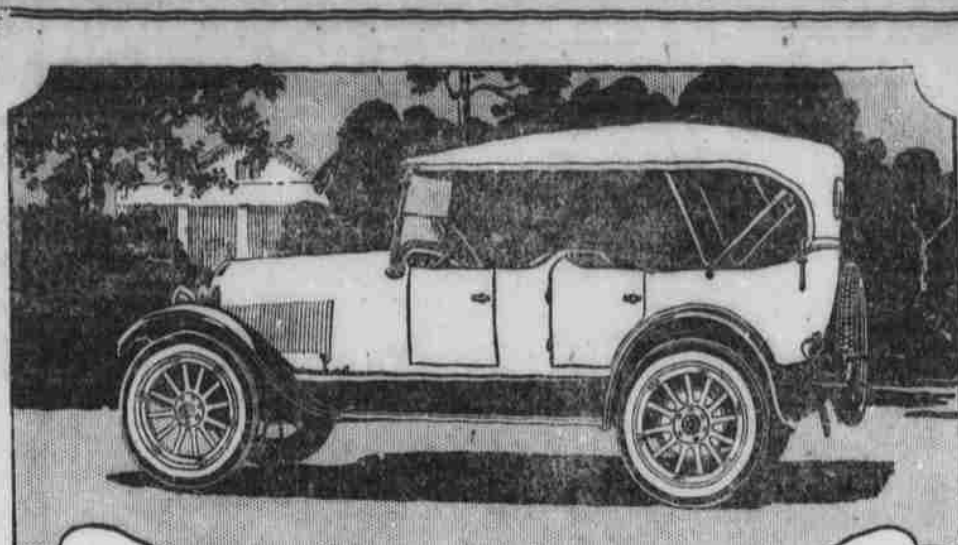

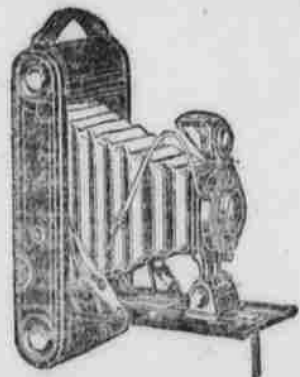

OIL AND GAS PROSPECTS IN EAST CENTRAL NEW MEXICO

United States geological survey in the following bulletin indicates areas which may prove favorable for drilling:

The geological structure of parts of New Mexico has been under investigation during the last four years by N. H. Darton, a geologist of the United States Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, who has discovered in the beds of rock many domes and arches that may be reservoirs of oil or gas if these substances are present in the regions examined. These flexed beds are parts of geologic formations that produce oil in Wyoming, Oklahoma, Kansas, and Texas, but in New Mexico little evidence of the presence of oil or gas in them has yet been found. A small amount of oil at Dayton and a few seeps and some traces of oil reported in water wells at several other places are the only favorable indications so far reported. Only a few deep wells have been bored in New Mexico, however, and these are in places where the structure is not favorable for the occurrence of oil or gas, or the wells were not drilled deep enough to make them satisfactory tests. Much of the geologic guidance used in locating the wells drilled has come from incompetent "experts," the presence of one "dome," for example, having been deduced from haphazard readings of dip taken on layers of cross-bedded sandstone. One probably hopeless

project is a deep hole in the middle of Tularosa Desert, where there are no rock outcrops to indicate the structure. In some of the hectic literature written to promote the sale of oil stock the chief geologist of the United States Geological Survey is falsely quoted as authority for the statement that New Mexico would develop one of the biggest oil fields on this continent.

Localities of Domes and Arches

The general structure of east-central New Mexico is that of an eastward-dipping monocline, but there are local reversals of dip due to domes and arches, or anticlines, some of which are rather prominent. Only a few of the areas where these structural features appear to merit the attention of the geologist and driller can be mentioned here. In Guadalupe County, for example the apex of one of the most clearly marked domes is in the west-central part of T. 11 N., R. 19 E. The uplifted beds, which are 2,500 feet thick, are of Permian and Pennsylvanian age, and the Pennsylvanian beds lie on granite at a vertical depth of 2,000 feet or more. On Pintada Creek, in the center of T. 8 N., R. 19 E., there is a smaller dome involving the same strata, and a slightly less pronounced dome is indicated in the same canyon a few miles above Pintada post office. There are several broad, low arches

in the strata in the northeast corner of this county and in adjoining parts of San Miguel, the next county to the north. In Quay County a broad, low anticline in the "red beds" passes a short distance east of Tucumcari and extends for some distance north and south of the Rock Island Railroad. In De Baca County the strata dip nearly due east in general, but a few local reversals of dip suggest that minor domes or arches may be found when a

detailed survey is made.

Wells Should Be Sunk Deep

All test wells sunk in this region should be carried entirely through the sedimentary series, which in the domes and anticlines mentioned is from 2,000 to 3,000 feet thick and at intervals from top to bottom contains coarse sands, some of which may be oil bearing.

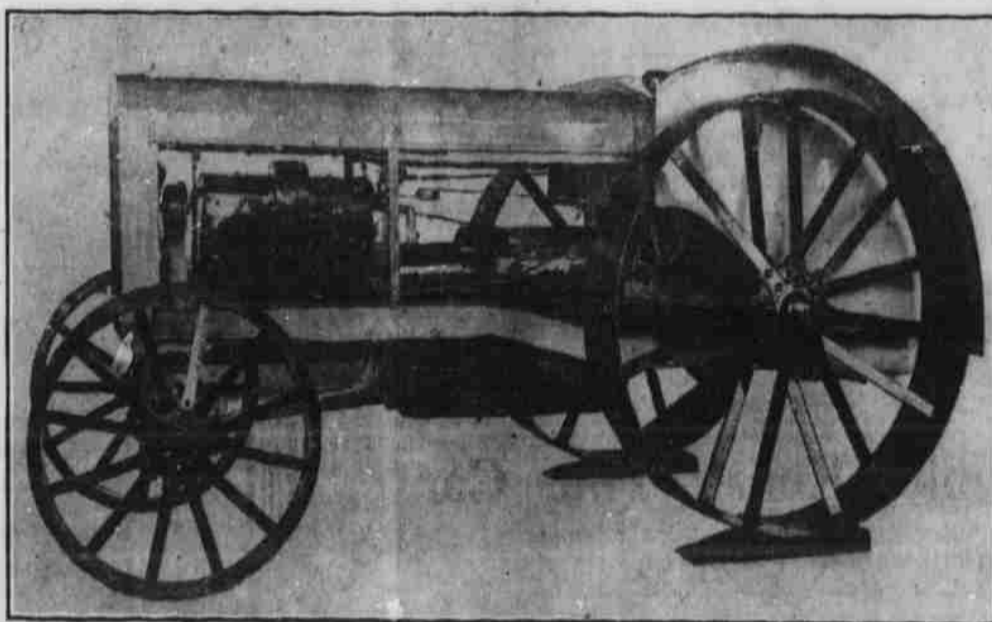

SCHOOL NOTES

It has become necessary to inform the teachers that no decision can be made with reference to their re-employment until after the May meeting of the county commissioners, the commissioners having refused to consider the matter as of sufficient importance to pass on it last Monday. Ignorance of school conditions is the only reason advanced for any body opposing the standing our high school has with the North Central Association of Colleges. Ignorance is the only reason why some men of today oppose the increase in teachers salaries. Ignorance is the only reason why men will not affiliate themselves with interests opposed to progress. The principals of our ward schools devote all their time to the class room. In other cities they have time off during the day to supervise the

work in their buildings. A supervisor of all grades will undoubtedly keep the school system more as a unit than for it to be broken into several units of supervision. The School Board Journal, published in Milwaukee, is regarded by school men as one of the best in the United States of its kind, and is read by thousands of school boards, and school officers. It is a paper that should be read by school people, and those of school interests generally. The Republican National Committee at least considers the serious shortage of teachers as a worth while consideration for their platform, notwithstanding some of the lesser lights. The Democratic Committee will not be behind its rival in this matter when the time comes to announce its principles and declarations. The Clovis Board of Education offered to make no addition to their teaching force next year as a compromise if the matter of the budget could be decided by the April term of the commissioners. The number

of teachers needed to make the schools efficient was ten, and to do without these ten, a supervisor and a kindergarten, will seriously handicap. The May term will undoubtedly see a few present in favor of better educational facilities, or they will be satisfied to have a year of inferior work done in the schools.

NO PEACE YET

Nearly two years have passed since fighting ceased in the Great War and still we do not have peace. In fact, the recent developments in Europe indicate that we may soon see hostilities break out on a large scale and involve some of the great powers. It begins to look like the fruits of victory are to be dissipated. The only thing that promised relief from the conditions which resulted in the war was the League of Nations. We do not say it would have prevented a return of the old conditions, but it was an effort to enthrone justice and fair play, and as such it was worth a fair and impartial trial. The Republican Senate is chiefly to blame for the failure of the League and the Borahs and Lodges may some day bow their heads in shame at the awful responsibility they assumed for partisan purposes. The conclusion that politics dominated them is inescapable. They will doubtless accomplish their purpose of embarrassing President Wilson but we fear they have accomplished another result which is less creditable to them. America cannot maintain a position of isolation from Europe. War in Europe threatens the peace and prosperity of America, and we can't escape our responsibility. Patriotic Americans should not want to.—Amarillo Daily Tribune.

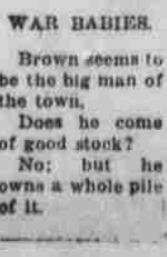

SOLDIER PRESIDENTS

The soldier presidents of our country may be divided into two classes, the first embracing those who were elected wholly or at least largely because of their military service. It begins with Washington, "first in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his fellow citizens." Following him came General Jackson, whose brilliant victory at New Orleans made him a hero of the day, and enabled him to defeat John Quincy Adams for a second term. William Henry Harrison had won renown by several victories over the Indians, ending with his defeat of Tecumseh. "Log cabin and hard cider" contributed to his popularity. He died a month after his inauguration.

General Taylor was fresh from the Mexican war, and his laurels gained there enabled him to win the presidency over so able and popular a man as Lewis Cass. He died sixteen months after his inauguration.

General Grant was the most conspicuous soldier who was elected solely because of his military record. He had never taken part in politics, nor held a civil office.

The second class of soldier presidents includes those who had seen service in war, but whose record contributed little or nothing to their election. Monroe took part in the Revolutionary war, holding the rank of major, and was wounded at the battle of Trenton. He was not elected president until thirty-three years after the close of the war. Pierce was a brigadier general in the Mexican war, and was injured by the falling of a horse. His service did not contribute much toward his election.

Hayes had a fine record in the Civil war, rising to the rank of brevet major general. But he served two terms in Congress, and was three times elected governor of Ohio, and his civil record gave him his chief strength. Garfield, Benj. Harrison and McKinley all served in the Civil war, but owed their election to their political record. Roosevelt's part in the Spanish war contributed indirectly to his nomination and election.

The soldiers who were candidates, but failed of election, were General Scott in 1852, General McClellan in 1864, and General Hancock in 1880. The total number is fourteen, including the three classes.

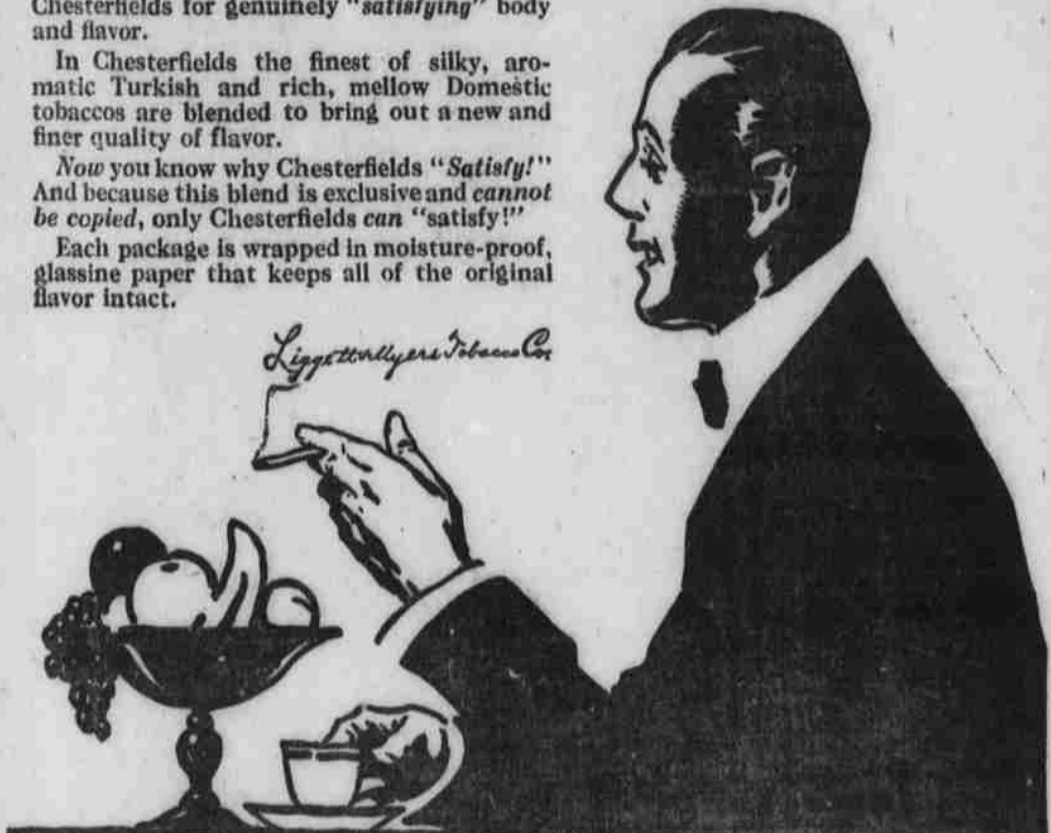

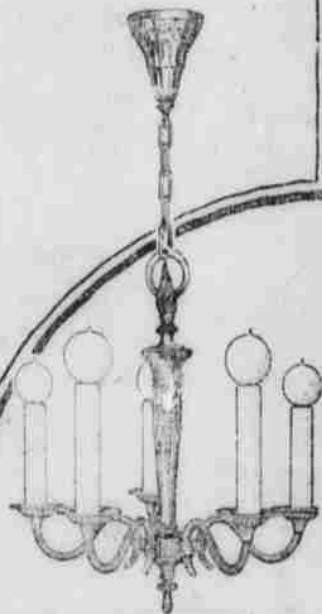
