BIG VOTE POLLED IN LAST SATURDAY'S PRIMARY

The largest vote ever polled in an election in Curry County was cast in the primary last Saturday. The total vote was 2135 and much interest was manifested throughout the day. The races which attracted the most interest were those for sheriff, county clerk and county superintendent. For the first time in the history of the county the women voted and that they appreciated the fact that the Democratic party offered them the ballot was demonstrated by the fact that the woman vote was quite large. It was quite a factor in the vote cast and had the political prophets guessing all day.

Much Interest in Saturday's Track and Forensic Meet

The Curry County Track and Forensic Meet last Saturday was attended by pupils from schools in all parts of the county. The contests were limited to pupils in schools outside of Clovis and were divided into two classes. E. C. Parker, who is chairman of the Curry County Teachers' Association, was chairman of the meet.

Class One in the Track contests was limited to boys from the ages of 17 to 21, and the rank below was awarded by the judges, Mr. Tanner, Mr. Engstrand, Mr. Barnett and Mr. Hewitt:

The Panhandle Press Association met in Amarillo last Friday and Saturday. Editors of newspapers from nearly every town in this section were there to discuss problems of interest to the craft and enjoy the hospitality offered them by the city of Amarillo.

On Friday night the guests were banqueted by the Amarillo Daily Tribune, the new paper recently established there. Saturday morning they were taken to the big gas well north of Amarillo and a big gasser turned loose for them.

One particular feature that was duly appreciated by the visiting editors was the fact that the Board of Development paid the hotel bills of all the visitors during the two-days session.

Curry County is entitled to ten votes in the convention, but may send more than ten delegates, as on account of the convention being on the east side a number of Democrats from the county will likely want to attend the convention.

OVERALLS AND REAL THRIFT

Fort Worth Star-Telegram: We must confess to a lack of enthusiasm for the "overall" movement which seems to be sweeping over the country. The movement leaves us cold, not because we do not appreciate that the prices of clothing are too high nor because we do not sympathize with the idea that people should refrain from buying things that they do not need, but because we cannot see that it will accomplish anything of permanent value and there is just a little danger that it will do harm. To be sure, people ought not to buy what they can get along without, but we are inclined to believe that a good many who are joining in this "crusade" could get along very well without overalls, for one thing. We are not hypercritical, we hope, but we do not think that an emotional hip-hip-hurrah movement like this can be made to take the place of old fashioned thrift.

And it is old fashioned thrift that is needed right now, not a spectacular "swearing off" from expending money for one item on the general expense account. The man who desires really to help the situation will pare down all of his expenditures a little, keeping them all within the radius of necessity and cut out all extravagances. That is not as easy as wearing overalls, but it is many times more effective.

Incidentally extravagant speech and extravagant behavior are quite as out of keeping with the present situation as all other kinds of extravagance.

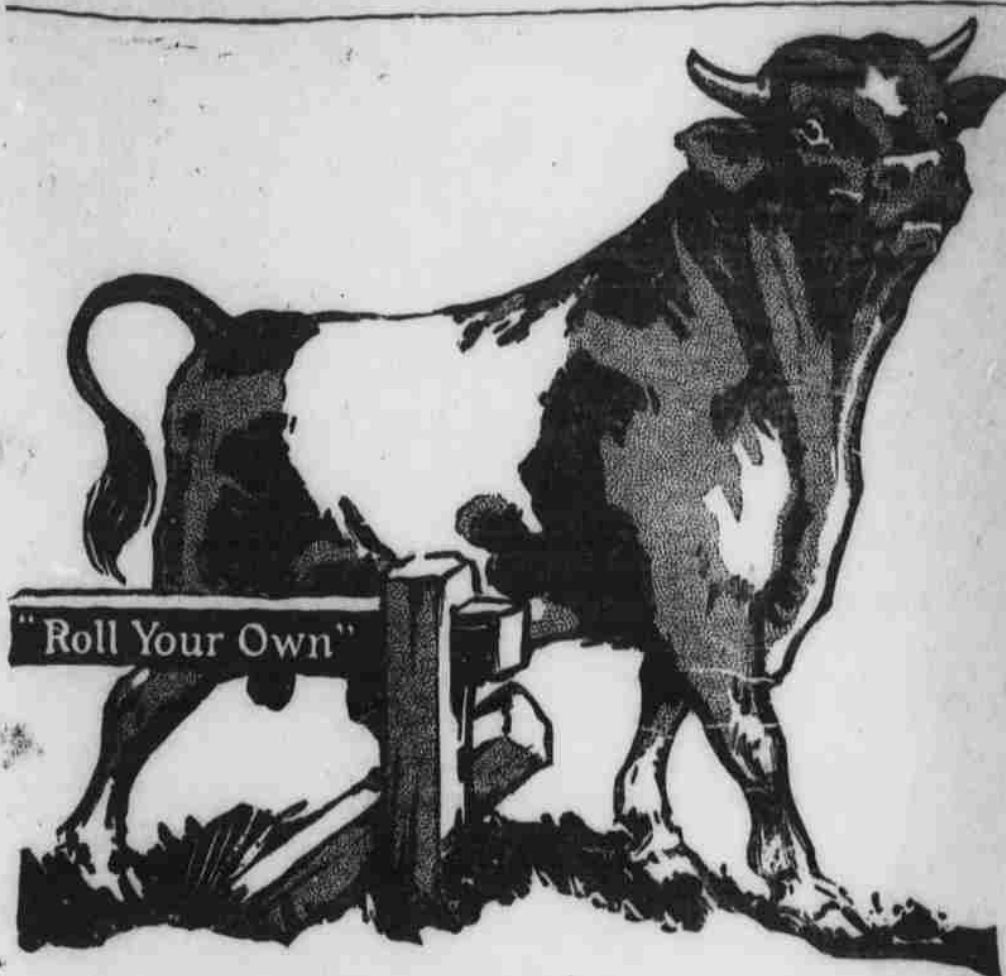

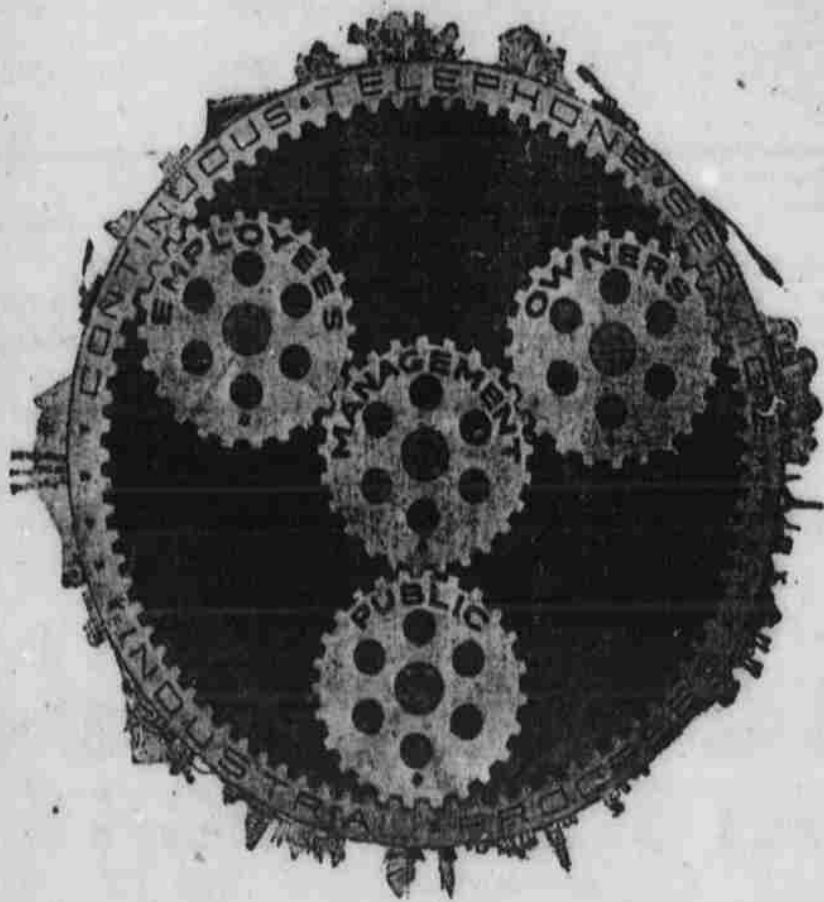

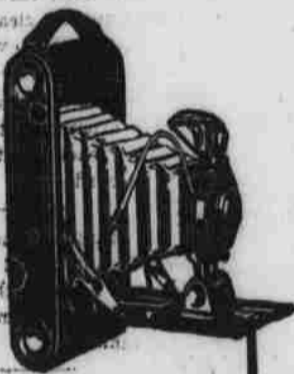

The Democratic party's record in peace and in war, since President Wilson was inaugurated, March 4th, 1913, is one of the best claims to the voters' support. Then out of the war came a great peace treaty and a league of nations covenant which President Wilson had a hand in forming. PUBLISHERS DISCUSS SHORTAGE OF PAPER

The American Newspaper Publishers' Association in convention last week in New York discussed many matters of importance.

One of the questions most seriously discussed was how best to prevent a shortage of paper. After much discussion, a resolution was adopted declaring that it was the sense of the meeting that publishers should agree to use no more white paper in 1920 than they used in 1919.

Among the resolutions adopted was one approving the Underwood measure in Congress, which favors lifting the embargo by Canada on wood pulp from the Crown lands that were previously leased by Americans.

Resolutions approved the Poindexter bill in Washington which seeks to make a survey of wood pulp lands and to reforest the country systematically; urged favorable action upon the present water power bills now before Congress; asked repeal of some of the war-time postal rates which seem to work out to the disadvantage of the newspapers, and opposed all congressional legislation which seeks to hamper publishers in their efforts to produce better newspapers.

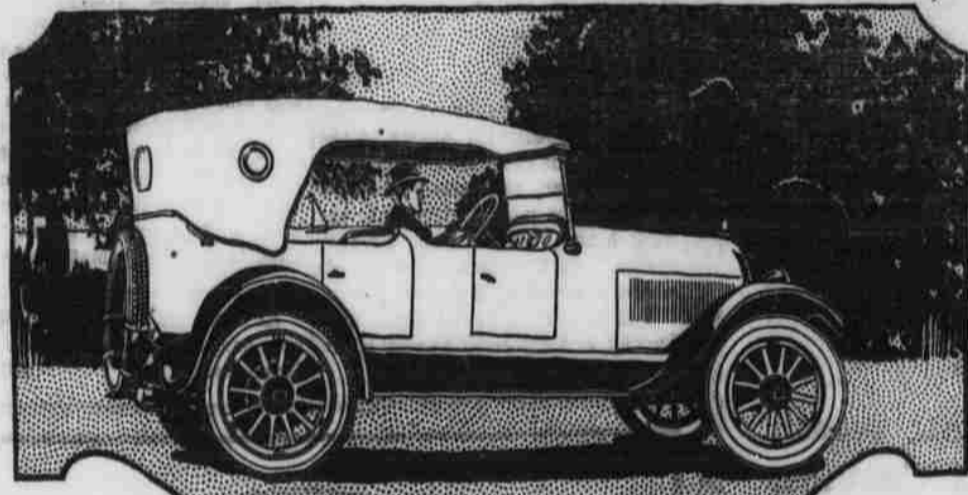

The third and fourth grades have been cleaning the yard this week.

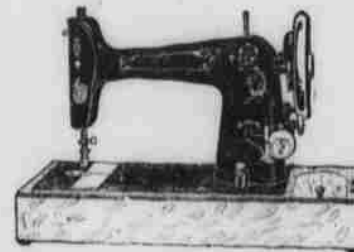

RED CROSS NOTES

What of Your Community?

By some perverseness of Fate, there is, in most people, a quirk which makes it impossible for them to see their own faults or their own possibilities.

This same quirk is present in most communities.

Consequently, the Red Cross, in

the working out of its peace-time program, is constantly discovering towns, villages and even cities which shrug their shoulders, metaphorically, and say, "What is the use? The war is over."

They stoutly maintain that there is no sickness to speak of, though the records show that the death rate is far greater than it should be.

They insist that the "war job" is

finished, but when a Home Service Secretary goes into the community she finds hundreds upon hundreds of American soldiers who do not know and who have never been told what privileges and compensations their government is offering them to pay, in a measure, for the sacrifices they made.

Is your community one of those in which the soldiers are pitifully surprised when someone shows an interest in them?

Have you given your soldiers the chance to say, "Oh, folks don't care what happens to me. They've stopped waving the flag."

They argue that a Public Health nurse is a "fad," that children's teeth are Nature's products and therefore should need nothing more than Nature's care. They manifest utmost contempt for the present-day demand for thorough medical school inspection; sneer at the menace of tuberculosis, maintaining that a germ, which cannot be seen, cannot be dangerous, and that organized social welfare work is a bugaboo.

And the "they" referred to is often an obstinate leader who sits back, placidly, with hands folded, remarking with smug complaisance, "We have managed pretty well so far without these new-fangled things, I reckon we can go on without them."

The world is marching forward, and persons in authority or with prestige must be willing to march forward, too, if Progress is to be kept alive.

Are you a stumbling block in the upward march of your community?

Is some perverse, petty idea to which you have clung for years keeping your town from advancing?

The time has come for every man and every woman to decide whether he or she is going to be modern and help make the world a decent, healthful and happy place to live in, or be medieval and permit disease and misery to reign unhampered because individuals are too indifferent to fight.

Service Men Are Urged to Reinstatement Insurance

The attention of all persons interested in the welfare of ex-service men and their dependents is again called to the fact that men may, up to July 1st, 1920, reinstate their lapsed or cancelled insurance regardless of the time they were discharged by simply sending to the Bureau two monthly payments accompanied by the reinstatement application, stating that they are in as good health as at the date of their discharge or expiration of the grace period, whatever is the later date.

Such men should be referred to the Secretary of the Home Service Section who has on hand a full supply of reinstatement blanks and full information as to how to assist men with their reinstatements.

The War Risk Insurance Bureau is making strenuous efforts to have all men who have allowed their insurance to lapse, to reinstate it. For this reason the privilege has been extended to July 1st, 1920. All men should be urged to attend to this matter as promptly as possible for the reason that they are not covered by insurance protection while the policy is lapsed, and for the further reason that their health might at any time become such that they could not conscientiously sign the reinstatement requirements as to health.

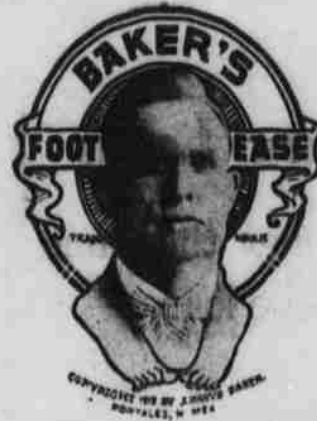

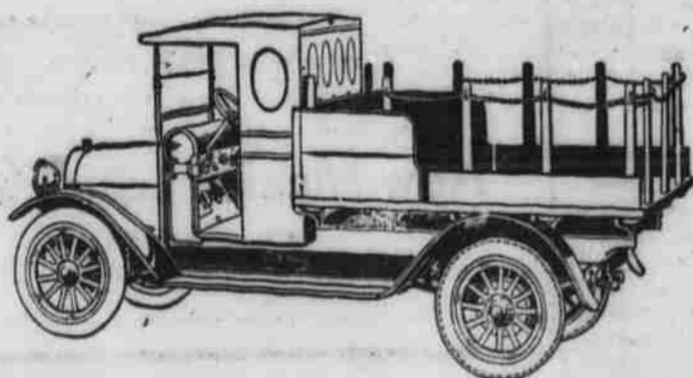

Better Teachers' Salaries Mean Better Teachers

A newspaper of national circulation recently carried this headline:

"TEACHERS UNDERPAID THROUGHOUT UNITED STATE"
This statement was true, but it missed the vital aspect of the situation. It should have read:

"SCHOOLS UNDERMANNED THROUGHOUT UNITED STATES" or more truly

"CHILDREN UNDERTAUGHT THROUGHOUT UNITED STATES"
Thus it would have emphasized and made plain the serious aspect of the present situation in every state in the Union, including our own. Except in isolated cases teachers are not greatly to be pitied. Usually they are young and competent persons and present industrial conditions are such that any young and competent person can command a living wage at almost any other occupation. If they cannot make a living at teaching they can easily pass to an occupation where-in they can; and this they constantly do, as is evident from experience in the schools of this and every county in New Mexico.

For a few—unfortunately too few—teachers who have made a life-work of the profession and are now too old to enter other lines of work the situation is truly serious. But these are the exceptions. For the rank and file of teachers themselves the situation is not serious.

But for the schools of this county and of N w Mexico; for the directors especially of rural schools, AND FOR THE CHILDREN SERVED BY THESE SCHOOLS THE PRESENT SITUATION IS CRITICAL.

CAN WE IN THE NEXT FEW YEARS FILL OUR SCHOOLS WITH COMPETENT TEACHERS AND GIVE OUR CHILDREN A FAIR START, OR CAN WE NOT?

WHEN WE GET TEACHERS CAN WE KEEP THEM UNTIL THEY APPROXIMATE THEIR MAXIMUM USEFULNESS, GAINED BY EXPERIENCE AND KNOWLEDGE OF OUR LOCAL CONDITIONS AND NEEDS, OR WILL WE BE FORCED TO LET THEM GO AFTER TEACHING A YEAR OR LESS AND BEFORE THEY ARE WORTH THEIR SALT?

IN THIS COUNTY WE MUST DO OUR PART TOWARD A SOLUTION OF THE HUGE UNSOLVED EDUCATIONAL PROBLEM NOW PERPLEXING NOT ONLY NEW MEXICO AND THE UNITED STATES BUT THE WHOLE ENGLISH-SPEAKING WORLD—THE SCARCITY OF COMPETENT AND TRAINED TEACHERS.

THE SOLUTION LIES IN PAYING SALARIES ADEQUATE TO HOLD IN OUR SCHOOLS COMPETENT AND TRAINED MEN AND WOMEN.

THIS IS THE ONLY SOLUTION AND IT IS DEMANDED NOT FOR THE TEACHER WHO GENERALLY CAN TAKE CARE OF HIMSELF OR HERSELF IN SOME OTHER OCCUPATION WHEN NECESSARY, BUT FOR THE PROPER MAINTENANCE OF GOOD SCHOOLS IN OUR COMMUNITIES AND FOR THE SOUND EDUCATION AND WELFARE OF OUR CHILDREN.

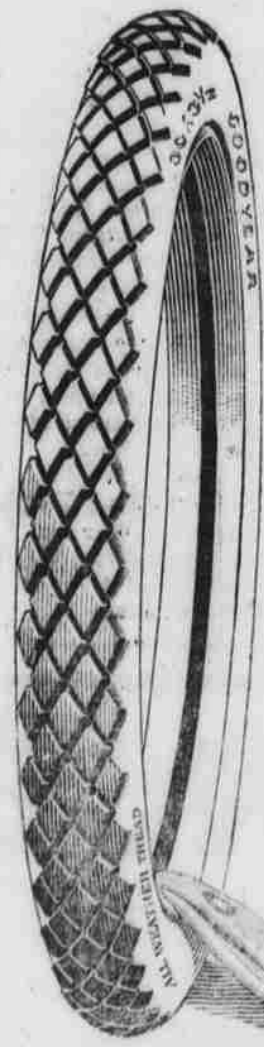
