COUNTY DEMOCRATS TO MEET IN CLOVIS SATURDAY, MAY 22

The Democratic county convention is hereby called to meet at Clovis, New Mexico, on Saturday, May 22, at 2:00 p. m. at the county court house, for the purpose of electing ten delegates to attend the state convention which meets at Roswell on June 3rd, and to elect a county chairman, secretary and treasurer, and to transact any other business which properly comes before the convention.

On Friday, May 21, Democratic precinct meetings are hereby called in the various precincts of Curry county, to meet at their usual meeting places, at the hour of 4 p. m. for the purpose of electing delegates to attend the county convention, and to elect a precinct chairman in each precinct to serve for the coming two years.

CURRY MAY SEND TWENTY DELEGATES

Curry County is entitled to ten votes in the State Convention which meets at Roswell next month to elect delegates to the National Convention. It has been suggested that this county send twenty delegates with each delegate having a half vote each. This would enable all to attend the convention who desired to go as delegates. The Curry County delegation will no doubt be made up of some lady members if any of them desire to go as delegates.

CHAVES COUNTY HOLDS INTERESTING PRIMARY

Roswell, N. M., May 12.—After counting all night and all day the result of Tuesday's Democratic primary Chaves County is still in doubt, as far as control of the organization is concerned. There were several surprises. One was the size of the vote cast in the county. The woman vote is still puzzling the politicians. The soldier candidate, Dillard Wyatt, who is seeking the District Attorney's office, literally swept the county, rolling up a big majority. His opponent, Robert Dow of Carlsbad, had a majority of 1063 from Lea and Eddy counties, but Wyatt is the winner in the district by about 500 votes. The women voted for Wyatt almost solidly, it is thought. On the other hand, the only woman candidate, Miss Carrie Skillman, running for county superintendent of schools was defeated by C. C. Hill, who has a majority of probably 300. This was the second big surprise.

Both the county committee and control of the county convention was still in doubt tonight and will probably be decided by a few small voting boxes which have not reported. Both factions were making timid claims tonight, and both admitted that it was so close that good feeling between the factions had not been augmented any to say the least.

The size of the vote indicates the women took advantage of their opportunity.

CARRANZA'S FATE STILL VERY MUCH IN DOUBT

WASHINGTON, MAY 12.—Reports of progress in the political organization of the new Mexican revolution were received here today, but the situation of the deposed president, Carranza, remained undefined.

Dispatches from Vera Cruz said he was fighting off the revolutionists at a point near Marcos, about half way between the capital and Vera Cruz, but no report, official or otherwise, came from Mexico City to contradict claims of revolutionary agents in the United States that he had been captured. The latest dispatches received by the state department from the embassy at Mexico City was a report May 9, but communication by wireless has been established and instructions sent to the state affairs to communicate fully.

NEWS PRINT PRODUCTION

The paper manufacturing industry represents an investment of about \$750,000,000 and employs 120,000 people.

Four tons of coal, wood and chemicals come into a paper mill for every ton of finished product sent out. Each ton of paper that is made requires one ton of coal or its fuel equivalent in oil. A cord of wood makes 1000 pounds of pulp. Paper manufacture has a hard problem to keep pace with consumption; daily newspapers alone having a circulation of 27,000,000 copies.

CONGRESS HAS SORRY RECORD

Bent upon adjournment or recess early in June, the present Republican congress will have written a sorry record. To date, of general legislation promised the people in the 1918 campaign, it has passed a railroad bill. Granting that it will pass a budget law and soldier bonus bill prior to June, neither of which is yet certain, its record will consist of three general pieces of legislation, added to the usual annual supply bills. It will have done nothing to adjust the tariff and revenue inequalities; it will not have solved the problem of what to do with the merchant marine and will have done nothing to encourage foreign trade; it will have neglected its opportunity to create land settlements for discharged soldiers, and will have done nothing for the encouragement of better relations between capital and labor.

In a sentence, it will have done little but criticize the administration for what it has done and what it has tried to do, but has been unable to do because congress blocked the way, and it has been in session approximately one year.

NORTH DAKOTA PAYS THE BILL

From the published reports of conditions in North Dakota it appears

that taxes have increased in the neighborhood of 300 per cent in the past two years of Non-Partisan league rule.

The league program of socialism and state ownership is now costing the people heavily. A farmer gets no more for his produce than farmers in adjoining states and a loaf of bread or a meal costs just as much in North Dakota as elsewhere.

A costly political machine has been built up at the expense of taxpayers, and investors steer clear of North Dakota where an automatic class rule in the interest of a privileged few endangers the safety of all kinds of investments. The league is making a determined fight to extend its influence to other states at coming elections.

ALABASTER BOXES OF HUMAN SYMPATHY

Do not keep the alabaster boxes of your love and tenderness sealed up until your friends are dead. Fill their lives with sweetness. Speak approving, cheering words while their ears can hear them and while their hearts can be thrilled and made happier by them; the kind things gone, say before they go. The flowers you mean to send for their coffin, send to brighten and sweeten their homes before they leave them. If my friends have alabaster boxes laid away full of fragrant perfumes of sympathy and affection which they intend to break over my dead body I would rather they would bring them out in my weary and troubled hours and open them that I may be refreshed and cheered by them while I need them. I would rather have a plain coffin without a flower, a funeral without a eulogy, than a life without the sweetness of love and sympathy. Let us learn to anoint our friends beforehand for their burial. Post mortem kindness does not cheer the burdened spirit. Flowers on the coffin cast no fragrance backward over the weary way.—Praetorian Guard.

ORDINARY GOOD THINGS.

Take a pint of any kind of canned fruit juice and stir into it, when boiling, three table-spoonfuls of sago that has been soaked several hours in cold water. Add sugar, if necessary, and a little salt; cook in a double boiler until the sago is soft. Pour into a mold and chill. Serve with cream and sugar, or fruit juice may be used as a sauce.

Milk Sherbet.—Mix one-fourth of a cupful of lemon juice with two cupfuls of sugar. Add one-quarter of milk. Pour into the freezer, add the white of an egg beaten stiff and partly freeze. Then add a cupful of grated pineapple and finish freezing.

Spiced Graham Pudding.—Take half a loaf of stale graham bread, cut off the crust and preps seeded raisins into the bread to cover the entire surface. Make a custard mixture of two cupfuls of milk, two eggs, four table-spoonfuls of sugar, one-half teaspoonful of nutmeg. Turn the bread in the custard until well soaked and the milk is entirely absorbed. Put into a buttered mold and steam, tightly covered, one hour. Serve with maple sauce.

Vegetarian Loaf.—Take two cupfuls of white bread crumbs, one cupful of milk, two cupfuls of walnuts or pecans coarsely chopped, two beaten eggs, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of poultry dressing, one-half cupful of melted butter, pepper and celery salt. Soak the crumbs in the milk and eggs, mix with the other ingredients. Make in an oblong loaf and bake in a greased pan half an hour, basting often with butter. Turn out on a hot platter and serve hot or cold. Use parsley as a garnish.

Cheese Dreams.—Cut circles of thinly sliced close-textured bread. Lay very thin slices of cheese between the bread, to form sandwiches. Brown lightly in butter on both sides. Serve hot with plain lettuce salad.

A little leftover ham if finely minced and added to a white sauce will flavor an otherwise flavorless dish. This may be used over buttered toast or as a gravy with baked potatoes.

VOTERS KICKED HUGHES INTO A REAL COIN JOB

New York.—Charles E. Hughes may not have essayed 100 per cent as a presidential candidate back in 1916, but as a lawyer, and as a money getter in the legal field, it doesn't seem he has any serious competitors. Friends of the former Republican candidate say that his income is \$1,000,000 a year. If he really makes that \$1,000,000 Hughes is making more out of strictly legal work than any other lawyer in this country.

Hughes' present income is in striking contrast to what he received as a justice of the U. S. supreme court. That position pays \$14,500 a year. When Hughes was defeated for the presidency some said he made a mistake in resigning from the supreme court in order to run. But did he?

What really happened in November 1916, was that the voters of this country—and particularly the voters of California—kicked Hughes upstairs into a position paying about 60 times what his former one had yielded.

So busy is Hughes' law office on

lower Broadway that attorneys say he has enough work on hand to keep him busy for the next hundred years. He'll be very lucky if he gets to finish it. He was 58 years old on April 11th.

TAX TEN MILLION BACHELORS OF UNITED STATES

Washington, May 11.—A tax on bachelors by States in need of cash has been suggested by Actuary McCoy of the Treasury Department. McCoy is an expert at devising ways of raising money for the Federal Government.

France is now ready to tax bachelors, he pointed out. From \$40,000,000 to \$100,000,000 a year could be raised in the United States by a bachelor's tax, McCoy said.

Approximately 10,000,000 men between 44 and 20 are now holding fast to a state of single blessedness in the United States, Census Bureau reports indicate, and the number is growing constantly. An annual tax of \$5 could be paid by most single men without much sacrifice, advocates of the tax said.

MRS. COLEMAN ACQUITTED

Santa Fe, May 8.—Florence Coleman, charged with an attempt to tamper with a Government witness, was acquitted by a jury in the United States District Court here. The case was under trial all yesterday. The jury was out only 15 minutes in reaching a verdict.

Mrs. Coleman, an employe of S. C. Pandolfo and the Pan Motor Co., was charged with having tried to influence Mrs. Sarah E. Clark, of Belen as to testimony Mrs. Clark might give at the trial of S. C. Pandolfo and others. Mrs. Clark had been subpoenaed as a witness in the case, which had been set for trial on Oct. 23, 1919, before Judge K. M. Landis, in the United States District Court at Chicago.

The witnesses for the government were Mrs. Clark, who formerly ran a small rooming house in Belen; W. E. Henson, a minister living in Guadalupe county, but who was in Belen at the time of the alleged offense; George Huffman, postmaster at Belen, and Fred Farnoff, an agent of the department of justice.

The character witnesses for the defense were Senator L. C. Mersfelder, of Albuquerque now, but for 14 years a resident of Clovis; A. E. Curren who has been a resident of Clovis some 14 years; A. B. Wagner, who has been postmaster at Clovis for nearly seven years; Judge John T. McClure, former presiding judge of the Fifth Judicial District Court, who held court in Clovis for about seven years; Mrs. S. C. Pandolfo of St. Cloud, in whose home Mrs. Coleman has lived for one and one-half years.

Before entering the employ of the Pan Motor company, in September, 1917, Mrs. Coleman had lived for 13 years in Clovis, 11 years of that time serving as an employe in the postoffice. The several witnesses testified to her good reputation.

THE HOME AND THE NATION

The real history of a Nation is made in the homes of its people—this is the truth that Professor Ferrero, the noted Italian historian, draws from his exhaustive study of the Rise and Fall of the Roman Empire. We are inclined to believe in our superficial way, that this truth, accepted by all great moral leaders, and by all of the greater statesmen—that the home is the foundation of national greatness—is a modern doctrine.

It is illuminating to realize that a great modern historian confirms his belief in that doctrine, after a study of the causes which brought about the disintegration of the Roman Empire. In his lecture on "Corruption in Ancient Rome" Ferrero says: "The causes of how many mysterious historical events would be more clearly and profoundly known, if how many periods would the spirit be better understood did we only possess the private records of the family that make up the ruling class. Every deed we do in the intimacy of the home reacts on the whole

of our environment. With our acts we assume a responsibility toward the Nation and posterity, the sanction for which, near or far away, is in events."

This is not a preacher nor a moral teacher, but a historian speaking. He had gained that conviction from a deep study and a long consideration of the events of history immediately preceding the downfall of the Roman Empire—particularly of that period embraced in the first fifty years which followed the beginning of the Christian era. The austere virtues and the spirit of the early Roman patriots had vanished; luxury had crept in and luxury had been followed by corruption. The old standards which demanded virtue in the home life of the ruling class had been overthrown. The result was irretrievable National disaster.—Montgomery Advertiser.
