The New Mexican has been urged that property be assessed at its cash value and the board of commissioners of Santa Fe county thought the paper meant what it said and raised the valuation of the New Mexican printing plant. The business manager has appealed the case to the territorial board of equalization.

EQUALIZATION OF TAXES.
A careful reading of the statutes seems to establish the fact that the territorial board of equalization has no power to equalize taxes except those assessed upon railroads, telegraph and telephone lines and sheep and car companies. The board of county commissioners of each county does have the power under the law to assess real estate within its respective county, at such value as it may deem proper and best for the owners. This is the opinion given the New Mexican by some very good lawyers.

This thing of assessing valuable timber and grazing land at 20 and 30 cents per acre must stop.

INSURANCE.
During 1900 insurance companies of all kinds collected in New Mexico \$27,039,668 in premiums and paid out only \$18,874,711, or only 22.7 per cent of the sum collected, 10 per cent less than the average in other states. The auditor also shows that fire insurance is carried on \$10,729,490.48 worth of property in the territory. As such insurance can be carried only on a certain class of real and personal property, generally only 5 to 10 per cent of the total wealth of a state, the New Mexican says that a better idea of the real value of personal and real property owned in the territory is gained than by looking over the assessment rolls of the different counties. Over \$1,000,000 worth of life insurance is carried in New Mexico by companies doing their business directly in the territory while undoubtedly nearly as much more is carried by companies who quote a present residents of New Mexico before they come here and collect the premiums by mail or other wise than through local agents.

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OFFICIAL MATTERS.

New Railroad Corporation File Papers Will Build in Southern New Mexico.

INTERESTING INSURANCE STATISTICS.

The Southwestern railroad of Arizona company filed amended articles of incorporation with Territorial Secretary J. W. Reynolds, changing its name to the El Paso & Southwestern and increasing its capital stock to \$1,000,000. The company will build a line of railroad from Don Luis station on the Arizona & Southwestern line to Agua Prieta, on the Mexican border, and will also acquire the New Mexico & Arizona and the Arizona & Sonora railroads as well as complete a line from Tucson to El Paso by way of Deming, a total length of 130 miles.

Articles of incorporation were also filed by subsidiary companies. One is the Southwestern Railroad of Arizona with a capital stock of \$750,000, divided into 750,000 shares. It provides for the building of a railroad line 100 miles long from Don Luis station in Arizona to the New Mexico boundary.

James Douglas is president of the Arizona & Sonora railroad. The Arizona & Sonora railroad is a subsidiary company of the Southwestern Railroad of Arizona.
