He Answers Charges Made by Rev. Dr. C. E. Lukens.

LIVELY RELIGIOUS CONTROVERSY.

Gallop, N. M., Aug. 5.—On my return from an extensive trip in the south of my parish, my attention is called to an article signed Dr. C. E. Lukens, a so-called religious writer, in which he attacks me in an article of mine which appeared in The Citizen on the 5th of July.

My article was called an editorial, and was brought before me by a Massachusetts lawyer, complaining about the uncivilized condition of New Mexico. That editorial was brought before me by a "sincere and devoted worker" of San Mateo at a meeting in Boston, in commenting this paper, the Boston Transcript has said, "In this article, the national domain is attacked, paganism is rampant, ignorance flourish, and degradation is the common condition. Do you not see the condemnation of such a policy in the failure of your work among the Mexicans? You find it every year that \$100,000 to allure them to your creed, and in spite of so much gold the Mexican race adheres to the faith of their forefathers, and they support their priests rather than receive your administration gratis.

Gold may tempt in your hands, the Mexican race, but it is yours. This is all I have to say.

Should Rev. Dr. C. E. Lukens, M. D., with more interesting terms, some of his old friends may accommodate him.

As to me I shall not any more countenance a discussion with an opponent who grounds his arguments on hatred, slander and bigotry.

He was a man about 50 years of age and leaves a family, by whose request the remains will be interred at Los Angeles, with Knights Templar services.
