Some Aspects of the Farmers' Problems

By BERNARD M. BARUCH

(Reprinted from Atlantic Monthly)

Some farmers favored by regional compactness and contiguity, such as the citrus-fruit-growers of California, already have found a way legally to merge and sell their products integrally and in accordance with seasonal and local demand, thus improving their position and rendering the consumer a reliable source of assured quality, certain supply, and reasonable and relatively steady prices. They have not found it necessary to resort to any special privilege, or to claim any exemption under the anti-trust legislation of the state or nation. Without removing local control, they have built up a very efficient marketing agency.

The grain, cotton, and tobacco farmers, and the producers of hides and wool, because of their numbers and the vastness of their regions, and for other reasons, have found integration a more difficult task; though there are now some thousands of farmer's co-operative elevators, warehouses, creameries, and other enterprises of this kind, and for a long time past, the great majority of our laborers are out of employment, while in another column you read an official report to the Department of Commerce that the great Krupp plants of Germany, the pre-war output of and workmen in which contributed more to the world calamity and human suffering than any like institution in history, now employs 99,000 men as against 81,000 men prior to the war; that they are sustained and reasonably paid; that the daily output of agricultural and varied products of that institution is greater than in history.

In the first place, a loose organization, such as any union of farmers must be at best, cannot be so arbitrary and promptly controlled as a great corporation. The one is a lumbering democracy and the other an eagle autocracy. In the second place, with all possible power of organization, the farmers cannot succeed to any great extent, or for any considerable length of time, in fixing prices. The great law of supply and demand works in the undying of the best laid plans that attempt to foil it. In the third place, their power, will avail the farmers nothing if it be abused. In our time and country power is of value to its possessors only so long as it is not abused. It is fair to say that I have seen no signs in responsible quarters of a disposition to tolerate price-fixing. There seems, on the contrary, to be a community beneficial purpose to realize a stability that will give an orderly and abundant flow of farm products to the consumer and ensure reasonable and dependable returns to the producer.

In view of the supreme importance to the national well-being of a prosperous and contented agricultural population, we should be prepared to go a long way in assisting the farmers to get an equitable share of the wealth they produce, through the inauguration of reforms that will procure a continuous and increasing stream of farm products. They are far from getting a fair share now. Considering agricultural and the long hours of labor put in by the average farmer and his family, he is remunerated less than any other occupational class, with the possible exception of teachers, religious and lay. Though we know that the present general distress of the farmers is exceptional and is linked with the inevitable economic readjustment following the war, it must be remembered that, although representing one-third of the industrial product and half the total population of the nation, the rural communities still partly enjoy a fifth to a quarter of the net annual national gain. Notwithstanding the taste of prosperity that the farmers had during the war, there is today a lower standard of living among the cotton farmers of the South than in any other section in the country that relates to them.

To take a tolerant and sympathetic view of the farmers' strivings for better things is not to give a blanket endorsement to my specific plan, and still less to applaud the vagaries of some of their leaders and groups. Neither should we, on the other hand, allow the froth of bitter agitation, false economies, and mistaken radicalism to conceal the facts of the farmers' disadvantages and the practicability of eliminating them by well-considered measures. It may be that the farmers will not show the business sagacity and develop the wise leadership to carry through sound plans; but that possibility does not justify the obstruction of their upward efforts. We, as city people, see in high and speculatively manipulated prices, specie, waste, scarcity, the results of defective distribution of farm products. Should it not occur to us that we have a common interest with the farmer in his attempts to attain a degree of efficiency in distribution corresponding to his efficiency in production? Do not the recent fluctuations in the May wheat option, apparently unrelated to normal interaction of supply and demand, offer a timely proof of the need of some such stabilizing agency as grain growers have in contemplation?

It is contended that, if their proposed organizations be perfected and operated, the farmers will have in their hands an instrument that will be capable of dangerous abuse. We are told that it will be possible to prevent it to arbitrate and oppressive price-fixing from its legitimate use of ordering and stabilizing the flow of farm products to the market, to the mutual benefit of producer and consumer. I have no apprehensions on this point.

"National self-preservation, in these states, primarily demands, plenary defense of our markets against being made the dumping grounds of the world's products of cheap labor and production, augmented by extreme currency depreciation.

"One needs to travel but little to be taught the distress and dire needs of our manufacturers, producers and laborers by the vacant shops, the smoky stacks, and hopeless faces of our workers. Where before were the signs of activity and life are now

ever enacted. Thereunder, ordinarily to introduce foreign merchandise into the commerce of the United States, in competition with American productions, no single oath by the foreigner is required as to their value, or is otherwise made necessary.

"It is absolutely impossible under the existing law to gain accurate information as to foreign home market values. Under our existing system, every appraiser throughout the United States is presumed every morning that he goes to his office to have knowledge of the market value of every imported article in every country of the United States exporting.

"Upon every hand we find in our land that to-day our goods are being driven from our markets, our factories closed, our farms impoverished and our laborers thrown into idleness by the cheap productions of foreign countries which are hourly being dumped into this country. Three years ago the war closed. Almost every great commercial nation of the world save the United States has put up tariff barriers against this deluge of cheap foreign goods. October 1st, England raised her rates on six thousand articles. Previously she provided special duty against German goods of 50 per cent, and a depreciated currency of 75 per cent.

"The question now whether the import duties levied by the United States shall be calculated upon foreign or American valuation basis is perhaps the most important import tariff issue seriously considered by the Congress since 1833.

"The existing foreign valuation system is without doubt the weakest

REGULAR SESSION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

1922, JAN. 3, 1922.

The Board of County Commissioners of Valencia County met in a regular session on Jan. 3, 1922. The members present were Hon. Dr. De Vries, chairman of the board, Hon. Narciso Marquez and Hon. Seis Lobato, members, Hon. Joseph F. Tadre, sheriff, and A. A. Gutierrez county clerk.

The board being in order of business, the chairman announced to all those present to present their business before the board.

Mr. Charles N. Roark representing the Guaranty Title and Trust Company appeared before the board in regard to making a contract for preparing an abstract of the records of Valencia County and the board after giving due deliberation to the matter decided not to act on this matter until the next regular meeting.

Mr. Felipe Armijo and other citizens of Precinct No. 2, Belen, presented a petition signed by a number of citizens from the southern part of said precinct praying for a division of said precinct, and creating a new precinct out of the southern part of the Belen precinct. The board after hearing arguments in favor and against the creation or division of said precinct decided not to act on this matter until the next meeting in February, in order to give a full consideration to the matter and to give an opportunity to all the people concerned that they may be well acquainted as to the division of said precinct.

The clerk was instructed to publish the following notice in the Belen News and El Hispano Americano of Belen for two consecutive issues.

Whereas the board of County Commissioners of Valencia County, is authorized and directed by the provisions of Chapter 100, section 4 of the laws of 1922, to have charge of all the road work within the county, and whereas said board has made a competent petition in the Improvement Committee to have charge of all the road work within the county, therefore Be it Resolved by the board of county commissioners of Valencia County that the said Emiliano Castillo of Los Lunas, New Mexico, is hereby appointed County Road Superintendent for the ensuing year of 1922.

Be it further resolved that the same road superintendant be hereby required to furnish a bond in the sum of \$5,000 and two good and sufficient sureties to be issued by a surety company authorized to transact business in the state of New Mexico, for the faithful performance of all duties.

Be it further resolved that the County Road Superintendent shall receive a salary of \$10,000 per annum, all actual and necessary expenses, both salary and expenses not exceeding the amount of the salary, and that the same be deducted from the salary of the County Road Superintendent.

Be it further resolved that the County Road Superintendant be authority to engage in doing any work outside of the county, not included in the road charges adopted by the board of county commissioners of said county, to be made during the month of September 1921, to be made by the County Clerk and chairman of the Board of County Commissioners and hereby authorized respectively to draw and sign warrants in payment of services and material expended upon roads, provided that the same are supported by vouchers and attested by the county road superintendent, each such voucher shall bear the name and address showing where the labor or material was expended.

John M. Owen appeared before the board of county commissioners in regard to building a mail stage near Swanee gross, San Jose creek. This matter was referred to the County Road Dept. and he is hereby requested to investigate and report in connection with the building of a mail stage, and to report his investigation to this board at its next meeting.

In conformity with the provisions of Chapter 100, section 20, the board of county commissioners of Valencia County, that the same of Valencia County is hereby authorized to grant an order to the county road superintendent to furnish a drawing copy of all roads for taxation purposes.

**REGLAMENTOS DE LA ACEQUIA
DE NUESTRA SEÑORA DE
BELEN DE LA LADERA**

1. El mayordomo actuando bajo la dirección del cuerpo de comisionados, tendrá completo cargo de la acequia y será responsable por cualquier falta en el desempeño de sus deberes. Tendrá cuidado de los trabajos y asentamientos, de no dar más trabajo que el que pertenece a los diferentes vecinos.

2. Es el deber del mayordomo de quitar cualquier obstrucción que impida la corriente del agua de dicha acequia.

3. El mayordomo tendrá cuidado que todos los dueños de terreno de dicha acequia trabajen en ella según las correspondientes órdenes que se trabajan su parte no se diera agua.

4. Si el mayordomo da agua a cualquiera que no haya pagado su asentamiento el mismo trabajo sera vedado de su sueldo.

5. Cada quincena personas que tomen agua sin orden del maestro pagaran a una multa de diez pesos y estaran sujetos a una multa de diez pesos y en tal caso sera deber del mayordomo causar que tales personas sean multadas.

6. Cugido el agua sea distribuida por horas comenzara con el primer radio de arriba y seguirá sucesivamente hasta el ultimo de abajo y quien reciba agua por hora sera dueño del mayordomo que complete sus horas y no se permitira mas que un riego por una contracorriente en las que los demás porciones completen su riego.

7. Si el agua ha sido dada alguna persona por el mayordomo cuando la misma este por horas y esta por alguna razón no puede usarla entonces sera dada a la siguiente persona de abajo.

8. La regla concerniente a los asentamientos -levas- por el año 1921: A cada hombre con herramienta se le acreda un dia de trabajo y a cada hombre con tiro de caballos y carro o escraper se le acreditará dos dias de trabajo por cada dia de fatigas. Tambien se reclamara \$1.50 por cada dia de trabajo atrasado y 3 con tiro y peon.

9. Todos los dineros colectados y pagados al mayordomo por trabajo atrasado o multa serán entregados al tesorero y no usara ningun dinero de dicho fondo sin orden del cuerpo.

10. Cualquier porcionero que falte o refuse pagar su asentamiento se le negara el uso del agua hasta que lo pague, encuyendo el pago del mayordomo y dicho pago se hara en el mes de Agosto.

11. dichas reglas y regulaciones estarán urgentes durante el año de 1922 y el cuerpo de comisionados se reservará el derecho de hacer otras reglas si a su juicio se crea necesario.

12. Todo terreno arrasado o regado que usen agua de la acequia pagaran a razón de 5 centavos por cada acre.

13. Resuélvase que el mayordomo tendrá cuidado de no permitir arrancamientos a la acequia.

14. Derechos nuevos o adicionales se podrán adquirir del siguiente modo. El aplicante tiene de pagar mitad el trabajo y mitad con dinero por los derechos nuevos por el año de 1922 y si algún terreno se ha regado sin pagar el derecho de los rraños tendrá este año que pagar con dinero y además tiene que pagar el interés por los años que ha regado sin derecho. Ademas los dueños de terreno reportaran al mayordomo el terreno o acres de terreno que han a regar y si alguna persona no ha esta satisfecha de las medidas de su terreno reportaran al comisionado para que se hagan tales medidas, como también el mayordomo si se considera que alguna medida no este legalmente reportada pasea aviso a la comisión para que sea medida.

15. La persona que tenga trabajo atrasado en la parte de arriba de la acequia lo responderá ahora en la limpia y solo tendrá que pagar dinero a razón del impuesto del año.

16. Resuélvase además que el mayordomo esta entitulado al derecho de los peones de regadio y cosechar 80¢ de cada acre, tantos acres como tenga cada dueño de dicha acequia por su pago.


