Some Aspects of the Farmers' Problems

Some farmers favored by regional competition and contiguity, such as the citrus-fruit-risers of California, already have found a way legally to merge and sell their products integrally and in accordance with seasonal and local demand, thus improving their position and rendering the consumer a reliable service of assured quality, certain supply, and reasonable and relatively steady prices. They have not found it necessary to resort to any special privilege, or to claim any exemption under the anti-trust legislation of the state or nation. Without removing local control, they have built up a very efficient marketing agency. The grain, cotton, and tobacco farmers, and the producers of hides and wool, because of their numbers and the vastness of their regions, and for other reasons, have found integration a more difficult task; though there are now some thousands of farmer's co-operative elevators, warehouses, creameries, and other enterprises of one sort and another, with a turnover of a billion dollars a year. They are giving the farmers business experience and training, and so far as they go they meet the need of honest weighing and fair grading; but they do not meet the requirements of rationally adjusted marketing in any large and fundamental way.

The next step, which will be a pattern for other groups, is now being prepared by the health-rulers through the establishment of sales media which shall handle grain separately or collectively, as the individual farmer may elect. It is in this step that the Committee of Seventeen, which has created so much opposition and is thought by some to be in conflict with the anti-trust laws. Though there is now before congress a measure designed to clear up doubt on this point, the grain-producers are not relying on any immunity from anti-trust legislation. They desire, and they are entitled to co-ordinate their efforts just as effectively as the large business interests of the country have done. In connection with the selling organizations the United States Grain Growers, incorporated in drafting a scheme of financing instrumentalities and auxiliary agencies which are indispensable to the successful utilization of modern business methods. It is essential that the farmers should proceed gradually with these plans, and aim to avoid the error of scrapping the existing marketing machinery, which has been so laboriously built up by long experience, before they have a tried and proved substitute or supplementary mechanism. They must be careful not to become enmeshed in their own reforms and lose the perspective of their place in the national system. They must guard against fanatical devotion to new doctrines, and should seek articulation with the general economic system rather than its reckless destruction as it relates to them.

To take a tolerant and sympathetic view of the farmers' strivings for better things is not to give a blanket endorsement to any specific plan, and still less to applaud the varieties of some of their leaders and groups. Neither should we, on the other hand, allow the froth of bitter acclamation, false economies, and misdirected radicalism to conceal the facts of the farmers' disadvantages and the practicality of eliminating them by well-considered measures. It may be that the farmers will not show the business sagacity and develop the wise leadership to carry through sound plans; but that possibility does not justify the obstruction of their upward efforts. We, as city people, see in high and speculatively manipulated prices, spoiled eggs, scarce, scarcity, the result of defective distribution of farm products, should it not occur to us that we have a common interest with the farmer in his attempts to attain a degree of efficiency in distribution corresponding to his efficiency in production? Do not the recent fluctuations in the May wheat option, apparently unrelated to normal interaction of supply and demand, offer a timely proof of the need of some such stable

ing agency as grain growers have in contemplation? It is contended that, if their proposed organizations be perfected and operated, the farmers will have in their hands an instrument that will be capable of dangerous abuse. We are told that it will be possible to pervert it to arbitrary and oppressive price-fixing from its legitimate use of ordering and stabilizing the flow of farm products to the market, to the mutual benefit of producer and consumer. I have no apprehensions on this point.

In the first place, a loose organization, such as any union of farmers must be at best, cannot be so arbitrarily and promptly controlled as a great corporation. The one is a lumbering democracy and the other an agile autocracy. In the second place, with all possible power of organization, the farmers cannot succeed to any great extent, or for any considerable length of time, in fixing prices. The great law of supply and demand works in various and surprising ways, to the undoing of the best laid plans that attempt to foil it. In the third place, their power, will avail the farmers nothing if it be abused. In our time and country power is of value to its possessor only so long as it is not abused. It is fair to say that I have seen no signs in responsible quarters of a disposition to dilute prices. There seems, on the contrary, to be a commonly beneficial purpose to realize a stability that will give an orderly and abundant flow of farm products to the consumer and ensure reasonable and dependable returns to the producer.

In view of the supreme importance to the national well-being of a prosperous and contented agricultural population, we should be prepared to go a long way in assisting the farmers to get an equitable share of the wealth they produce, through the inauguration of reforms that will procure a continuous and increasing stream of farm products. They are far from getting a fair share now. Considering the capital and the long hours of labor put into the average farmer and his family, he is remunerated less than any other occupational class, with the possible exception of teachers, religious and lay. Though we know that the present general distress of the farmers is exceptional and is linked with the inevitable economic readjustment following the war, it must be remembered that, although representing one-third of the industrial product and half the total population of the nation, the rural communities contribute only a fifth to a quarter of the national annual gain. Notwithstanding the taste of prosperity that the farmers had during the war, there is today a lower standard of living among the cotton farmers of the South than in any other section in the country.

United States Valuation Would Correct Tariff Evils

—Judge De Vries.

"America's markets being the best, prices the highest and its money at par, this country has become the goal of all exporting trade." Judge Marion De Vries, of the United States Court of Customs Appeals, says in a statement just issued in favor of the new Jordan Tariff Bill.

"National self preservation, in that sense, primarily demands, plenary defense of our markets against being made the dumping grounds of the world's products of cheap labor and production, augmented by extreme currency depreciation.

"One needs to travel but little to be taught the distress and dire needs of our manufacturers, producers and laborers by the vacant shops, the smoldering stacks, and hopeless faces of our workmen, where before were the signs of activity and the fruits of contentment.

"We turn to the morning paper. Every day is printed there the same story. We read in one column, for example, that a cut of 20 per cent has been made in agricultural implements, in another that four and one-half million of our laborers are out of employment, while in another column you read an official report to the Department of Commerce that the great Krupp plants of Germany, the price output of and workmen in which contributed more to the world calamity and human suffering than any like institution in history, now employ 99,000 men as against 81,000 men prior to the war; that they are overmanned and reasonably paid; that the daily output of agricultural and other products of that institution is greater than in history.

"Upon every hand we find in our land that today our goods are being driven from our markets, our factories closed, our farms impoverished and our laborers thrown into idleness by the cheap productions of foreign countries which are hourly being dumped into this country. Three years ago the war closed. Almost every great commercial nation of the world says the United States has put up tariff barriers against the United States in every morning paper he goes to his office to have knowledge of the market value of every imported article in every country of the United States exporting hereto.
