MCCARTY'S BODY FOUND.

Over Two Months Spent in Hunting for the Great Hunter.

About the first day of last June four men went to look for game in the southwest of Flagstaff. The party consisted of John McCarty, the renowned hunter, Joseph Day, his hunting partner, John Govey and M. Bower. They camped at the above named place for the purpose of hunting the mountain lion and bear in the region of the Grand Canyon.

Joseph Day left camp soon after arriving there and came to Flagstaff after provisions. While he was away, McCarty and Govey went on a day's hunt. They notified the neighbors and a searching party was sent out to look for the missing man.

Upon Mr. Day's return from Flagstaff he said that he saw almost constantly until last Monday when the body was found. He was assisted by the game warden.

When about seven miles from the camp the party was going down a box canyon near Miller's canyon and discovered the mangled remains of John McCarty. The head had been detached, and was lying with face down, and about three rods away from the body appeared to have been washed there by the water.

The circumstances and conditions led the searchers to the following conclusions: That McCarty had killed a bear, as a bear skin was found wrapped up in his coat, and it is believed he was on his way to camp when he encountered the second bear and the fight to the death occurred. It is supposed that he shot at the second bear, falling to kill the bear, that his gun exploded, it was found lying by his side, the barrel buried about two feet from the breach. Both of his legs were broken by the bear, and his clothes were torn in shreds, while the searchers believed, were indications of a terrible struggle between an enraged human and an unarmed and defenseless human being.
