### Car Shortage Viewed With Alarm

•

To the Wheat Growers of Curry County:

There exists a shortage of cars for the movement of grain not only in New Mexico but in the Panhandle of Texas. In view of the fact that the farmers of Curry County will soon begin harvesting and threshing another big crop of wheat they should view with alarm the shortage of cars and make arrangements to take care of the bulk of their wheat before they begin threshing as otherwise they might be compelled to pile it on the ground and in the event of rain, be heavy losers. It will probably be many months after the crop is threshed before enough cars can be secured to haul the 1920 crop to the market. This is, indeed, a serious problem and should receive the careful consideration of every wheat farmer in the county. There exists a shortage of cars for the movement of grain







A review of the work of the Chamber of Commerce for the past six months is due the members. There is much work done by the Chamber of Commerce from which there may be no immediate visible results.

Unfortunately many details on which much effort is expended belongs to this class and in most cases this work is the most valuable.

There is other work, however, from which visible results have been obtained and it is of these we will speak.

NARRATIVE REPORT

RURAL TELEPHONE SYSTEM

A rural telephone system reaching every important community center in the county has been long desired. In the many miles of poles already erected and leading to Claud, Grady, Pleasant Hill, Ranchvale, Fields and Texico, and the stringing of many miles of wire by two crews now at work, are visible evidences of the accomplishments in that field.

#### NATIONAL HIGHWAYS

The securing of the Bankhead National Highway and the Ozark Trail routes through Clovis, the marking and mapping of hundreds of miles of highways leading to Clovis, heretofore unknown trails, untraveled and un-heralded, has not been the least accomplishment of the Chamber of Com-

merce in a comparatively short time.

The hundreds of tourists passing through Clovis going east, west, north and south is tangible, visible evidence of accomplishment. These hundreds are but forerunners of the thousands of tourists that will inevitably follow.

#### FUTURE PLANS

Water that has passed the mill is of little moment. It is of future plans that is most important. The Ozark Trail must be marked, advertised and developed. The Bankhead National Highway as a "paper road" would be of little value. The road authorities in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas must be interested in matching the work of New Mexico so ably started by the State Highway Commission and the road authorities of Roosevelt, Curry, Chaves, Lincoln and Otero Counties. Almost \$1,000,000,00 will be spent on these routes through New Mexico in the next two years. Contracts aggregating \$200,000 will be let in Curry and Roosevelt Counties alone in July.

The Clovis Chamber of Commerce is in a position to greatly assist in putting this great construction program over, both in New Mexico and the states to the east. Clovis was a leader in the movement that caused these great highways to be routed through her gates.

#### ABO PASS ROUTE

But Clovis has even a greater work to accomplish. The same reason which justified the Santa Fe railroad spending millions of dollars to build a great railroad, the Belen Cut-off, through the Abo Pass, will make the Abo Pass Highway a FOR SALE—370 acres good plains

#### LOGAN BRIDGE

The building of the Logan Bridge gives 'Clovis another great opportunity. A great state line and cross-connecting road beginning in the
new oil field at Pecos thence north through Lovington, Portales, Clovis,
Grady, Tucumcari, Clayton and on north to a connection with the great
Lincoln National Highway near Julesburg, Colorado, must be promoted.
There will not be a single obstacle in the way when the Logan Bridge is
completed. It will only require an organized effort.

#### THE GRADY ROAD

The building of a modern highway, suitable for heavy truck traffic to the north end of the county, will be materially hastened by the building of the Logan Bridge and the promotion of the State Lines Highway. The State and Federal road authorities will recognize the value of this route and the combined efforts of the state, federal and county authorities will make light work of building this highway. When this is accomplished every acre of land in Curry County north of Running Water Draw will double and treble in intrinsic value. Is it not worth working for a use accomplishment will be, under present conditions, far easier than building the Clovis-Portales road five years ago.

#### DEEP OIL TESTS

The drilling of a deep test for oil and gas near Clovis must be con-sumated. This project has behind it some of our strongest and far-seeing men and it is the duty of the Chamber of Commerce to put its shoulder to the wheel and help put it over before the end of 1920, and it will be done.

#### MODERN HOTEL

A new \$200,00,00 hotel must be secured for Clovis. The past efforts made by the Chamber of Commerce may not be so barren of results as some might think. It is not an impossible accomplishment and is even nearer than any dream.

#### BIRDS IN COMBAT

Feathered Creatures Sometimes Battle to the Death.

Contrary to Pretty Theory, Perfect Peace Does Not Always Reign Within Those "Little Nests" as Sung by Post.

"Birds in their little nests agree," wrote Doctor Watts. If the eminent preacher had chanced to witness an incident similar to that which I saw the other day, says a writer in the London Dally Mail, he would never have penned that libel.

I was walking across a London golf course when two sparrows shot past my head, chattering violently, and, coming to ground a few yards away, set to fighting so furiously that I was actually able to pick them both up in my hands.

I let one go at once; the other I carried a little distance before liberating it, Will you believe it?-a moment later the two were at it again, benk and claws.

Almost nil birds fight furiously in the springtime. Even turtle doves, those emblems of pence, will go for one another in the mating season.

The various methods of offense adopted by-different birds are interest-Spatrows are their powerful benks but hold one another with their claws. Starlings light in exactly sim-Har fashlon. Their combats are at times most desperate. A friend saw one cock starling astually kill another,

Pigeons use their wings but rarely do one another much harm. Swans fight with their wites, and their strength is so great that their battles sometimes result fatally. I have, however, seen a swan apparently endeavoring to hold the head of a rival under water, but I was not near enough to make out what happened.

Some birds have spars on their wings. The spur-winged goose, which is a small, long-legged bird and rathor resembles a duck on stilts, has extraordinary wing power. The crested screamer has actually double spurs on Its wings and is a very awkward customer to tackle.

All the birds of prey use their talons as their principal weapons. The strength which lies in the talons of even a small hawk is almost incred-Ible. As for an engle, one has been known to drive its claws clean through the skull of a large toment into the brain, killing the animal instantly.

The pheasants are the only family of birds provided with spurs. Our domestic fowls are, of course, members of this genus, and it is in the game fowl that the spur is developed to the greatest perfection. These leg spurs resemble the horns of cattle, in that they have a bony core protected by a smooth sheath of horn.

The guinea-fowl, again, is singular in that it has a blunt horn upon its head which it uses as an offensive

"Practically unheard of on this side of the Atlantic, eluding most travelers, even escaping many of the seekers after the little-known places of Europe. Cherso neither is inaccessible nor unartractive," says a bulletin from the National Geographic society. dangles like a pendant in the Gulf of Quarnero, low hung from the neck of Flume. It is the Long Island of that port, its shore line rising 12 miles to the south of D'Annunzio's present stronghold. Its slender form extends to the southwest for 40 miles, though it never exceeds seven miles in width, and its area is somewhat more than twice that of the District of Columbia.

"Holding in mind this location, near the head of the Adriatic, in view of the tentative plans to make Flume a buffer state between Italy and Jugo-Slavia, the strategic possibilities of Cherso become apparent. Indeed, one may picture it as a potential Helgoland of the Adriatic.

"Cherso lies off the shores of the northern part of Dalmatia and the Croatian littgral, a region formerly known as Morlacchia. The Morlacchia shannel preserves this name, originating with the Slavic invaders of Dalmatia, who 'called the Latinized peoole they found there Vlachs, or Mavro-Vlachs-black Vlachs,' Thus the Slavs of this region have come to be known, by a corruption of this title. as Morinchs.

"In rural districts Morlacchian women retain their historic costume, which includes a kerchief for the head, many strands of beads, a waist band from which hang amulets and various trinkets, and, over a blue cloth gown, an apron of exquisite embroidered pattern. About her neck an unmarried girl wears a string of coins and rings which comprise her dowry. Formerly the men wore their hair in a plait, which their wives were expected to comb, adorn with ribbons and charms, and anoint with fats."







Himalayan Bear's Foolish Combat With Stone.

Like Too Many Members of the Human Race, the Animal Is a Victim of His Unconquerable Obstinacy.

Most wild animals, it appears, are stupid as well as greedy and obsti-But for sheer brainless obstinacy in the face of opposition there is, the best authorities contend, no animal like the Himalayan bear. If he finds a thing in his way he will always push it aside if he can, even though it would be easier to go around the obstacle.

The wily natives of India have obfrom it have contrived a trap to catch him. They select a tree with a spitable horizontal bough. At a point on the bough about ten or twelve feet from the fork they fasten a bait likely to attract the bear-honey, for example, or goat's flesh. Then from another bough above that one they suspend a heavy block of stone. The rope is so fastened to the upper bough that the stone hangs between the balt and the fork of the trees.

The bear scents the bait from a distance, comes to the tree, sees the food on the bough and climbs up the tree. Reaching the bough, he walks along it to get at the balt. But suddenly he notices the obstacle in his way and pushes it aside with his paw. The stone swings out of the way for a second; then it swings back and hits the bear on the paw. With a growl of irritation the bear pushes it aside violently. The stone swings away again; then it returns with greater force and hits the bear on the

With a snarl of rage the bear gives the stone a tremendous thrust and sends it up into the air in a wide curve. Then down comes the stone in a similar curve and hits the bear a thumping whack on the ribs.

Most animals would desist after that third blow; not so the hear. He is now in a perfectly mad rage, and a bear is a good boxer. He hits out with his paws, right and left and sends the stone hurtling forward in a still wider curve. Then, after a few seconds, the stone comes back and hits the bear a terrific "uppercut" on the

But alas! the hear never went to school and learned the law of gravity. Every blow he hits the stone is returned tenfold. And as the stone has po brains to be knocked out, it is the bear that gets knocked out.

Then the wily natives hiding below rush in with a net and throw it quickly over him. And that is how any "zoo" or menngerie gets its Himntayan bear.

Co-operative Law Library.

An interesting experiment in library co-operation is being worked out in the Long Beach public library, Long Beach, Cal. Forty or 50 attorneys of the city of Long Beach have sent law books from their private libraries to the public library for the purpose of forming a co-operative law library, Those contributing books in this way are entitled to take books from the cooperative library, keeping them for a period of five days, and the general public is allowed to consult the books at the library. The books are marked, "Lonned to the Long Beach Public Ltbrary." Some of the attorneys joining in the plan have each contributed as many as 200 books to the co-operative law library. It would seem that this iden might be worked out successfully in other lines of endeavor, thus making the resources found in books available to the largest possible number of people.





ly be made on the Railways Ice Company's plant here this fall, according to T. E. Reiff, local manager. However, these improvements have not been decided on and nothing definite can be announced.

The local plant, which has a daily capacity of seventy-five tons, and 2,500 tons storage capacity, is working overtime to meet the present demands; and in an emergency the daily output can be pushed up to 90 tons. In order to meet the additional demands of the citizens of Clavis, the plant is turning out 81 tons daily.

The Railways Ice Company has twelve plants scattered throughout the southwest, with a daily capacity of 25,000 tons and a storage capacity of 65,000 tons.

Most of the output of the local plant goes into the refrigerator cars of meat and fruit trains that pass through here, and only about eight or ten tons are delivered by wagon in Clovis each day.



If presented, Hoover, a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, probably would get all of Michigan's 30 votes on the first ballot-more than he obtained at any Time during the Republican convenaion by virtue of having carried the presidential primary in that state before he repudiated the Democratic marty.

Palmer's lead in instructed delegates was threatened because of the contest filed by Tom Watson over Georgia's 28 delegates-the only Democratic contest filed to date.

Owing to the two-thirds rule in Democratic convention, 728 votes are mecessary for a choice.
