PLANT MORE SHADE TREES

"More time and effort should be given to planting shade trees and other ornamentals," says Director Garcia of the Agricultural College.

Even though the growing of shade trees or other ornamental shrubs does not as a rule become a source of direct revenue, they certainly add to the comfort and beauty of the home and school grounds, avenues, driveways and parks, and also add to the value of the surrounding property.

It is true that if we were always to measure the value of shade trees in dollars and cents there is many a tree that would never be planted. It takes some care, work and money to grow a good shade tree successfully especially in some of our New Mexico localities where water is limited or very expensive, but man is a beauty loving animal and the effort is well worth while.

Spring is the best time to plant shade trees, but the practice of planting shade trees in the spring and forgetting them in summer usually results in either dead or stunted specimens the following spring. Trees are grateful plants and will respond and grow if given the right treatment, but one should not expect them to get along without care. Water is king in New Mexico and a reasonable amount of water is absolutely necessary to produce a satisfactory tree.

NORTH DAKOTA OBJECT LESSON

COMMISSIONER'S PROCEEDINGS

Proceedings of a special meeting of the Board of County Commissioners, held in the County Clerk's office on the 7th day of March, 1921 for the purpose of disposing of the matter of receiving all the county road equipment from the County road superintendent and any other matter that might come before the board at this time.

Those present were:
John D. Fleming, Chairman.
John A. LaRue, Commissioner.
J. W. Manning, Commissioner.
S. D. Denn, Sheriff.
George Roach, Assessor.
Daniel Boone, County Clerk.

Now in the matter of receiving the properties belonging to the county, held by the county Road Superintendent. It is hereby receipted for and the county road superintendent is hereby given until March 31st in which to make his final report and complete his record, and is hereby instructed to continue the work on a certain bridge in the Pleasant Hill district.

Now come Cash Ramey and T. W. Stricklin before the board with a petition signed by seventeen legal voters and residents of Curry county and from the precinct in question, and present the cause to be opened the section line between the sections described as follows: Beginning at the northeast quarter of section four in township four north of range thirty-

four east, N. M. P. M., Curry County, and running due south on section line east of section four a distance of twelve miles to the state highway road running from Clovis to Melrose, N. M., also that to be built at once a bridge across Running Water Draw at a point where the said road caused to be made would cross the draw, the principle object in asking for the above mentioned road would enable the farmers to haul their wheat to Havener instead of Clovis, and thereby save from ten to twenty miles of hauling.

The above request is considered and the county commissioners agree to meet on Sunday, March 12, 1921, and will go out and investigate the same, and will at their next meeting take final action on the same.

Now comes Robert Ham and others by petition and request, that a road be opened and established commencing at a point on the Abo Highway between the northwest corner of section 2 and the northeast corner of section 3, township 2 north, Range 31 east, N. M. P. M., Curry County, New Mexico. Thence south on said line to a point between the southwest corner of section 2 and southeast range 31 east, N. M. P. M., Curry County, New Mexico.

The above petition is hereby considered and it is agreed that the county commissioners will go and act as an investigating committee on Saturday March 12, 1921, and will take final action on the same at their regular meeting held on the first Monday in April.

In the matter brought to the attention of the board wherein \$33.00 worth of cement was used by District Number Seven and had not been paid, it is hereby ordered that the same remain unpaid until there was enough money in the above mentioned district to take care of same.

Board of devising some plan to take care of the county road business since the abolishing of the office of county road superintendent by recent legislation, giving all the powers and duties to the board of county commissioners; it was decided by the Board that in each and every voting precinct a road overseer shall be elected by the voters of said precinct, in a manner as they deem fit, by election or petition or in any other manner which would not incur expense; that the said road overseer be required to be a legal voter and property owner in said precinct and that he shall be required to give bond for the road equipment in his possession; that he be reasonably compensated for his services for the actual time put in in working the roads.

It is hereby ordered that the selection of the various road overseers shall be made, ready to be submitted for appointment by the board by April 4th, 1921.

The Board approves the county officers' salaries for the month of February, 1921.

The Court now adjourned until April 4, 1921.

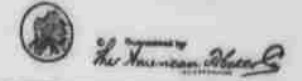

NEW MONTE CARLO IN CUBA?

Possibility That World-Famous Gambling Establishment May Be Located on the Island.

"The greatest gambling center in the world will be located in the western hemisphere if plans for 'palaces' in Cuba develop as given out," said Walter P. Harris of Havana. "Cuba is already beset with the gambling fever, and fortunes change hands there almost every day."

"Since the announcement of the prince of Monaco that he is preparing to close Monte Carlo, there have been extensive preparations for the establishment of great gambling palaces designed to attract the sporting element that now visits Monte Carlo to the 'Pearl of the Antilles.' Several villages have been surveyed with the view of locating this gambling center, but so far no definite decision has been reached."

"Gambling is already flourishing in Havana. The Casino de la Playa is a great gaudy temple of roulette, where wonderful dinners are served at less than cost. The profit to the house comes from the wheel. The men who take women to the Casino for dinner invariably back them at the wheel."

"The moratorium now in effect on the island has not affected the crowds at the Casino, because they are mostly composed of tourists, and the visitor is treated to the sight of a country, apparently bankrupt but gambling madly, where fortunes change hands overnight and the beggar of today may be the rich man of tomorrow."—Washington Post.

HUMAN FACE AS A BEACON

Radiometer Able to Record the "Shine" Thrown Off, at a Distance of Several Miles.

Novelists that speak of a face "lighting up" put down an actual truth that few of them are aware of or intend. One of the most delicate instruments in the world, a radiometer, records the "shine" of a human face, and can do it at a distance of several miles. So delicate is the instrument that it can detect and record the glimmer of a candle half a mile away, and if there were no atmospheric obstruction it could detect the same candle 10 miles away. The instrument consists of two thin glass disks, one polished and one blackened, suspended by a quartz thread in a vacuum. Waves of radiant energy striking this instrument disturb its balance, because the bright disk reflects them, while the black one absorbs them.

While the human face to the normal eye gives out no waves of radiant energy, the fact remains that a constant flow of energy is being thrown off, and these waves travel an unknown distance. Although the radiometer is a wonderful and delicate instrument, there is a thermal couple ten times as sensitive as the radiometer and it can detect the heat of a candle 60 miles distant.

Italy to the Rescue.

Visiting a school is a doubtful pleasure. But the woman had promised to call for a friend who is known as a "rooky" teacher. She waited until almost closing time before entering the school, a red brick, lumpy sort of building, not specially attractive. It looked as if she had come too soon. All eyes soon focussed on her instead of on the busy little teacher. The word "trio" was being explained to the children and volunteers were asked to stand and use the word in a sentence. And no one need expect to go home until the word was fully explained.

Little R. T. coaxed, "Come now, tell me just one little story with 'trio' in it."
Timidly, swarthy little Giuseppe raised his hand. His naturally happy face was strained in his effort to help. Then flashed a bright smile at the woman and shouted cheerfully:
"It is nearly trio clock."—New York Sun.

Go to Class by Underground Tunnels.

An underground tunnel system that has all the fascination of the catacombs, although it serves the less dramatic function of conveying heating pipes, is one of the chief attractions at Wellesley college.

It has just been completed and undergraduates are being permitted to ramble around under the 300-acre campus.

The tunnels are six feet high and wide enough for comfortable walking. Girls have found that no matter how cold the weather, it is a good plan to abandon coats when taking this long adventure. The temperature from the heating pipes is about that of a Turkish bath.

This Oil May Cure Leprosy.

The use of Chaulmoogra oil has been known for some time to have some virtue in the treatment of leprosy, and recently it has been discovered that there are a great many points of similarity between the genus of leprosy and those of tuberculosis. This has led to some government experiments in the direction of combating tuberculosis which will be conducted at Hawaii.

Iron Ore From the Alps.

A new iron ore field has been discovered in Switzerland which is estimated to contain 47,000,000 tons, which will assure to Switzerland, at present consumption rate, sufficient iron ore to last for 45 years. The federal council suggests a provision by the government of 1,200,000 francs upon condition that a total capital of 4,000,000 francs is raised for exploitation.

HAD TOUCH OF COMIC OPERA

Chinese Armies Stopped Fighting to Let United States Vessel Pass Down the River.

Ensign William H. Galbraith, navigating officer of the United States destroyer Hart, attached to the United States Asiatic squadron in Chinese waters, in a letter tells of the intensified work placed on the hands of the vessels of the squadron in the Far East by the operations of the Chinese civil war now in progress between the Pekingese and the Cantonese sections of the nation. When armies representing these hostile sections approach cities in which American citizens are in business there is much excitement on the part of the Americans and they call urgently for the protection of the fleet, says the Columbus Dispatch.

Recently the Hart received a radio-gram call from an officer of a United States merchant vessel, stating that his vessel 50 miles up one of the Chinese rivers was being detained. The captain was anxious to put to sea, and would the Hart see that it was permitted to depart? The Hart got on the job at once and found when the scene was reached that there was no governmental authority holding the United States ship up, but the Cantonese army was drawn up on one side of the river and the Pekingese on the other and a battle was in progress, with the river, through which the United States ship must pass, between them. Naturally the captain did not fancy risking the shots that were passing across the channel. The respective commanders kindly suspended the fighting until the merchant vessel had passed.

Discoverer of Vulcanized Rubber Was at One Time Compelled to Beg Money for Bread.

Charles Goodyear, who became a millionaire and was the inventor of vulcanized rubber as well as many other forms of the tree sap products, at one time was forced to beg for \$5 to keep him from starving. In 1824 he discovered that rubber could be vulcanized. It was an accident. He attempted to remove some bronze dust from a bit of rubber cloth, and after trying several chemicals tried aqua fortis, a chemical largely composed of sulphuric acid. It failed also, and he threw the cloth away. A few days later he picked it up by chance, and noted the spot rubbed by the aqua fortis had hardened and would stand a degree of heat that would have melted it in its former state.

He applied his discovery, and soon was wearing rubber shoes, coats, hats and other garments, and had a small fortune by the right of his discovery. But a year passed, and his goods were discredited and returned, rotting and broken. He was ruined. He started in again to discover a method that would vulcanize the rubber, and for ten years he kept at it, his life a long misery of hunger and cold and crushing poverty. His success came suddenly and soon he was rich beyond his wildest dreams.

Wonderful Poison Gases.

Canned, solidified, poison gas, which is claimed to be absolutely foolproof and mobile, has been perfected for use by the American soldier, according to Popular Mechanics Magazine. That two studies—defensive and offensive gas research—go hand in hand already has been demonstrated, for, in addition to the development of new forms of gas, army experts at the Edgewood (Md.) arsenal, have had to improve the gas masks to make them effective against some of the new gases brought into existence there. In technical military progress, every new weapon means a call upon the armorer for a new defense. As a result, this country today has not only gases which surpass anything used during the World war, but a mask which, in recent tests was worn 24 hours a day for a week, except at mealtime, without any discomfort whatever. Breathing was normal, speaking was simple, and it kept out all the gases thus far known.

Women Smokers "Under Cover."

The mystery of where women cigarette smokers obtain their supply is solved, in part at least, by an uptown druggist, who was asked why nearly all such stores keep their tobacco stands in inconspicuous places, says the New York Sun. He said the reason for doing so is because the druggists cater to women smokers, and this class is rather timid about purchasing in the open. The women, it seems prefer to glide back to some out-of-the-way corner, where nobody will see them. Of course, there are exceptions.

PREPARING TURF FOR FUEL

New Method, Said to Have Originated in Russia, May Result in Relieving Shortage.

A new method of drying turf to relieve the serious fuel shortage in Finland has been put in operation in various Scandinavian countries. The new method was invented by engineers working under orders from the Russian soviet government, to find a more labor-saving method of preparing turf as fuel for the great central power station near Moscow, the process being made known in Finland through an escaping engineer. The fundamental principle of the process is quite simple. The raw turf in the swamp, by a powerful jet of water under a pressure of 20 atmospheres, is freed from all old roots and changed to this mud. This is pumped out on a drying field and spread in layers. When sufficiently dry it is cut into bricks of uniform size by means of a tractor. The turf pump is constructed like an ordinary water turbine, is reversible with aid of electric motor, is equipped with a cutting apparatus which completes the work of the water jet, and can be raised or lowered as the surface of the mud varies. The entire equipment is mounted on a car which can be pushed forward or backward on rails along the line of work.—Scientific American.

Convicted by the Bible.

A local man charged with not having the tail light burning on his automobile was arraigned before the mayor, who assessed a fine of \$3.

The accused protested, said it was a poor law under which he was fined and that he did not think it would hold water in court.

The mayor declared any law founded on the Bible was good enough for him. The defendant said he couldn't see where a tail light had anything to do with the Bible. The mayor looked pityingly at the accused, and said:

"Do you remember the tale about the ten virgins, five of whom had lights and five of whom didn't? Well, if you do, you will remember that the Lord wouldn't have anything to do with the five without lights, and neither will this court."

Cotton Stalks Will Furnish Paper.

The possibilities of cotton stalks as a source of paper have long been suspected and experiments in this direction have been made, but for one reason or another it has never proved quite practical.

The nearest approach to success has been made recently, and it is announced that there is a plant at Greenwood, Mass., where 50 tons of paper are made every day from three times that amount of stalk.

Certain thin tubular fiber in the pulp will make excellent cellulose for durable papers. It is strong and flexible. If a quarter of the annual supply of the cotton stalks of the South were put to this use each year there would be no need of a paper shortage in this country.

Reservation for Aborigines.

The commonwealth of Australia has taken steps for the preservation of the aborigines of that country and has assigned a tract of public lands in the northern territories as reservation for the tribes. It includes the Mann and Peterson ranges and practically the whole of Lake Amundson. The governments of South and Western Australia have set aside adjoining areas for the purpose of this reservation.

BEWILDERING TO THE MIND

Everyday Measurements of Science That Are Almost Beyond Comprehension of the Layman.

One great difficulty in the study of astronomy is to comprehend the immensity of the distances and sizes involved. For instance, we can form no conception of the size or distance of the sun.

Suppose there was a spherical shell of the diameter of the sun. Suppose a great genie should drop into this shell, every second, night and day, a ball the size of the earth. How long would it take to fill the shell? Would it take an hour, a day, or a week? In fact, it would take two weeks, and when full the shell would contain more than 1,000,000 earths.

The distance to the sun is 93,000,000 miles. How long would it take a cannon ball to reach the sun, if shot from the earth, and continued on its course at a uniform velocity? In order not to underestimate the distance, some might say a year. In fact it would take 1,000,000 earths.

Astronomically speaking, the above distance is very short. The sun is our nearest star. Strain the imagination by trying to comprehend the velocity of light which would pass seven times around the earth in one second of time. Now stagger the brain by trying to think of stars, so remote from us that a million years are required for their light to cross the enormous abyss that separates them from us. Think of it! When that ray of light, which now enters the eye, started on its course, perhaps there was no life on this earth.—John Candee Dean in the Indianapolis News.

REFUSED HAND OF SULTAN

Offer of Marriage by Ruler of Sulu Was Turned Down by Alice Roosevelt.

The Moro is not all bad. He has his good points. There has never been a case where a Moro has murdered an American woman, and there are many American women in Moroland. This abstinence, however, is not due to Moro chivalry, but to the fact that in the Moro thought women have no souls.

Not that the believed soullessness of the sex keeps the Moro from being a ladies' man. In fact, he is inclined to be very gallant. The famous visit of the Taft party, accompanied by the then Miss Alice Roosevelt, some years ago (and long to be remembered in the Philippines), was attended by a characteristic exhibition of Moro gallantry. When this party visited Jolo—no trip to the islands would be complete without visiting this picturesque island—his royal highness, the sultan of Sulu, immediately offered his hand in marriage to the daughter of the President. He addressed her as the American princess, and the name of Princess Alice still clings to her in the Philippines. The fact that his highness already had a couple of dozen wives scattered around the town was no deterrent in case of a Mohammedan monarch.

Encouraging the Hen.

The modern method of increasing the quantity of eggs that may be obtained from hens is turning on electric lights in their pens in the middle of the night, thereby awakening them, to the end that they eat an extra meal and thus approach closer than ever before the ideal of laying an egg a day, week after week. One can not but think that this lengthening of the working day for hens is a device of the same genius who discovered that there was no need of arising at dawn to feed the poultry. He simply waited until after the henyard denizens had gone to roost, and then scattered their morning meal. The hens found their breakfast waiting for them in the morning, while the ingenious one arose and went about the affairs of the day only when he felt so inclined. No chancier called him to work.

"Automobile" Street Car.

Mechanical arrangement similar in many respects to that of an automobile is the distinguishing feature of a new form of gasoline-driven interurban car described in Popular Mechanics Magazine. Though the body, seating 35 passengers, is like that of a standard modern street car, there is a long hood extending in front, in which the 50-horsepower engine is mounted. An auto-type gear shift is provided, and a shaft transmits the power to the rear wheels. Air brakes, electric lights, and a hot water heating plant are other details of the equipment. The car makes a round trip of 40 miles in a little more than two and one-half hours, consuming about five and one-half gallons of gasoline, or one gallon to seven miles.

The "Long Circuit" advertisement is that which appeals indirectly. It is that variety of advertisement which brings the most success to the advertiser. The biggest advertisers use it and they get results. If they did not they would not continue to advertise.

Newspaper advertising is a distinct economy. The merchant who sends out thousands of circular letters thinks he is economizing. He is wasting money. Here are the reasons:—In the first place the recipient of a circular letter never reads more than one or two lines, on the average. Then the letter goes into the waste basket. The average circular letter costs the merchant over three cents, counting the cost of paper, envelopes, labor and a two cent stamp. One thousand of them will cost him about \$35.00.

The same advertisement in his local newspaper, in the same space, far better displayed, would cost him much less, and the chances of its being read and producing results are about fifty per cent greater. People throw away circular letters, but they never throw away a newspaper until they have read it. If you know how to write your ad, or will let someone write it that does know how, it will be read along with the rest of the paper. If advertising don't bring you results it is your own fault.

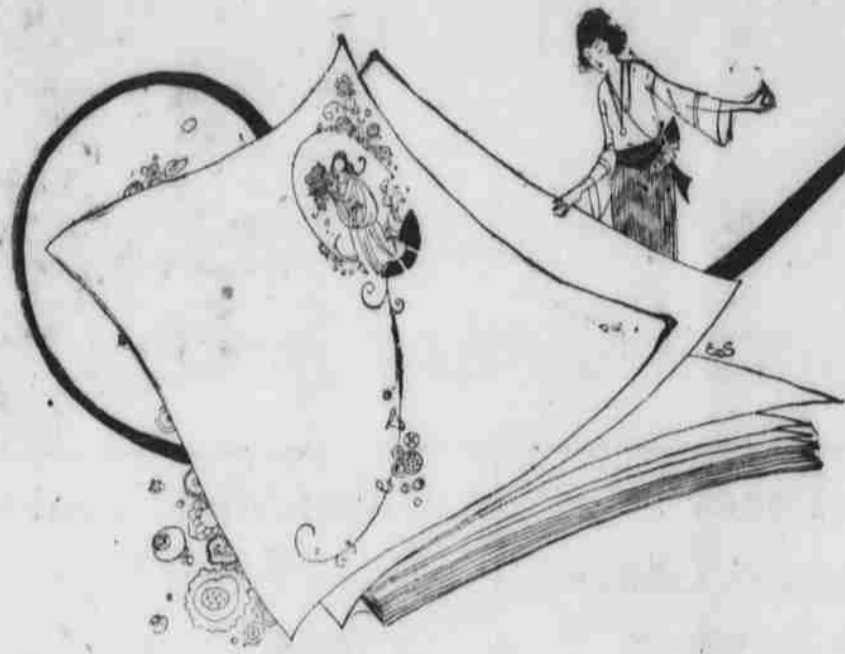

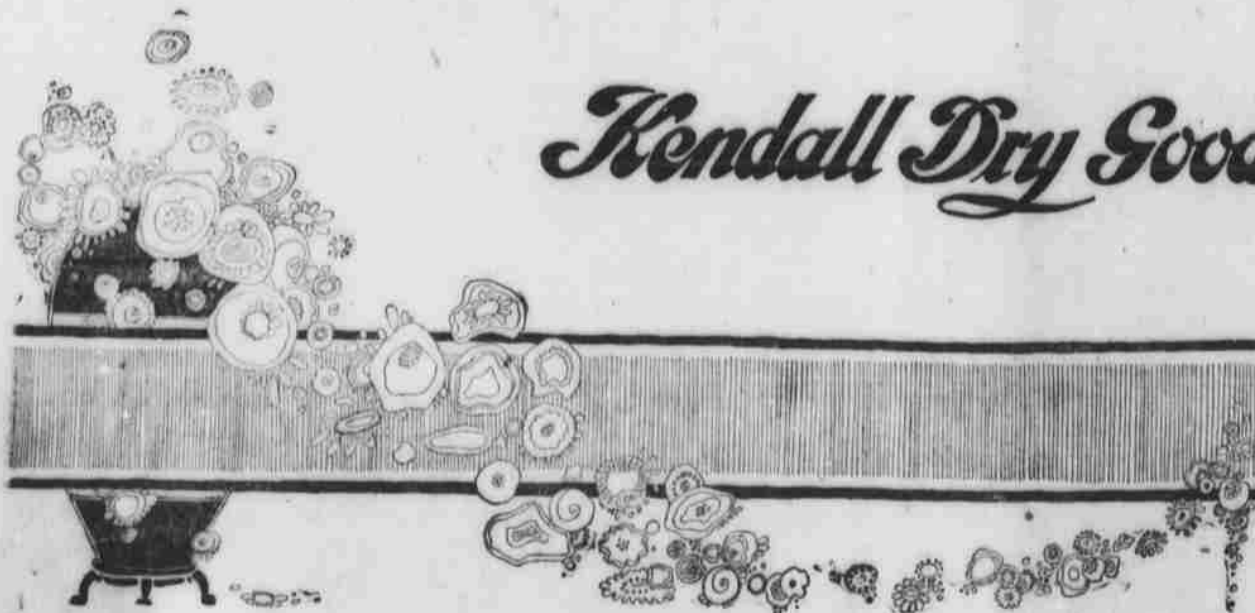

Local Five Wins Pecos Valley Championship. Will Attend State Tournament to be Held at State College March 17th, 18th, and 19th.

In the presence of the largest crowd of basketball fans of the year, the Clovis High School quintet defeated Amarillo High School last Saturday night 38-21. The decisive defeat of Amarillo, one of the strongest teams in the Panhandle, not only gives Clovis a claim to the championship of the Panhandle but also makes her show up strong as a contender for state honors, having in addition won the championship of the Pecos Valley.

Although Clovis has not played all the teams in the Valley, yet the five that she has defeated were able to win over the teams in the southern and western parts giving Clovis the largest percentage of games won with major teams. The local five has defeated Roswell twice which in turn won over Fort Sumner by a decisive score. Fort Sumner has the only team showing any class other than Roswell despite the fact that Hagerman defeated Roswell early in the season by one point. Artesia and Carlsbad are out of the race while both Clovis and Fort Sumner will over Portales. Santa Rosa has been defeated twice by Clovis and broke even with Fort Sumner.

For the local five Foreman and Kent Hunt have been largely responsible for the successful season. They were both members of last year's squad, Foreman being one of the members of the state championship team while Hunt was general utility man, playing any position on the team as needed. Both have been consistent scorers and play the floor well. Foreman has had things almost his own way at center in practically every game and of the centers seen in action this year should easily make the all-state team for that position. Hunt has been the pivot of the team at floor work and runs Foreman a close race for the total points scored despite the fact that he was not in the lineup of one game on account of illness. For the rest of the team all were inexperienced, this being their first year at basketball. For the guards, Jones and Anderson have handled the safety end of the court in an admirable manner. Jones always pleases the fans and disappoints his opponents. What he lacked in size he made up in speed and fight. Anderson has been the right man in the right place, discovering his opponents and occasionally slipping down the court and making a basket. Early in the season Sledge was forced out of the game on account of an injured knee. Glen Hunt stepped into the vacancy and played the position in a satisfactory manner. Other basket tossers who have been showing up fine are Jerry Miser, Billy Green, Tom Frost and the Freshman-Sophomore team, all of whom will be heard from in basketball next year.

An interesting feature of this year's basketball season has been the playing of the Freshman-Sophomore team. They have played four games with outside schools winning three and losing the fourth to the Amarillo team consisting of the Amarillo coach and four of the regular squad. The game was an aftermath of the main contest on Saturday night. The schedule of the first team for

the year with major teams follows: Clovis 42, Santa Rosa 25; at Santa Rosa.

Clovis 15, Portales 2; at Portales. Clovis 38, Santa Rosa 21; at Clovis. Clovis 19, Albuquerque 23, at Albuquerque.

Clovis 20, Roswell 15; at Clovis. Clovis 39, Portales 21; at Clovis. Clovis 38, Amarillo 21; at Clovis.

An interesting comparison of the team this year with the championship team of last year, before departing for the tournament, may be found in the per cent that the total score of the opponents for the season bear to the total score of the home team. The per cent that the opponents were able to score on last year's team was 50%. On the team of this year, not including the minor games 58%; including the minor games it is 55%.

According to the dope the local five, if they play true to form, should give the other teams of the state a lively run for the championship.

However, all dope may be upset owing to the change of the rules this year permitting a player to be put back into the game after again being taken out. Under this rule a whole team can be taken out for rest, as in the Albuquerque game, and be run in at a critical point of the game with decisive results. This rule puts the teams of the schools located at a long distance from the tournament at a great disadvantage on account of the great expense incurred in taking more than six men.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That, we, the undersigned, whose names are subscribed hereto, do, by virtue of the laws of the State of New Mexico, hereby associate and form ourselves, our successors and assigns into a corporation under the following articles of incorporation, to-wit:

The name of this corporation shall be "Clovis Mill and Elevator Company."

The location of its principal office in this state, and the principal place of business of said corporation shall be at Clovis, New Mexico, at which place the corporation shall keep and maintain an office for the transaction of business, and that W. The objects and purposes for which said corporation is formed and the powers which it shall possess, in addition to the general powers conferred upon it by law, shall be to own, hold, operate, buy and sell flour, meal, shorts, bran, hay and all products made from grain; and all products produced on the farm, and poultry, eggs and all animals raised and produced on the farm, or range, and corn, wheat, oats, sudan, cane, kaffir and maize, and all kinds of grain and seeds; to buy, own, hold, and sell and transfer real estate and to execute mortgages on real estate to secure loans of money; to borrow money and to execute security for same; to loan money and to take security of all kinds for same; to discount and trade in commercial paper, bonds, notes, judgments and choses in action of all kinds; and to buy, own, hold, and sell buildings of all kinds and lease same; to own, hold, operate and construct and sell kinds and classes of mills, elevators and storage plants, and to own, hold, operate and conduct a general wholesale and retail mercantile business; to maintain, own, hold and operate, a general bookkeeping business, covering any one or all of the classes of business herein enumerated.

GREEN FEEDS ARE ESSENTIAL

Good Varieties Are Sprouted Oats, Alfalfa Meal, Clover Hay, Cabbages and Mangel Beets.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Green feeds should be supplied to hens confined in small yards, and, indeed, to all hens during the winter. Free range or large yards kept in grass furnish ideal conditions for green feed. Smaller yards should be divided into two parts, used alternately, planting the vacant section two or three times yearly with a quick-growing green crop, such as rape, oats, wheat, rye, or barley. This method furnishes green feed and helps to keep the yards sweet and clean, which is an important consideration, poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture say.

Good varieties of green feeds are sprouted oats, alfalfa meal, chopped alfalfa and clover hay, cabbages and mangel beets. In ordinary cellars cabbages do not keep as well as mangel beets, and should be used up first. Cabbages may be hung in the poultry house; the beets are usually split and stuck on a nail on the side wall of the pen about a foot above the floor. Yereables that have been frozen can be thawed out and fed to fowls, but do not keep well after thawing. Clover and alfalfa may be fed as hay, cut into one-quarter or one-half-inch lengths, or they may be in the form of meal.

Oats for sprouting are soaked overnight in water and spread out from one to one and one-half inches thick on trays having perforated bottoms, and put into an oat sprouter. Stir the oats daily until the roots are matted together. Keep the oats moist by watering them once a day. Artificial heat should be supplied in cool weather. Use a good grade of oats and allow a square inch of sprouted-out surface for each hen daily, feeding these sprouted oats on the floor of the poultry house or in the yard. Feed at any time after the sprouts are well started, which usually takes from five to

seven days. Keep the sprouter clean and spray it occasionally with disinfectant to prevent the growth of mold spores.

Keep oyster shell and grit before the hens all the time. These substances are an inexpensive but quite necessary part of the ration. Hens will eat about two pounds of oyster shell and about one pound of grit each in a year.

WINTER CROWDING IS ERROR

Big Mistake to Put Too Many Hens and Pullets Together in One House in Cold Weather.

A good many farm poultry raisers make the mistake of housing too many hens and pullets together during cold weather. Hens will lay as well if yarded and well cared for as if on free range; but they must not be crowded when they are confined. If the hens are being fed and forced for eggs alone, get them into winter quarters in their pens early in the fall and do not change them about after they have been located. Introducing new hens into the laying pens always causes more or less confusion, and this decreases the number of eggs laid.

GREEN FEED OF IMPORTANCE

Not Only Assists to Supply Necessary Amount of Vitamins but Also Acts as Regulator.

With hens being confined to the pens it is important that plenty of green food should be given. Not only does it help to give the required amount of vitamins but it also is beneficial as a regulator. The nearer one makes the hens feel that they still have spring conditions, the better egg production can be expected. Cabbages, mangels, chopped and steeped alfalfa, and such like make fine food for fowls.

Farm Bureau Notes

Insects Damaging Wheat.

Many reports of the green bug affecting the wheat in Curry County have been reported. A number of fields were examined in which the English grain louse was found, but the green bug is the one that does the most serious damage. The English grain louse is the largest of the two

insects, being about one-tenth inch long, and having the black antennae as long or longer than the body. They are of a yellowish-green color, and both winged and wingless individuals. The green bug ranges from one-twenty-fifth to one-fourteenth inch long. It is of the same general color as the English grain louse with a medium line darker than the rest of the body. They have black eyes and most of the antennae are black. The winged female is slightly larger than the wingless, but of the same general color. Both the English grain louse and the green bug give birth to live

young, the English grain louse bearing from forty to fifty each, which become full grown in ten days to two weeks, and then reproduce young in the same manner. The green bug lives over the winter in the egg stage. The aphids hatching from the eggs are all female, which give birth to live young, no males occurring during the summer.

During her life, which is about a month, the female will give birth to fifty or sixty, the young which begin to give birth when about seven days old. It is readily seen that the green bug in this way multiplies very fast, and may do great damage to the grain crops.

For the control of the green bug we are almost entirely dependent on their natural enemies, but the green bugs will multiply during a mild winter, while the enemies are not able to work. In this way the green bugs reach large numbers and do their damage.

Among the natural enemies of the green bug is a tiny wasp-like insect that deposits eggs in the green bugs, the grub hatching from the egg and feeding internally on the bug and destroying it. Other natural enemies are the lady beetle and a fly-like insect.

There is very little that can be effective in controlling the green bugs. The most important methods are preventative. The green bugs live during the latter part of the season on volunteer oats and wheat until the early sown grain is grown. The destruction of all volunteer grain, especially volunteer oats, will prevent the green bug from living through the late summer and early fall season.

Where small spots of grain are injured, the grain, infested may be covered with straw and burned, plowed under or sprayed with a fifteen per cent solution of kerosene emulsion.

Much damage is reported from the green bug in the great wheat producing sections of Texas, and serious early infestation in the south commonly leads to infestation farther north as the season progresses.

Any farmer having infestation of green bugs on small areas should destroy them as quickly as possible by one of the above methods. However, where infestation is general on large areas, we are hoping that conditions will be favorable to the growth of the enemies of the green bugs, and thus prevent serious damage. opens will make conditions favorable for the reducing of the green bugs. The continuation of mild winter weather favors multiplication of the green bugs and permits it to become more numerous than its parasitic enemies are able to hold in check. It is hoped that the weather and parasitic enemies will keep the green bugs down and prevent damage.

Test Seed Before Planting.

Poor seed is a source of much sorrow in farming. The seed may be weak and produce spindling worthless plants; the alfalfa may be a non-leucous weed, trash or any other of various miscellaneous fillers; or the seed may not germinate at all.

One sample of alfalfa seed recently sent to the New Mexico Agricultural College for a test appeared to be of excellent quality. It had a fancy price attached to it, and yet tested only 44 per cent. This seed was priced at 45c per pound, but according to the germination test was actually costing \$1.02 per pound of vital seed.

There are many methods used to test seed. For small seed like alfalfa or the grasses, a very satisfactory method is to use two moistened blotters placed between two plates. Count out 100 seed and place them between two clean blotters that have been thoroughly moistened with boiling water, taking care that no two seeds touch each other. Place the blotters in a plate and cover with another inverted plate. The seed should be kept moist and at a uniform temperature of about 70 degrees for a period of ten days, after which all the strong germinated seed may be counted out.

Don't waste feed because it is cheap. Conserve.

Farm Loan Act Valid.

The Supreme Court of the United States handed down a decision on February 28th holding that the Federal Farm Loan Act is constitutional. In sustaining the decision dismissing the injunction proceedings, the Supreme Court held that Congress had full authority to exempt from taxation the bonds of the farm loan banks. One year ago the Federal loan board reported that 75,384 farmers had borrowed \$182,897,000, and that applications from 179,734 other farmers were then pending for loans totaling \$471,000,000. The Federal Farm Loan Board may now proceed to function, with the result that agriculture again has access to credit resources which

should prove of marked assistance during these trying times.

Traffic Conference.

Monday, March 14th, promises to be another red letter day in American agriculture. At 10 a. m. on that day the eagerly awaited Traffic Conference will convene in the Congress Hotel, Chicago. The American Farm Bureau Federation has joined with a number of other farm organizations and with shippers' leagues, state of fields, and various interests vitally affected by the transportation problem in issuing the call.

SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS.

When a small portion of fowl has been left from a roast which has appeared both hot and cold, croquettes are suggested.



Rice and Chicken Croquettes.—Remove all the choice bits of meat from the bones and cut them in small pieces. Any quantity not exceeding a cupful may be used. For more chicken or turkey more rice will be needed. Cover the bones with cold water and heat slowly to the boiling point. After simmering an hour add one or two outside stalks of celery, an onion cut in slices, a small portion of carrot, also sliced, and let cook half an hour longer. Drain off the liquid. Beat three-fourths of a cupful of rice to the boiling point in a quantity of cold water. After boiling two minutes drain, rinse in cold water and set to cook in three cupfuls of broth. When the rice is tender cook one-fourth of a cupful of flour, half a teaspoonful each of salt and paprika in one-half cupful of butter. Add one cupful of the broth taken from the rice if it is not absorbed and stir until boiling, then stir in the chicken and the rice and any additional seasonings needed. Let stand until cooled a little, then shape in cylinders. Roll in soft bread-crumbs, beaten egg diluted with milk or water and again in crumbs and fry in deep fat. Serve with a sauce made of the chicken broth and cream or tomato puree, half and half.

Roquefort Salad Dressing.—Cream two ounces of Roquefort cheese, using a wooden spoon. Gradually beat in four to six tablespoonfuls of olive oil, two to three tablespoonfuls of vinegar and a scant half-teaspoonful each of salt and paprika. Cream may be used to replace the oil, all or in part.

Potato and Ham Croquettes.—Take one cupful of minced ham, add two eggs, stir over the heat until the egg is just set, cool, make into balls, cover with mashed potato. Roll in fine dry crumbs, then in egg white thinned with a little cold water, then in crumbs again. Fry in deep fat.
