



NO OPERATION IS NECESSARY

DOCTORS HOLD THAT OPERATION IS UNNECESSARY FOR PATIENT.

MRS. HARDING BETTER

WIFE OF PRESIDENT PASSES CRISIS AND RECOVERY ASSURED.

Washington.-The condition of Mrs. Harding was such that an official bulletin issued, stated that "unless unforeseen exacerbations arise, all consultants feel that the immediate crisis of the case has been passed."

This statement was made after confidence had been expressed by attending physicians as her condition continued to improve, that the crisis had

Definite announcement was made that no operation would be necessary

Dr. Charles Mayo of Rochester, Minn., who arrived in Washington to consult with Brig. Gen. C. E. Sawyer, White House physician, and others on the surgical phase of the case, left for home and Dr. Carl W. Sawyer also left Washington. Dr. John M. T. Finney, John Hopkins University specialst, who participated in consultations, already had returned to Baltimore, leaving Dr. C. E. Sawyer, Dr. George T. Harding, Jr., of Columbus, the President's brother, and Dr. Joel T. Boone, medical officer of the Mayflower, the presidential yacht, in attendance at the bedside

Dr. Sawyer reported that Mrs. Harding was taking liquid nourishment, was regaining strength and was exceedingly cheerful.

Asked by 'newspaper men whether there was any significance to the statement in the bulletin that no operation would be performed at present, Dr. Sawyer said the question of an operation in the future would be "entirely up to Mrs. Harding." Physicians in attendance, he added, had not reached a conclusion as to whether one was imperative.

He added that the "real crisis" in the disear was passed.

Those who have been near the bedside of the President's wife continued to praise her highly for the pluck and fortitude she had shown.

"The doctors, of course, deserve some credit." said Dr. Sawyer, "but Mrs. Harding, to a large extent, is responsible herself for the remarkable way she has pulled through a desperate illness. She has been a wonderful patient-acceding readily and cheerfully to every suggestion."

Mrs. Harding's condition wa serious that persons other than members of the household were not permitted to visit her bedside.

Dr. Sawyer said the President had borne up under it remarkably. Assurance from his physician that his wife not, only had passed the crisis, but continued to improve, was the source of great relief.

Senator Lodge Renominated.

Chicago. - Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts has been re nominated and Senator Charles E. Townsend of Michigan is victorious, on the face of the returns from those states. Senator Townsend, who has been forced to defend himself against charges of supporting Senator New berry during a hot campaign, has maintained a substantial lead over his nearest opponent, Herbert F. Baker. In Massachusetts, Senator Lodge maintained nearly a three-to-one lead over Joseph Walker, who had made an active campaign against the Republican incumbent.

Father Slays Two Girls. Kansas City, Mo.-After hours of se ere grilling at police headquarters Tony Dinello, 47 years old, broke down and confessed, according to authorities, that he took both of his daughters to the bank of the Missouri river near here, beat them on the head with a hammer and threw their bodies into the water. The victims were Flora Dinello, 11, and Helen Dinello, 14, both of whose bodies were found floating in the river.

U. S. Sells Wooden Ships.

Washington.-The great fleet of cooden vessels, conceived during the war as a means of rapidly bridging the Atlantic, was knocked down at a private competitive sale to George D. Prev of San Francisco. The price-\$750,000 for 226 vessels, all but ten of he entire wood of the fleets-was considered a bargain as evidenced by the spirited bidding which rapidly ran the offers from a first bid of \$406,000 to \$750,000, which was accepted by Chairuan Lasker

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

Reports reaching Carrixizo state that Miguel Montoya, a storekeeper at Rabenton, was shot and killed on the streets of the town.

Figures recently compiled by the city treasurer shows that Albuquerque has spent over half a million on its paving since the year 1919.

Due to the shortage of coal at the big furnaces at Pueblo, Colo., manganese operations at the Boston Hill mines near Silver City have been stopped.

The recovery of \$149,000 worth of notes and bonds, issued by the defunc Bank of Phoenix to creditor banks in Los Angeles, by the payment of \$21,000 in cash, has been announced by Andrew Baumert, Jr., receiver.

F. J. Kasper of Swink, Colo., chief agriculturist for the Holly Sugar Cor poration, recommended at a meeting of business men at Las Cruces that sugar beet demonstration planting be continued in the Mesilia Valley next sea-

Plans are being made for the excavation of the Aztec ruins south of Farmington, part of the work to be done by the University of Denver. An auto road will be made to the ruins and sixteen men and two teams will be used in the work.

F. C. Sganzini, Jr., who was given a hearing in the court of Judge Schauer at Gallup, N. M., was assessed a fine of \$100 and costs and sentenced to serve ninety days in the county jail, but the jail sentence was suspended The charge of carrying a deadly weapon was filed by the district attorney.

Police on both sides of the international line at Nogales are searching for Juan N. Beltram, city treasurer of Nogales, Sonora, who is reported to have disappeared following the recent discovery of an alleged shortage of \$1,-492.25 in his accounts. It was reported in the Sonora town that the shortage was believed to be as high as \$20,

The tax commission will follow District Judge Harry P. Owen's decision in regard to teachers' pay, J. E. Saint, tax commission chairman, stated when the commission took up the Torrance county school budget. Under the decision the highest pay that can be given a teacher in one, two or three-room rural school is \$110 a month for mine months.

The gold strike reported from the United Verde Extension mine, near Jerome, Ariz., recently, continues to be a topic of interest in the Verde district. While no statement of the extent of the find has been given out as yet, it is practically certain, it is said, that the deposit will prove of great value, with the ore growing richer as the drift is advanced.


QUICK STROKE WINS FAME FOR W. HOOVER

Duluth Sculling Marvel Is Attracting Much Attention.

Experts Are Agreed That Marvelous Speed Displayed by New Champion Is Due to His Peculiar Stroke -Style Original.

Walter Hoover, the Duluth sculling narvel, whose phenomenal rise to the oinnacle of boatsmanship has attracted international attention, achieved his coveted position by virtue of a particular style of rowing which aspirants to his title may have considerable dificulty in mastering.

Boating experts are agreed that the marvelous speed of the new world's champion as displayed in the English Henley regatta is due to his peculiar stroke, a short, swift mevement which,

in actual test during the Thames competition, produced as high as 58 complete strokes a minute. Nothing in the annals of aquatic sports reveals that any other follower of the sculls was capable of such execution, and, admittedly, there were none at the English water sweepstakes who were even closely matched with the Duluth lad in point of technique.

Hoover's masterly style is selforiginated, according to those who have watched him through his long and arduous training since he left his employment as an engineer in the old home town to seek the sculling championship of the world, and even the title holder himself is not wholly able to define or explain the creation of

During his first six years' connection with the Duluth Boat club Hoover was uncertain as to his particular ability with the oars and he was doubtful in what division his efforts would eventually place him, but during that time he followed closely his own set rules for physical training.

Hoover did his first rowing in 1913, and in the nine years' interim before he won the world's title he guarded his physical self religiously. During this time he was a woodsman, factory worker, soldier on the Mexican border student and engineer. When he finally decided upon a sculling career in 1921 he had every physical advantage, and this, according to experts, enabled him to develop his style to perfection and triumph over the best scullers in the world.

WORLD WHEAT CROPS SHOET.

igures for United States Show Slight Decline in Year.

Washington.—The world's wheat roduction this year will be less than was last year, but considerably reater than the pre-war average rding to estimates made public by he Department of Agriculture. Actuestimates and condition reports om reporting countries indicate a ield this year of 3,019,526,000 bushels, mpared with the production last ear of 3,059,596,000, and the 1909-18 verage of 2,890,353,000 bushels.

Reports from all sources regarding ussia said crop conditions were fav rable and would feed the nation this ear, eliminating the need of importd wheat. Nearly all European coun ies, however, reported decreases, the otal European production being estinated at 1,100,991,000 bushels, co ared with 1,239,256,000 in 1921 and he pre-war average of 1,275,157,000. ritish India and Japan are expected produce 392,847,000 bushels, comred with 282,094,000 last year and he pre-war average of 375,827,000.

GROW BUCKWHEAT

Will Survive and Give Fair Return on Soils Too Thin for Other Crops.

Bare Must Be Exercised in Applying Material, as Grop is Subject to Lodging in Seasons of Abundant Rainfall.

Since buckwheat is considered a "poor land" crop, it will survive and often give a fair return on land too poor for corn, oats and clover, many farmers have discovered.

Buckwheat requires considerable nitrogen for its maximum growth. Even though its period of growth comes at the season when the soil is furnishing available nitrogen most rapidly, still on very poor soils a light application

of farm manure or a little nitrogenous fertilizer is descrable. Care is necessary in supplying nitrogenous material to buckwheat, however, as the crop is subject to lodging, particularly in seasons of abundant rainfall.

Phosphoric Acid Needed. Like the true cereals, buckwheat rephoric acid. This is particularly true in New York, since the soils of the buckwheat section are universally deficient in phosphorus. It also seems to respond to potash. This is to be expected, since the poorest soils have been drained of their available potash. While the total supply of potash is adequate, soils seeded to buckwheat are often those which have not been well treated in the past, and as a result not only has the organic matter been depleted, but at the same time the rate at which the potash becomes Lime is not needed, since buckwheat is tolerant of soil acidity.

To Fertilize This Season. Taking all of these factors into consideration as well as fertilizer costs, the prime essential in the fertilization of buckwheat this season is an application of 200 to 400 pounds to the acre of acid phosphate, the soils workers at the New York State College of Agriculture say. On very thin soils, where manure is not available, in addition to the acid prosphate 50 to 100 pounds of nitrate of soda or sulphate of ammonia, and 25 to 50 pounds of nuriate of potash may be used.

CONSERVING HAY IN MANGER

forse With Chronic Habit of Nosing Out Feed Under His Feet Is Decided Nuisance.

A neighbor once owned a horse with a chronic habit of nosing most of the hay out of the manger and under his feet as soon as it had been thrown down. An animal with this trait is both a nuisance and useless expense. Alfalfa, clover and some other hays are not so easily removed, but wild hay can be easily tossed out.

This farmer resorted to a simple means to stop this annoyance. A green log about four inches in diameter was cut short enough to drop into the manger without touching either of the leed boxes.

This was supported, when outside, by two ropes, each tied through the halter-rope holes and around one end of the log. After the manger has been filled the log is thrown into it, onto the hay. There is plenty of room for the horse to eat, yet there is no possibility of the feed being thrown but. The device cured the animal mentioned of his bad habit in about

GIVE ALFALFA GOOD CHANCE

Growns of Plant Are Likely to Be Injured if Hog or Other Stock Is Turned in Too Soon.

After the alfalfa crop has been cut for hay, hogs or other stock should not be turned in too soon. The crowns of the plant are likely to be injured if the stock is given a chance to eat the young tender shoots too closely. Often this close feeding per-manently injures, or even kills, the plants. Let it have a good start if you tend pasturing. It is better practice, however, to provide other crops


DIP ALL CATTLE REGULARLY

Quickest and Most Effective Way of Getting Rid of Ticks Is Systematic Treatment.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

"How long do we have to dip?" Judging from numerous reports received by the United States Department of Agriculture the question of length of dipping interests the majority of live stock owners in areas quar antined because of cattle ticks. The department's answer is "one or several years, depending on how you dip." Naturally cattle owners wish to complete tick eradication in the shortest possible time and at least cost and in-

The experience of the department in eradicating ticks from half a million square miles shows conclusively that regular systematic dipping of all cattle every 14 days is the quickest means.

Failure of even a few cattle owners to dip all their cattle may undo the efforts of their neighbors who bring all the cattle to the vats on schedule. The bureau of animal industry, United States Department of Agriculture, will supply on request full information for completing tick eradication in the shortest time-one season when directions are faithfully followed.

HANDLING OF GUMBO SOILS

Effective Methods Being Developed by Farmers on Milk River Reclamation Project.

More effective methods of handling rumbo soils are being developed by some of the farmers on the Milk River reclamation project in Montana, says the United States Department of Agriculture. One conclusion is that in irrigating this kind of soil the water should be applied frequently and in small quantities. Much trouble in getting crops started may be overcome by adopting a regular habit of fall plowing. The seeding of such soils to either yellow or white sweet clover in some cases is proving a means of supplying humus and for getting grain or alfalfa started later.

WORK OF EXTENSION AGENTS

Detailed Summary of Demonstrations in Home Management and Arrangement is Given.

Extension agents working with farm women in 1921 gave 11,000 demonstrations in home management and ar- Poincare. rangement.
