Some of the neighbors think jealousy was at the bottom of the trouble. Deputy Sheriffs Banghart

and Wooten of Bernalillo county were first on the scene. and Mr. Banghart gave the following story to the Albuquerque Journal: 'We arrived at Barton and

found that Wolff was on the other side of the Bernalillo-Santa Fe county line. He was at his home and afraid that the two brothers of Erwin would seek revenge, so we took him into custody until Deputy Sheriff Grimmer could arrive from Stanley. Erwin's brothers did not attempt to harm the young man.

I went down to the scene of the shooting, about 500 yards east of the Barton yards postoffice. I found buckshot in one post and a pistol ball in another. There is a road running on the Bernalillo-Santa Fe county line and another crossing, running east and west. Erwin, driving a car, came in from his home at Moriarty over the road running east and west and turned south toward the home of his father-in-law, Williams, where his wife now lives, the two having been separated for

some time.





Sec. 1. That Sec. one of Ordinance No. 1 be amended to read as follows: ANIMALS AT LARGE .- It shall

be unlawful for any neat cattle, horse, mule, burro, goat, sheep, swine, or other animal to be turned oose, abandoned or to run at large within the limits of the Town of Estancia; or for any such animal to be so tethered that it may roam across or into any street or public place in said Town; and it shall be unlawful for any person to herd or detain in any street, avenue, alley or other public place in said Town, any cattle, horses, sheep or swine. Sec. 2. That Sec 4 of said Ordinance No. 1 be amended to read

as follows:

The marshal shall deliver to the owner or keeper of any such animal or animals impounded, the ani mal or animals, upon payment of \$2.00 per head for each animal im pounded, and \$1.00 per head for each day such animal or animals shall remain impounded after the first day, together with the actual cost of feeding and watering.
