H. C. Williams vs. M. D. Atkinson et al, demurrer of defendant overruled.

State vs. Wiley A. Rainbolt, defendant sentenced to not less than one year nor more than eighteen months in penitentiary.

J. S. Dyer vs. Sallie Fulton, dismissed for want of prosecution.

State vs. Lorenzo Candelaria, defendant sentenced to not less than three nor more than four years in penitentiary, sentence suspended until further order of court.

Juan Gallegos vs. J. M. Oranda, ordered that defendant, his agents, etc., be enjoined from negotiating or transferring those certain checks drawn on First National Bank of Willard for \$200, \$200 and \$600, defendant required to deposit said checks with clerk of court pendente lite; also enjoined until further order of court from selling or encumbering certain sheep and lambs purporting to have been conveyed to defendant by plaintiff about May 11th, earmarked double over-bitt and swallow fork left, half over-crop right. Plaintiff required to give \$500 bond against loss or damage to defendant in case order shall be held unwarranted. Ordered that defendant show cause at Las Cruces July 26, why this order should not be made perpetual.

Letty M. Dimond vs. Truman A. Dimond, divorce granted plaintiff by default.

The Johnson Presley Co. vs. Tanous Tabet et al, judgment against plaintiff, defendants to recover their costs against plaintiff.

Pearl Schell vs. Robert Schell, divorce granted plaintiff and plaintiff given custody of two minor children.

Encino State Bank vs. Nicolas Tenorio, et al, appeal to supreme court granted, plaintiff to give bond in double amount of judgments.

Carmelita J. de Tafoya vs. Luciano Tafoya, divorce granted plaintiff.

Board of Trustees of Torreon Land Grant vs. Nemesio Garcia et al, former decree vacated and set aside, defendants excepting. Leave granted defendants to file amended answer with cross complaint. Plaintiff granted thirty days in which to file brief and take such other action as they desire.

A TORRANCE COUNTY CASE

The hearing of a Torrance county case brought to this county for the greater convenience of the witnesses and attorneys was held in the district court this afternoon with Judge Edwin Mechem of the third judicial district presiding.

The suit being tried is that of Robert L. Shaw against the Woodmen of the World to collect insurance said to be due from the organization. Mr. Shaw, who was named beneficiary by George Shaw, who died at Mountainair, N. M., on November 1, 1918, claims \$500 and a hundred dollar tombstone for the grave of the deceased. The Woodmen have refused to pay the death benefits on the grounds of breach of warrant on the part of George Shaw.

Witnesses in the case are Robert L. Shaw, Dr. C. J. Amble and Dr. George H. Buer, all of Mountainair. Benson Newell, clerk of the district court at Las Cruces is here with Judge Mechem.—Albuquerque Herald.

Color and Disinfect.
Color really does fight disease. Take for example the ultraviolet ray. Here we have a most convincing proof of the healing force that resides in color. This famous ray exerts a very potent curative effect upon certain diseases of the skin. A ray of ultra-violet light is concentrated upon the diseased part, and immediately a new process is set up by which the disease is eventually destroyed.

Spaniard is Wife's Master.
The legal position of a married woman in Spain is today so low that her husband has absolute control over her person and property, as in the middle ages. The wife cannot enter business without her husband's consent. He has the legal right to shut her up in a convent if she does wrong, and it is left to him to decide what constitutes wrong.

Proper Care of Parrots.
Parrots in the wild state live on seed and fruit and should, while in captivity, be fed as nearly as possible the same kind of food. They should be fed sunflower seed, hemp seed, boiled yellow corn, stale bread soaked in water, an occasional piece of apple or banana, and ground peanuts and dry cracked corn. Plenty of water and gravel should be kept in the cage. The parrot's cage should be cleaned every day.

Acids.
Nitric acid which is used in preparing the tremendous explosive, trinitrotoluol, is a very powerful acid, and if applied to the skin burns terribly. Surgeons occasionally use it for destroying growths. Hydrocyanic or prussic acid is probably the most deadly poisonous of the acids. Formic acid, found in certain insects, especially in ants, is used as a food—by crushing or eating the insects—among some aboriginal tribes. Possibly malleic acid, or some of the still finer acids are among the weakest of the acids.

Iron Clothes With the Feet.
In Cairo men employed in the native tailoring establishments iron clothes with their feet. Except for the long handle, the irons are shaped like an ordinary flat-iron, but are larger. A solid block of wood rests on the top of the iron, and on this the men place one foot, guiding the iron in the desired direction by means of the handle. For the sake of convenience, ironing boards are raised only a few inches from the ground, and, however strange the method may seem, the work is done well and expeditiously.

Dangerous Alarm Clock.
To prevent oversleeping, and thus risking the loss of their employment, the mail carriers of Morocco resort to a unique and perilous scheme. They tie a string to one foot, and, as they know how long a yard or two will burn, they regulate the length of the string by the time they have to sleep. They light the string, which burns slowly, and, when the fire comes to their foot, they are painfully reminded that it is time to arise.

ADVERTISING BEANS

In a recent issue the Michigan Farmer, a farm paper whose influ-ence is great in the state of Michi-gan, carried a long article com-menting on the recent advertising campaigns conducted by the Michi-gan Bean Jobbers' association. After a detailed report of the advertising committee's expert, the Journal says: "The bean jobbers present at the Saginaw meeting thought so well of this experiment in the education of consumers regarding the quality of Michigan beans, that the advertising committee of the association was authorized to formulate a further publicity campaign and provision was made to finance same. This promises well for a good outlet for next year's crop and should aid in encouraging the planting of a lib-eral acreage to this crop this year. "Perhaps the most significant fact regarding this experimental publicity campaign is that the indirect ben-efits are likely to surpass the direct benefits already apparent. From the official report of the meeting it appears that the investigation as to the result of the advertising sug-gested certain practices to the bean dealers which are likely to have a very permanent and far-reaching effect in increasing the popularity of Michigan beans with consumers throughout the country. The most important of these suggestions were the stenciling of the bags in which the beans are packed, and the en-closure of similarly stenciled paper sacks in each bag for the use of the retailer in selling the beans over the counter. The general adop-tion of this plan will be of great advertising value to the Michigan product and protect it in large de-gree from the competition of infer-ior products, especially if sup-plemented by suitable educational cam-paigns to impress the superiority of our product on the consumer's mind. "In view of this development it is to be regretted that the Bean Grow-ers' association has become inactive, since growers could well afford to cooperate with dealers in populariz-ing their product."—Bean-Bag (July).
