SHOT TO DEATH

Corona, July 24th:—This morning Jim W. Gillespie, a prosperous rancher whose home was nine miles east of Corona, was shot and killed instantly in front of the post-office at Corona, by Paschal Luttrall, a neighbor of Mr. Gillespie.

It is presumed that the men came to town close to the same time Saturday forenoon. Gillespie drove to Corona in his car about 11 A. M. He stopped his car in front of the Stockmens State Bank and entered the bank, where he remained for about ten minutes transacting business. After leaving the bank he presumably entered the post-office, next door, and got his mail. In about ten minutes from the time at which he left the bank a shot was heard and Dr. J. S. Stone, whose office stands next to the post-office, upon looking out to investigate the cause of the shot, found Mr. Gillespie lying on the street with a bullet hole in his head. Luttrall, who in the meantime was standing near, remarked to Dr. Stone that he was the person who fired the shot and was ready to surrender.

There was no one who witnessed the shooting save a little lad of about six years of age who was sitting in a car close by. He, however, knows nothing clearly.

The county sheriff was notified of the shooting and came and placed Luttrall under arrest, taking him to the county jail at Carrizozo. Following his arrest the prisoner would make no statement as to his reason for shooting Gillespie.

Gillespie has been a resident of the Corona district for several years, having come from Texas. He was 34 years old and left a wife and one child, a boy about two years old.

Luttrall is also married and is the father of two small boys. He is about 30 years of age, and has lived near Corona for the past two years.

The tragedy has caused a profound sensation in the town and community, where both men were well known. It is believed that the mystery surrounding the shooting will be cleared up when the preliminary hearing takes place.

Mr. Gillespie's body was shipped to El Paso for burial.

DEMOCRATIC COUNTY CONVENTION

A delegate convention of the Democrats of Torrance county is hereby called to meet in the court house at Estancia, on Thursday, August 19th, 1920, at ten o'clock A. M., for the purpose of electing twelve delegates and twelve alternates to attend the Democratic state convention at Las Vegas August 24th, to nominate candidates for presidential electors; for congress and for state officers, and to transact any other business that may properly come before the convention.

Each precinct will be entitled to one delegate for each ten votes or major fraction thereof cast for the Democratic candidate for governor in 1918. Precincts organized since the 1918 election will elect delegates as nearly on this basis as possible.

It is recommended that the primaries to elect delegates be held on Saturday, August 14th, unless otherwise arranged by precinct committeemen. In any precincts where committeemen fail to call primaries, the Democrats are urged to hold meetings and elect delegates.

All voters who intend to act with the Democratic party in the coming election, regardless of past party affiliations, are invited to participate in the primaries and convention.

Women may participate in the primaries, and may be elected and will be recognized as delegates to the convention.

SCENIC LOOP ROUTE IS LATEST STATE HIGHWAY

A scenic loop-the-loop route to include the most interesting scenery in the state is being planned by the Clovis Chamber of Commerce in connection with cities along proposed route. The highway will start from Clovis over the Abbo Pass route, through Ft. Sumner, Santa Rosa and Las Vegas, where it will enter the mountains. Thence the route will continue to Santa Fe and will include all the Indian villages down the Rio Grande through Albuquerque, Isleta, and Belen. Then the highway will take the Abo Pass route back through the mountains to Estancia, Willard, Vaughn, Encino, Fort Sumner and Clovis.

"This route should especially appeal to tourists from Eastern New Mexico and Texas who want to take a short tour through the state, and who want to see most of the sights that New Mexico holds for the visitor," said Mr. Jones, secretary of the Clovis Chamber of Commerce.

A similar route through Texas is being planned with the co-operation of chambers of commerce. The route takes the tourist from Clovis through central Texas by way of the state capital at Austin, and on to the coast by way of Houston, Galveston and Corpus Christi, then back through San Antonio, San Angelo, Midland, and Lubbock to Clovis.

"It is our plan," said Mr. Jones, "to have our scenic loop for Texas visitors in summer, and the Texas loop for our tourists in the winter." Chambers of commerce of cities along the New Mexico loop are taking great interest in the project, and Texas cities too, are anxious to get their loop completed and well advertised by this winter.—Clovis News.

ESTANCIA INFLECTS FIRST DEFEAT ON CARRIZOZO

The Estancia ball players went to Carrizozo last Sunday and in a game that was well played on both sides inflicted the first defeat on the Carrizozo club which it has suffered this season.

You can't get the Estancia crowd to talk about the game much. They trail off into praise of the Carrizozo players and people, and the treatment accorded the Estancia crowd. They say they were entertained like princes and were treated in every respect as distinguished visitors, not only by the ball players, but by the Carrizozo people in general.

The Estancia crowd arrived in Carrizozo at noon and found a sumptuous dinner awaiting them. After the game they were entertained in the ice cream parlors, and upon arrival at Corona at eight o'clock in the evening on the home trip were halted and treated to a good supper upon order of the Carrizozo people. All had their fill except Jack Welch, who says he didn't get enough to eat.

During the game there was not an angry word and no disputes of any kind between players or spectators, and the Carrizozo crowd were as ready with their cheers for good plays by the Estancia players as for their own club.

If all ball games could be played under such conditions the sport would gain immensely in popularity and there would be no criticism from any quarter.

Let us start a rivalry between the crowds that witness ball games, to see who can treat the visitors with the greatest courtesy and generosity. Carrizozo has set a fast pace, but there's nothing like trying to equal it. Let the Estancia crowd see if they can't match it when the Carrizozo players come here.

The record shows that the game was a good one. When two amateur clubs play a game with only three errors each, it is pretty good ball playing.

The Estancia players were all in good form, and made none of the ragged plays that they sometimes pull off. Ray Burrus played a perfect game behind the bat, while Milbourn in the pitcher's box was as steady as a clock and had the game well in hand at every stage. He allowed ten hits, but they were well scattered and brought no runs except the two in the fifth inning. Barkis Keen played a brilliant game at first, while B. Keen made some great plays at second. Draper and Welch at third and short were Johnny-on-the-spot all through the game. Albritton and

Swartz in the outfield got generous applause for brilliant long-run catches. Mullen did some great base running, running for himself and Milbourn.

The Carrizozo players did equally well, the only difference in the playing being that the Estancia players managed to bunch their hits so as to yield runs in four innings, while the Carrizozo boys got together with the bat in only one.

More Sugar for You.

People who have soft-pedaled the sugar bowl for six years may be interested in the statement that crop conditions on July 1 promised an increase in next fall's sugar production in the United States; an increase amounting to, approximately, 333,000 tons, or enough to load a train of freight cars 70 or 75 miles long, allowing 40 tons per car. This prospective crop is equal to more than 22 pounds of sugar for every man, woman and child within the United States, and the increase over last year equals more than six pounds per person. The sugar-beet crop this year covers almost a million acres as against the 5-year average of about two-thirds of a million; and the growing condition on July 1 was above the 10-year average. There is more than half a million of sugar cane this year, about half of which is intended for sugar—and the other half for syrup, after deducting considerable amounts for planting the next crop. There is a substantial increase in acreage over last year, especially in Louisiana, where nearly all the cane sugar of the United States is made. The growing condition of the cane in Louisiana is much better than last year but considerably under the average for the past nine years. The Department of Agriculture, which has carried on a number of projects looking toward making this country self-sustaining from a sugar standpoint, is co-operating with other agencies in protecting the crops from insects and disease and otherwise promoting the production and utilization of a bumper sugar crop. It should be borne in mind, however that the forecast for 1920 is based upon conditions on July 1, and the actual return would be above or below this forecast according as conditions between July 1 and harvest are better or worse than average.

Grading Adds to Farmer's Profits.

When a farmer orders a box of bolts of a certain make and size he does not expect to find a thin layer of the bolts specified on the top of the box and assorted bolts underneath. In the world of commerce a manufacturer who pursued such practices would soon be bankrupt.

The same principle applies to the sale of farm products, say specialists of the Bureau of Markets, United States Department of Agriculture. Before sending produce to market the farmer should sort it as to quality and size. The Bureau of Markets from time to time has recommended grade specifications for various products, and, wherever these recommendations have been followed, satisfaction and increased monetary returns have generally resulted. For instance, it is estimated that in 1919 the potato growers in Virginia increased their profits a half million dollars by grading their produce. Similar results are being obtained in other states.—Government Circular.

 ing the clover that was cut
 would not come on and make
 a crop of seed, but that was
 a mistake this year. The clo-
 ver that was cut is three to
 four feet in height and is
 heavy with bloom. Where it
 was not cut, the tallest stems
 are seven feet or more in
 height. This clover was seed-
 ed on the sod, the ground
 never having been plowed.
 Mr. Ayers has a clover huller
 here and a header on the way,
 to take care of his crop. A
 goodly sum of money has
 been spent on this crop, seed-
 ing and buying machinery to
 take care of it, but the money
 is expected to come back with
 interest out of this seed crop.

Use Less Sugar in
Jellies and Jams.
 One-fifth to one-quarter less
 sugar can be used in making
 jelly and jams, experiments
 made by household experts in
 the United States Department
 of Agriculture experimental
 kitchen indicate.
 Another sugar-saving wrin-
 kle tested by the experiment
 kitchen is to add one-quarter
 teaspoon of salt to each cup
 of fruit juice for jelly or pulp
 for jam, marmalade, and con-
 serve. In the case of nonacid
 fruit this makes the absence
 of the full amount of sugar
 less noticeable. The salty
 taste will disappear after the
 product has stood for a few
 weeks, but the flavor will be
 much the richer for the addi-
 tion of the salt. Salt was so
 used in England during the
 war, and the method suggest-
 ed was based on reports of
 the process.
 With fruits of pronounced
 flavor, or where lemon and
 orange peel or spices are used
 for flavoring those with mild
 flavor, various syrups take the
 place of part of the granulat-
 ed sugar. Usually half and
 half is the proportion used in
 substitution.
