BE IT REMEMBERED: That at a call meeting of the Board of Directors of the Mogollon Mercantile Co., a corporation, duly organized under and by virtue of the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, and that Ernest Craig is the President of said corporation, and that said Craig is now absent from the Territory of New Mexico; the said Board of Directors, being a majority of the Board of Directors aforesaid, the following resolution was offered and unanimously adopted: "WHEREAS: The corporate existence and period of duration of the Mogollon Mercantile Co., is about to expire and will expire on the 16th day of June, 1906, by limitation as fixed in its articles of incorporation; and

"WHEREAS: It is advisable and expedient that said existence and period be extended for a further period of ten years from and after said 16th day of June, 1906, or ten years from and after the date of filing of certificate of extension if filed sooner than said 16th day of June, 1906, now, therefore;

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

Writes a Letter Urging the People of Arizona to Vote For Joint Statehood.

HE HAS A PECULIAR AFFECTION

For People of Four Territories Which Now Have Chance to Enter as Two States.

A press dispatch from Tucson, Arizona, under date of July 4, says that President Roosevelt has written a letter to a friend of his there urging that the people of Arizona accept the present opportunity to secure statehood for their territory. Following is the letter:

Washington, D.C., June 27, '06.
Dear Mark A. Rogers, Secretary Arizona Statehood Association, Tucson, Arizona:

My earnest hope is that the people of the territory of Arizona in their wisdom will decide to enter the Union as a part of the great state of Arizona. No man can foretell what will happen in the future; but it is my belief that if the people of Arizona let this chance go by they will have to wait many years before the chance again offers itself, and even then it probably will be only on the present terms—that is, on condition of being joined with New Mexico.

If the people of Arizona come in now, they will achieve what every self-respecting American ought to wish to achieve—that is, the right of self government. If they refuse what is proffered to them, and what in my opinion is proffered on the only proper and permissible terms, they condemn themselves to indefinite continuance of the condition of territorial tutelage.

I have a peculiar affection for the people of the four territories which, under the act of congress that I have just signed, now have an opportunity to enter as two states into our federal union. These territories are filled with men and women of the stamp for which I grew to feel so hearty a regard and respect during the years that I myself lived and worked on the great plains and in the Rocky mountains. It was from these four territories that I raised the regiment with which I took part in the Cuban campaign. Assuredly under no circumstances would I advise the people of these territories to do anything that I considered to be against either their moral or material well-being. I feel that for them now to refuse to come into the Union as states would be at the best mere folly.

Very wisely the people of Oklahoma and Indian Territory, and, I believe, the people of New Mexico also, have abandoned the attitude which forbade their assuming the great privileges and responsibilities of full American citizenship. I can not express too heartily my hope that the people of Arizona, exercising their sober second thought, will come to look at the matter in the same light.

SOCORRO IS SHOCKED.

An Earthquake Monday Morning Awakens Sleepers and Causes Stampede to Open Air.

The severest earthquake that Socorro has experienced in many years awakened the city's sleeping population at a quarter past three o'clock Monday morning. The rumbling and the rocking sent the frightened ones scurrying into the open air, and they "stayed not upon the order of their going." There was a general rattling of things and a bit of loose plaster here and there was thrown down, but no damage was done. The disturbance was doubtless due to a slipping of the strata in the Magdalena mountains. At least it was confined to a small area. There were a few quivers of the ground during Monday and a quite perceptible shock Monday night. Since then the bosom of mother earth has been in statu quo.

SESSION OF PROBATE COURT.

Considerable Business Disposed of the First of the Week.

Judge Henry Dreyfus held a regular session of the probate court for Socorro county beginning Monday, July 2. There were present Henry Dreyfus, probate judge; B. A. Pino, clerk and interpreter, by Sam'l C. Meek, deputy; and Leandro Baca, sheriff.

The proceedings of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

The final report of Nestor Gonzales, administrator of the estate of Floripe Baca de Gonzales, was approved and the administrator and his bondsmen were discharged.

Donaciano Padilla petitioned the court to be appointed guardian of Valentine Cardenas, a minor. He was required to furnish a good and sufficient bond in the sum of one hundred dollars.

The first day of the September term of the court was set for the hearing of the final account of Frank Lauderbaugh, executor of the last will and testament of John Yount, deceased.

Mary E. Harris, administratrix of the estate of Henry R. Harris, deceased, was granted six months within which to make her final report.

Francisco M. de Baca and Solomon G. Baca, administrators of the estate of Juan Jose Baca, deceased, filed an inventory and appraisal of said estate, which was approved. The administrators were authorized to carry on during their administration the mercantile and cattle raising business in which the deceased was engaged up to the time of his death.

Henry G. May, administrator of the estate of Thomas Cooke Silliman, deceased, filed an inventory and appraisal of the estate and was authorized to sell the personal property of the estate and to apply the proceeds of such sale to the payment of the costs of administration.

H. M. Dougherty and P. J. Savage, executors of the last will and testament of J. F. Cook, deceased, filed a report of bills paid and the report was approved.

Fred Baldwin, administrator of the estate of Mary A. Baldwin, deceased, was granted three months within which to make his final report.

An instrument purporting to be the last will and testament of Levi Baldwin, deceased, was declared and decreed to be the last will and testament of said Levi Baldwin, and Fred Baldwin was appointed administrator of the estate.

CITY'S WATER SUPPLY

Has Been Increased One Hundred Per Cent By Boring Tunnel Near the Spring.

MR. BURSUM WORKS A MIRACLE

It Will Now Be Necessary to Supply Socorro's Water System With Larger Mains.

Mr. Bursum has wrought a miracle in connection with the city's water supply.

To those who are not familiar with the source of Socorro's water supply, unsurpassed for its purity, it may be of interest to know that the city water comes from a spring at the foot of a mountain two and a half miles distant and at an elevation of three hundred and fifty feet above the plaza.

A short time ago Mr. Bursum employed workmen to excavate a cut and tunnel in the mountain on a level with the spring and about thirty yards north of it, with the hope of increasing the flow. The hope has been abundantly realized.

Last Saturday a crevice was opened in the rock at the head of the tunnel, and from this crevice there immediately flowed a stream of water fully equal in volume to that from the spring which has always been the source of the city's supply. This stream has been flowing uniformly since and has not materially diminished the flow from the spring.

The importance of this occurrence to the inhabitants of Socorro would be difficult to estimate in dollars and cents. While the supply of water was sufficient before for ordinary uses, there were times when the need of a more abundant supply was realized. It will now be possible to furnish every residence in the city with all the water that can possibly be needed for domestic uses and for the irrigation of lawns and gardens even during the driest seasons.

But Mayor Bursum's good work does not stop here. He will drive the tunnel twenty-five or thirty feet further into the mountain, and there is a very strong probability that he will still further increase the flow of water. He has already raised the walls of the reservoir in the upper part of town five or six feet, making it possible to em-pound two or three times as much water as before. The water is now piped into this reservoir instead of running into it through an open ditch as it had done for years, with great waste and with danger to the public health. The improvements at the reservoir are not yet completed. Furthermore, Mr. Bursum has put valves into the city mains in such places that it will be possible at a moment's notice to bring the entire pressure of the city's water supply to bear at any desired point. In case of fire this arrangement might easily result in the saving of thousands of dollars worth of property.

When it is remembered that all this has been done and that more is to be done at Mayor Bursum's private expense, it becomes an impressive fact that the city of Socorro owes its mayor at least a profound and lasting debt of gratitude.

ALBUQUERQUE has awakened to the fact Delegate Andrews is, after all, a pretty good sort of man to represent New Mexico in Congress.

By the way, what has become of that Albuquerque Non-Partisan Joint Statehood league "that roared so loud and thundered in the index"?

WHEN Mr. Bryan is nominated for the presidency again the only 16 to 1 feature of the campaign will be 16 chances that he will lose to 1 chance that he will win.

WITH the severest of many earthquakes in fifty years, the first thunder storm in several months, and an alarm of fire, all in one day, Socorro can justly lay claim to being anything but a dead one.

DELEGATE ANDREWS has made a remarkable record during a remarkable session of Congress. While Delegate Andrews is to be congratulated because of his success, the people whom he has represented are more to be congratulated because of benefits received.

JOSEPH CANNON, Speaker of the House of Representatives, says: "In my judgment the work done and the legislation enacted in the session just closed exceeds in importance, for the best interests of the people, the work of any session during my thirty years of public life."

MAYOR BURSUM has already doubled the volume of Socorro's water supply, and there is a strong probability that he will increase it still further. In the matter of smiting the rocks and causing streams of water to flow forth, Moses must have been a novice compared with Mayor Bursum.

POLITICAL policies and business conditions have absolutely no relation of cause and effect—any Democrat knows that. Still, periods of great industrial growth like the present show a persistence in coming on during Republican administrations that must fret the soul of an advocate of free trade, cheap money and anti-expansion.

TO THOSE who are so industriously trying to make it appear that there is a tremendous row brewing in the Republican party of Socorro county, the Chieftain begs leave to say that their labors will be entirely in vain. The November election will show that the county organization is still united enough to overcome all opposition in the usual overwhelming fashion.

SPEAKING of the excellent record made by Congress during the session just closed, President Roosevelt says: "It is noteworthy that not a single measure which the closest scrutiny would warrant us in calling of doubtful propriety has been enacted, and on the other hand, no influence of any kind has availed to prevent the enactment of the laws most vitally necessary to the nation at this time."

THE railroad rate bill, the pure food bill, the free alcohol bill, the lock canal bill and the statehood bill are measures which were passed by the session of

Congress which closed last Saturday and which cause that session to be distinguished as having done more important constructive legislation than any other session of Congress has done since that which met under Lincoln's call on July 4, 1861.

THERE has been practically no change during the week in the prospects concerning joint statehood. It is still generally conceded that New Mexico will give a large majority in favor of the union and that Arizona will give an equally large majority against it. No campaign has yet been inaugurated on the question, and when such a campaign is inaugurated the probability is that it will serve only to strengthen the sentiment which already prevails in each territory.

A BLOOD RED LAKE.

Peculiarity Manifested by a Sheet of Water in Switzerland.

Lake Morat, in Switzerland, has a queer habit of turning red about two or three times every ten years. It is a pretty lake, like most of the sheets of water of that picturesque country, and its peculiar freak is attributed to a disposition to celebrate the slaughter of the Burgundians under Charles the Bold on June 21, 1476, but the French say that it blushes for the conduct of the Swiss, who in that battle gave the Burgundians no quarter.

This phenomenon, of course, has its legend. The old fishermen of the lake, who catch enormous fish called silures that weigh between twenty-five and forty kilograms, say when they see the waters of the lake reddening that it is the blood of the Burgundians. As a matter of fact, some of the bodies of the Burgundians killed in the battle were thrown into the lake, while others were tossed into a grave filled with quicklime. This historical recollection angered the Burgundian soldiers of the victorious armies of the republic in 1798 so much that they destroyed the monument raised in honor of their compatriots who fell heroically in that battle, and Henri Martin very justly reproached them for that piece of vandalism.

It would hardly do to attribute the reddening of the waters of the lake to the blood of the soldiers of Charles the Bold. The coloring is due simply to the presence in large quantities of little aquatic plants called by naturalists *Oscillatoria rubescens*. The curious thing about it is that Lake Morat is the only lake in which this auriferous growth is developed.

THE JAW AND THE TEETH.

THE GOLDFINCH.

Changes in Plumage That Are Puzzling to the Novice.

Most everyone in America is acquainted with the goldfinch, but many people know the bird by the name of lettuce bird on account of its bright yellow color. Goldfinch is a very appropriate name, as the bright yellow of the male when in breeding plumage is like burnished gold. The female goldfinch is more modestly dressed than her mate. The changes in plumage of the male are very interesting and to the novice somewhat puzzling. Until the student becomes acquainted with the bird he may wonder why he sees no males during the winter. The truth is at this season the flocks of supposed female goldfinches are really of both sexes, the male bird having assumed in the previous fall, usually by the end of October, a plumage closely resembling that of the female and young bird of the year. The male retains this inconspicuous dress until late in February, when one can notice a gradual change taking place in some of the birds. This renewal of feathers is actively continued through March and April, and by the first of May our resplendent bird is with us again. The song period with the male goldfinch continues as long as he wears his gold and black livery, for it commences as early as the middle of March and ends late in August. Goldfinches are very cleanly in their habits and bathe frequently. Their nests are exquisite pieces of bird architecture, the inside being lined with the softest plant down. The mother bird is the builder, her handsome consort during the nest building time devoting most of his efforts to singing to cheer his industrious mate.—Philadelphia Press.

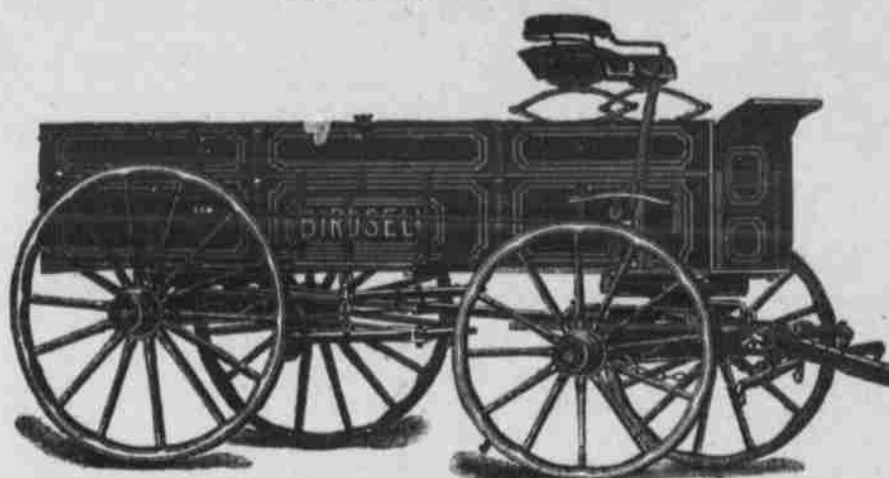
