ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICERS WAS SOMEWHAT EXCITING

Opposition to Association's Ticket Was Finally Developed

Board of Commissioners Issued Certificates of Election

The election of officers for the town of Alamogordo resulted in more interest and excitement than had been anticipated. The Alamogordo Retailers and Business Men's Association put the first ticket, the so-called regular ticket into the field, and until a day or so prior to election there was no other ticket put out.

There was a good deal of general dissatisfaction over the first ticket, not with the men on the ticket, but over the means used to nominate the ticket. Many of the citizens were old-fashioned enough to believe that the voters of the incorporated district were entitled to a voice in the selection of the town officers. Certainly it was true that with only one ticket in the field, nothing was left to the people but to ratify the choice of the Retailers' Association.

NEW MEXICO INSTITUTE WINS TWO MORE CUPS

Both Teams Win First Honor in National Contests

RECORD OF SEVEN FIRST HONORS

Greatest Blind Athletic Teams in United States

The awards of the athletic contests of the National Athletic Association of Schools for the Blind, notice of which has just been received by Superintendent Pratt, have proved beyond any doubt that the New Mexico Institute for the Blind has the greatest blind athletic team in the United States.

In the contest for girls, held on the campus Saturday, May eleventh, New Mexico won first place, with the Western Pennsylvania Institute at Pittsburgh in second place, thirty-seven points behind, and Wisconsin third.

In the contest for boys, held May eighteenth, New Mexico finished first, with a total credit of seventy-seven points, Missouri second with seventy-two points, Ohio third with sixty points, New York fourth with fifty-one points.

New Mexico joined the association early in the session of 1909. Since New Mexico joined the association, eight national contests have been held, and in seven of the eight contests, New Mexico has finished first, winning for each victory a handsome silver loving cup for a trophy.

Five of the loving cups are now at the Institute and the other two, so recently won, will be received at an early date. The five cups which were won prior to the last session were recently photographed and will be used as one of the illustrations for the biennial report and cata-

GRAND JURY REPORTS COUNTY PRINTING COSTS TOO MUCH

This Report Was Approved by Majority Of The Members

Complete Investigation Was Made and the Records Were Examined

Alamogordo, N. M., March 9, 1912.

To the Hon. E. L. Medler, Judge of the Third Judicial District of New Mexico, Alamogordo, N. M.

We, the Grand Jury empaneled for the March 1912 term of Court beg to submit the following report:

We have investigated every violation of the law which has been called to our attention, and have called every witness suggested to us for examination. A great many witnesses have been called whose knowledge in particular cases was not sufficient upon which to base the presentment of an indictment, although some have given valuable evidence as to the conditions that prevail in different parts of the county.

We are of the opinion that the liquor law in regard to Sunday closing and sale of liquor to minors has been violated in a number of instances, although we have been unable to secure sufficient evidence to warrant indictments.

We are of the opinion that there is a practice of illegally carrying concealed weapons in certain parts of the County, concerning which we were not able to secure sufficient evidence to present indictments, and we recommend that the Sheriff and his deputies, through the Sheriff, be instructed to put forth extraordinary efforts to put a stop to this practice.

We have presented indictments in all violations of the law in cases, where, in our opinion, sufficient evidence could be secured for conviction.

Committees were appointed to visit and inspect all the offices of the County officials and the County Jail, a report of which is herewith attached.

From records examined, and evidence secured, we are of the opinion that the county is paying considerably more for printing than is necessary, especially for the publication of the delinquent tax list. There appears to be no evidence that there has been bids asked for in the matter of publishing the delinquent tax list since April 5, 1909. The contract let at that time expired on the 31st day of December, 1910. It appears that bids have not been asked for, although the publishing of the delinquent tax list published in January, 1912, amounts to about \$567.00, the maximum allowed by statute, while the same could have been published for about one-half of this amount.

One of the adjoining counties is paying thirty-one percent of the maximum allowed.

The foregoing report, which was submitted in open court by the grand jury at its last session, is entitled to serious consideration. The grand jury is one of the most powerful and august bodies under our form of government. It is the grand jury's privilege, and duty as well, to inquire into all matters affecting the public welfare. The grand jury is the body which prepares the indictments under which criminals are punished, the punishment varying from a short term in prison to the death penalty.

It appears that the grand jury of Otero county thought that too much was being spent for the county printing. The report itself shows that an investigation was made, the records in the matter being examined. The exact dates and the figures used in the report could not have been given without an examination of the records. The grand jury did not base the report upon vague suspicions and rumors, but upon the facts in the case. Moreover, the report is not signed by the chairman of a committee or subcommittee but by the "Foreman of the Grand Jury," and a vote of the majority of the members was necessary to submit such a recommendation.

The grand jury has discharged its duty by rendering its report, and still the commissioners stand pat and refuse to consider with favor a proposition to save money for the tax payers. **Are the tax payers of Otero county willing for the commissioners to continue to support their private charity with the public funds?**

WILSON AND MARSHALL ARE NOMINATED AT BALTIMORE

Forty-six Ballots are Required but Harmony Prevails Afterward

One memorable, epoch-making, history-making assembly was the democratic national convention which was called to order in Baltimore on Tuesday morning of last week. The nomination of a candidate for President was not effected until Tuesday afternoon, forty-six ballots had been taken. The Vice-President was nominated about midnight of Tuesday, and after the adoption of the platform, the convention adjourned, sine die, at two o'clock Wednesday morning.

Woodrow Wilson, Governor of New Jersey and former president of Princeton University, is the nominee for President. Thomas R. Marshall, Governor of Indiana, is the nominee for Vice-President.

The platform is progressive, but not nearly so radical as in the previous campaigns. Notwithstanding the long, hard fight over the nomination, har-

mony prevailed during the closing hours of the convention, when the vice-president was being nominated. Mr. Clark is quoted as saying that he was just as much a Wilson supporter as any delegate in the convention. Mr. Clark and Mr. Underwood both declined to be considered for the vice-presidency.

The vote for Mr. Clark on the first ballot was 440, the highest vote on the 10th ballot when he received 556, lowest on the final ballot when he received 84. The vote for Gov. Wilson on the opening ballot was 324 and he did not at any time drop below that mark. On the 45th he received 633 and on the 46th, 990, making the election practically unanimous.

First ballot for Harmon, 148, lowest number 14 on the 32nd, highest mark on 1st. Underwood received 118 1/2 on the 1st, highest 130 on the 19th, lowest 97 on the 46th.

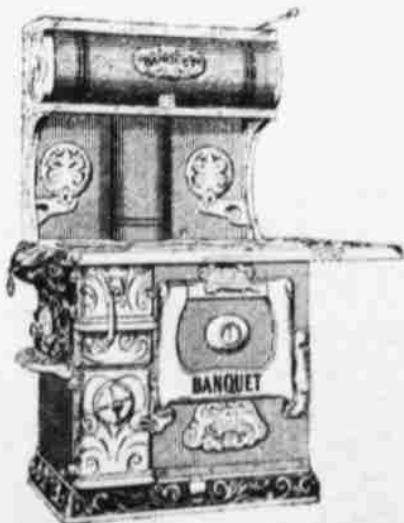

logue which is now in the hands of the printer.

The winning of first place is all the more remarkable when it is considered that New Mexico had no students eligible for Class B events, which reduced the general average. This school finished third Class A, first in Classes C and D.

One enormous advantage that New Mexico has over all the other state institutions is in the climate which permits the students to be out of doors at play and athletic practice nearly every day of the school year. Then of course the training is of the very best.
