ADJOURNED SESSION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS HELD AUGUST 26, 1922.

An adjourned session of the board of county commissioners of Valencia County, held on the 26th day of August, 1922; there were present Hon. Daniel Lucero, chairman of the board, Hon. Narciso Frances, Hon. Fred D. Huning, members, Hon. Joseph F. Tondre, sheriff, and A. A. Gutierrez, escribano. The minutes of the previous session were read and approved by the board.

The session being in order of business the apportionment of funds for the different road districts in the county was taken under consideration. The board being advised that many changes are being made on the tax rolls by the assessor on orders of the State Tax Commission; the board decided not to take action in the apportionment of road funds until a later date, when the tax rolls are corrected, and the tax valuation of the county is known.

Whereas, it has been made to appear to this board that the County Health Department will be in need of a clerk for the next year, in order to carry on the health work successfully, and

Whereas, the tentative levy already made for the county health fund is insufficient to meet the necessary expenses of said department and as said levy is limited by law to half a mill.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the board of county commissioners of Valencia County, that in order to employ a clerk for the county health department for next year an additional levy sufficient to raise \$600.00 is hereby made. Said levy to be applied in the general county fund, for the purpose of paying the salary of the clerk of the health department as already stated. The county clerk is hereby instructed to notify the state tax commission by transmitting a certified copy of the foregoing resolution.

The election of justice of the peace in precinct no. 14, San Lorenzo, was taken under consideration, and in the opinion of the District Attorney in this matter was presented by the clerk to the board, which opinion is that the board order another election for justice of the peace in precinct no. 14, San Lorenzo be held on the 19th day of September, 1922, and J. H. Griffith, Jose E. Ramirez and Trinidad Lucero are hereby appointed judges of election.

The county clerk is hereby instructed to communicate with Mr. T. H. Wilcox and Mr. Jose E. Ramirez, candidates for justice of the peace in precinct no. 14, San Lorenzo, requesting them to retire one of them in favor of the other and in this way avoid a nother election for justice of the peace in said precinct; the board is willing to appoint a Justice of the Peace if the parties interested in the matter recommend such an appointment.

A letter from the Central Printing Company of Albuquerque, New Mexico, was presented to the Board, and after being advised of its contents, the Clerk was instructed to communicate with said corporation, explaining the situation in regard to tax collections; and to advise the said party that the account due by the county since last year, cannot be paid at this time, and not until delinquent taxes are collected. The clerk is hereby instructed to advise the above referred corporation to present a voucher for this year's bills.

Resolved by the board of county commissioners of Valencia County, that the county clerk is hereby authorized and directed to take and subscribe fire insurance as follows: on the court house, \$15,000.00, on the county jail, \$3,000.00, on the garage situated contiguous to the county jail, \$1,000.00, and on the Packard county truck, \$1,000.00, making a total of \$20,000.00. The said clerk is further authorized and directed to take and subscribe for fire insurance especially on said buildings and other furnitures and property of whatever nature inside of said buildings. Said fire insurance shall be subscribed from the companies represented by E. C. Luna, H. Emory Davis and Joseph F. Tondre.

The board of county commissioners adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

Resolved by the board of County Commissioners of the County of Valencia, State of New Mexico, that a special tax of two mills on each dollar of the valuation of all property in said county subject to taxation for state and county purposes is hereby levied and imposed for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and improvement of public highways and enable the state and counties to meet the provision of the Federal Aid Road Act, being the tax authorized and directed to be made by said Board by the Act of the legislature of said state entitled "An Act Authorizing and Directing boards of county commissioners to levy taxes for each of the years, 1921, 1922 and 1923 for the construction and improvement of Public Highways and to meet dollar for dollar allotments to the State and Federal funds under the Federal Aid Road Act, and for other purposes approved March 12, 1921.

The county Assessor of said county is hereby authorized and directed to extend said levy on the tax roll for said county for the year 1922; and the county treasurer of said county is hereby authorized and directed to collect said tax and remit the same to the State Treasurer to be placed to the credit of the State Road Fund.

Being no other business before the board the same adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

There is No Water in Santa Fe Stock

President Storey issues another Statement, of Interest to Santa Fe Patrons

The charge is still made that the railroads are asking returns on "watered stock."

Congress undertook to ascertain the facts through the Valuation Act, which was introduced by Senator LaFollette. The Interstate Commerce Commission has been conducting this valuation for nine years, and the following elements are considered: Cost of reproduction in the years 1913 to 1916, cost of reproduction less depreciation, original cost, other values and elements of value. Stocks and bonds or earning capacity have not been considered.

From all the data available the Interstate Commerce Commission has found—

Valuation of all the railways in 1920 \$18,900,000,000

Net capitalization of all the railways December 31, 1919 16,939,515,522

Value above capitalization \$ 1,960,484,478

Otherwise stated, the value of the railroads is TWO BILLION DOLLARS in excess of the net face of all stocks and bonds. If present day unit prices had been used, the excess would be far greater.

This should dispose of the question of "watered stocks."

But recently reference has been made to the "valuation that the railroads have succeeded in putting over on the Interstate Commerce Commission." The valuation work on the Santa Fe is nearly completed and we know that we have not "put anything over" on the Interstate Commerce Commission. On the contrary, we believe that the Interstate Commerce Commission has been over-strict in its rules and methods of valuation, and that as a consequence it has greatly undervalued our railroad.

When the work is completed, no "water" will be found in Santa Fe stock.

Southwest News From All Over New Mexico and Arizona

The store of the Willard Mercantile Company in Mountain, N. M., was entered by robbers recently, who made their escape with goods valued at over \$1,000.

The 300,000 acres of the Salt River valley compose the single largest agricultural section in Arizona, but almost every county has some farm lands. The Yuma project, the Gila valley, the Florence-Casa Grande district, the Tucson district—all have rich farms. In the northern and some of the south-eastern sections there are large dry-farm tracts.

Two charges of embezzlement against R. L. Pinyan, former chief of police of Globe, were dismissed in Superior Court. The charges were dismissed upon a motion made by the county attorney. Mr. Pinyan was charged with embezzlement in connection with a shortage in city funds at his disposal, which he failed properly to account for, it was alleged.

Wade Hampton Marshall, cotton broker of Phoenix and Tempe, was fatally injured, and Roy Stephenson, received minor bruises and cuts when an automobile in which they were riding and driven by Marshall overturned on the Tempe highway, about six miles east of Phoenix recently. Marshall was taken to a hospital at Phoenix, where he died two hours later.

Ted Muller, son of Fritz Muller, assistant state land commissioner of New Mexico, and Leo Lorenzo have been arrested on warrants issued by a justice of the peace charging them with an attempt to set fire to an ice plant in Santa Fé. Assistant District Attorney A. M. Edwards, who prepared the complaints, declined to state the evidence on which his charges are based.

Spurning modern methods of travel via the Pullman, auto and airplane, eighteen families of Apache Indians reverted to the mode of transportation of their ancestors when they removed from Fort Apache, near Globe, to Fort Huachuca, their new home, recently. Headed by scouts on horseback, the travelers in rustic covered wagons of the early days of the plains made their way over mountain and desert.

Former Governor Miguel A. Otero, who was assaulted in the Capital City Bank of Santa Fé, by Eduardo M. Otero of Los Lunas, on Nov. 18, has brought suit against the latter in the District Court at Santa Fé to recover \$10,000, half for punitive damages and half for costs. The bill of complaint alleges that the defendant did "wrongfully, unlawfully, maliciously and wantonly assault, beat, bruise, maim and wound" him.

The Venus group of mines near the site of the Last Chance in the Lordsburg district, is now producing a good lot of ore which runs heavy in silver with a touch of gold. Over fifteen cars of ore have been shipped, much of which will run 10 per cent of silver. It is reported that some of the ores taken from the mine have run as high as 1,500 ounces to the ton, which is one of the best showings in New Mexico for some years.

Following the signing of the Colorado river compact by commissioners of seven states at Santa Fé, another water controversy of long standing was amicably settled when the states of Colorado and New Mexico, through their representatives, Delph E. Carpenter and Stephen B. Davis, Jr., signed an agreement, subject to approval by the respective State Legislatures providing for the equitable distribution of the waters of the La Plata river between the two states.

The beautiful home of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Melton of Fort Sumner was completely destroyed by fire recently. The house and contents will be almost a total loss.

Adoption of plans for a state-wide campaign which will assure the erection of a new athletic stadium at the university in time for the opening of the football season of 1923, and the decision that the University of Arizona Wildcats will meet the Utah Aggies in a post-season game to be played at Phoenix on Christmas day were the outstanding results of a recent meeting of the university board of athletic control.

Thirty-five years ago the Vizna mine was one of the richest silver producers in the then famous Tombstone district. Since then several shafts have been sunk on adjoining properties in the hope that the Vizna vein would be encountered, but none found the ore. Recently a six-inch vein of "horn silver," equally rich ore, was found but a few feet beneath the surface of the main street in Tombstone when excavations were made for a cement curb. Mine men say the vein is undoubtedly the long-sought Vizna vein.

That he did not own an old Spanish grant but only leased the supposed grant for ninety-nine years, was the discovery made when the safe deposit box of John Slaughter, wealthy Douglas man who died last February, was opened by the administrators, according to Neri Osborn, Jr., inheritance tax collector.

MILK-MARKETING PLANT PROBLEMS

Bulletin Recently Issued by Department of Agriculture Outlines All Details.

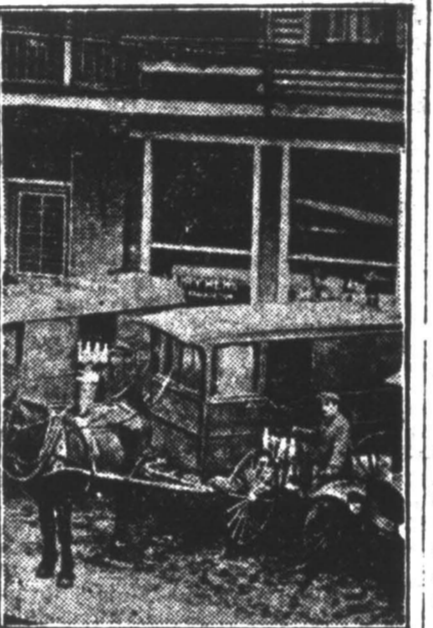
LIST OF EQUIPMENT NEEDED

Manager Must Secure Adequate and Proper Milk Supply, Efficient and Economical Operation and Sales Methods.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Persons who are interested in the establishment of co-operative milk-marketing plants, as well as those already engaged in marketing milk co-operatively will find many of their problems handled exhaustively in Department Bulletin 1095, Producers' Co-operative Milk-Distributing Plants, just published by the United States Department of Agriculture. The bulletin, consisting of more than 40 pages, is based upon studies of the experience of a large number of plants of this type in various parts of the country, mostly in small cities where a satisfactory system of distribution was not previously developed. Details are given on contracts, financing, organization, by-laws, location and equipment of plants, investment, management, sales methods, distribution costs, and accounting systems.

Lists are given of equipment needed for small plants with less than 250 gallons capacity, for plants to handle from 250 to 1,000 gallons, and for large plants handling more than 1,000 gallons a day. Figures obtained from

77 co-operative plants show that the average investment in the plant itself per gallon capacity is \$25.97 when the capacity is 500 gallons or less; \$22.77 when the capacity is from 500 to 1,000 gallons; \$11.60 when the capacity is 1,000 to 2,000 gallons; and \$19.14 when the capacity is from 2,000 to 8,000 gallons. In the same order, the investments per gallon capacity in equipment were \$28.73, \$31.79, \$11.89, and \$12.34. Estimates are given of the total amounts of money needed to establish and operate plants of these various capacities.

The three principal problems that confront the milk manager are, according to the bulletin, the securing of an adequate and proper milk supply, efficient and economical plant operation, and sales policies and methods of market distribution.

KEEP PUMPKINS ALL WINTER

Only Well-Ripened Specimens With Thick Rinds Should Be Stored—Keep Them Dry.

It isn't so very difficult to keep pumpkins, squash, etc., all winter if they are stored properly. Of course, only well-ripened pumpkins or squash, with thick rinds, and which are well colored, should be stored. They should be gathered carefully before hard frost. Any that are injured in gathering or otherwise should be discarded, and only the perfect specimens retained. Be sure to leave the stems on all the pumpkins. The ideal storage place is a dry room or dry basement where the temperature will average around 65 degrees or above. Place the pumpkins or squash on shelves, or at least keep them off of concrete floors or other places where there may be too much moisture. Do not pile them up, but keep the individual pumpkins separated from each other. With such care either pumpkins or squash should keep several months.

TIMES TO STUDY GARDENING

Fall and Winter Suggested as Good for Reading Up on Advanced Methods for Crops.

Fall and winter are good times to read and study advanced methods in gardening and growing truck crops for the market. Many new bulletins treating all of the various subjects on gardening have been published recently by state agricultural colleges and departments of agriculture. The bulletins will be sent free.

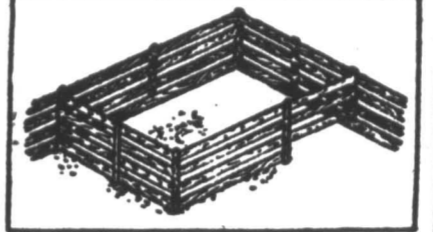
TEACH LITTLE PIGS TO EAT WHEN YOUNG

Customary to Wean Porkers When Six Weeks Old.

Small Pen Affords Opportunity to Feed Them Apple Parings, Sprouted Grains, Alfalfa Meal and Separator Milk.

The owner makes more profit when his pigs learn to eat at an early age. It is customary to wean pigs when they are about six weeks old, as that is about as long a time as the sow can afford to suckle them. If the young pigs learn to eat before weaning, they do not suffer a setback at the loss of the mother's milk.

There is no better way to teach young pigs to eat than to give them

the run of a small pen where they can find appetizers such as apple parings, sprouted grains, alfalfa meal and warm separator milk in a small, clean trough.

The drawing shows such a pen in the corner of the barnyard or hogyard. The bottom board of the fence is removed, which leaves an opening large enough for a six-week-old pig, but not large enough to permit the entrance of the sow or other large hogs.

VALUE OF MANURE REDUCED

Pronounced Detrimental Effect Noted at Geneva Station by Adding Wheat Straw.

Surprising results have been obtained by soil and crop experts at Geneva, New York, in a series of tests recently completed, from the use of wheat straw with horse manure. When fresh straw was added to manure and applied to growing crops, a pronounced detrimental effect was noted as compared with crops where fresh manure was used alone. It was further observed that when straw was added to the manure, together with some preservative, a marked loss of the organic matter of the manure resulted. The loss of organic matter amounted to 53 per cent during an interval of four months where peat was added to manure-straw mixture and only 32 per cent where the peat was added to manure alone.

The best results appear to follow the use of acid phosphate with manure in the stables. A couple of handfuls of the acid phosphate is scattered in each stall each day and the animals are allowed to trample it into the manure. The manure can then be stored in a covered shed, or pit, until it can be spread in the field.

HOGGING DOWN SMALL GRAIN

Three Years' Test at Ohio Shows Practice With Rye is Unprofitable With Hogs.

Whether or not it will pay to hog down small grains will depend upon circumstances, but probably it will not. Hogging down rye was found to be an unprofitable practice in pork production in a three years' test at the Ohio experiment station. The average daily gain of the hogs on rye was less than one-half of a pound, whereas when corn and tankage formed the concentrates and clover was used for pasture gains of more than one pound a day were secured. In addition, it required 478 pounds of rye to produce 100 pounds of pork. The rye would have returned a greater profit if it had been sold as a cash crop. Even when the hogs were allowed about one-fourth of a pound of tankage daily in addition to the rye, they consumed 634 pounds of rye as compared with 226 pounds of corn for 100 pounds of pork produced.

EXTENSION WORKER IS HELP

Found Most Successful in Conducting Demonstrations of Farm and Home Practices.

Over 2,100 of the 2,850 agricultural counties in the United States employ at least one agricultural extension worker, who acts as a joint representative of the United States Department of Agriculture and the State Agricultural college in conducting demonstrations of farm and home practices found most successful by experiments of these institutions. They also give advice and assistance in farming matters by personal visits, correspondence, telephone messages, community meetings and articles in the local press.

ALFALFA IS PREFERRED CROP

Heavier Yield of Hay Produced on Fertile, Well-Drained Soils Than of Sweet Clover.

Sweet clover is not recommended in preference to alfalfa for heavy, fertile, well-drained soils that are well supplied with lime, and free from quack grass, or June grass, unless the cost of seedling must be considered. It will grow to perfection on such soils, but alfalfa usually produces heavier crops of hay per acre.

HARDING FIGHTS BLOC ATTACK

PRESIDENT OPPOSES AMENDMENT PROVIDING FOR ABOLITION ELECTORAL COLLEGE.

CHANGE UNNECESSARY

ANOTHER PROVISION CALLS FOR CHANGE IN INAUGURATION DATES.

Washington.—Members of the new Progressive bloc in Congress got into action a few days ago, but at the very outset ran into White House opposition.

Led by Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, bloc members sitting on the Senate agriculture committee obtained a favorable report from that committee for a constitutional amendment providing for abolition of the electoral college and for direct election of the President and Vice President and for abolition of the long period of time usually elapsing between a congressional election and the regular meeting of the new Congress. Such an amendment forms one of the planks in the platform adopted by the bloc at its organization meeting.

Opposition on the part of President Harding to any such change in the constitution was expressed by a White House spokesman soon after the Senate agriculture committee resolution was laid before the Senate and assigned to a place on the calendar of business. Some administration leaders in the Senate likewise voiced their disapproval of the amendment and it appeared that any efforts by the bloc to press the proposal might bring on a fight which would test the power of the Progressive faction.

The proposed amendment would provide specifically that "the choice of each state for President and Vice President shall be determined in a general election of the qualified electors of such states," thus permitting voters to cast their ballots directly for President and Vice President. The vote would be canvassed by the Senate and House meeting in joint session, each state being given as many votes for this purpose as it has senators and representatives.

If such a canvass by states should disclose lack of a majority, then the President would be chosen by a majority vote of the House "from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as President." The vote for vice president would be canvassed in a similar manner, except that in event of no choice by a majority of the voters, the Senate would select that official as between the two persons receiving the largest number of votes.

The committee in reporting the amendment resolution through its chairman, Senator Norris, pointed out that the proposed system might result in the election of a President and vice president from different parties—"a matter of fundamental justice we ought to be protected by law in taking . . . should we desire to do it."

The amendment would further provide that the terms of senators and representatives should begin the first Monday in January following the biennial congressional election and that Congress should meet each year on that date. This would wipe out the session of the old Congress after the biennial elections.

Another provision of the amendment would be to change the date of inauguration of the President from March 4 to the third Monday in January. White House officials in presenting President Harding's views on the proposal represented the executive as feeling that constant changes in the constitution were unnecessary, and in some cases unwise. Mr. Harding, it was said, regarded the procedure under the constitution whereby a new Congress does not meet for more than a year after its election as one of the wisest steps taken by the nation's founding fathers, as it allows passions to cool.

To Recruit 5,000 Steel Men. Youngstown, Ohio.—The soviet government of Russia expects to recruit 5,000 steel workers from the Youngstown district this month, according to P. S. Calvert, president of the Kuzbas industrial colony, who began a search for puddlers, machinists, rollers and mill hands. Law to Protect President. Washington.—A Department of Justice bill prohibiting mailing of threatening letters to the President or members of his family with fines and penitentiary terms as penalties, was passed by the Senate and transmitted to the House. Italy to Club Criminals. Rome.—Criminals will be clubbed and sent to hospitals instead of being imprisoned, in the administration of justice under the Fascist regime in the province of Alessandria, Dr. P. P. Salvo, the secretary, said in an address to malefactors summoned before him. "Hereafter the Fascist undertake the administration of justice adopting different laws from those of the judicial authorities," Dr. Salvo said. "Whoever is guilty will not be sent to prison, but to the hospital—after being clubbed."

Up to Nov. 1 they put in 11,238 new freight cars, which 47,802 more than were procured during the entire year of 1921. On the date, this year, they had in service 896 new locomotives and had 1,232 more under orders at factories.

\$100,000 U. S. Notes Recovered

New York—Part of \$100,000 in United States treasury notes stolen from the Cleveland Trust Company of Cleveland, Ohio, on Oct. 11, was recovered in New York when officials of the Federal Reserve Bank recognized \$60 in notes of large denominations which had been left with a local brokerage firm by a stranger, who asked to have them changed into smaller

\$500,000 to Prevent Grain Rust

St. Louis—Members of the Conference for the Prevention of Grain Rust from the Middle West, who appeared before a Congressional subcommittee in support of an appropriation of \$500,000 for barberry eradication next year, have returned from Washington confident that Congress will grant the appropriation. The committee was told that a continuation of the campaign for the next years would make possible the ultimate control of black-stem rust of grain.

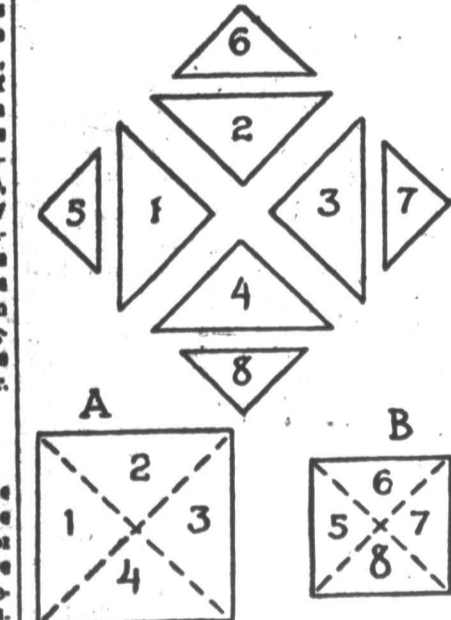

Wonderful Piece of Work

Feat of Engraver That is Not Likely to Be Duplicated for Many Years. The bureau of standards was recently asked to measure what is probably the smallest piece of engraving on glass in the world. The engraving consists of the Lord's Prayer (57-word version) engraved on glass in a space of .001 by .002 of an inch. The writing can only be seen under a high-power microscope, the magnification required being from 900 to 1,000 times. The measurements by which the above dimensions were determined were carried out in the laboratories of the bureau. The extremely small size of this engraving will be realized when it is considered that if a square inch were entirely filled with writing of this size the entire Bible could be written 25 times in that space—in other words, something more than 20,000,000 words could be written in a square inch.
