By the same proportion the Chino has net profits in sight of fully two hundred million dollars!

Let it be said here that the Chino comes nearer paying its just proportion of taxes than any one of the big mining companies in New Mexico. Instead of paying all told about six hundred and fifty thousand dollars in taxes, these mines should pay not less than two million dollars, and then they would not be paying in proportion to their ability to pay.

When one considers the fact that prior to the organization of the association, New Mexico pinto beans were sold on the markets of the country at a price far below Michigan navy and other varieties of beans while at the present time they are selling at a figure considerably in advance of all other varieties, the wonder is that the grow ers to the last man is not enthusiastic for the association.

Pintos are selling at a low price at this time, yet not as low as other kinds are selling and we venture the assertion that were it not for the association and its influence on the quality of the pintos going on to the market, they would not command a price locally above two and a half cents per pound.

There is a great future for the pinto bean industry in New Mexico in general and the Estancia valley in particular but the industry will not reach its highest pinnacle of success until each and every grower has identified himself with the association in a whole-hearted way .-Contributed.
