ANOTHER STORY

The following account of the Duan tragedy is from the Carrizozo

Charles F. Lackland, fireman or the Carrizozo-Duran division, was shot and killed at Duran Monday evening at 7:30 by Howard Avent, watchman for the railroad company

The statement of eye witnesses to he tragedy is, in substance as fol-

Avent, who had reached Duran or No. 4, having been down the line as far as Alamogordo, had gone to his home, when a man by the name of Barnett was seen to approach him and, apparently, engage him in conversation. Immediately Avent left his home and turned toward the depot, near where Lackland was standing. Lackland, so the statement continues, was not aware of the proximity of Avent, his back being to the man at whose hands he was soon to die, made a move to roll or light a cigarette and in doing so turned in the direction from which Avent was approaching. Just as Lackland turned, Avent, who was some forty feet distant, opened fire. The first shot passed through Lackland's hand which he was in the act of raising to his mouth, and went on through his left shoulder. The baptism of children and reception second shot took effect in the abdomen, passing through the body, at which Lackland fell. As the wounded man fell, Avent continued shooting, one bullet entering near the spine and passing out at the right faith in Christ, and who desire to breast.
