COMMISSIONERS MEET

In An Important Regular Quarterly Session in the City on Monday April 1.

LARGE NUMBER OF BILLS PAID

And the Finances of the County Found to Be in First Class Condition.

At a regular quarterly meeting of the board of county commissioners held in the court house in this city commencing April 1, there were present Chairman David Farr, Commissioner Pedro S. Contreras, Clerk E. H. Sweet, Interpreter E. S. Stapleton, and Sheriff Aniceto C. Abeytia.

The bill of Misais Baca, ex-sheriff, for feeding prisoners during the last quarter was presented, but the board deferred action upon it until the opinion of the district attorney could be obtained as to the legality of payment.

The report of E. S. Stapleton as special road commissioner was approved.

J. W. Richardson of Rosedale petitioned the board to revoke the liquor license of S. G. Vivian of Rosedale. Action was deferred pending investigation.

The clerk was instructed to co-operate with the territorial engineer in selecting places along the Rio Grande where the two thousand dollars appropriated by the territorial legislature to increase the surface flow of the river shall be expended.

The clerk was instructed to purchase a type-writer for the use of Superintendent D. A. Ortega, the purchase to be made, however, subject to the approval of the district attorney.

Commissioner Contreras introduced a resolution authorizing Chairman David Farr to borrow money on notes in behalf of the county to make necessary repairs on the court house and jail building.

The clerk was instructed to request District Attorney H. A. Wolford to be present at the meetings of the board in person or by deputy.

The sum of \$250.00 was appropriated from the road fund to make such repairs as the chairman of the board might deem necessary on the Blue Canon road, \$150.00 to make repairs on the road at Durfee Hill, and \$150.00 to make repairs on the Chupadero road.

Warrants had been drawn for \$125.00 each in favor of the county commissioners for salary for the first quarter of 1907 when it was discovered that the salary is \$100.00 a quarter instead. The board decided to let the warrants stand and deduct \$25.00 from each salary for the next quarter.

The clerk was instructed to confer with the local Masonic lodge to ascertain for what price the property on the corner northwest from the court house can be bought. Also, the clerk was instructed to notify the sheriff to reduce the salary of the jail guard to \$10.00 a month until such time as the number of prisoners in the jail would justify the need of a guard continuously.

Sheriff Abeytia was instructed to dispose of the lumber used in the erection of a scaffold for the execution of Carlos Sais.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE COPPER RIDGE MINING AND DEVELOPMENT COMPANY.

Know all men by these presents; That we, the undersigned, hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of Arizona:

First: The name of the corporation shall be the Copper Ridge Mining and Development Company, the principal office of said corporation in Arizona, shall be at Phoenix, Arizona. But said corporation shall have an office at Colorado Springs, in the state of Colorado, or at such other place or places outside of Arizona as the by-laws shall provide, where the books of the corporation may be kept, all stockholders' and directors' meetings held, and all corporate business transacted.

Second: The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation is as follows:

To, in any manner and in any place, as principal, agent, trustee, or otherwise, acquire, deal in or dispose of, all kinds of real and personal property, including mines, mining claims, oil lands, coal lands, gas lands, or any of the products thereof, water, water rights and machinery, and to work, mine, explore, and develop the same; to acquire, and dispose of shares of the capital stock and bonds of other corporations; to borrow money, and to execute notes, bonds, mortgages or other evidences of indebtedness; to make all contracts and to exercise all rights in respect to any of the above kinds of property that a natural person might or could make or exercise.

Third: The capital stock of this corporation shall be five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), divided into five hundred thousand shares of the par value of one dollar (\$1.00) each. At such times as the Board of Directors may direct, said stock shall be paid up in cash, property, services, or other thing of value, and the judgment of the directors as to the value thereof shall be final. All said capital stock, when issued, shall be and become fully paid and forever non-assessable.

Fourth: The commencement of this corporation shall be the date of the filing of these articles according to law and the termination thereof shall be twenty-five years thereafter, with privilege of renewal for like periods perpetually.

Fifth: The affairs of this corporation shall be conducted by a Board of seven directors, and the following named shall constitute the Board of Directors until their successors are elected: Chas. Pelta, Geo. Keith, A. P. Latham, Lewis J. Pelta, H. F. Hines, Geo. P. Hopkins and J. G. Brown.

The greater part of the Board of Directors shall be elected from among the stockholders at the annual stockholders' meeting to be held on the Fifteenth day in the month of January of each year. The officers of said corporation until their successors are elected shall be: Chas. Pelta, President; J. G. Brown, Vice-President; Geo. Keith, Secretary and Geo. P. Hopkins, treasurer.

Sixth: The highest amount of indebtedness, direct or contingent, to which this corporation is at any one time to subject itself shall be no dollars.

Seventh: The private property of the stockholders and officers of this corporation shall be exempt from all corporate debts.

THE NEW SCHOOL LAW

Superintendent J. E. Clark Calls Attention to Some of Its Provisions.

J. E. Clark, territorial superintendent of public instruction, has issued a circular letter addressed to county school superintendents and calling their attention to some of the provisions of the new school law enacted by the thirty-seventh legislative assembly. For the benefit of the teachers and school directors and all others who take an active interest in the schools, The Chieftain reproduces Superintendent Clark's letter, as follows:

Dear Sirs:

It is quite unfortunate that our educational bill was made one of the very last orders of business in the recent legislative assembly. Some very unsatisfactory conditions result from this fact.

A digest of school legislation of 1907 is mailed to you, and I wish to call your attention to certain points in as brief a way as possible.

You will note that Section III, dispenses with the County Board of School Examiners. The attention of District Judges and Boards of County Commissioners will be called to this point.

The County Superintendent will hold examinations at such times, places, and in such manner as may be prescribed by the Territorial Board of Education. All papers will be graded at the office of public instruction. Let me caution against being too liberal with permits. The law forbids issuing twice to the same person.

The new law requires every institute conductor and instructor to hold a certificate from the Territorial Board of Education. The County Superintendent cannot make a legal contract for institute work with a person not holding such a certificate.

All institutes should be held late in the summer, in August, preferably. Dates, places, and wages paid to conductors and instructors must be approved by the superintendent of public instruction.

We shall be very strict in the matter of issuing excuses to teachers for non-attendance at institutes.

The Territorial Board of Education will adopt text-books June tenth. All schools, rural, village, town, and city, must use the books adopted. There will be no alternative. We shall secure lower prices on books by this plan. All parents will appreciate this.

The Territorial Superintendent of Public Instruction or his Assistant will visit as many institutes during the summer as possible.

Aside from the conductor, an instructor in primary methods is recommended in every county where the "Institute Fund" will warrant it.

Notify the clerks of boards of school directors that their statistical reports must be on file in your office within ten days after June fifteenth.

According to this law, the election of school directors should have occurred Monday, April first. There can be no legal election of directors this year. You will be instructed in due time how to meet the emergency legally.

Arrangements for the county institutes constitute the next order of business of this office. Your correspondence is solicited. I have had no help in this office until to-day. I trust, therefore, that you will pardon my not having kept you in close touch with plans.

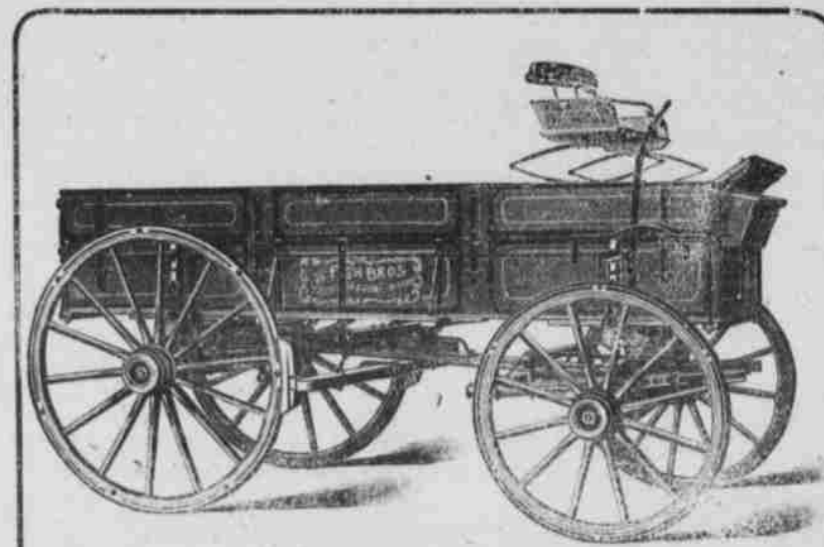

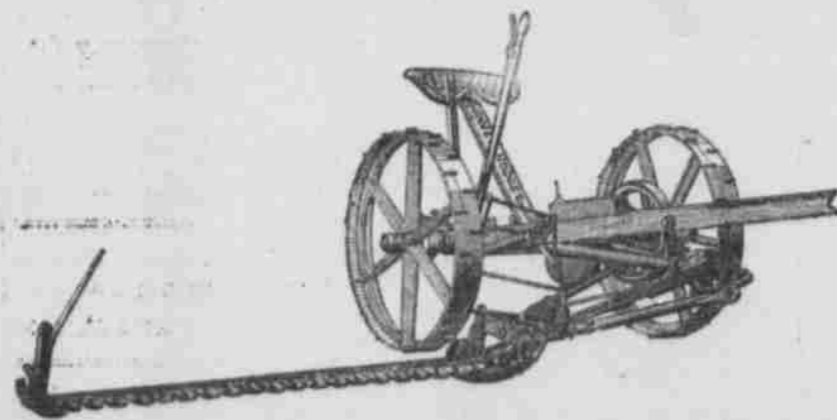
