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## Taxpayers of Lincoln County.

The proposition to vote \$20,000 of the bonds of the county, July 2nd, 1891, should be well considered and every man should vote for it only after an honest investigation and a deliberate conclusion as to its merits. No conscientious taxpayer desires to incur a public indebtedness and impose burdens of taxation upon himself and his neighbors unless there appears some adequate return for the proposed outlay.

In the first place, is there an urgent demand for the immediate building of a new court house for Lincoln County? The present building has been in use by the county less than eleven years and while the county embraced what is now the three counties of Lincoln, Chaves and Eddy, was sufficient for the purpose. With about 60 per cent. of the county business taken away from us by the creation of the new counties it surely ought to serve our purposes for at least a few years longer.

Second—The present county buildings, within the last few years cost us nearly \$30,000, or considerably more money than it is proposed to put into this new building. Hence we cannot expect, under similar conditions, to erect for \$20,000 a better building than the one we already have, costing largely more than that sum. The proposition then means that the county is to squander \$20,000 and add nothing to its convenience in carrying on the public business, or it means that we are to be called on next year for \$30,000 or \$50,000 more to complete what this \$20,000 has but just commenced.

Everybody knows that the amount proposed to be raised will build no court house at all creditable to even the poorest county in the Territory, and therefore such an expenditure, without a greater one following it, would simply be a waste of money.

Third—With our present burdensome taxes we are prepared to assume additional obligations. It is easy to vote and issue bonds, but are the taxes, with which these bonds are to be paid, so entirely raised by the property holders? How many of us now find it difficult to pay the annual demands of the public through the tax collector? How much more difficult will it be to discharge the greater demands where the debt is more than doubled as it will be on the issuing of the aforesaid bonds?

On January 1, 1891, the bonded debt of Lincoln County was \$15,000, after deducting the amounts due from Chaves and Eddy counties. It is now proposed to add to this bonded debt \$20,000, or much more than we owe at present, thus considerably more than doubling our existing debt.

Fourth—The counties of Chaves and Eddy have not paid the amounts due from them, and so far, have shown no disposition to do so. When payment of these amounts can be enforced is a question no one can answer. Until they are paid Lincoln County stands charged with a debt of \$36,000. This debt the county is primarily responsible for, and must pay whether the amounts due from the new counties are paid or not. The indebtedness from Chaves and Eddy counties was due to Lincoln County and payable on the 1st day of January, 1891, and there is no assurance that it will ever be paid without long and expensive litigation.

While we must always favor a judicious expenditure of public money for necessary purposes, we do not see the propriety of, or do any urgent demand for the outlay

county buildings, with some necessary repairs, to be ample sufficient for the mass and purposes of the county for the present. We are therefore opposed to the issuing of the court house bonds and the consequent increase of our rate of taxation at this time, and we appeal to every taxpayer in Lincoln County who places the interests of the public above the promotion of the merely selfish aims of a few schemers who seek only to speculate off the people's money to join us in securing the defeat of a proposition which is instigated alone by a desire for public plunder.

We are fully aware that there are a few persons who have congregated about the proposed new court house who live off of the county of Lincoln. They have no other visible means of support than what they pick up from the residents of the other portions of the county, whose misfortune compels them to visit the county seat. These leeches and vampires are the investigators and promoters of the scheme to rob the taxpayers of the county in order that their means of support may be increased. They are mendicants, only preferring to secure their subsistence by such indirect means rather than honestly making application to be placed on the list of public paupers.

When the bonds are issued and the funds exhausted, these same beggars will demand another issue, that the stream may be kept flowing into their hungry maws. If it is denied them, they will be compelled to seek some honest labor for a subsistence, or leave the country.

## Newsdealer Laws.

Dr. Traskman, editor of the Workman, Cleveland, has taken some pains to collect and compile the decisions of the U. S. Courts on this subject and gives in his Washington Post, as the result of his investigations, the following, which may be relied upon as correct.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered willing to renew their subscriptions.
2. If the subscriber orders the discontinuance of his periodical the publisher may continue to send it until all arrearages are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodicals from the office to which they are directed, they are responsible until they have notified the publisher and ordered them discontinued.
4. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publisher and the papers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that refusing to take periodicals from the office or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional refusal.
6. If subscribers do not in advance they are held to give notice at the end of the time if they do not wish to continue taking it, otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it, and the subscriber will be responsible until express notice, with payment of all arrearages, is sent to the publisher.

The latest postal laws are such that newspaper publishers can arrest any one for fraud who takes a paper and refuses to pay for it. Under this law the man who allows his subscription to run along for some time unpaid and then orders it discontinued, or orders the postmaster to mark it "refused," or have a postal card sent notifying the publisher, leaves himself liable to arrest and fine for the same as for theft.
