A. J. COURY KILLED

Last Saturday evening as A. J. Coury of Duran was closing his store five Mexicans entered and asked to buy some small articles. One of them asked for a drink and was directed to the rear of the room, one remaining at the front. As Mr. Coury went behind the counter to wait on the supposed customers they drew revolvers and as he turned told him to throw up his hands. Reports say he did not comply, but threw something which he got hold of. The taller of the robbers shot him twice, both shots striking him in the face, and he was instantly killed. Mrs. Coury, who was present, grappled with the murderer, aided by her little daughter, and wrenched a revolver away from him. In the struggle she was shot just above the hip. The robbers then fled.

Mrs. Coury was taken to a hospital at El Paso, and reports say that her wound is not dangerous and

The murdered man, Mr. Coury, was a leading merchant of Duran and a leading citizen of the county, universally esteemed as a good man and a good citizen. He had been engaged in business in Duran for many years.

Beans the last week or so have peen in strong demand, at steadily advancing prices, and with prospects of a short crop, there seems no reason to expect a decline of any great noment, surely not back to the figures where beans reposed since last

Truthfully speaking, America is going to have to feed a good share she is not going to have any large surplus with which to do it. We're going to have to pay more for our foodstuffs, too. Potatoes will be in small supply, and beans, a good substitute, will be in demand.

Our market letters this saus, with but one (r two exceptions, point to better prices for almost every variaty of beans. The one real exception is the blackeye crop, which will probably appropen record figures.

In Michigan, New York and Caliifornia, the production of small white beans is seriously cut, the low prices which prevailed so long having forced the growers to turn to more profitable varieties. The hot weather, and in some cases, blight, further cut production. Farmers, too, are not very anxious to dispose of what beans they still have on hand. Canners and wholesale growers are getting out of their "gloom" and starting to buy more freely. They can see far enough ahead to realize that beans are going to be wanted badly, and with easier money, are not so afraid to anticipate their requirements as they were.

One Michigan dealer predicted \$5" beans within seven weeks." Indications as this is written are that he will have several weeks to spare.


