B. A. NYMEYER PAINFULLY INJURED BY MILK WAGON

Quite a serious accident befell one of our oldest and most respected citizens, B. A. Nymeyer, county surveyor, last Saturday night about eight o'clock, as he was crossing the street near the E. T. Carter residence, on his way to town. Mr. Nymeyer was going south and a number of cars passed going north the lights from them dazzling him, and that added to the fact that the light on the street was not burning, prevented him from seeing the approaching milk wagon which was going west. Mr. Wersell says that he did not see any one crossing the street until they were right on him and that he stopped as soon as possible. He carries no light on his wagon, and Mr. Nymeyer being totally deaf, did not hear its approach.

Rude Wilcox and Claude Eaker, who were passing picked the injured man up and Dr. Poepp coming along took him to his home in his car. It was found on examination, that no bones were broken, but the muscles of the entire body seem to be sprained and Mr. Nymeyer will in all probability be confined to his bed for some time.

Mr. Nymeyer, realizing his infirmity, is always cautious about crossing the street, and the accident might have been avoided had the milk wagon been carrying a light, as he always watches closely. The affair is very unfortunate as Mr. Nymeyer is getting up in years, and from that fact, his recovery is bound to be slower than that of a younger man.

MEMORIAL SERVICE LAST FRIDAY FOR REVEREND GEORGE H. GIVAN

The Memorial service for the late Rev. George H. Givan, held last Friday morning at the Methodist church, during the sessions of the District Conference, was worthy of more than the passing notice we were obliged to give in last week's Current. The meeting was in charge of Bishop DuBose, a personal friend of Reverend Givan, who gave brief testimony to the worth of his friend, after which the good old hymn, "How Firm A Foundation" was sung, and prayer offered. Touching remarks were made by Reverend Allison, and J. C. Jones, of Roswell, and other ministers and a tribute of affection written by Miss Conner, was read by the secretary of the conference. Afterwards, "Grandma" Stanford spoke her appreciation of the kindness she had ever received at the hands of her pastor, and Judge D. G. Grantham gave a most eloquent and touching address on his relations with the deceased. The full choir, with Mrs. Bates at the piano, sang the favorite song of Brother Givan by request, "Love Lifted Me," and the benediction was pronounced. The services were marked by a solemnity and tenderness seldom felt even on a similar occasion. A committee was appointed to draft suitable resolutions for the family and the press, and which will appear in due time.

Hunick, who was called to Los Angeles, to attend the burial of his mother, tells that he was taken down almost immediately on his arrival there with the flu, and is confined to his bed at this time. No serious results are feared, but the illness will interfere greatly with his plans, he having expected to return to his home the last of the present week.

SENIOR DAY

The annual student body celebration of Senior Day events was observed at the High School Friday. This is a gala day in the history of the Senior class and the source of widespread attraction to the visitors and well-wishers of school affairs. On this day the Senior class is given complete charge of the institution of knowledge. They teach and grade the classes, form the detention lists, conduct the periods and every duty connected with the observance of "law and order." The results of their four years training in keen observation is given a test, with initiative an important factor. No suggestions or helps are offered; the faculty tactfully remaining in seclusion while the "passing pedagogues are at the helm."

At an early hour the pro-tem faculty arrived and arranged the program for the day. Each member was in appropriate costume. Misses Albritton, Etter, Elizabeth and Catherine Purdy, typified the popular conception of a "School Teacher." Their dresses were of the pre-war design, (Civil War) with a coiffure to match. They pronounced learning to their classes with sedate mannerisms but their solemnity produced an opposing effect upon the students.

Misses Dorothy Batton and Barber Nell Thomas were the modern Normal School graduates. Their dress was modern and with ideas to match. Their representation and characterization of the 1922 model teacher was perfect, with the appearance of the exact age as that of their pupils and with a trained ear waiting for the closing bell.

Herbert Hiltson was the rube "professor," and John Lewis "a noted artist." Glenwood Jackson, an English sportsman, John Owen Eakin a student of many lands and noted bug authority. Virgil McCollum and Dudley Usery were, "The Spirit of the Passing West;" Alkali Ike and Two Gun Pete. They served as the law and order for the day.

At the close of the twenty minute period the following program was given:

Song, congregation, "Ma." Address, "Qualities of Worth in the New-Faculty and Bad Qualities in the Old," Supt. Herbert Hiltson. Duett, Opera Selections, Virgil McCollum, Glenwood Jackson (Stopped by request).

Address, "Evils of Detention," Principal Martha Williams. Talk, "Bugs of All Races," by Prof. John Owen Eakin. Speech, "Wonderful Paintings Seen Abroad, Painted by Myself," John Lewis.

The program closed with a riot that was a supreme test on the new faculty. The students refused to stop applauding and go back to classes and in order to master the difficult situation the faculty sang another song.

Following the program three of the male instructors declared an adjournment while they were gone on a horse-back ride. During their absence the detention list became very popular, there being twenty-seven honorary places. In the noon hour the official photograph of the new faculty was taken.

The class of '22 successfully performed the standard historical custom of this day but in keeping with their spirit of live classes they added many new and original events, setting a record that coming classes will experience difficulties in attaining. And many other records of this class will be out of the reach of many. In the graduation of this class, Carlsbad will witness not only one of the best classes but, THE GRADUATION CLASS of the Carlsbad High School. A broad statement, but supported by popular opinion and past events. To those who watch school events a class who "can do" and "does do" brings a

rather restful joy to the watchers. Carlsbad has always been blessed with an excellent school system but each year sees the same senior class activities. The same old parties, the same trip to the caves, the same play, the same annual. A new standard now floats above the haunts of the present senior class. This year it was not the senior play, but a production that ranked with the best of amateur shows and the crowd left with the feeling of having witnessed an excellent evening's entertainment rather than just a donation because it was a school affair. A list of the original parties and activities would fill this sheet. The Echo up to this date is far beyond its predecessors. An Honor Club has been organized, which is a great interest-creator and proving an incentive for high grades and leader-ship.

(By REV. P. B. FITZWATER, D. D., Teacher of English Bible in the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

LESSON FOR MARCH 25

REVIEW

GOLDEN TEXT—The Lord is righteous in all His ways, and holy in all His works.—Psalm 145:17.

DEVOTIONAL READING—Psalm 130.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Favorite Stories of the Quarter.

JUNIOR TOPIC—Israel's Heroic Prophets.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Estimate of Elijah, Elisha, Jonah and Amos.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Social Teachings of the Quarter's Lessons.

The method of review will largely be determined by the taste of the teachers and the grade in the school concerned. To the writer's taste, two good methods are available: the biographical and the summary. In using the biographical, the lives of four great prophets, Elijah, Elisha, Jonah and Amos may be considered. These four men are connected with nearly all the lessons of the quarter. This method can be used to good advantage in nearly all the grades of the school. In the summary method the principal fact of each lesson with its leading lesson should be set forth. This method can be used to good advantage in the adult departments. The following is a suggested summary:

Lesson I. Rehoboam refused to grant the request of the people for the lightening of the burdens of taxation. Because of this ten tribes under the leadership of Jeroboam revolted and formed another kingdom. The most effective cure for social and political unrest is justice by the rulers to those ruled.

Lesson II. Elijah, after announcing to Ahab the withholding of rain for a term of years, fled and was fed by the ravens and by the widow at Zarephath. God adapts himself to the circumstances of His servants, and sometimes in the most unlikely ways provides for His own.

Lesson III. At the request of Elijah, Ahab called the people together to witness a supreme challenge of Baal worship. Faith in God will stand the most severe test. The fire of God is the unfailing sign which differentiates true from false religion.

Lesson IV. Elijah, though brave before the 450 prophets of Baal, fled for his life from Jezebel. God dealt most gently with his discouraged servant. We should learn from this that frequently we fall in our strongest point.

Lesson V. Naboth refused to sell his vineyard to Ahab, whereupon through Jezebel's plot he was murdered, and Ahab took possession. Nations and kings should respect the rights of individuals.

Lesson VI. When Elijah's work was finished, God took him to heaven by a whirlwind. Elijah had once requested death, but God had a better way for him to go to heaven than by way of death.

Lesson VII. The Shunammite woman, seeing Elisha passing by on errands for God, was moved to provide a comfortable lodging for him, whereupon Elisha sought to recompense her by promising that God would give her a child. Not infrequently has the prophet's chamber brought blessing to the home.

Lesson VIII. At the command of Elisha, Naaman dipped himself seven times in the Jordan and was healed of leprosy. In order to be healed of the leprosy of sin, human pride and vanity must be put away and obedience rendered to God.

Lesson IX. The king of Assyria sent a great army to apprehend Elisha because he had repeatedly informed the king of Israel concerning the movements of the Assyrian army. When the Lord opened the eyes of Elisha's servant, he beheld the mountains filled with horses and chariots of fire. "The angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear him, and delivereth them." "Lord, open our eyes!"

Lesson X. At the preaching of Jonah, the wicked city of Nineveh repented and God showed mercy. God's mercy and forgiveness should move us to preach the gospel to the heathen.

Lesson XI. The children of Israel prided themselves in their security and gave themselves to luxury and sensual indulgences. God sent Amos to warn them of the judgment which must follow. The Lord will bring the ungodly to judgment for their ungodly living.

Lesson XII. In due time the prophecy of Amos came true. The Assyrians came and carried the children of Israel into captivity, from which they never returned. Rejection of God and the despising of His worship will be followed with judgment and destruction.

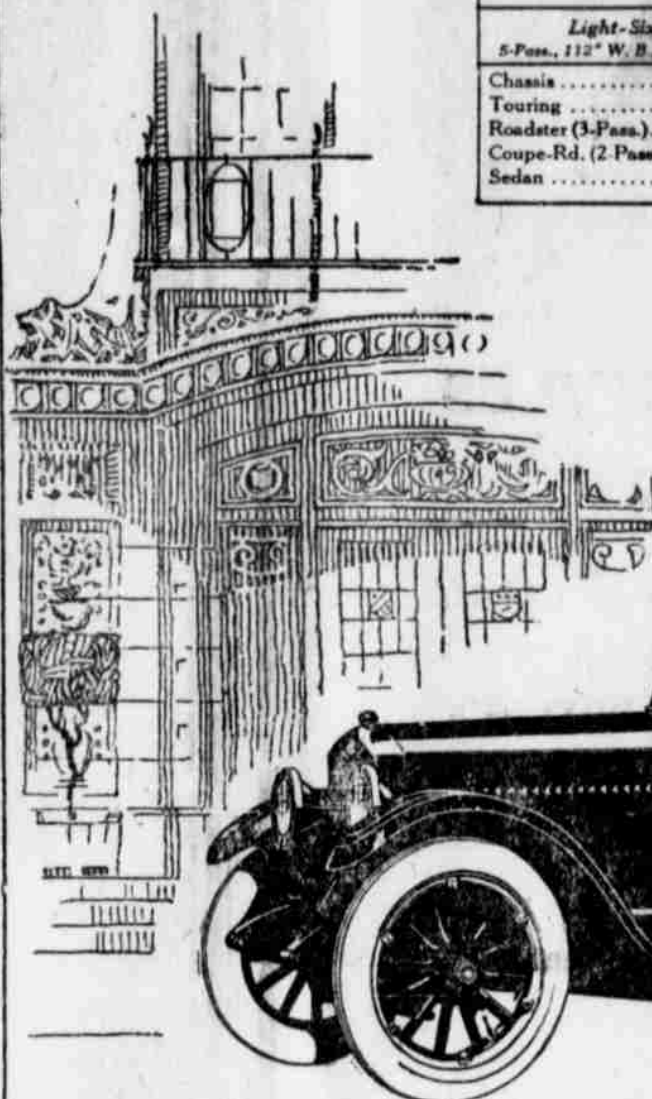

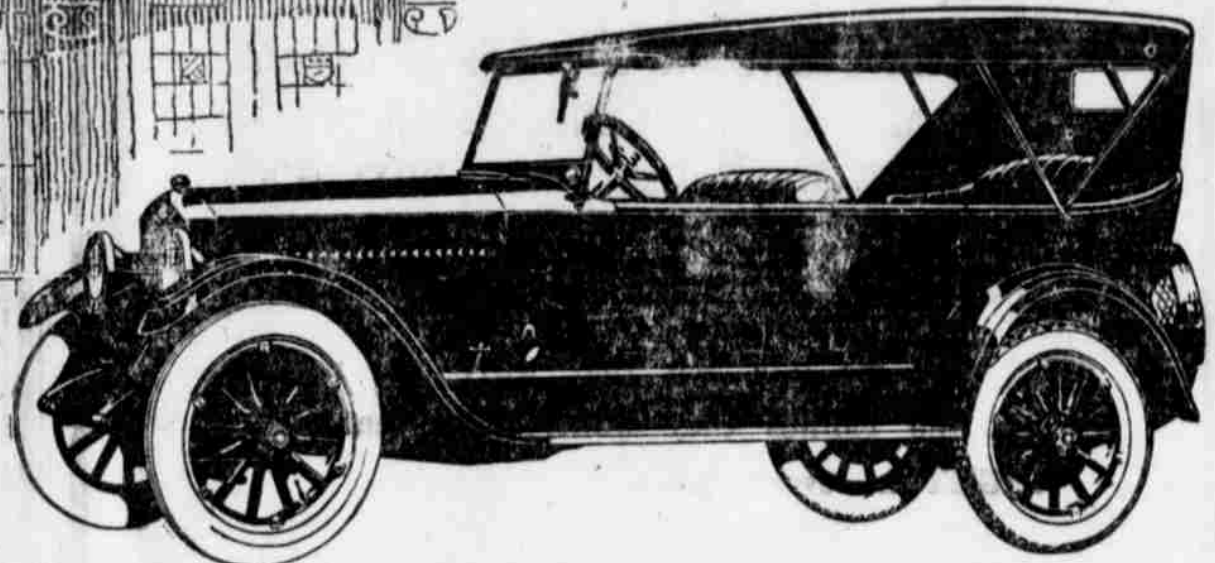
